Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 18, 1887:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,476.
 The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 510.
 During the past week 397 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.
 There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 53 permits.
 There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 5 permits.
 There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 8 miscellaneous permits.
 There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy-sinks, 59 permits.
 At premises where contagious diseases were reported, 295 visits were made, and 187 disinfections and 73 fumigations were performed.
 The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 3.
 The number of vaccinations performed was 1,661, of which 512 were primary and 1,149 revaccinations.
 There were seized and condemned, 13,345 pounds of meat, 7,250 pounds of fish, 2,500 pounds of fruit and vegetables, 63 crates of cucumbers, 3 crates of oranges, and 2,200 pineapples.
 The number of specimens of milk examined was 83, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 43, the number of arrests made was 1, and the amount of fines imposed was \$250.

The certificates of 585 births, 56 still-births, 332 marriages, and 680 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, June 18, 1887. This shows a decrease of 1 birth and 10 still-births, and an increase of 72 marriages and 71 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 24 births, 1 still-birth, 114 marriages and 57 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; diphtheria, 9; malarial fevers, 1; puerperal diseases, 6; rheumatism and gout, 3; cancer, 9; pneumonia, 1; aneurism, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; apoplexy, 2; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; surgical operations, 2; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 12; croup, 3; whooping cough, 3; erysipelas, 2; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 24; mania, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 12; bronchitis, 4; heart diseases, 5; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 11; convulsions, 3; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 11; Bright's disease and nephritis, 8; premature and preterm births, 19; suicide, 2. The number of deaths from measles, alcoholism, and drowning was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 169 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 215 under two years, 278 under five years, and 42 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 66 more than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 40.88 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 143 were in institutions, 381 in tenement-houses, 128 in houses containing three families or less, 10 in hotels and boarding-houses, 18 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 130 on the first, 148 on the second, 111 on the third, 96 on the fourth, 25 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 664 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 16 non-residents; 93 were stated to be single, 165 married, 73 widowed, and the condition of 349 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 18, 1887, was 69.7 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 29.877; the mean humidity was 62, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 996, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.38 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
