

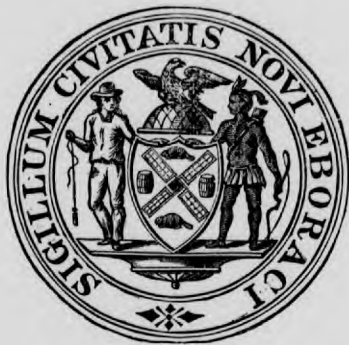

NEW YORK, April 23, 1878.

The Board of Health met this day.

Reports Received.

From the Sanitary Superintendent: On operations of the Sanitary Bureau; on contagious diseases; on work performed by Disinfecting Corps; on slaughter-houses; on application for permits; weekly report from Riverside Hospital; on damaged coffee; on adulteration of pop-corn; on sewer in Sixty-second street and Ninth avenue; on application for leave of absence; on offensive meat at Forty-fourth street and First avenue; on west side nuisances; on slaughter-houses, fat melting, and manure dumps on east side of the city.

Resolutions.

Resolved, That the pay-rolls of this Department for the month of April, 1878, when approved by the Finance Committee, shall be duly signed by the President and Secretary, and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section of the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code.

Section 198. That on and after the 10th day of May, 1878, no cows or cattle shall be led or driven through or along the streets of the City of New York, between Fifty-seventh and Sixty-sixth streets, without a permit in writing from this Department, and in strict accordance with the routes, hours, and terms prescribed and designated therein.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending April 23, 1878. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,617, as follows, viz.:

1 public building, 777 tenement-houses, 173 private dwellings, 92 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 28 stores and warehouses, 43 stables, 35 slaughter-houses, 10 fat-rendering establishments, 1 mill, 8 public sewers, 1 garbage dump, 2 manure dumps, 1 smoke-house, 36 sunken and vacant lots, 43 yards, courts, and areas, 68 cellars and basements, 145 waste-pipes and drains, 122 privies and water-closets, 26 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 1 smoky chimney, 1 cesspool, 1 violation of the Code, 11 other nuisances, together with 28 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 475.

During the past week 101 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 117 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

104 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 44 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 37 houses, 37 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. 1 person sick with measles was removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending April 20, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 563 burial permits for city deaths, 36 for bodies in transitu, and 30 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 563 deaths, 124 marriages, 440 births, 30 still-births, 36 applications for transit permits, and 60 returns from coroners. There were 31 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 9 transcripts of birth record, 4 of marriage record, and 17 of death were issued from this Bureau.

SIR—563 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, April 20, 1878, which is an increase of 54, as compared with the number reported in the preceding week, and 109 more than the number reported during the corresponding week of 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending April 13, was 519, which is 30 below the average mortality of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.98 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,080,297.

During the week the following causes of death showed an increase compared with the week previous, viz.: Measles, 3; scarlatina, 8; diphtheria, 1; croop, 7; whooping cough, 3; erysipelas, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 3; alcoholism, 5; cancer, 6; phthisis pulmonalis, 10; bronchitis, 1; pneumonia, 17; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; while typhoid fever decreased 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 2; puerperal diseases, 1; inanition, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; diseases of the heart, 8; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 10; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 5; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; premature and pre-natural births, 1; suicide, 4, and drowning, 3. There were 9 causes which caused upward of 20 deaths, these causes, compared with the previous week of this year and the corresponding weeks of last year, are as follows:

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 97 were in institutions, 315 in tenement houses, 139 in houses containing three families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 98 on the first, 172 on the second, 106 on the third, 59 on the fourth, 18 on the fifth; 561 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 2 non-resident; 66 were stated to be single, 114 married, 63 widowed, and the condition of 320 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 536 deaths and still-births, or 90.39 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 9; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 200; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 74; Greenwood (undenominational), 66; Lutheran (undenominational), 89; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 24; Evergreen (undenominational), 38; Woodlawn (undenominational), 11; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 4; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 2; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 3; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 6; Washington (undenominational), 5.

