SIR—In accordance with the provisions of section 1168, chapter 378, Laws of 1897, the Board of Health has the honor to present the following report of the operations of the Department of Health for the year ending December 31, 1900:

PUBLIC HEALTH.

The sanitary condition of the city during the year has been good, although the death-rate was slightly higher than in 1899. There were 70,872 deaths against 65,343 in 1899, giving a death-rate of 20.57 against 19.47 for the previous year.

The distribution of these deaths among the different boroughs is shown in the following table, which also gives the death-rates for the purposes of comparison:

A portion of the increase in the number of deaths may be considered to be offset by the increase of population. The Federal census of 1900 has rendered it possible to revise the estimates of population and correct the death rates for several years back to the last preceding census. The death rate for 1899 therefore becomes 19.47 instead of 18.41, as printed in the report for that year. If this rate had continued without change during the year 1900 there would have been 67,068 deaths, so that of the 5,529 deaths in 1900 in excess of those in 1899, 1,725 may fairly be charged to increased population, leaving 3,804 as the actual excess due to a higher mortality. This excess of deaths was mainly due, as shown in the report of the Registrar, to the epidemic of influenza during the earlier months of the year and the higher temperature of the summer months and the prolongation of the heated term to a later date than usual.

The decrease in the death rate has continued now for many years, with slight occasional fluctuations in the opposite direction, due to special causes, such as extraordinary weather, the influenza, etc., and the following table gives the estimated population for the middle of each year, corrected by the results of the Federal census of 1900, with the deaths and death rates, for twenty years:

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES.

There was a marked increase in the number of contagious and infectious diseases reported during the year, viz., a total of 41,709 against 33,486 in 1899, and 37,637 in 1898. The year 1899 was marked by a low mortality in almost every respect, partly, no doubt, owing to the equable temperature. The ensuing table gives the reported cases by boroughs for the three years since consolidation.

The diseases included in this table are those usually considered most amenable to sanitary control, viz., diphtheria and croup, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox. It will be noticed that the total for 1900 is almost exactly as much in excess of the total for 1898 as that for 1899 is below it. Manhattan shows the smallest increase over 1899, about 10 per cent., and an actual decrease from 1898. All the other boroughs show an increase over 1898, as well as 1899, the greatest increases being in The Bronx and Richmond, where the cases reported are more than double what they were in 1899, and in Richmond nearly thrice the number reported in 1898.

These increases were due mainly to an increase of diphtheria and croup and there being an actual decrease of scarlet fever and a comparatively small increase of typhoid fever and small-pox, as shown by the following table:

In the Borough of Manhattan there was a decrease in the reported cases of diphtheria and croup, but an increase in all the other boroughs, amounting in The Bronx to about 100 per cent. (2,216 against 468), in Brooklyn about 100 per cent. (3,098 against 1,498), in Queens about 90 per cent. (591 against 307), and in Richmond about 100 per cent. (1,213 against 140). This was the most widespread epidemic of the year, and it is a notoriously difficult disease to control by the use of isolation and disinfection. The mortality rate was not high—about 4½ per cent. in Manhattan and 10 per cent. in The Bronx. Scarlet fever decreased in every borough excepting The Bronx, where there was an increase.

Typhoid fever increased in every borough excepting The Bronx, where there was a considerable decrease, mainly due to the fact that the mortality rate was not high—about 4½ per cent. in the latter part of 1899.

INFANT MORTALITY.

The rate of mortality among children under five years of age is the best crude test, of the sanitary condition of a city. The following table shows the death rate of children under five years of age, because the requisite figures have not been reported in the Federal Census, nor is it possible to calculate the death rate from the number of births, on account of the imperfection of the birth statistics. The table is for the purpose of comparing one year with another, and is not to be taken as a guide to the total deaths of all ages, as shown in the

The increase in the percentage, as will be seen, is very slight over 1899, only 1-25 of one per cent., an increase adequately accounted for by the difference in the summer temperature of the two years. During the three years that have elapsed since consolidation, the showing for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (the old City of New York) is even better than this, viz.:

HEALTH VS. WENDEL.

In the Supreme Court, Seventh Judicial District, for a violation of the Sanitary Code, compliance with an order issued by the Department of Health to remove certain sanitary improvements and repairs to premises owned by the owner. Defendant interposed a general denial, and the case was set for trial on November 27, 1900, reversing the judgment. The opinion, and application has been made by the Department to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court upon the matter rendered by a divided court, and upon the further interest and importance are involved.

