## EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

MAYOR'S MARSHAL'S OFFICE, ROOM 1, CITY HALL,  
NEW YORK, December 21, 1888.

Hon. ABRAM S. HEWITT, Mayor:

SIR—I am in receipt of your communication of the 15th ultimo, inclosing a copy of the report of the Commissioners of Accounts of their examination of this office, for the year 1887, in which you call my attention to the statements contained in pages 5, 6 and 7 of the same, and request me to make a report thereon at my early convenience.

I have the honor to report as follows:

The Commissioners of Accounts report that 104 pawnbroker's licenses were issued during the year 1887, and that the Business Directory contains the names of 107 persons engaged in the business. I admit that their statement is correct, but an examination of the Business Directory will show that Alexander B. Bernard and Robert J. Rosenthal are set down as doing business at No. 32 Third avenue; Henry W. Gentzlinger and Goldsmith & Kack at No. 182 Avenue A; and John S. McDuff at No. 405 Sixth avenue; which would seem to make it appear that there were three firms doing business without a license, while the facts are, that Alexander B. Bernard, who resides at No. 32 Third avenue, and who did business up to May 8, 1887, at No. 114 Fourth avenue, has retired and Robert J. Rosenthal has been granted a new license to engage in the pawnbroker business at the place in which Bernard resides, No. 32 Third avenue.

Henry W. Gentzlinger, who resides at No. 182 Avenue A, has also retired since May 1, 1887, and a new firm, under the name of Goldsmith & Koch, has been granted a license to do business at the same place since May 2, 1887; and the name of John S. McDuff, which appears in the Business Directory for 1887 as doing a pawnbroker business at No. 405 Sixth avenue, is unknown, his name not appearing in the City or Business Directory before or since that year; the fact is plain then that Bernard, Gentzlinger and McDuff not being in business the number licensed would be three less than the number advertised in the Business Directory, which would make the total number licensed 104, as appears by the books in this office. I would also state that 10 firms have retired from business during the year 1887, and 10 new firms have been granted licenses, making the number of pawnbrokers stand the same as 1886; and I also venture to say that there is no person doing a pawnbroker business in this city, at the present time, without a license.

In regard to chapter 363 of the Laws of 1884, I can state that a copy of the law was sent to each furniture storage-warehouseman more than two years ago.

I am satisfied that money is advanced indirectly by furniture storage-warehousemen, but as long as it is loaned by their agents, who appear to act for themselves, it is a difficult matter to obtain evidence against them; and, on the other hand, people who are forced to deal with them are unwilling to appear against them for fear of exposing their circumstances. Section 12 of the law seems to have been cunningly drawn, for, as you see, it only includes those who do business as storage-warehousemen; that is to say, a person who does not do business as a furniture storage-warehouseman can loan money, as they do now, on furniture contained in residences or storage houses, and take a mortgage on the same for security without coming under the provisions of the law.

In the month of March last I made a report to you of a case against C. M. Maxwell, keeper of a furniture storage-warehouse, by whom money had been advanced on furniture; and I also explained the matter to Mr. Grosse, an assistant in the District Attorney's office, to whom the case was referred, as also did the person who received the advance, but in the opinion of Mr. Grosse the case was not sufficiently strong.

In regard to chapter 163 of the Laws of 1862, which prohibits the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty from making or causing to be made any alteration of rates or charges affecting any item or source of revenue of either of the Sinking Funds or of the General Fund which may tend to a diminution of the receipts from such source of revenue, or either of them, I would state that no change has been made in the ordinance relative to the matter during my term of office. I approve of the suggestion made by the Commissioners that a careful revision of the ordinances would be advisable.

The Commissioners suggest a change in the manner of issuing licenses, as follows:  
 Let the license blanks be engraved on steel plates and printed by a responsible bank note company, thus insuring the best safeguard against counterfeiting. Let the denomination, that is, the amount of the license fee, be engraved in the plates. When printed let the blank licenses be delivered to the Mayor or the Comptroller, and accounts opened with the Marshal, in which the fee value of the several licenses shall be charged to him and the several amounts derived from the issue of the licenses, from time to time, credited to him.

The balance of the account should be and, if the work has been honestly done, will be represented by unissued blanks and can be quickly and absolutely verified.

