

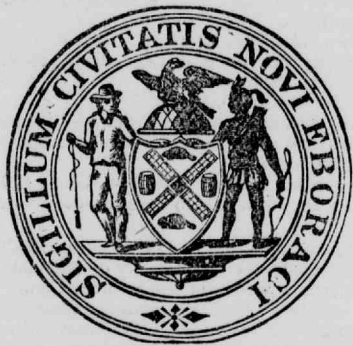

Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor, during the month ending March 10, 1879.

Resolved, That the Exempt Firemen's Association of the City of New York be and they are hereby authorized and permitted to use and occupy the court-room of the Police Court in the New Court-house at Jefferson Market, in which to hold their meetings, provided the business of said court shall in no case be interrupted or interfered with; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby granted to the "New York Athletic Club" to suspend a banner of net-work, in size not exceeding forty feet in length and thirty feet in width, across Broad street, between Wall street and Exchange place, at such height as shall leave a clear space of thirty feet between the surface of the street and the lowermost portion of the banner, said banner to be suspended at no time for more than two consecutive weeks, and only in the months of February, May, August, September, and December; such permission to continue during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Stewart & Co. to erect a temporary wooden covering over the elevator in front of their store on Ninth street, about 200 feet east of Broadway, inside the stoop line, the same to be not more than four feet wide, nor more than fourteen feet long, nor more than seven feet high, and to be maintained only during the winter months, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of Police be and they are hereby requested to direct all policemen on post duty, before making complaints at the station-house for violation of the Corporation ordinances, except those relating to the removal of snow and ice, to notify each offender verbally to remove the cause of complaint, and if the said violation is removed within twenty-four hours' time, then no complaint shall be made; but not more than one such notice shall be given for any one offense.

Whereas, Public exhibitions of electric light have been given, with seemingly successful results, in front of many private buildings in this city; and

Whereas, The Board or Commission authorized to make and enter into contracts for lighting the streets, avenues, and places in the City of New York, consisting of the Mayor, Comptroller, and Commissioner of Public Works, have power to use for public purposes, illuminating material other than gas; be it therefore

Resolved, That the said Board or Commission be and is hereby requested to have experiments made to test the practicability of lighting the Central Park and the other public parks or places, streets and avenues of this city with electric light, and with a view also of determining the relative cost of the two systems, viz.: gas or electric light; such experiments and exhibitions to be without expense to the city.

Whereas, This Board has learned, with profound sorrow, of the death of Jacob A. Westervelt, ex-Mayor of this city, and who was, at the time of his death, President of the Department of Docks. He died in this city on the 21st inst., at the advanced age of eighty years; and

Whereas, In the general sorrow for the death of this distinguished man, it is fitting that the municipal authorities should bear a part. He had been intimately identified with the city and its interests for more than half a century, and in every relation he held towards his fellow-man, integrity of word and act were his chief characteristics. During his lifetime he implicitly, and with simple faith, followed the teaching and example of Him who commanded His disciple to "love thy neighbor as thyself," and he was taken from this life, full of years and full of honors, lamented by all who knew him, to enjoy the rewards promised the faithful servant by the Great Master; be it therefore

Resolved, That this preamble and resolution be entered in full in the minutes of this Board, as an evidence of the estimation in which the deceased was held by the corporate authorities of this city, and as an expression of our sorrow for his death; that an engrossed copy thereof be transmitted to his family, and that as a further mark of respect for the memory of the deceased, the Board do now adjourn.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional sections to the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same are hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 202. Any cattle, meat, birds, fowl, fish, fruits or vegetables, found by any inspector or officer of this Department in a condition, which is, in his opinion, unwholesome or unfit for use as human food, shall, upon the order of the Sanitary Superintendent, be removed from any market, street, or public place, and the owner or person in charge thereof, when so directed by the said inspector, or by such order of the Sanitary Superintendent, shall remove or cause the same to be removed to the place designated by the Sanitary Superintendent, or to the offal dock; and shall not sell or offer to sell, or dispose of the same for human food. And when, in the opinion of the Sanitary Superintendent, any such meat, fish, fruit or vegetables shall be unfit for human food, or any such animal, cattle, sheep, swine or fowls, by reason of disease, or exposure to contagious disease, shall be unfit for human food, and improper or unfit to remain near other animals, or to be kept alive, the Board of Health may direct the same to be destroyed as dangerous to life and health, and may order any such animals, sheep, swine or fowls, to be removed by any inspector, police officer, officer or agent of this Department, and to be killed and taken to the offal dock.

