REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDED JUNE 30, 1918.

Estates reported to and investigated by the Bureau, 191; estates upon which Letters of Administration were granted to Public Administrator upon application of creditors or next of kin, 42; estates upon which Letters were granted upon the application of Public Administrator, 96.

Nine hundred and fifty-one estates are at present under administration.

The accounts of proceedings of the Public Administrator have been judicially settled and allowed by the Surrogate in twenty-five estates, and the estates distributed pursuant to the Decree of the Surrogate.

Eight hundred and ninety-six estates were received from the New York Hospital, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals and the Commissioner of Public Charities.

Three hundred and forty-seven estates heretofore received from the Coroners Office, Borough of Manhattan, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals and the Commissioner of Charities have been paid into the City Treasury.

All reports and returns to the Comptroller, Board of Aldermen and Supervisor of the City Record have been rendered.