I can state from experience that such a change would cause great delay in the transaction of the business of this office, for the reason that if any one person, who holds a number of licenses of the same class, had to wait for the filling up of a blank for each license number it would entail extra work on the clerks and cause delay to those in waiting.

I will cite one case as an illustration:

The New York Transfer Company holds one hundred and twenty-five express licenses and one paper is issued to them containing one hundred and twenty-five numbers, while under the system proposed a separate license blank would have to be filled out for each number and would, therefore, retard the business of the office.

I would recommend that the bond now required to be furnished by the Marshal be increased from five to twenty thousand dollars, and that a safe be procured for the keeping of books containing the license blanks.

Hon. ABRAM S. HEWITT, Mayor:

SIR—We have the honor to report that we have made an examination of the books and vouchers of the Bureau of Licenses for the year 1887. The amount of money received during that



year, as shown by the books of the Mayor's Marshal, is \$131,397.75, corresponding with the amount accounted for by the Chamberlain as received from that officer.

The receipts of the preceding year were \$119,259.75. The increase in the year 1887 is, therefore, \$12,138, which is explained, as follows:

In a report made by this office to the Mayor, in the year 1885, attention was called to the fact that license fees were then being exacted from car-drivers without warrant of law. The collection of such fees were thereupon stopped. In the year 1886 an ordinance was passed which was intended to authorize the further exaction of such fees.

Under the authority of such ordinance the Marshal issued in that year 2,610 licenses, and collected thereon \$2,610. The matter having been brought before the Counsel to the Corporation, that officer declared the ordinance in question unconstitutional and void, and consequently that the money had been received into the City Treasury without right. Thereupon an appropriation was made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for refunding it. The greater portion has now been paid back and the practice of exacting such fees discontinued.

Taking these facts into consideration, and deducting the amount, \$2,610, from the revenue of the year 1886, we find that the excess of receipts of the year 1887 over those of the year 1886 amount to \$14,748.

The annual fee for a pawnbroker's license is \$500. One hundred and four such licenses were issued in each of the years 1886 and 1887. The Business Directory of the year 1887 contains the names of one hundred and seven. It would therefore seem possible that some liables may have escaped the vigilance of the Marshal.

Chapter 339 of the Laws of 1883 defines a pawnbroker as "any person, corporation, member or members of a copartnership or firm, who loans money on deposit or pledge on personal property, or other valuable thing, other than securities or printed evidences of indebtedness, or who deals in

the purchasing of personal property or other valuable thing on condition of selling the same back again at a stipulated price."

Chapter 363 of the Laws of 1884, which is in the form of an amendment to chapter 339 of 1883, provides that the word "pawnbroker" contained in the last-mentioned chapter "shall be construed so as to include any person, copartnership, firm, company or corporation designated as doing business as furniture storage-warehousemen, and by whom moneys are loaned and advanced upon goods, wares or merchandise pledged or deposited as collateral security."

Whether any, and if so, what storage-warehousemen in this city fall within the requirements of the above-mentioned act does not appear to have been definitely settled, except, perhaps, by the warehousemen themselves, none of whom has taken out a pawnbroker's license. Special inquiry and action upon this matter by the Marshal would seem to be in order.

Chapter 163 of the Laws of 1862 prohibits the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty from making or causing to be made, any alteration of rates or charges affecting any item or source of the revenue of either of the Sinking Funds or of the General Fund which may tend to a diminution of the receipts from such source of revenue or either of them.

It is indicated by an examination of some of the rates fixed from time to time, by the Common Council, that they are in conflict with the above provision of law. An instance occurs in the matter of a hackney coach license, the fee for which at the date of the passage of the act of 1862 was \$5. In the year 1880 the fee was reduced by ordinance to \$3, thereby diminishing the revenue of the Sinking Fund.

In view of the foregoing facts, and also of the probability that the ordinances relating to other license fees, and also to other subjects, may conflict with law, a careful revision of them by the Board of Aldermen, under the advice of the Counsel to the Corporation, is respectfully suggested.

There is no independent check upon the Marshal in the matter of the accountability for license blanks. They are procured by the Marshal, who, if so disposed, could use them to his own pecuniary advantage, without discovery in the examination of his accounts.

