The Honorable ABRAM S. HEWITT, Mayor, etc. ; SIR-Pursuant to the requirements of section 49 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments make the following

REPORT

REPORT of the operations and action of the Department of Taxes and Assessments for the three months ending June 30, 1888. During the period for which this report is made the revision of assessed valuations has been completed and the assessed valuations of real and personal property for the year 1888 determined. The assessment rolls have been prepared as required by law, and are now complete and ready for delivery to the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of July instant, as required by section 828 of the New Vork City Consolidation Act of 1882. This report, therefore, contains a summary of the action of the Department for the official year, which commences with the assessment of property for taxation on the first Monday of September, and terminates with the delivery of the certified assessment rolls to the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of July. The following statement shows the assessed valuations of the real and personal estate in the City of New York for the year 1888, as compared with the same for the year 1887 :

This increase, as will be seen by the preceding statement, is mostly in the Twelfth. Nineteenth, Twenty-second, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and is attributable to the erection and completion of new buildings and the appreciation in the value of real estate.

The decrease in the Second Ward is caused by the demolition of buildings to make room for more costly and modern structures.

#### RECORD. THE CITY

The increase for 1888 is \$1,740,525, and due chiefly to the assessment of shareholders of new banks. Since the last assessment of shareholders of banks, the Bank of the State of New York has increased its capital \$400,000 ; the Chase National Bank has increased its capital \$200,000 ; the Fulton National Bank, with a capital of \$300,000, has liquidated, and the following-named new banks have been formed and commenced business: Lenox Hill Bank with a capital of \$100,000; National Bank of Deposit with a capital of \$300,000; Ninth Avenue Bank with a capital of \$100,000; Bank of New Amsterdam with a capital of \$250,000; Riverside Bank with a capital of \$100,000; Union Bank with a capital of \$250,000, and the Western National Bank with a capital of \$3,500,000, making a net increase of bank capital of \$4,900,000.



A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 2.15 P.M., at the office of his Honor Mayor Hewitt. Present—Mayor Abram S. Hewitt, Commissioner of Taxes and Assessments Michael Coleman, Commissioner of the Public Works Department John Newton, Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald

and Colonel Emmons Clark. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. A communication from Mr. John Schappert, of No. 1809 Second avenue, was read, offering as a site for an armory for the Seventy-first regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., twenty-six lots on the block between Second and Third avenues and Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, for \$200,000.

It was ordered on file. A communication was also read from Mr. Byron W. Anderson, of No. 17 West One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, offering as a site for the same regiment thirty-six lots, or less, on the east side of Lenox avenue, between One Hundred and Thirteenth and One Hundred and Fourteenth streets, for \$275,000. It was ordered on file.

It was ordered on file. The Chairman of the Committee on Plans reported a resolution to recommend the adoption of the plans and specifications of Mr. John P. Leo for an armory for the Twenty-second Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., substituting best quality of hard-burned Haverstraw common brick for the Green-wich stone rubble masonry. The report was received, and the following preamble and resolution was offered by Colonel Clark and seconded by General Fitzgerald : Whereas, The Committee on Plans have recommended the adoption of the plans and specifica-tions of Mr. John P. Leo for an armory for the Twenty second Regiment, as submitted by him in the competition, except that brick shall be substituted for the Greenwich stone. Resolved, That this Board approve of the plans and specifications as presented by Mr. John P. Leo, modified by the substitution of best quality of hard burned common Haverstraw or other equally good North river brick for the Greenwich stone rubble masonry, for an armory for the Twenty-second Regiment, N.G. S. N. Y., on the site bounded by Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets, the Ninth avenue and the Boulevard, the approval of said plans and specifications being conditioned upon their approval by the Building Department of the city and upon an agreement already made with the architect that no claim for services will be made if the bids or estimates for said building, together with the architect's fees, shall exceed the sum of \$300,000, which has been appropriated therefor. dollars For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from he ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars. dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aque-duct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be car-ried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars. Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS. Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be here-after placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings. It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." \* \* All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter. Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet. *Rate Without Meters*.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.,

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC. No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons. All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall *prevent all waste* of water. The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be per-mitted.

railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be per-mitted. No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed. Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals for each offense, which will be strictly enforced. Fountans or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-salcons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited. The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas,

sations, contectoneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited. The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this depart-ment may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water. Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed. The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887 the following changes are made in charging and collect-ing water rents :

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have hereto-

arrears in the same manner as regular rears nave nertex-fore been treated. ad. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through

by ineter model of a such part thereof as is supplied through meter.
 3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.
 4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful maner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like maner as other charges for so-called extra water rents of every mature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books MITH,

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by de-jective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., with-out the knowledge or consent of the owners of the prem-ises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable water of a clement so valuable and essential out the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-perture only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted. Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises re-sonsible for the amount of water used or wasted.
