### Police Department.

Report for the Quarter Ending June 30, 1911.

July 8, 1911.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, New York City:

Sir—As required by section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to submit the following report for the quarter ending June 30, 1911:

On June 30, 1911, the total force was 9,964. In addition, there were on probation 1 Surgeon, 236 Patrolmen, and 3 Matrons.

Of the above there were absent without leave, 396; absent without leave, none; sick, 262; suspended, 6.

During the last quarter the gains and losses in the several ranks were as follows:

Appointed: Patrolmen, 87; Doorman, 1; Surgeon on Probation, 1; Patrolmen on Probation, 285; Matrons on Probation, 3.

Retired: Surgeon, 1; Inspector, 1; Lieutenants, 14; Sergeants, 7; Patrolmen, 53; Doorman, 1.

Died: Sergeants, 2; Patrolmen, 14; Lineman, 1; Matron, 1.

Dismissed: Captain, 1; Patrolmen, 10; Patrolman on Probation, 1; Matron, 1.

Resigned: Patrolmen, 5; Patrolmen on Probation, 6.

Reinstated: Lieutenant, 1; Patrolmen, 3.

Reappointed: Patrolmen, 2.

Promoted: To Inspector, 5; to Captain, 14; to Lieutenant, 47; to Sergeant, 78.

The following schedules give for the quarter ending June 30, 1911, the statistics customarily reported:

Sick Time—The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received during the quarter, and a brief summary of the work of the Surgeons of the Department will be found in the schedule annexed marked "A."

Arrests—The statistics regarding arrests are given in the schedule annexed marked "B."

Lost Children—The number of lost children received by the Department and disposed of is given in the schedule annexed marked "C."

House of Detention—The particulars regarding witnesses confined in the House of Detention are given in the schedule annexed marked "D."

Disposition of Property Coming Into the Hands of the Police—Figures showing the value of lost or stolen property recovered and returned to owners, transactions of Property Clerk's office, etc., will be found in the schedule annexed marked "E."

Sanitary Co. (Boiler Squad)—The transactions of the Sanitary Company (Boiler Squad) for the quarter will be found in the schedule marked "F."

Discipline—The annexed schedule marked "G" gives in brief a record for the quarter of disciplinary transactions concerning members of the force.

Licenses—The number and character of licenses issued during the quarter, the fees received and the number of applications for licenses denied will be found in the schedule annexed marked "H."

Detective Bureau—The work accomplished by the Detective Bureau during the quarter is shown in the schedule annexed marked "I."

Pension Bureau—Number of applications received for pensions during the quarter and action taken thereon is shown in schedule marked "J."

Veterinary Surgeons—Operations of the Veterinary Surgeons' staff for the quarter are given in schedule marked "K."

Identification Bureau—Identification cards issued, etc., schedule marked "L."

Among the arrests, shown in Schedule "B" were 5,850 cases in which summons were served. The figures in detail, showing the offenses for which summons were served, are shown in a table appended to Schedule "B." Respectfully,

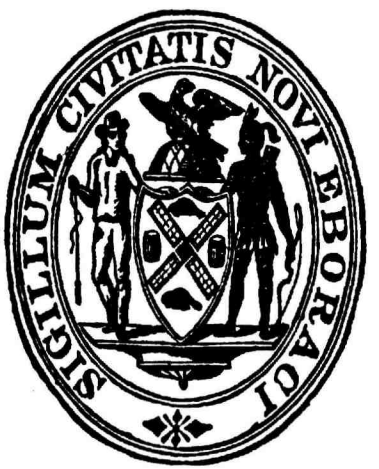

Proposed Amendments to the Rules and Regulations for Plumbing and Drainage.

### WATER SUPPLY.

HOUSE SERVICE PIPE MUST CONNECT to the street mains by means of taps supplied

by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

A stop and waste cock must be placed under the sidewalk at the curb, and also a separate stop or valve upon the service pipe just inside the front wall.

The diameters of street service pipes must not be less than one inch for dwellings, one and one-half inches for tenements or apartment houses, and two inches for hotels, factories and other miscellaneous buildings.

That all rising lines have a stop cock or valve at the foot of each line and a separate stop cock or valve on the branches from riser for each fixture, if isolated, or each group of fixtures, such as bath rooms, kitchens, etc., located so as to be accessible at all times.