We have no reason to believe that under the present administration of the office there is any impending danger from the improper use of the blanks, but the door is open to it, and security rests mainly upon the honesty of the official.

The system which we suggest in regard to the matter is briefly this:

Let the license blanks be engraved on steel plates and printed by a responsible bank note company, thus insuring the best safeguard against counterfeiting. Let the denomination, that is, the amount of the license fee, be engraved in the plates. When printed, let the blank licenses be delivered to the Mayor or the Comptroller, and accounts opened with the Marshal, in which the fee value of the several licenses shall be charged to him and the several amounts derived from the issues of the licenses, from time to time, credited to him. The balance of the account should be, and if the work has been honestly done, will be, represented by unissued blanks and can be quickly and absolutely verified.

This plan, if carried out, would at least afford evidence, if need be, that the City had taken due precaution for its own protection against fraudulent practices in this matter.

Numerous complaints are made from time to time to the Marshal by persons who have imaginary or real grievances. No record of such complaints is kept.

We recommend that a complaint book or docket be prepared in which shall be entered, in chronological order, the substance of all complaints and of the action taken upon each, and that the book be currently and properly indexed.

Surety bonds are taken from pawnbrokers, second-hand dealers, emigrant boarding-house keepers, junk dealers, etc., in penal sums ranging from \$100 to \$10,000. The practice seems to be not to submit these bonds to the Mayor for approval, although the law in the cases of the most important ones requires it.

The blanks themselves indicate an intention that no bond should be accepted until it had received the Mayor's approval.

The Board of Aldermen adopted the following resolution (over the veto of the Mayor), December 31, 1884, viz.: "Resolved, That it shall not be lawful for any person or persons to sell, peddle or vend any order or permit in relation to the freighting of coal by canal-boats, within the City of New York, under a penalty of one hundred dollars for each offense, unless such person shall have previously obtained from the Mayor of the City of New York a license in the form and manner now prescribed in relation to peddlers and vendors, and the fee for such license to be one hundred dollars and shall be deposited by the Mayor to the credit of the fund called the Sinking Fund of the City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt."

No licenses appear to have been issued under authority of the above resolution, the legality of which may be considered doubtful. It is suggested that the attention of the Counsel to the Corporation be called to the resolution with the view that if it be found illegal, proper action may be taken to have it rescinded, and if legal that it be enforced.

We have prepared and herewith inclose for your information, a comparative table of the number of licenses of each class issued during the several years from 1877 to 1887, inclusive, and the respective rates thereof.

## BOARD OF COUNTY CANVASSERS.

Pursuant to section 2, article 1, title 5, part 1 of the Revised Statutes, the Aldermen of the County of New York met in the County Clerk's office, on Tuesday, January 1, 1889, at 12.30 o'clock P. M., to canvass the returns of the votes given at the Special Election held in the City of New York on the 28th day of December, 1888, and organized by the election of Alderman Walton Storm as Chairman, a quorum being present, consisting of—

President Storm, Aldermen Barry, Benjamin, Butler, Clancy, Conkling, Cowie, Divver, Dowling, Fitzsimons, Gunther, Holland, McCarthy, McMurray, Martin, Mooney, John Murray, Joseph Murray, Rinckhoff, Sullivan, Tait, Von Minden, and Walker.

The Chairman having taken the constitutional oath of office, the same being administered to him by the County Clerk, acting as Secretary, administered the oath to each of the members present.

Alderman Conkling offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the chamber of the Board of Aldermen be and is hereby designated as a part of the County Clerk's office for the purpose of counting,



From the Dock Protective Association—Thanking the Board for its prompt action in relation to removal of dumping-boards between Sixtieth and Sixty-second streets, East river, and stating that the dump foot of East Sixtieth street, East river, has not been removed.

From John F. Doyle, agent, representing owners of westerly half of Pier 15, East river, in reference to the settling of bulkhead between Piers 14 and 15, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From J. C. Watson—Requesting permission to erect a tower on the westerly side of the Harlem river, between One Hundred and Thirty-fifth and One Hundred and Thirty-sixth streets. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From E. M. Van Tassel—Requesting permission to run drain-pipes and two engine-pipes from building corner Thirteenth avenue and West Eleventh street through the bulkhead as shown on plans submitted. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Noah F. Mason—Reporting that there is a dangerous rock in the East river, about two hundred and six feet easterly of the westerly side of Pier 53, about fifty-five and one-half feet from the existing bulkhead-line. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Homer Ramsdell—Accepting the terms and conditions of resolution adopted 13th of December, 1888, in relation to spurs on Pier, new 24, North river.

