MESSAGE FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, February 17, 1891.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

It is with great sorrow that I officially announce to you the death of General William T. Sherman, the great soldier, the distinguished patriot, and our most beloved citizen. On his retirement from the Army of the United States, he came to live with us. Foremost in public spirit, and always ready to aid in charitable and civic enterprises, his loss, while a calamity to the United States, is greatest to the people of the city of his home. His services as Chairman of the Johnstown Relief Committee, and as member of the World's Fair Committee and other public bodies, showed his value in civil life no less than in war. in civil life no less than in war.

Out of respect to his memory, and as a token of the love and esteem in which he is held by all the citizens of this metropolis, as well as of the country, I recommend that the public offices be closed on Thursday next—the day of his obsequies; that all citizens be requested to close their places of business from one to five o'clock on the afternoon of that day, and that the flags be displayed at half-mast on public and private buildings until Saturday next, and that your Honorable Body take such further action as you may deem proper. MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By the President -

Whereas, General William Tecumseh Sherman, a brilliant soldier, a true patriot and an honored citizen of this great metropolis, has answered his last roll-call after attaining more than the allotted age of three score and ten, nearly half a century of which was spent in the service of his country, in support of its flag, and to perpetuate its constitutional liberties; and

Whereas, In the death of General Sherman, the last of the great military leaders in the war of the Rebellion, every household in this the city of his adoption, that he loved so well, and wherein he endeared himself to so many, feels a void as if the dread messenger had entered and summoned a member of its own family; and

Whereas, The brilliant military services of the late General Sherman form an imperishable era in the history of our common country, and his marvelous aptitude for leadership, his strategical acumen, his fatherly solicitude for the welfare of the common soldier and his departure from all previously accepted rules of war by marching hundreds of miles through a then hostile country after cutting himself off from his base of supplies, challenged the admiration of the powers of Europe and stamped him as one of the greatest military captains of all time; and

Whereas, "As Peace hath her victories no less renowned than War," so General Sherman in civil life united to a sunny disposition a heart that ever throbbed in sympathy with all that was good, true and patriotic, with a hand always outstretched to charity and with a mind innocent of malice, he, since his advent in this, the metropolis of the nation, made friends by the thousand and earned naught but the good will of every citizen; and

Whereas, Unborn millions of this great republic will reverence the memory of General Sherman, whose motto as a soldier was that the military power existed only to repel invasion, suppress rebellion and preserve order, and then when these results were achieved the warrior was again merged in the citizen, ready to resume military duty at the call

rebellion and preserve order, and then when these results were achieved the warnor was again merged in the citizen, ready to resume military duty at the call of his country and in honor of her flag; and,

Whereas, In the wide-spread and sincere grief for the death of such a man as General Sherman, it becomes the bounden duty of the People and the Government of this municipality to participate properly in all ceremonies touching the final disposition of the remains and to indicate appropriately to the country at large the sorrow of the city, which he loved so well and in whose centre he died, at the irreparable loss sustained by the Republic of the United States; and, furthermore, to give proper expression of the sympathy we feel for the members of his family in their bereavement; be it, therefore,

Resolved, That, out of sorrow and respect for the memory of General William Tecumseh Sherman, it is hereby recommended that our citizens close their respective places of business and refrain from any secular employment on Thursday, the 19th day of February, 1891, that being the day set apart for the funeral ceremonies; that the public offices be closed on that day, except those specially required by law to be kept open; that the flags be displayed at half-staff on all the public buildings in this city; that the owners of private buildings and the owners or masters of vessels in our harbor be requested to display their flags at half-mast on said day, and that a Special Committee of five members of the Common Council be appointed, with instructions to invite the co-operation of his Monor the Mayor and the heads of the several Executive Departments, to represent the City Government at the funeral of the deceased; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing preamble and resolution be suitably engrossed, duly authenticated by the Corporate seal of the City, attested by the Clerk of the Common Council, and transmitted to the family of General W. T. Sherman, as an additional evidence of respect for the memory