Diameters of branches to any fixture must not be less than one-half inch. For flushometer valves not less than one inch for urinals and one and one-quarter inches for waterclosets.

Where hot water supply pipes are installed, the distance between the hot and cold risers and branches must not be less than twelve inches, and a method of circulation provided that will insure the prompt delivery of hot water at the faucet when required.

All risers and branches, where possible, must be exposed and properly fastened.

Beginning at the intersection of the easterly side of line of Hedwig street prolonged northerly with the southerly side of line of Grand street, as shown on Section 17 of the Final Maps of the Borough of Queens, adopted June 26, 1908, running westerly along the southerly side, or line of Grand street to the point or place where the southerly side of line of Grand street intersects a line distant at all times 100 feet, measured at right angles from the northerly side or line of Flushing avenue; running thence westerly along the said line distant 100 feet, measured at right angles from the northerly side or line of Flushing avenue, and parallel to said Flushing avenue to a point where said line intersects the line midway at all times between Fresh Pond road and Clermont avenue produced northerly; running thence southerly and at all times midway between the easterly line of Fresh Pond road and the westerly line of Fresh Pond road and production of this course to the southerly line of Hebbard avenue; thence westerly along said southerly line of Hebbard avenue to a point midway between the easterly line of Mary street and the westerly line of Fresh Pond road; thence southerly and at all times midway between the easterly line of Mary street and the westerly line of Fresh Pond road and the production of this course to the southeasterly line of Eliot avenue; thence on the production of the last-mentioned course to the southerly line of Metropolitan avenue; thence westerly along the southerly line of Metropolitan avenue to the easterly line of Vincent street; thence southerly along the easterly line of Vincent street and the production of this line to the southerly line of Ralph street; thence westerly along the southerly line of Ralph street to a point midway between the easterly line of Prospect avenue and the westerly line of Fresh Pond road; thence southerly to a point on the northerly line of Putnam avenue midway between the easterly line of Prospect avenue and the westerly line of Fresh Pond road; thence southerly along the southerly line of Putnam avenue; thence easterly along the southerly line of Putnam avenue to a point midway between the easterly line of Buchman avenue and the westerly line of Fresh Pond road; thence southerly to a point on the northerly line of Myrtle avenue midway between the easterly line of Buchman avenue and the westerly line of Fresh Pond road; thence southerly along a line at right angles at all times to Myrtle avenue to the intersection of this line with the westerly side or line of Fanny street; thence northerly along the westerly side or line of Fanny street and projection northerly thereof to the northerly side or line of Myrtle avenue; thence easterly along the northerly line of Myrtle avenue to a point on the northerly side of Myrtle avenue midway between the intersection of the southeasterly line of Kossuth place and the northerly line of Myrtle avenue and the intersection of the easterly line of Central avenue and the northerly line of Myrtle avenue; thence northerly to a point on the northerly side of Halleck avenue or production thereof midway between the easterly line of Fresh Pond road and the westerly line of Sedgwick street; thence northerly and at all times midway between the easterly line of Fresh Pond road and the westerly line of Sedgwick

street or production thereof to a point on the northerly line of Madison street; thence easterly along the northerly line of Madison street to a point midway between the easterly line of Fresh Pond road and the westerly line of Doubleday street; thence northerly to a point formed by the intersection of the easterly line of Lilac street with the northerly line of Metropolitan avenue; thence northerly along the easterly line of Lilac street and the production of said line to the northerly line of Eliot avenue; thence easterly along the northerly line of Eliot avenue to a point midway between the easterly line of Fresh Pond road and the westerly line of Mount Olivet avenue; thence northerly to a point formed by the intersection of the easterly line of Hedwig street with the northerly line of Mount Olivet avenue; thence northerly along the easterly line of Hedwig street and the production thereof to the southerly line of Grand street, the point or place of beginning.

Fourth—That, provided there be no objections filed to either of said abstracts, our final report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof, for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Court House, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 27th day of October, 1911, at the opening of the Court on that day.

Fifth—In case, however, objections are filed to any of said abstracts of estimate and assessment, the notice of motion to confirm our final report herein will stand adjourned to the date to be hereafter specified, and of which notice will be given to all those who have heretofore appeared in this proceeding, as well as by publication in the City Record, pursuant to Sections 981 and 984 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by Chapter 658 of the Laws of 1906.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant, free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with the exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the De-

partment of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department of Finance, for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