MANHATTAN COMPANY VS. DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

The case was commenced in the Supreme Court, First Department, by the Manhattan Company against the Department of Health to restrain the Board of Health from enforcing chapter 663 of the Laws of 1900. This act prohibited the use of the Borough of Brooklyn, New York City, and by implication the other boroughs of the city. The Board of Health was charged with the enforcement of the act in question, a demurrer was filed, and the matter duly came on for argument, and was argued

before Mr. Justice Andrews on June 5, 1900. Mr. Justice Andrews on October 24, 1900, overruled the demurrer on the ground that the act was unconstitutional. An appeal, however, has been taken to the Appellate Division from the interlocutory judgment entered on the decision, and is now pending.

On August 28, 1900, proceedings were commenced in the Supreme Court, New York County, by the People of the State of New York on relation of Arthur Jordan, against the Department of Health of The City of New York, to obtain a peremptory writ of mandamus requiring the Board of Health to grant or deny the relator's application for a permit to kill poultry at premises Nos. 21 and 22 East street. The relator's application for a permit was denied by the Board of Health, and his efforts in the Supreme Court to procure a permit were unsuccessful. In the opinion of the Board of Health, a sufficient number of these permits are now outstanding.

VIOLATION OF SECTION 119 OF THE SANITARY CODE.

On July 27, 1900, one Herman Bindseil was arrested for a violation of section 119 of the Sanitary Code. The defendant carried on a fur-dyeing establishment at No. 42 West Ninety-ninth street, and used the roof of the building for drying furs. Complaint was made to the Department of Health by many persons living in the vicinity of the premises that particles of hair from the dyeing establishment entered the apartment-houses in the neighborhood, and the business was complained of as a public nuisance.

The matter was duly investigated by Inspectors of the Department, who found the complaints justified, and an order was duly made by the Board of Health requiring the nuisance to be abated. The defendant did not comply with this order and his arrest followed. He contested the case vigorously, and after a trial, lasting one week, in the Court of Special Sessions, he was found guilty and fined the sum of twenty-five dollars.

IMPERSONATING INSPECTORS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

During the year complaints have been made to the Board of Health by various citizens and property-owners of persons representing themselves to be Inspectors of the Department of Health and seeking to obtain money through such representations. These persons impersonate Inspectors and officers of the Department of Health for the purpose of blackmail. The Board of Health has made strenuous efforts to stop such practices, and on November 21, 1900, one George G. Wallace was arrested for a violation of section 1267 of the Laws of 1897. He was held in \$500 bail for trial at Special Sessions, and on November 30, 1900, was tried and found guilty. The Court imposed a fine of \$250 or sixty days' imprisonment in the City Prison, and the defendant is now serving his term of imprisonment.

VIOLATIONS OF SECTION 134 OF THE SANITARY CODE.

Numerous arrests were made during the year for violation of section 134 of the Sanitary Code, which prohibits the nuisance created by the use of soft coal. Many of the persons arrested sought to justify their use of soft coal by claiming that it was impossible to obtain hard coal in consequence of the strike among the coal miners. But a vigorous prosecution was made against all violations of the section in question, to hold the nuisance in check as far as possible. In some cases the defendants were fined by the Court of Special Sessions, and, in other cases, owing to the existence of the strike, sentence was suspended.

VIOLATIONS OF SECTION 26 OF THE SANITARY CODE.

Recognizing that overcrowding of lodging-houses is a source of danger to the public health, the Department of Health has been endeavoring to break up the practice of overcrowding and, to keep such houses under control, the Board of Health requires a written permit, and that the houses intended to be used shall be sufficiently lighted and ventilated. During the month of December alone ten arrests were made for violation of the Sanitary Code in carrying on such places without a permit and for overcrowding.

One Thomas Kelly was the first person convicted for this offense, and he was fined ten dollars by the Court of Special Sessions. The second prosecution was against one Otto Barthel for carrying on a lodging-house at No. 406 East Fifth street. It was shown that he had no permit and that his place was in a largely overcrowded condition. Barthel was tried in the Court of Special Sessions December 24, 1900, and upon being found guilty was sentenced to thirty days' imprisonment in the City Prison.

VIOLATIONS OF SECTION 63 OF THE SANITARY CODE.

The Board of Health is unceasing in its efforts to secure a pure and wholesome supply of milk to the people of the city. Section 63 of the Sanitary Code prohibits the sale of impure, unwholesome or adulterated milk, and makes the very possession of the article unlawful. During the year \$6,765, as fines, were imposed upon defendants by the Court of Special Sessions, for violations of section 63, and the money was paid.