The distribution of deaths for the week ending April 13, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 6; Second, 0; Third, 6; Fourth, 7; Fifth, 7; Sixth, 14; Seventh, 17; Eighth, 15; Ninth, 22; Tenth, 20; Eleventh, 20; Twelfth, 49; Thirteenth, 17; Fourteenth, 9; Fifteenth, 5; Sixteenth, 16; Seventeenth, 37; Eighteenth, 30; Nineteenth, 101; Twentieth, 36; Twenty-first, 25; Twenty-second, 50; Twenty-third, 6; Twenty-fourth, 4.

The mean temperature for the week ending April 20, 1878, was 54 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.937, the mean humidity was 71, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 874, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.01 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia, was 18.58; Brooklyn, 16.10; Chicago, 12.53; Baltimore, 21.38; Cincinnati, 17.13; New Orleans, 28.72; Richmond, 17.44; Charleston, 38.24; Dayton, 12.64; Erie, 18.53; Lowell, 17.71; Worcester, 18.05; Cambridge, 15.33; Fall River, 32.86; Lynn, 30.02; Springfield, 4.97. SIR—There were 509 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, April 13, 1878, which is the same number, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 7 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending April 6, 1878, was 511, which is 20.2 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.60 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,080,028.

WEDNESDAY, April 17, 1878.

The Board of Education held a stated session on Wednesday, April 17, at the Hall of the Board, corner of Grand and Elm streets, at 4 o'clock P. M.
Present—Wm. Wood, Esq., President, and Commissioners Beardslee, Bell, Donnelly, Dowd, Goulding, Halsted, Jelliffe, Kelly, Manierre, Place, Traud, Vermilye, Walker, Watson, West, Wheeler, and Wickham—18.

Absent—Commissioners Cohen, Katzenberg, and Wetmore—3.

The minutes of the preceding session were read and approved.

Commissioner Wetmore was excused for absence on account of sickness.

The President laid before the Board a communication from Hon. Joseph P. McDonough, transmitting a certified copy of chapter 106, Laws of 1878, relative to the age for admitting school children, and fixing the same at five (instead of four) years. Commissioner Jelliffe offered the following:

Whereas, By § 22, of the laws relative to Common Schools, passed July 3, 1851, page 40 of the Manual; by § 30 of chap. 332, Laws of 1851 (Manual, p. 64); by § 1, chap. 405, Laws of 1855 (Manual, p. 62); by § 1, of chap. 258 of the Laws of 1862 (Manual, p. 63); by § 3 of chap. 650, Laws of 1860 (Manual, p. 63); by chap. 650, Laws of 1866, as amended and by chap. 835, Laws of 1872, and by chap. 230 of the Laws of 1874, the various schools therein mentioned entitled to participate in the apportionment of school moneys, and generally known as "Corporate Schools," are declared "subject to the general supervision of the Board of Education," and to the same regulations and restrictions as are by law imposed on the Common Schools of New York.

Resolved, That a Standing Committee of this Board be appointed, to be known as the Committee on Corporate Schools, with special powers and duties to be hereafter defined.

Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, Elections and Qualifications.

Commissioner Jelliffe offered the following—

Whereas, By subdivision 3 of section 8 of the Act relative to Common Schools in the City of New York, passed July 3, 1851 (p. 26 of the Manual), it is declared to be the duty of Commissioners of Common Schools, "To visit and examine all the schools entitled to participate in the apportionment," generally known as Corporate Schools;

Resolved, That to provide for the more regular and orderly performance of this duty, the President of the Board of Education be requested, on or before the 30th of June, to assign to each member of this Board one or more of such schools to be by such commissioner visited and examined.

The President put the question whether the Board would adopt said resolution.

And it was decided in the affirmative.

Reports of Standing Committees were presented as follows—

By Commissioner Wickham from the Committee on Normal College, recommending that an

additional story be erected on the Training Department Building: Laid over to be considered with other reports, and when considered, was adopted.