By the Vice-President-

Whereas, In the death of Admiral David Dixon Porter, the country has lost a loving son, and its flag an intrepid defender; and
Whereas, The heroic naval officers who won undying fame in the late Rebellion have almost

Whereas, The heroic naval officers who won undying fame in the late Rebellion have almost all, with the exception of one or two, gone to join the silent majority; and Whereas, The late Admiral David Dixon Porter, who with Farragut and Foote, shared the glories of success in Southern waters—he alone of the trio lived to see the United States Navy in a lair way to be worthy of the Republic and its re-united people—lived to set his seal of approval on the highest improvement in naval architecture as embraced in the new steel cruisers of our navy, and which restores in a degree the United States to its proper supremacy on sea; and

Whereas, The death of Admiral David Dixon Porter, occurring almost simultaneously with the demise of General William Tecumseh Sherman, inflicts a double blow of sorrow on the nation; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Common Council of the City of New York deplore the death of Admiral David Dixon Porter, and deeply sympathize with his family and the nation at the irreparable loss sustained.



The 736 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.12, against 23.10.

Diphtheria and measles show an increase for the week and scarlet fever a decrease, the reported cases being 121, 447 and 153 respectively, against 107, 433 and 174 for the previous week. The increase of diphtheria is small, and is pretty evenly distributed between Rivington and Eighty-sixth streets, east, and Fourteenth and Eighty-sixth streets, west, and in the annexed district. Measles increased chiefly between Houston and Fourteenth streets, west, and in the lower portion of the annexed district, decreasing as a rule elsewhere. The decrease of scarlet fever was most marked between Fourteenth and Eighty-sixth streets, east and west, while the iccal increases were mostly below Fourteenth street, east of the Bowery.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

HEADQUARTERS FIRE DEPARTMENT, NEW YORK, January 24, 1891.

Present-President Henry D. Purroy, in the chair, and Commissioners S. Howland Robbins and Anthony Eickhoff.

Fireman 1st grade Henry E. Hanley, Hook and Ladder 21, "absence without leave." Testimony taken and referred to Chief of Department for report.

Commissioner Robbins reported the testimony taken under authority of the resolution of the Board, adopted July 11, 1888, on charges against the following-named, at hearings held on the 12th, 13th and 16th instant:

Fireman 2d grade Frank Argue, Hook and Ladder 10, charged with, 1st, "neglect of duty" (two specifications) and 2d, "disobedience of orders."

Fireman 1st grade Samuel P. Lynch, Hook and Ladder 10, charged with, 1st, "absence without leave," 2d, "neglect of duty," 3d, "disrespect to superior officer, and, 4th, "conduct prejudicial to the good reputation, order or discipline of the Department."

Fireman 1st grade James Enright, Hook and Ladder 10, charged with "conduct prejudicial to the good reputation, order or discipline of the Department."

Fireman 2d grade James H. Ging, Hook and Ladder 10, charged with "conduct prejudicial to the good reputation, order or discipline of the Department."

President Purroy, after consultation with his colleagues, spoke as follows in announcing the decisions of the Board:

My knowledge of the affairs of the Fire Department and of Hook and Ladder 10, in connection with the testimony taken, convinces me of the guilt of the accused.

with the testimony taken, convinces me of the guilt of the accused.

I regret, however, that a careful examination of this testimony impresses me with some doubt as to whether the imposition of the severest sentence—dismissal from the force—would be sustained

on appeal.

Although Lynch is recorded as having pleaded guilty to the charge of "absence without leave," he was permitted to subsequently qualify that plea by statements which, under the Corporation

he was permitted to subsequently qualify that plea by statements which, under the Corporation Counsel's decision, rendered it substantially a plea of not guilty.

Lieutenant Banta's testimony, which is all that there is upon which to base the charge of assault against any one of the accused, is very much weakened, to my mind, by his contradictions and statements in regard to his own conduct, which he himself made while on the stand.