MAINTAINING NUISANCE BY RUNNING DYNAMO.

Arthur B. Proal, Jr., engineer for the New York and Staten Island Electric Company, of Livingston, Staten Island, was arrested for violation of section 1201 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897. Defendant was charged with maintaining a nuisance. It was claimed by persons in the vicinity of the electric-light company that their rest and sleep were broken in consequence of the noise made by the running of dynamos. Defendant was arrested and on November 13, 1900, a motion was made by his counsel to transfer the case to the Grand Jury of Richmond County. The order of transfer was made by a Justice of the Supreme Court (Second Department), and the case is now before the Richmond County Grand Jury.

SIRS—I have the honor to submit the report of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau during the year 1900.

The Sanitary Bureau of the Department of Health is under the charge of the Sanitary Superintendent, assisted by five Assistant Sanitary Superintendents, one in charge of each of the five boroughs.

F. H. Dillingham, M. D., in charge of the Borough of Manhattan.

Robert A. Black, M. D., in charge of the Borough of Brooklyn.

Eugene Monaghan, M. D., in charge of the Borough of The Bronx.

Obed L. Lusk, M. D., in charge of the Borough of Queens.

John L. Feeney, M. D., in charge of the Borough of Richmond.

The Sanitary Bureau is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, nuisances or causes of danger to the public health; with the execution of the orders of the Board, with the care of contagious diseases; with the inspection of foods and offensive trades; with the inspection of mercantile establishments and issuance of employment certificates; with the pathological, bacteriological and chemical research and investigations, and with the inspection of scholars attending the public, parochial and private schools.

To the Board of Health:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the report of the Bureau of Records for the year ending December 31, 1900.

There were reported during the year 81,721 births, 32,346 marriages and 70,872 deaths, showing an increase over 1899 of 4,089 births, 1,772 marriages and 5,529 deaths.

There was an increase in each of these items in each borough, the largest percentage of increase of births and deaths being in the Borough of The Bronx, and of marriages in the Borough of Queens.

These figures represent a birth-rate for the city of 23.72 in an estimated population of 3,444,675, against a rate of 23.13 in an estimated population of 3,356,722 in 1899, and a marriage-rate of 9.36, or 18.72 persons married in 1900 against 9.08, or 18.16 persons married in 1899.

The birth-rate in the different boroughs ranged from 27.26 in Manhattan to 19.29 in Brooklyn. These rates do not represent by any means the actual rates, but only the variation in completeness of the returns made by the medical attendants. Judging by the marriage-rate, which is high, the birth-rate of the entire city should be at least 30 per 1,000, which would give 103,340 births in 1900, instead of 81,721, i. e., more than 25 per cent. additional.

DEATHS.

The deaths for the year numbered 70,872, making the death-rate 20.57 per 1,000 living, against 19.47 in 1899. The results of the Federal census of 1900 have rendered possible a revision of the estimates of population since the last previous census, and has increased the death rate of 1899 from 18.41 to 19.47. These revised estimates will be found among the tables appended to this report.

The 70,872 deaths were distributed among the various boroughs, as follows:

The death-rates for Manhattan and The Bronx are above the average for the city and those of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond are below, Queens having the lowest rate of all, its population in previous years having been considerably underestimated.

In order to trace the cause of this increased mortality the following comparative table has been prepared, showing the deaths in 1899 and 1900 from all causes to which 300 or more deaths were due in the latter year, the list comprising more than 94 per cent. of all the deaths:

It will be noticed that there was an increase in 1900 in the deaths from almost all the causes in the list, the only noticeable decrease being in diseases of the nervous system. The most important increases were in measles, diphtheria and croup, diarrhoeal diseases, congenital debility, pneumonia, diseases of the digestive organs, Bright's disease and deaths by violence, the excess of deaths due to these causes amounting to 4,548, or more than 82 per cent. of the entire increase for the year (5,529). The greater mortality for the year, therefore, was mainly due to the epidemic of influenza during the earlier months, and the higher temperature of the latter months, as compared with 1899, as will be shown hereafter.

If the deaths for the year be distributed by quarters, it will appear that the greater part of the increase of mortality occurred in the first part of the year and was mainly due to the influenza, as follows:

Thus, 4,868 of the total increase of 5,529, i.e. more than 88 per cent., occurred during the first six months of the year—2,422, or almost exactly half of the increase were caused by influenza and pneumonia alone. A considerable part of the remaining increase was caused by other diseases, the death rate from which is always greater when influenza is prevalent. This epidemic was, in all probability, the cause of the increase in the deaths from phthisis, heart diseases, diseases of the kidneys, and possibly, of suicides.

