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## DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

### REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING JUNE 30, 1906.

Department of Taxes and Assessments,  
No. 280 Broadway, New York City,  
July 2, 1906.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of the City of New York:

Sir—Pursuant to the requirements of section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments submit the following report of the operations and action of the Department for the quarter ending June 30, 1906.

The aggregate assessed valuation of taxable real and personal estate in the five boroughs constituting The City of New York, for the year 1906, is \$6,305,794,185, a net increase over 1905 of \$393,649,958.

The total assessed valuation of taxable real estate in The City of New York for 1906 is \$5,738,487,245, a net increase over 1905 of \$516,904,944.

The aggregate assessed valuation of real estate for 1906, as set forth in the accompanying tables, is made up as follows: Lands and buildings, \$5,326,413,110; real estate of corporations, \$50,594,835; special franchises, \$361,479,300.

The total assessed valuation of taxable personal estate in The City of New York for 1906 is \$567,306,940, a net decrease from 1905 of \$123,254,986.

The assessed valuation of taxable real estate in the Borough of Manhattan for 1906 is \$4,105,352,281, a net increase over 1905 of \$284,598,100.

The assessed valuation of taxable personal estate in the Borough of Manhattan for 1906 is \$447,184,550, a net decrease from 1905 of \$121,206,240, making a total net increase in real and personal estate of \$163,391,860.

The assessed valuation of taxable real estate in the Borough of The Bronx for 1906 is \$355,779,602, a net increase over 1905 of \$80,920,009.

The assessed valuation of taxable personal estate in the Borough of The Bronx for 1906 is \$18,028,857, a net increase over 1905 of \$1,355,232, making a total net increase in real and personal estate over 1905 of \$82,275,241.

The assessed valuation of taxable real estate in the Borough of Brooklyn for 1906 is \$1,072,007,172, a net increase over 1905 of \$131,024,870.

The assessed valuation of taxable personal estate in the Borough of Brooklyn for 1906 is \$87,722,810, a net decrease from 1905 of \$3,189,153, making a total net increase in real and personal estate over 1905 of \$127,835,717.

The assessed valuation of taxable real estate in the Borough of Queens for 1906 is \$159,446,205, a net increase over 1905 of \$19,041,215.

The assessed valuation of taxable personal estate in the Borough of Queens for 1906 is \$9,694,428, a net increase over 1905 of \$599,690, making a total net increase in real and personal estate over 1905 of \$19,640,905.

The assessed valuation of taxable real estate in the Borough of Richmond for 1906 is \$45,901,985, a net increase over 1905 of \$1,320,750.

The assessed valuation of taxable personal estate in the Borough of Richmond for 1906 is \$4,676,295, a decrease from that of 1905 of \$814,515, making a total net increase in real and personal estate over 1905 of \$506,235.

The total assessed valuation of special franchises for 1906 in The City of New York, as fixed by the State Board of Tax Commissioners, as provided by chapter 712, Laws of 1899, is \$361,479,300, net increase over 1905 of \$59,285,750.

The assessed value of special franchises in Manhattan for 1906 is \$268,565,750, an increase over 1905 of \$40,511,750; The Bronx, \$13,992,000, a decrease from 1905 of \$125,000; Brooklyn, \$68,787,750, an increase over 1905 of \$16,580,800; Queens, \$8,333,300, an increase over 1905 of \$2,100,700; Richmond, \$1,800,500, an increase over 1905 of \$217,500.

The total assessed valuation of real estate legally exempt from taxation in The City of New York for the year 1906 is \$1,117,754,537, divided among the several boroughs as follows:

It will be noticed that the tentative assessments on real estate or those entered on the rolls at the opening of the books for public inspection, examination and correction on the second Monday of January are less than those held for taxation on the final assessment rolls delivered to the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of July. The reason for this is the special franchise assessments, fixed by the State Board of Tax Commissioners, are not delivered to the Department of Taxes and Assessments until the end of March, and that all other changes made in the rolls, due to increases by notice, exemptions, equalizations, etc., are made subsequent to the opening of the books of annual record on the second Monday of January.

### Taxable Personal Estate for the Year 1906.

The assessed valuations for personal estate for 1906 show a net decrease from 1905 of \$123,254,986. The returns show that the major part of this decrease is due to the Borough of Manhattan.

The decrease in Manhattan was \$121,206,240; Brooklyn, \$3,189,153; Richmond, \$814,515.

There was an increase in the Borough of The Bronx of \$1,355,232, and in the Borough of Queens of \$599,690.

The decrease in assessments on personal estate, above stated, is due to the following causes:

First—By a decision of the courts that the unearned premiums of insurance companies, although invested in non-taxable securities are not taxable, notwithstanding the claim that such exemption results in a double exemption of the same items and further decisions of the courts in relation to the liability of gas companies with regard to taxes upon their personal estate.

Second—Through the operation of the Mortgage Tax Law in force to July 1, 1906, a further loss was caused in the assessed valuation of the personal property of individuals and estates, and

Third—By the elimination from the record of assessed valuation of the names of residents and non-resident individuals whose names and assessments had been carried on the assessment rolls from year to year notwithstanding the fact that notices mailed to such parties in this and several previous years had been returned by the post office authorities as undelivered and undeliverable, and, no payments having been made upon any such assessments in a series of years, it was clearly apparent that a continuance of the names upon the tax rolls was useless and would be the cause of unnecessary expenses and deceptive statistics.

Chapter 126 of the Laws of 1902, amending section 24 of chapter 550 of the Laws of 1901, provides for the assessment and taxation of bank shares.

In The City of New York the statement of bank assessment and the tax thereon is made by the Board of Tax Commissioners of said City on or before the 15th day of December in each year, and is due and payable in the hands of the Receiver of Taxes December 31.

Bank share assessments are not included in the aggregate assessments of real and personal property submitted in this report. The tax, when collected, is turned into the General Fund, and becomes available for the general expenses of the City.

## Assessment Districts.

Under section 989 of the Greater New York Charter, it is made the duty of the Deputy Tax Commissioners, under the direction of the Board of Taxes and Assessments, to assess all the taxable property in the several districts that may be assigned to them for that purpose, the work of the assessment to commence on the first Tuesday of September in each and every year.

In assessing real estate for the taxes of 1905, the City was divided into forty-one districts, and a Deputy Tax Commissioner assigned to each.

The following are the district boundaries by boroughs:

## Borough of Manhattan.

- District 1. All that portion south and west of Watts, Varick and Grand streets, the Bowery and James street.
- District 2. Bounded by James street, the Bowery, Third avenue, Fourteenth street and East river.
- District 3. Bounded by Watts, Varick and Grand streets, the Bowery, Third avenue and Fourteenth street.
- District 4. Bounded by Fourteenth street, Fifth avenue, Twenty-sixth street, Sixth avenue, Fortieth street and the Hudson river.
- District 5. Bounded by Fourteenth street, Fifth avenue, Twenty-sixth street, Sixth avenue, Fortieth street and the East river.
- District 6. Bounded by Fortieth street, Sixth avenue, Ninety-sixth street and the Hudson river.
- District 7. Bounded by Fortieth street, Sixth avenue, Seventy-ninth street and the East river.
- District 8. Bounded by Seventy-ninth street, Lenox avenue, One Hundred and Eighteenth street, Third avenue, Second avenue, One Hundred and Fourth street, Ninety-sixth street and East river.
- District 8A. Bounded by Ninety-sixth street, Second avenue, One Hundred and Fourth street, Third avenue, One Hundred and Eighteenth street, Lenox avenue, Harlem and East rivers.

#### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 450 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
