

PUBLIC NOTICE.

A resolution, of which the following is a copy, was adopted by the Common Council, May 26, 1886, and was approved by the Mayor, May 28, 1886, viz.:

"Resolved, That in consideration of the fact that little, if any, business is transacted in the public offices of the Corporation after 12 o'clock, M., on Saturdays during the summer season, the various offices of the City, except those specially required by law to be kept open, be closed at noon every Saturday during the months of June, July, August and September, and the heads of the several departments of the City government be and are hereby requested to give their employees a half-holiday on Saturdays during the months above named."

APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending August 7, 1886.

Resolved, That six (6) additional lamp-posts be erected and lamps placed thereon and lighted, in front of the school-house, corner of Grove and Hudson streets, three of the lamps to be placed on Hudson and three on Grove street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Resolved, That the unused lamp-post and lamp now on the sidewalk in front of No. 159 South street, be removed forthwith, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Resolved, That a crosswalk of three courses of blue stone be laid across the Boulevard and Eighth avenue, between Fifty-ninth and Sixtieth streets, on the northerly side of the Grand Circle, at the Eighth avenue entrance to the Central Park, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, the expense to be paid from the appropriation for "Repairs and Renewals of Pavements and Regrading."

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected and street-lamps lighted in Eighty-third street, between West End avenue and Riverside Drive.

Whereas, Another man of National reputation has fallen; another bright particular star from the galaxy of illustrious names that have shed lustre upon our country and its free institutions, has been obliterated; the country had not recovered from the successive shocks caused by the deaths of Grant, McClellan, Hendricks, Hancock, Davis and Seymour before Samuel J. Tilden is added to the country's dead, and his loss grievously afflicts the people of the country. He died at Greystone on the Hudson, on Wednesday, the 4th instant, in the seventy-second year of his age; and Whereas, For nearly half a century Samuel J. Tilden has deservedly held a foremost place in the regard of the people, as he earned their respect and love by his untiring industry and devotion in laboring for their welfare, in conserving their interests and in promoting their happiness, by his courage and persistency in battling for the blessings of honest government; he was a reformer, in the best sense of that much-abused term, for wherever he discovered dishonesty in public life, he attacked it with such vigor that it seldom, if ever, survived the onset; the "Canal Ring," in this State, the "Tweed Ring," in this city, and other but lesser abuses and scandals were demolished by his trenchant blows. Nor was opposition to corruption in public life his only claim to public approbation: he could create, as well as destroy, as is evidenced by the present admirable judicial system in this State, and other and the better systems of public polity in force in other departments of our State Government, at present, are largely the work of his hands; and

Whereas, He was trusted, honored and rewarded by those he served; the people of this State, after he had held many minor offices, elected him to the highest office in their gift; the people of this Republic, in recognition of his pre-eminent talents and abilities, by a large majority of the popular vote—and as claimed, and now generally admitted, a majority of the electoral college—elevated him to the exalt

Whereas, Every prominent act of his long, eventful and useful life was characterized by pure, disinterested love of country; force and decision of character; fixity and energy of purpose, and untiring persistency, yet in the accomplishment of the many reforms in the affairs of our local, State and national governments, undertaken or advised by him, not a single selfish motive attaches to his name, and he leaves to posterity a brilliant example of disinterested devotion to duty. He had implicit faith in the people, and the people, in return, reposed unlimited faith in him; both regarded the trust as a sacred one and both were benefited by this interchange of confidence; and

Whereas, It is eminently proper that this Common Council, as the representatives of this municipality, should participate in the general sorrow occasioned by the death of Samuel J. Tilden; should add their feeble tribute of respect to his memory; should testify their appreciation of the value of his services to the people, and should aid in holding up to future generations the bright example of his public and private life, for the emulation of others who may succeed him; be it therefore

therefore

Resolved, That as an expression of sorrow, and out of respect for the memory of Samuel J. Tilden, it is hereby recommended that our citizens close their respective places of business, and refrain from any secular employment on the day set apart for solemnizing the funeral rites, and that the public offices of the Corporation, not by law specially required to be kept open, be closed, and no public business be transacted therein on said day; that the members of this Common Council will attend his funeral, with their staves of office draped in mourning; that his Honor the Mayor, as Chief Executive, the chief officers of the several departments and the Judges of the several Courts held in this city, be and are hereby respectfully requested to unite with the Common Council in the ceremonies incident to the sad occasion; that the Governor's Room in the City Hall, appropriately draped in mourning, be placed at the disposal of the family of the deceased, should it meet their approval, in which the remains may be laid in state, and the people who loved him so well, be permitted to view the remains; that the flags on the City Hall, and the other public buildings, be displayed at half-staff, from sunrise until sunset each day, until the interment, and the owners or masters of vessels in the harbor, and the owners and occupants of private buildings in this city be also requested to display their flags in like manner, for the same period, and that a special committee of five members of this Board, of which the President shall be one, be appointed to perfect the above, and take such other action as they may deem proper to make manifest the sorrow of the people and government of the City for the death, and their reverence for the memory of the illustrious deceased; and be it further

Resolved, That as an additional mark of respect for the memory of the deceased, this Board do

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, unanimously, by a rising vote, August 6, 1886, and Aldermen O'Neil, Fitzgerald, Lang and Divver appointed such special committee, the President being named in the resolution.