INFLUENZA.

This disease, now apparently permanently domiciled in this country, became comparatively quiescent after 1895, until 1898, since when it has been gradually increasing in virulence. During 1900 it caused more deaths in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (the old City of New York) than in any year since it first appeared in 1889, excepting 1891 (the worst epidemic of all), 1892 and 1895. The increase of deaths due to this cause first became noticeable in November, 1899, and the disease became more and more prevalent until the epidemic culminated in March, 1900, and then gradually faded away. A similar outbreak occurred in Europe, and in London the death rate during the first week of 1900 ran up to 37.1 per 1,000, a figure seldom reached in New York.

In the following table the deaths from influenza and pneumonia are given by months for 1899 and 1900, to allow of comparison:

As will be seen from this table, there was a considerable excess of deaths from pneumonia in every month of 1900, as compared with 1899, until the first six months had passed, and during the latter half of the year a regular diminution. In December, there were indications of a recurrence of influenza, but the anticipated epidemic, which culminated in the middle of January, proved to be very mild compared with those of preceding years.

CONTAGIOUS AND INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

There was an increase in the deaths from diseases of this class, excepting scarlet fever, which showed a slight decrease. The following table shows the number of deaths in 1899 and 1900 from diphtheria, croup, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox, practically all the diseases which are under direct control by the ordinary methods of sanitary administration:

The increase of measles was due to a short-lived epidemic which began in the Borough of The Bronx, and spread thence more or less throughout the city. Its greatest ravages were in the boroughs of The Bronx and Brooklyn, although it was also quite prevalent in Richmond, causing 15 deaths there in 1900, against 2 in 1899.

DIARRHOEAL DISEASES.

The increase in deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, which accounts for most of the excess of deaths during the latter part of the year, was mainly due to the much higher temperature and the more prolonged hot season as compared with 1899. There was a total excess of 611 deaths during the latter half of the year, and of this total 529 were due to deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, enteritis, and gastro-enteritis, as follows:

These months have been selected, because during the remaining portion of the year there are comparatively few deaths from these causes, which are emphatically summer complaints. Deaths of this class are always most numerous in July, but while there was very little difference for that month in 1899 and 1900, the great excess during August and September and even, though somewhat lessened, through October, emphasizes the great difference in the summer temperatures of the two years and the protracted duration of the heated term of 1900 until much later than usual in the fall.

INFANT MORTALITY.

This is usually considered the most sensitive test of the sanitary condition of a community as regards environment and public health administration. While the actual number of deaths of children under five years of age was about 8½ per cent. greater than in 1899, being 25,836 against 23,801, it was not greater than might have been expected from the prolonged hot weather, and the proportion of child mortality to the total was only slightly increased, being

36.46, against 36.42 in 1899. The decrease during the past few years has been continuous, as shown in the following five-year table:

The percentage is highest, it will be seen, in Brooklyn and lowest in Richmond, where it was also the lowest in 1899.

ACCIDENTAL DEATHS.

3,010 deaths by accident were reported, against 2,620 in 1899, an increase of 390. This excess was mainly due to an increase of 76 deaths by drowning, 54 by poison and 174 by sunstroke, a total of 304.

Of the 292 deaths caused by railroad accidents, 15 by cable cars and 12 by horse cars were all in the Borough of Manhattan; of steam railroad accidents, 33, the greatest number, were in the Borough of Queens, 22 each in Manhattan and The Bronx and 8 each in Brooklyn and Richmond. Of the 120 trolley accidents, 60, exactly one-half, were in Brooklyn, 29 in Manhattan, 17 in Queens, 11 in The Bronx and only 3 in Richmond.

Deaths by the electric current were almost doubled, viz., 20, against 11 in 1899. Of this number one-half, 10, were in Brooklyn and 4 each in Manhattan and Richmond.

Explosions of lamps and oil stoves were the cause of 20 deaths, 9 of which were in Brooklyn, and 5 persons were killed by lightning stroke, 3 in Queens and 1 each in Manhattan and Richmond.

There were 136 deaths from the accidental inhalation of illuminating gas, against 102 in 1899. The increase was chiefly in the Borough of Manhattan, where there were 98 such deaths in 1900, against 68 in 1899, while in Brooklyn there were only 28, against 24.

SUICIDES.