From McFarland, Boardman and Platt, attorneys Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company—Respecting the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen for the removal of shed erected on Pier 27, East river, and stating that the said company have been granted a stay of proceedings by Mr. Justice Van Brunt. The Secretary directed to send a copy of said communication to the Counsel to the Corporation.

From P. J. Brady, Dock Master—Reporting that the sheathing on Pier at Thirty-fifth street, North river, is in need of repairs.

From Charles H. Pendergast—Reporting that dredging is required in berth occupied by fire-boat at Pier 48, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From J. B. Erwin, Dock Master—Reporting that about twenty scupper-holes are required in deck of Pier at Fifty-first street, North river, to allow the water to run off. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to do said work, if necessary, was approved.

From David W. Bogert, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting hole in the pavement adjoining sheathing on bulkhead north of Pier, old 12, North river. The action of the President in notifying the lessees or occupants to repair was approved.

2d. Reporting repairs required to pavement adjoining sheathing on bulkhead south of Pier, new 24, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair was approved.

From Edward Abeel, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting that the bulkhead, from Pier, old 36 to Pier, new 29, East river, is in an unsafe condition. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to fence off at once.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting assignments of employees to special duty.

2d. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending December 15, 1888.

3d. Reporting that on December 18th instant, he had suspended Laborer Acting Watchman William Hart, for five days, and recommending that his action be approved.

On motion, his action was approved.

4th. Reporting that on December 18th instant, he had directed that Laborer Michael O'Connell be not again assigned to duty as Acting Watchman, and recommending that his action be approved.

On motion, his action was approved.

5th. Reporting death of Alonzo Davis. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to drop his name from the rolls.

6th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8472, that M. and J. Baird have dumped a large quantity of stone on the water-front, about twenty feet north of Seventy-sixth street, East river, and built a rip-rap wall of the same, and also stating that the stone has been deposited west of mean high-water mark and is therefore not within the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks.

7th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8566, that he had examined the plans and specifications submitted by the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company for repairing Pier 3, North river; rebuilding and extending shed and building, a bulkhead platform north of said pier, and find them ample and sufficient, as amended in red, to secure good work.

On motion, The plans and specifications were approved as amended in red and the Secretary directed to notify said company that they must dredge the area to be occupied by the bulkhead-platform to a depth of fifteen feet below mean low-water mark, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, before commencing the work of building platform.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8601, in reference to the application of E. M. Van Tassel for permission to run a six-inch cast-iron drain-pipe from elevator foot of West Eleventh street, North river, through bulkhead opposite, on Thirteenth avenue, also to run two engine pipes in the same manner through bulkhead opposite, on West Eleventh street, and connect a drain pipe from roof at same point in accordance with plans submitted. The action of the President in issuing a permit under the usual conditions was approved.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6044, in relation to building a pier foot of West Fifty-first street, North river.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8475, that he had repaired bulkhead-platform, foot of Eighteenth street, East river.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8476, that he had superintended the removal of all of the platform at the northerly side of East Thirty-eighth street, East river, that was within the lines of said East Thirty-eighth street.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8480, that he had made requisition for dredging in front of the bulkhead-platform at foot of West One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river, and supervised the work thereat.

13th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8519, that he had directed and superintended the repairing of horizontal sheathing on north side of Pier at Thirty-sixth street, North river.

14th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8528, that he had repaired Pier at Fifty-fifth street, North river.

15th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8530, that he had directed and superintended the driving of seventy piles around the boat-house located at One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, North river.

16th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8535, that he had repaired bulkhead north of Eighty-sixth street, East river.

17th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8542, that he had directed and superintended the repairing of Pier at Thirty-fifth street, North river and the bulkhead and rack north adjoining.

18th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8562, that he had fenced off from public use bulkhead foot of Little West Twelfth street, North river.

