PROPOSED ELEVATED LINES—LETTER TO ART COMMISSION EXPLAINING NATURE AND NECESSITY

The Chairman was duly authorized to transmit the following form of communication to the Art Commission of the City of New York:

September 29, 1909

HON. ROBERT W. DEFOREST, President, Art Commission, City Hall, New York.

DEAR SIR:—Commissioner Maltbie has stated to the Commission that you desire a statement regarding the sketches for proposed elevated roads that have been submitted to your Commission for approval.

This Commission is preparing plans for the construction of several rapid transit lines. In the main these lines will be under ground, but it is impracticable to build these as subways throughout their entire length. Elevated roads are planned for River and Jerome Avenues, Westchester Avenue between Whitlock Avenue and Peckham Bay Park, Borough of The Bronx, and 86th Street and Stillwell Avenue between Coney Island and about Bay 35th Street, Borough of Brooklyn.

One of the principal reasons why elevated roads are proposed in these districts is that the smaller cost of elevated roads as compared with subways will permit these lines to be built at once, whereas, if expensive subway construction is used throughout, it may be that the lines will not be self-supporting and that their construction will need to be delayed until population becomes very dense. Possibly they could be built as subways if an additional fare were charged, but the result of such a plan would be to continue present overcrowding and congestion. If a subway were built in Jerome Avenue a big sewer would have to be entirely reconstructed, which would add to the cost. Near Coney Island, the land is so low that a subway would need to be constructed partly under water, which is very expensive. The line in Westchester Avenue is far remote from the business district of Manhattan, and if built would open up a section and afford great relief.

The Commission has carefully considered what could be done to render elevated lines unobjectionable. In order to eliminate noise, it is planned to build a solid

reinforced concrete floor throughout, to place crushed stone between this concrete floor and the sleepers upon which the rails will rest, and to make the structure so substantial that there will be little vibration. It is believed that the structures proposed will be less objectionable from the standpoint of noise than any that have ever been constructed. The Commission has considered the advisability of using concrete throughout in order to improve the appearance of the structure, but it finds that the expense will be so great that a subway would not cost much more.

With Mr. Brunner's assistance, for which we are greatly indebted, our Chief Engineer has worked out plans which we consider in every way to be an improvement upon all others. The expense has been slightly increased to improve them from an art standpoint, and we shall be pleased to adopt any recommendations that the Art Commission may make, but we are obliged to keep in mind that the need for additional transportation facilities is very great, that the municipal funds available for transit purposes are limited, and that private capital cannot be secured if the cost of construction is made too great.

The sketches sent for your approval show typical sections. Of course, at important focal points, special designs will be prepared and submitted to you in connection with the final plans.

#### Franchise Matters.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held this day, the following proceedings were had:

Whereas, The New York and Queens County Railway Company has, under date of April 14, 1908, made application to this Board for a grant of the right, privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate an extension to its existing street surface railway system, beginning and connecting with the tracks of the company in Jackson Avenue, opposite the Queensboro Bridge Plaza, in the Borough of Queens; thence in and upon the Queensboro Bridge Plaza to the easterly bridge approach to the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon and along said approach and across intersecting streets and avenues to the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon and along the said bridge to the westerly approach; thence upon and along said westerly bridge approach to the westerly terminus thereof at Second Avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, Section 92 of the Railroad Law, and sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on May 1, 1908, fixing the date for a public hearing thereon as June 12, 1908, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was made to be at least fourteen days in the Long Island City "Daily Star" and the Flushing "Evening Journal," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the CITY RECORD for ten days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly had on such date; and

Whereas, At the meeting of this Board held September 17, 1909, the Select Committee to whom the matter had been referred submitted a report recommending certain amendments in the form of contract previously presented, and the Chief Engineer was thereupon directed to prepare a contract in accordance with such recommendations, which amended contract was presented to this Board September 24, 1909; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for, and proposed to be granted to the New York and Queens County Railway Company, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the New York and Queens County Railway Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the New York and Queens County Railway Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

#### Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this day of 1909, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the New York and Queens County Railway Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree, as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to operate passenger cars, upon two tracks only, upon and across the Queensboro (Blackwells Island) Bridge, as an extension to its existing lines in the Borough of Queens, upon the following route, to wit:

Beginning and connecting with the tracks of the Company in Jackson Avenue, opposite the Queensboro Bridge Plaza, in the Borough of Queens; thence in and upon the Queensboro Bridge Plaza to the easterly approach to the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon and along said approach and across intersecting streets and avenues to the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon and along the Queensboro Bridge to the westerly bridge approach; thence upon and along said westerly bridge approach to the westerly terminus thereof at Second Avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, all in The City of New York.