There were 761 suicides, against 628 in 1899, an increase of 133. Seventy-one of this increase was in the Borough of Manhattan and 45 in Brooklyn. In The Bronx there was a decrease and in Richmond an increase of 1, while in Queens the number was almost double, viz., 46, against 26 in 1899.

Of the total of 761, 578, or more than 75 per cent., were males and 183 females. Two hundred and fifty-one, nearly one-third of the whole, were Germans, and 249, almost another third, natives of the United States.

The means most frequently adopted was poison, which caused the death of 453 persons, almost 60 per cent. of the whole number. Two hundred and ninety-two persons—191 males and 101 females, used carbolic acid, now the favorite method of leaving the world, and 109, 81 males and 28 females—chose illuminating gas, these two methods alone accounting for 401 suicides by poison, almost 90 per cent. of the total of 453. Seventy-six persons killed themselves by hanging, and 168 by using firearms, a disproportionate number of these, as usual, being males, viz., 161, to only 7 females. Only 5 persons drowned themselves, all males, singularly enough, for drowning used to be a favorite method of suicide for females.

One female, presumably insane, took her own life by the extraordinary method of stuffing a handkerchief down her throat.

BIRTHS.

There were 81,721 births reported during the year, against 77,632 in 1899. The greatest increase was naturally in the Borough of Manhattan, but the greatest proportionate increase was in the Borough of The Bronx, and the next greatest in Brooklyn. The only boroughs in which the number of reported births exceeded the deaths were Manhattan, Queens and Richmond, the excess of births in Manhattan being between 11,000 and 12,000, while in Queens and Richmond the excess was slight, and in Brooklyn the excess of deaths was almost 1,000. The exact figures follow:

Of the 81,721 births reported, 42,076, or 51.49 per cent., were reported by physicians, and 39,645, or 48.51 per cent., by midwives. In 1899 the corresponding figures were 42,771 and 34,861, showing an actual decrease in the number of reports from physicians, and a very considerable increase in midwives' reports. This tends to corroborate the opinion often put forth in these reports that the dereliction of duty in this respect lies mainly with physicians rather than with midwives.

There were 42,016 male births to 39,705 females, a proportion of 1,058 males to 1,000 females. This is a reduction of the proportion in 1899, which ranged at the very high figure of 1,063. There were 573 pairs of twins reported, against 572 in 1899, about one in every 143 births, and 1,568 births were reported as illegitimate, about 1.91 per cent., a little higher than in 1899, when 1.72 per cent. was the rate.

SEARCHES AND TRANSCRIPTS.

25,132 searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made during the year and 21,989 transcripts from them were issued, against 22,611 and 19,395, respectively, in 1899, an increase of 2,521 searches and 2,594 transcripts.

*The apparent great increase in the number of deaths in the Borough of The Bronx is due to the fact that before the present consolidated city was formed the deaths in institutions in what is now The Bronx were all redistributed to the locality in which the deceased resided before admission into the institution, a large portion of them belonging in what is now the Borough of Manhattan. Since consolidation, the redistribution of deaths in institutions is carried out only within the limits of the borough itself.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Mayor's Office at 12 o'clock M., on Thursday, December 26, 1901.

Present—Robert A. Van Wyck, Mayor; Bird S. Coler, Comptroller; Patrick Keenan, Chamberlain; Randolph Guggenheimer, President of the Council, and Robert Muh, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held December 19, 1901, were approved as printed.

The Comptroller presented the following report and resolution relative to a lease of premises, No. 174 Bay street, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, for the use of the Coroner:

DECEMBER 21, 1901.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—Mr. George F. Schaefer, the newly elected Coroner for the County of Richmond, in a communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of December 11, 1901, states that the lease of the premises, No. 64 New York avenue, corner of Maple avenue, Rosebank, Staten Island, now occupied as the Coroner's office, expires on January 1, 1902.

He further states that in his opinion the present location of the Coroner's office is far from being the most convenient one that can be secured, and recommends that the lease thereof be not renewed.

He suggests and requests that arrangement be made for the lease of premises at Stapleton, Staten Island, known as No. 174 Bay street, for a term of one year from January 1, 1902, at \$30 per month, payable quarterly; the owner, Mrs. Elizabeth Schaefer, to furnish light, heat and janitor service.

The premises consist of part of the store floor of a two-story brick building, 37 feet 6 inches by 30 feet, on the west side of Bay street, between Sands and Prospect streets, in the Village of Stapleton.

The floor space is 19 feet 4 inches by 27 feet 6 inches.