19th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8581, that he had repaired deck of westerly half of Pier 19, East river.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Post and Matthews:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed with the construction of sufficient concrete base blocks for the bulkhead or river-wall, between the northerly side of West Fifty-fifth street and the southerly side of West Fifty-eighth street; also that he be and hereby is directed to proceed with the construction of about five hundred feet of said bulkhead wall, upon the same general plan as that for the Beach Street Section; and that all the work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract, as provided for by section 714 of the New York City Consolidation Act; and that it be done by the force of the Department, by day's work, except so much of the labor as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all the material and dredging necessary for the above-mentioned work of the wall not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Post and Matthews:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed with the construction of a Pier at Coenties Slip on the East river, to be known as Pier, new No. 6, East river, in accordance with the new plan for that section of the East river as determined by the Department of Docks on the 13th day of April, 1871, and adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on the 27th day of April, 1871, and as changed by the Department of Docks on the 28th day of November, 1888, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on the 19th day of December, 1888; and that all the work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract, as provided by section 714 of the New York City Consolidation Act; and that it be done by the force of the Department by day's work, except so much of the labor and material as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all materials, tools and dredging necessary therefor, and not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Post and Matthews:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed with the erection and construction of the spurs or additions to Pier, new 24, North river, as changed by the Department of Docks on the 13th day of December, 1888, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on the 19th day of December, 1888, and that all work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract, as provided by section 714 of the New York City Consolidation Act, and that it be done by the force of the Department by day's work, except so much of the labor and

material as is now or may hereafter be contracted for; and that all materials, tools and labor necessary therefor and not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

Referred to the Engineer of Construction in charge of Streets and Sewers in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

From the Clerk of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copies of the following resolutions:

1st. Transferring the sum of \$44 from the appropriation made for "Labor, Maintenance, etc.—General Maintenance," 1888, to the appropriation for "Music" for the same year.

"Police—Salaries, etc." 6,000 00

From Fordham Morris, attorney for the estates of Joseph P. Disbrow and Caleb Van Tassell, relative to the use and occupancy of buildings standing on the newly acquired park lands in the annexed district. Filed.

From G. Dilhau, J. S. Bache and others, asking that the hurdle removed from the bridge path in Central Park be replaced. Laid over.

From August Braun, applying for the privilege of letting skates and chairs at the Central Park lake during the coming skating season. Referred to the Treasurer, with power.

From the Topographical Engineer, reporting upon the petition of A. E. Putnam and Mary E. Cox, for the opening of Independence avenue from the Spuyten Duyvil station to Morrison's lane, in the Twenty-fourth Ward. Referred to Commissioner Towle.

From the Superintendent of Parks, recommending the purchase of manure, grass sod and fencing for the maintenance of Parks during the next year. Referred to the Treasurer, with power.

From the Engineer of Construction in charge of Streets and Sewers in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, submitting a time statement on the work of regulating, grading, etc., Sedgwick avenue from Montgomery avenue to Van Courtlandt avenue, showing a charge against the contractor of the penalty for twenty and three-quarters days' overtime. Approved.

From the Superintendent of Parks, recommending the employment of an Assistant Engineer, a Rodman and an Architectural Draughtsman for duty under the Landscape Architect. Filed.

On motion, John L. Francis was appointed a Skilled Laborer at \$4 per day, and detailed to duty under the Landscape Architect.

From the Police Surgeon, recommending William Ryan for the position of Ambulance Driver.

On motion, William Ryan was appointed Ambulance Driver at \$75 per month.

From the Police Tailors, applying for an increase of pay. Filed.

The President reported that he had been waited upon by a committee representing the Patrolmen of the Park Police force, who asked that their salaries be graded and fixed as those on the Municipal Police force. The matter was laid over.

From Andrew Powell, attorney for Mary A. Walker, asking permission to put in branch pipes to connect with a drain being laid at Morris Dock, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, for the purpose of draining houses now being erected by him. Referred to Commissioner Towle.

John T. O'Connor, representing James J. Coogan, appeared and asked that some action be taken by this Board to enable him to obtain an appropriation to raise the iron truss of Central Bridge at One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street and Harlem River to the height required by law, viz., fourteen feet.

Commissioner Robb offered the following:

Whereas, this Board has recommended that a tunnel should be built under the Harlem River at One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, to replace the present Central or Macomb's Dam Bridge; and Whereas, There must be a delay of several years before such tunnel or any other permanent means of transit can be constructed at this point; therefore,

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this Board that the iron truss of the Central Bridge, which now obstructs One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street and Exterior street, should be raised to the height required by law without delay. Adopted.