Section 203. That hereafter, no person shall gather, collect, accumulate, store, expose, carry or transport, in any manner through the streets and public places of this city, or in or to any tenement house, cellar, or houses in said city, any bones, refuse or offensive material, without a special permit in writing from the Board of Health, in accordance with the conditions and subject to the limitations thereof, and in such manner as not to cause offensive odors, or any nuisance whatsoever.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby authorized and directed to publish the above ordinances as required by law.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of Dr. Endemann, upon the examination of air in public schools-rooms, be forwarded to the Board of Education.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 1, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,600, as follows: 2 public buildings, 812 tenement-houses, 126 private dwellings, 39 other dwellings, 5 manufactories and workshops, 10 stores and warehouses, 48 stables, 2 stock yards, 40 slaughter-houses, 1 packing-house, 11 lodging-houses, 10 fat-melting establishments, 1 bladder drying establishment, 1 lime kiln, 1 garbage dump, 30 manure dumps, 11 sunken and vacant lots, 41 yards, courts, and areas, 73 cellars and basements, 124 waste-pipes and drains, 130 privies and water-closets, 3 street-gutters and sidewalks, 4 dangerous stairways, 1 smokey chimney, 3 cesspools, 6 other nuisances, together with 65 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The total number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 459.

During the past week 90 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 48 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

27 permits were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 157 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 14 houses, 141 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 520 births, 51 still-births, 203 marriages, and 600 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, March 1, 1879, this shows a decrease of 21 births, and an increase of 14 still-births, 59 marriages, and 49 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was a decrease of 23 births, and an increase of 9 still-births, 56 marriages, and 78 deaths, compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 6; croup, 7; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; heart diseases, 8; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 5; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; convulsions, 3; while the mortality from diphtheria increased 6; whooping cough, 3; erysipelas, 4; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 7; phthisis pulmonalis, 4; bronchitis, 9; pneumonia, 9; aneurism, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 11; apoplexy, 2; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; enteritis, peritonitis, and gastritis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 14; cyanosis and atelectasis, 8; premature and pretermatural births, 2; surgical operations, 2; deaths by suicide, 1.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 95 were in institutions, 223 in tenement-houses, 172 in houses containing 3 families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc., 5 were on the basement floor, 114 on the first, 169 on the second, 122 on the third, 67 on the fourth, 19 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth. 595 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 5 non-resident; 69 were stated to be single, 173 married, 66 widowed, and the condition of 292 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows: City deaths, 600; still-births, 51; bodies in transitu, 23. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 63 were upon certificates received from the coroners. 520 births, 203 marriages, 51 still-births, 600 deaths, 23 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 41 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 1 transcript of the birth record, 9 of marriage, and — of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending March 1, 1879, was 27.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer 30.047, the mean humidity 79, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind 1,237, and the total amount of rainfall was .40 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the N. Y. Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH
of the Health Department of the City of New York,
held at its office on the 4th day of March, 1879, the fol-
lowing resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon
the Health Department, the following additional sections

to the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health,
be and the same are hereby adopted and declared to form
a portion of the Sanitary Code.

Section 202. Any cattle, meat, birds, fowl, fish, fruits,
or vegetables, found by any inspector or officer of this De-
partment in a condition which is, in his opinion, unwhole-
some or unfit for use as human food, shall, upon the order
of the Sanitary Superintendent, be removed from any
market, street, or public place, and the owner or person in
charge thereof, when so directed by the said inspector or
by such order of the Sanitary Superintendent, shall re-
move, or cause the same to be removed, to the place
designated by the Sanitary Superintendent, or to the offal
dock, and shall not sell, or offer to sell, or dispose of the
same, for human food. And when, in the opinion of the
Sanitary Superintendent, any such meat, fish, fruits, or
vegetables shall be unfit for human food, or any such ani-
mal, cattle, sheep, swine, or fowls, by reason of disease,
or exposure to contagious disease, shall be unfit for human
food, and improper or unfit to remain near other animals
or to be kept alive, the Board of Health may direct the
same to be destroyed, as dangerous to life and health, and
may order any such animals, sheep, swine, or fowls, to be
removed by any inspector, police officer, officer, or agent
of this Department, and to be killed and taken to the offal
dock.

accordance with the conditions and subject to the limita-
tions thereof, and in such manner as not to cause offensive
odors or any nuisance whatsoever.