The lot on which the building stands is 37 feet 6 inches by 125 feet with an L 25 feet by 57 feet 6 inches to Prospect street; is known as Lot No. 213, Plot 2, page 6 of the Second Ward, Borough of Richmond, and is assessed for \$6,000.

The owner proposes, during the coming year, to put on another story to the building and add 10 feet on the rear, but Mr. Schaefer, the Coroner, claims that the accommodations at present are ample for the requirements of the office.

I am of the opinion that the terms of the proposed lease are just and reasonable, and that it may properly receive the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

I would suggest that the newly elected Coroner, Mr. George F. Schaefer be requested to take charge of the City's property on January 1, 1902, and remove the same from premises No. 64 New York avenue, Rosebank, S. I., to the new office.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City, from Mrs. Elizabeth Schaefer, of premises known as No. 174 Bay street, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, for the use of the Coroner for a term of one year from January 1, 1902, at an annual rental of three hundred and sixty dollars (\$360), payable quarterly, the owner to furnish light, heat and janitor's service; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance and offered the following resolution to rescind resolution authorizing lease of premises corner Washington avenue and One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, Borough of The Bronx, for the Police Department:

DECEMBER 24, 1901.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—In regard to the resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on December 10, 1901, authorizing a renewal of the lease to the City from Joseph P. O'Donnell of the premises occupied by the Police Department as a station-house for the Thirty-seventh Precinct, on the northeast corner of Washington avenue and One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, Borough of The Bronx, for a term of one year from March 11, 1902, at a rental of \$2,750 per annum, I beg to advise you that I consider that the resolution should be rescinded.

It would appear from the information which I have been able to obtain that the new building on Bathgate avenue, north of One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, will soon be ready for occupancy, the same being almost completed. In fact, the architects state that the building will be ready on February 15, 1902.

Even allowing for delays, which may occur, this building should be ready by April 1, 1902, and in consequence the renewal of the temporary quarters for a period of one year from March 11 is entirely unnecessary.

I am informed by the Chief Clerk of the Police Department that the premises will not be required for any other purpose after the new building is ready.

In order that no complications may arise, should the new building not be ready by March 11, I am of the opinion that the Police Department should enter into negotiations with the landlord, whereby an extension of one month or more will be granted, if necessary, at the same terms as is now paid under the lease.

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held December 10, 1901, authorizing a lease of premises on the northeast corner of Washington avenue and One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, Borough of The Bronx, for the use of the Police Department, for a term of one year from March 11, 1902, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance relative to the request of the Commissioner of Highways for a lease of a parcel of land on Elm avenue, Evergreen, Borough of Queens:

DECEMBER 23, 1901.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. James P. Keating, Commissioner of Highways, in a communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of December 7, 1901, requests "that a lease be authorized from March 1, 1901 to March 1, 1902, of a parcel of land located on Elm avenue, Evergreen, Borough of Queens, described as follows:

"Beginning at a point where the Meyerrose farm adjoins the property now or formerly belonging to the Long Island Real Estate and Improvement Company, running thence along Elm avenue southeasterly about 175 feet; running thence northwesterly 200 feet more or less; thence southwesterly 200 feet parallel with the Elm avenue line to the land now or formerly of the Long Island Real Estate and Improvement Company; thence southeasterly along the division line of the Long Island Real Estate and Improvement Company to the Meyerrose farm, about 200 feet, to the point or place of beginning; together with the stable, tool-house and wagon-shed.

"This property is required for use as a corporation yard by the Department of Highways in the Borough of Queens, for the storage of stone screenings, road machine, etc. This property has been used by this Department since March 1, 1901, without the execution of a lease, the communication from the Deputy Commissioner of Highways, Borough of Queens, recommending that the property be leased by the City, having been lost in transmission. The rent is \$240 per annum, and the owner of the property is Harry Semmler, Evergreen, Long Island."

I have caused an examination to be made of the premises and submit the following report: I am informed that the parcel of land described in the application is a part of a plot of 21 acres, known as "The Meyerrose farm," said to be owned by Joseph Meyerrose, whose name appears in the official list of employees of the Department of Highways, Borough of Queens, as "Foreman," at a salary of \$1,800 per annum.

A two-story frame house with barn, several small outhouses and sheds, are on the premises. Harry Semmler, who is named as the owner in the communication from the Commissioner of Highways, and who occupies the house, claims only to have a lease of the premises, from year to year.