Commissioner Robb called up the plan for a railway in the Transverse road No. 3, through Central Park, and the report of the Engineer of Construction relative thereto, which were laid over on the 14th ultimo, and moved that said report and plan as submitted be approved and transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their concurrence, as provided by chapter 407 of the Laws of 1888. Carried.

The Treasurer was empowered to confer with the Counsel to the Corporation in the matter of the care of buildings and other property within the New Parks in annexed district, and if, in the opinion of the Counsel to Corporation, the interests of the city require that such buildings and property should be insured, the Treasurer was further empowered to effect such insurance.

The Treasurer was requested to ascertain from the Counsel of the Corporation whether the title to the territory in the New Parks, or any portion thereof, is now vested in the city.

The Landscape Architect, was directed to prepare plans and specifications for an extension of the bridge-path system from its present termination, near Mount St. Vincent, to the northerly end of the Park, at One Hundred and Tenth street.

A bill of the Consolidated Gas Company, amounting to \$18.10, for repairing and protecting gas pipes on the Third Avenue Bridge, was audited, approved and ordered transmitted to the Finance Department for payment.

The salary of Charles H. Myers, Engineer of Construction in charge of Streets and Sewers in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, was fixed at \$5,000 per annum, to date from January 1, 1889.

The salary of William R. Kingsland, Clerk, was fixed at \$1,200 per annum, to date from January 1, 1889.

The Board then proceeded to consider the evidence taken in the trials of Park Policemen.

Samuel Collins, Roundsman—Charged with being absent from duty without leave, was found guilty as charged and fined one day's pay.

John F. Knaeagh—Charged with violation of rules and conduct unbecoming an officer; charge dismissed.

Thomas F. Marrow—Charged with being off post, was found guilty as charged and fined five days' pay.

William G. Lyons—Charged with being absent from roll-call; charge dismissed.

John Maguire—Charged with sleeping on post, was found guilty as charged and fined thirty days' pay.

**AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH**  
of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, August 2, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 219. In every public hospital and dispensary in the City of New York there shall be provided and maintained a suitable room or rooms and place for the temporary isolation of persons infected with contagious disease, who shall immediately be separated from the other persons and other patients at such dispensary or hospital. It shall be the duty of the physician or physicians, of the officers, managers and of every one who has charge of a hospital or dispensary, and of every one who has any duty or office in respect to patients in the course of treatment, or persons who apply for treatment or care at a dispensary or hospital, to see that a report is immediately made to the Health Department of the City of New York of every person infected with a contagious disease who comes to their knowledge, and that such person or persons so infected are properly isolated and kept separate from other persons and other patients.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT, No. 301 MOTT STREET,

**AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH**  
of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, January 27, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 13 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 13. That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said buildings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, let, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment.

## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.

**REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.**

**UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows:**

The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be made against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as provided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters. \* \* \* \* \*

The said commissioner of public works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, prescribe for the prevention of the waste of water; such fines shall be added to the regular water rents.

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

**BAKERIES.**—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

**BARBER SHOPS** shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bathtub therein.

**BATHING TUBS** in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

**BUILDING PURPOSES.**—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as bricks—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

**COWS.**—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum. **DINING SALOONS** shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

**FISH STANDS** (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows: **HORSES, PRIVATE.**—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

**HORSES, LIVERY.**—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

**HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.**—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

**HORSE TROUGHS.**—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper half-cock to prevent waste.

**HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES** shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

**LAUNDRIES** shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

**LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS** shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

**PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES** shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

**PRINTING OFFICES**, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

**SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS** shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

**STEAM ENGINES**, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

**WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.**—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

**WATER-CLOSET RATES.**—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

## METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." \* \*

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water.

Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

## PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

**PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT**  
in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 351 of the New York City Consolidated Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

## NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

**NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN**  
made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.

## GRANTS OF LANDS UNDER WATER.

**THE OWNERS OF LANDS IN THE CITY OF**  
New York, which were formerly under water, and which were granted by the City of New York, are notified that nearly all of the grants of such lands contain covenants, on the
