

The 1,336 deaths represent a death-rate of 38.09, against 29.44 for the previous week, and 33.29 for the corresponding week of 1891. The increase of 304 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 161 in the deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, of 9 from phthisis, of 70 from diseases of the digestive organs, of 10 from Bright's disease, and of 18 from violent causes. There was a decrease of 9 in the deaths from heart disease. The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth and Twenty-second Wards, from measles in the Nineteenth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Twenty-third Ward.