The Department of Highways has at present on the premises, 5 road machines, 1 roller, 1 plow, 1 harrow and a small quantity of road-making material, such as stone screenings and cobblestones.

A lot of smaller implements, such as shovels, spades, picks, etc., are housed in one of the smaller outbuildings.

The stable and sheds do not appear to be used by the Department, as carts, wagons and other property belonging to the Meyerrose farm occupy the same, while the City property in the possession of the Department of Highways is entirely unprotected from the weather.

While it is no doubt necessary that some place should be provided for the storage and safe keeping of the implements and tools required by the Department of Highways in this locality, it does not seem to me that the premises sought to be leased can be regarded as a corporation yard as for the terms proposed, viz., \$20 per month, a suitable place, properly fenced, with sheds, etc., for the exclusive use of the Department, could be acquired; but if simply a storage place for implements and tools is required, \$50 per annum, would, in my opinion, be ample compensation.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 180 of the Greater New York Charter, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue from time to time as may be required Corporate Stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000), the proceeds whereof shall be applied to the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks and Ferries.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance and offered the following resolution relative to the proposed improvement of the waterfront on the south side of the Harlem river, between Third avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, Borough of Manhattan:

SIR—The Department of Docks and Ferries, in communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, December 17, 1901, by its Secretary, William H. Burke, incloses the following resolutions, adopted by the Board of Docks, at meeting held December 6, 1901:

"Resolved, That this Board hereby approves the plan for the proposed improvement of the waterfront on the south side of the Harlem river, between Third avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, as follows:

"The proposed new plan comprises three slips inshore of the bulkhead and pierhead-line, established by the Secretary of War in 1890, with a marginal street of varying width, bounded on its exterior side by a bulkhead-line, and on its interior side by a marginal street line, said lines being described as follows:

"The exterior line of the proposed marginal street, wharf or place will begin at a point where the prolongation of the easterly line of Third avenue intersects the bulkhead and pierhead line, established by the Secretary of War in 1890, and will run thence northwesterly along said bulkhead and pierhead-line to the prolongation of the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-first street; thence deflecting to the right, and still northwesterly and along said bulkhead and pierhead-line to the northerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-first street; thence westerly and along the northerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-first street to the easterly side of Lexington avenue; thence northerly and along said easterly side of Lexington avenue to the bulkhead and pierhead-line established by the Secretary of War in 1890; thence northwesterly and along said bulkhead and pierhead-line a distance of 114.27 feet to a line parallel with and distant 95 feet northerly from the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-second street; thence westerly and along said parallel line 373.04 feet to a line parallel with and distant 34.12 feet easterly from the easterly line of Fourth avenue; thence along said parallel line distant 34.12 feet easterly from the easterly side of Fourth avenue 168.25 feet to the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-third street; thence easterly and along said southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-third street 236.68 feet to the bulkhead and pierhead-line established by the Secretary of War in 1890; thence northwesterly and along said bulkhead and pierhead-line to the prolongation of the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street; thence deflecting to the right and northwesterly still along said bulkhead and pierhead-line to the northerly line of East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street; thence westerly and along said northerly line of East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street to a point distant 115.32 feet easterly from the westerly line of Fourth avenue; thence along a line parallel with and distant 115.32 feet easterly from the westerly line of Fourth avenue 299.83 feet to a point in the aforesaid bulkhead and pierhead-line established by the Secretary of War in 1890, where the easterly prolongation of the northerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street intersects the same.

"The interior line of the marginal street, wharf or place will begin at the southeasterly corner of Third avenue and East One Hundred and Thirtieth street and will run thence northerly along the prolongation of the easterly side of Third avenue to the masonry construction of the under-grade roadway or thoroughfare underneath the Third Avenue Bridge and its easterly approach, as shown on the accompanying maps; thence along said masonry construction in a meandering line, as shown on said map to a point distant 75 feet inshore of or southwesterly from the bulkhead and pierhead-line established by the Secretary of War in 1890,