The misconduct and violations of Department rules involved in the charges against Lynch, Enright and Ging are most serious and disgraceful. For three able-bodied young men to suddenly and

Enright and Ging are most serious and disgraceful. For three able-bodied young men to suddenly and treacherously assault one man, and that man their commanding officer, is one of the most cowardly and brutal occurrences that has ever been presented to this Board.

The three men above mentioned all have bad records. Argue's offense is also a very grave one, because, although he is not accused of assaulting his commanding officer, it is, nevertheless, plain that he made no effort to prevent the attack upon him, and that through fear, or some other motive, he conspired with his associates to conceal the true facts of the case from the Board.

I am satisfied that Fireman Lynch was the ringleader in the brutal assault upon his commanding officer, and it should not be forgotten that only a short time has elapsed since he was before the Fire Commissioners and found guilty of a most serious charge.

There are four charges against Lynch. On each chargo the Board finds him guilty, and on

There are four charges against Lynch. On each charge the Board hads him guiny, and on each charge imposes upon him a fine of ten days' pay.

A separate record in his case shall be made, and if found guilty on any charges hereafter, he will be entitled to no clemency, but will be dismissed from the service of the Department.

He will report immediately to the Chief of Department, who will transfer him to such other

company as he may select.

In the case of Enright, the Board finds him guilty, and, in view of his being an old offender, directs the entry of a similar record to that ordered in the case of Lynch, and imposes upon him a fine of ten days' pay, which, although not adequate to the offense, is the severest sentence which the Board can impose, inasmuch as there is but one charge against him. He also will report to the

Chief for transfer.

In the case of Fireman Ging, the Board finds him guilty and imposes a fine of ten days' pay, and directs the entry of a record similar to that in the case of Lynch and Enright. He will also report to the Chief for transfer.

In the case of Argue, no charge has heretofore been made against him, and the two charges now before the Board do not involve an assault upon his commanding officer. Although there are two charges against him, it would be unfair, in view of his previous good record, to punish him more severely than Enright. The Board finds him guilty on both charges, and imposes upon him one The Board understands that Ging and Argue are applicants for promotion to a higher grade.

The Chief of Department is directed to take into careful consideration their misconduct, as shown in the charges against them, before forwarding to the Board their application.

The President reported the testimony taken on the 22d instant under authority of the resolution of the Board, adopted July 11, 1888, in the case of Fireman 1st grade Peter H. Ward, Engine 8, charged with "conduct prejudicial to the reputation, good order or discipline of the Department." Fined five days' pay.

A SEPARATE BID must be made for each of the sprinkling routes hereinalter described.

The bidder must state the amount which he proposes and agrees to pay for the license, over and above the amount which will be charged for the water consumed in sprinkling. The amount of each bid must be paid in advance at the time when the license is issued, and the charges for water, as established by the Commissioner of Public Works, must be paid mouthly in advance.

The season for sprinkling the streets shall begin not earlier than March 15, 1891, and terminate not later than November 15, 1891, and the Commissioner of Public Works reserves the right to diminish the length of the season and to suspend sprinkling during the season whenever he deems it in the interest of the City so to do.

The Commissioner of Public Works also reserves the right to reject any or all of the bids or proposals.

In the sprinkling of the streets the following rules and regulations must be observed:

1st. The tin sprinkler attached to each cart shall conform in every respect to a pattern approved by the Department of Public Works, the holes to be in parallel rows, at least one-half inch apart, and of a size not to exceed No. 14 wire.

2d. The name and residence of each person licensed to sprinkle the streets shall be painted on both sides of the cask in black letters of not less than two inches in length on a white ground.

3d. Permits for sprinkling carts, if driven by boys, will be immediately revoked.

4th. No license will be granted to any person not a resident of the City and County of New York.

5th. Each sprinkling cart shall be provided with a sound and proper piece of hose to conduct the water from the fire-hydrant to the cart, and such hose shall always be kept in order and free from leaks.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation ast 5 paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the norposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street numbe, of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act; When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the

Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
