The 862 deaths represent a death-rate of 24.05, against 24.48 for the previous week, and 28.01 for the corresponding week of 1892.

The deaths were only 15 less than in the preceding week, and the principal changes were as follows : an increase of 8 in the deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, of 13 from bronchitis and of 20 from pneumonia, with a decrease of 6 from diphtheria, of 5 from measles, of 7 from scarlet fever, of 8 from cancer, of 8 from pneumonia, of 11 from heart disease, and of 18 from Bright's disease.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Nineteenth Ward, from scarlet fever in Twelfth Ward, while the 3 deaths from measles were scattered through the Ninth, Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards.
