Pepacton Release Valve Inspection



elease valves at Pepacton Reservoir will be shut down for eight hours each day from Dec. 6–8 to facilitate an underwater inspection of infrastructure at the reservoir. The information gathered during the inspection will allow DEP to design a project to replace valves at the release chamber—a project that is expected to happen several years from now. Releases from Pepacton Reservoir will be ramped back up to the rate specified in the Flexible Flow Management Program once the inspection is complete.

Spotlight on Safety

Safety First in Disaster Recovery

The winter season is almost here, which means it is important to prepare for driving in hazardous weather conditions. Snow and rain events can cause slick road conditions and impaired visibility. Many accidents occur during transition times between seasons when roads can go between wet and freezing very quickly.

You can be safe driving personal and work vehicles by taking the following precautions:

- Inspect vehicles before every use to ensure tires, lights, wipers, window washing fluid and other equipment are in good working order.
- Brush/scrape snow and ice off all windows, mirrors and lights prior to driving.

- Clear exhaust pipes of snow to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning.
- Make sure you can see and be seen.
- Brake gently to avoid skidding, use low gears to keep traction.
- If you hit a slick patch, don't overcompensate by trying to steer out of it. Take your foot off the gas and allow the steering system to right itself, and then slowly steer out of the situation.
- Reduce speed and maintain a safe distance from other vehicles.
- Report defective DEP vehicles to your supervisor immediately.

Special Guest Commissioner's Corner



Kevin McBride, Deputy Commissioner for the Bureau of Police and Security, is a guest commentator this week.

Yesterday, 44 new recruits were welcomed to the Staff Sgt. Robert H. Dietz DEP Police Academy in the City of Kingston. The new recruits comprise a diverse class that includes three military veterans, as well as men and women who were born in eight different countries and speak 10 different languages. The recruits will participate in seven months of rigorous training before joining the DEP Police as sworn officers to protect the largest municipal water supply in the United States.

The new class of recruits is the 13th to be trained through an academy run by DEP, and the third to be trained at the department's new

academy facility in Kingston. The class was selected from among 1,568 candidates who were screened through physical training exams, medical tests, and background checks.

DEP police recruits go through a rigorous program that comprises 1,275 hours of training over the span of seven months. Upon graduation, new recruits their colleagues in the DEP Police Division are charged with protecting 19 reservoirs, three controlled lakes, more 180,000 acres of watershed land, roughly 300 miles of aqueducts, 29 water supply dams, 57 bridges, seven wastewater treatment plants, and more than 280 shafts, chambers. laboratories, other facilities that help the water system function. These facilities and lands stretch across parts of eight counties and roughly 2,000 square miles of watershed.

Recruits trained at the DEP Police Academy will eventually be stationed at one of seven DEP Police precincts in Ashokan, Beerston, Downsville, Eastview, Gilboa, Grahamsville, or Yonkers.

Our new recruits will soon play an important role in securing the water supply, and I want to congratulate them and their families as they begin months of important training.