Sec. 2. The grant of this right or privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First.—The said right and privilege shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for a term of ten (10) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and may continue for a further term not exceeding in any case fifteen (15) years, which further term shall

be terminable at the option of the Board at any time during the said fifteen (15) years, upon six months' notice by the Board to the Company.

Second.—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) in cash within thirty days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one thousand two hundred dollars (\$1,200), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand two hundred dollars (\$1,200).

During the second term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand two hundred dollars (\$2,200), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand two hundred dollars (\$2,200).

During the third term of five years, or during such portion of said term as this contract shall be in force, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand four hundred dollars (\$2,400), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand four hundred dollars (\$2,400).

During the fourth term of five years, or during such portion of said term as this contract shall be in force, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand six hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$2,675), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand six hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$2,675).

During the remaining term of five years, or during such portion of said term as this contract shall be in force, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand nine hundred dollars (\$2,900), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand nine hundred dollars (\$2,900).

The gross receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross earnings of the Company from all sources as shall bear the same proportion to such gross earnings as the length of the route, hereby authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation.

The payment of such minimum sums shall begin on the day on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(c) For the use of the bridge structure and approaches thereto, the sum of five cents for each round trip, or the sum of two and one-half cents for each single trip of each and every car operated upon the bridge.

The number of such cars shall be certified by the Commissioner of Bridges to the Comptroller once each month, in such form as shall be designated by the Comptroller.

(d) For the use of the tracks owned by the City upon the bridge and approaches, a sum equal to four (4) per cent. per annum upon the valuation of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) per mile of single track used—provided, however, that if such tracks are used by any other company or companies, then the Company shall pay only such portion of such four (4) per cent. per annum upon the cost thereof as shall be proportionate to the use of such tracks by the Company. The Commissioner of Bridges shall compute the sums due the City for the use of such tracks and certify the same to the Comptroller.

(e) For the use of terminal loops and other terminal facilities which are the property of the City a sum equal to four (4) per cent. upon the cost of the tracks in the terminals, and all overhead equipment necessary for the operation of the cars, provided, however, that if such terminal loops and other terminal facilities are used by any other company or companies, then the Company shall pay only such portion of four (4) per cent. per annum upon the cost thereof as shall be proportionate to the use of such facilities by the Company. The Commissioner of Bridges shall compute the sums due the City for the use of such terminal facilities and overhead equipment and certify the same to the Comptroller.

Seventh.—A sufficient number of cars from the lines of the Company operated in the Borough of Queens shall at all times be operated across the bridge to accommodate passengers desiring to ride upon such cars. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as permitting the Company to operate local bridge cars back and forth upon the bridge between the bridge plaza in the Borough of Queens and the bridge approach in the Borough of Manhattan.

Eighth.—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on said railway or line or branch operated in connection therewith to any point thereof or of any connecting line or branch thereof within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City when such employees are in full uniform, and shall carry free upon the bridge and its approaches such employees of the Department of Bridges as may be designated by the Commissioner of Bridges.

Ninth.—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Tenth.—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Eleventh.—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross earnings, the total miles in operation and the total miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twelfth.—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or equity.

Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day, not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Thirteenth.—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the Commissioner of Bridges to make any alterations or changes in the construction, operation or management of the bridge, or to affect in any way the control of such Commissioner over such bridge, as provided by the Charter of the City.

Fourteenth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or shall fail to maintain the structures and equipment, as herein provided, in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company, specifying any defect on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time, and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), as fixed or liquidated damages; or the Board, in case such structures or equipment shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time, after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all the needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Fifteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Sixteenth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Controller of The City of New York the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, and the repair and maintenance of tracks and equipment upon the bridge, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof, after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or, after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice in writing to the Company; or, in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the rules and regulations made by the Commissioner of Bridges and the heating and lighting of cars, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated or lighted in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its president, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears, in the judgment of the Board, to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or, where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and, without legal procedure, direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund, the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Seventeenth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Eighteenth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned, or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein referred to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officers or officers.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 4. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law applicable thereto shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 5. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.
