The purchaser thereof, other than the present lessees shall nominate and present to the said Union Ferry Company, three persons, to act as appraisers, and said persons shall together value and appraise said boats, buildings and other property, and report their conclusion thereon, in writing, with their signatures thereto.
And in case said two appraisers are unable to agree thereon within thirty days after their appointment, then and in that case they shall have power to choose a disinterested person as umpire, or, in case of their failure within ten days after the expiration of said thirty days to agree upon an umpire, then the election of an umpire shall be made by the Presiding Justice of the Supreme Court for the First Judicial Department upon application of either party on two days' notice to the other, and said umpire shall in like manner value and appraise said boats, buildings and other property, and the conclusion of a majority of said three persons, when committed to writing, and signed by the umpire, shall be taken and accepted as the fair and appraised valuation.

No expense whatever shall be incurred by the Corporation of the City of New York in connection with the slips, bulks and bulkheads or premises so to be leased along with the franchises of said ferries.