"and on the northerly side of said bridge; thence northwesterly in a straight line parallel with and 75 feet distant southwesterly from that portion of said bulkhead and pierhead line which is intercepted by the easterly line of Third avenue and the southerly line of East One Hundred and Thirty-first street until it intersects said southerly line of East One Hundred and Thirty-first street; thence westerly along said southerly line of East One Hundred and Thirty-first street to the westerly line of Lexington avenue; thence northerly along said westerly line of Lexington avenue in a straight line until it intersects a line parallel with and distant 100 feet southwesterly from that portion of said bulkhead and pierhead-line intercepted by the southerly side of One Hundred and Thirty-second street and the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-third street; thence northwesterly along said parallel line until it intersects the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-second street; thence westerly along said southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-second street to the easterly line of Fourth avenue; thence northerly and along said easterly line of Fourth avenue to the northerly line of East One Hundred and Thirty-third street; thence easterly and along said northerly line of East One Hundred and Thirty-third street in a straight line until it intersects a line drawn parallel with and distant 60 feet southwesterly from that portion of the aforesaid bulkhead and pierhead-line intercepted by the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-third street and the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street; thence along said parallel line 60 feet southwesterly from said bulkhead-line in a straight line until it intersects the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street; thence westerly along said southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street to the westerly side of Fourth avenue; thence northerly and along said westerly side of Fourth avenue to the northerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street.

"All of which is shown on the map submitted herewith in duplicate by the Engineer-in-Chief.

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and hereby are requested to consent to and approve of the new plan for improving the water front between the easterly side of Third avenue and the northerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street on the Harlem river, in the Borough of Manhattan, as above set forth."

The new plan presented and above described, appears to me judicious, and I think the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly be given thereto, as requested by the Board of Docks.

For a Term of Ten Years from December 1, 1901.

To and from the foot of Forty-second street, East river, in the Borough of Manhattan, from and to the foot of Broadway, East river, in the Borough of Brooklyn, "together with all that certain wharf property, land and land under water belonging to the City; beginning at a point where the northerly line of East Forty-second street intersects the established bulkhead-line at the foot of said street; thence running southerly along said bulkhead-line a distance of about 296 feet to the northerly side of East Forty-first street; thence easterly along said northerly line of East Forty-first street a distance of about 150 feet to the established pierhead-line; thence northerly along said pierhead-line a distance of about 296 feet to the northerly line of East Forty-second street extended; thence westerly along the northerly line of East Forty-second street a distance of about 150 feet to the point or place of beginning in the Borough of Manhattan."

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF SALE.

The lease will be sold subject to the approval of the terms thereof by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

No bids will be received which shall be less than the upset price, viz.: Ten Thousand Dollars per annum.

The purchaser will be required at the time of sale to pay, in addition to the auctioneer's fee, to the Department of Docks and Ferries twenty-five per cent. of the amount of the annual rent bid, as security for the execution of the lease, which twenty-five per cent. will be applied to the payment of the rent first accruing under the lease when executed, or will be forfeited to the Department if the purchaser refuses or neglects to execute the lease, with good and sufficient security, to be approved by the Board of Docks, within ten days after being notified that the lease is prepared and ready for execution at the office of the Department of Docks and Ferries, Pier "A," North river, foot of Battery place.

Two sufficient sureties, to be approved by the Board of Docks, will be required under the lease to enter into a bond or obligation, jointly and severally with the lessees, in the sum of double the annual rent, for the faithful performance of all the covenants and conditions of the lease.

The lease will contain the usual covenants and conditions, in conformity with the provisions of law and the ordinances of the Municipal Assembly relative to ferries, and shall provide that the lessees will maintain and operate the ferry during the whole term, and will provide ample accommodations in the way of safe and capacious boats and sufficiency of trips, as to the sufficiency of which accommodations the decision of the Board of Docks shall be final; also conditions that the lessees shall dredge the ferry slip, etc., as required by the Board of Docks; that during the term of the lease they will erect and build, at their own expense, and will at all times well and sufficiently repair, maintain and keep in good order, all and singular the floats, racks, fenders, bridges and other fixtures of the landing places, and in the event of any damage to the bulkheads or piers from collision by the ferryboats, or otherwise, from any accident or negligence on their part, they will immediately repair and restore said wharf property to its previous conditions free of cost to The City of New York; that if at any time during the term of the lease the Board of Docks shall require any of the wharf property used for ferry purposes in order to proceed with the water-front improvements in the vicinity of the ferry landings, the said lessees shall surrender and vacate the premises without any claim upon the City for any damages whatever, upon written notice being given to the lessees three months in advance of the intention of said Board; that such notice shall specify, by the general terms of description or by reference to the plans and specifications of the proposed work of improvement, the character of the alterations and improvements to be made in regard to said water-front, affecting the property and rights hereby authorized to be demised, and upon receiving such notice the lessee may elect to terminate the lease of said ferry privileges or franchise by serving notice of such election upon the Board of Docks within one month after receiving the notice from the Board of Docks of its intention to improve the water-front in the vicinity of the ferry landing; also, that in case only a portion of said wharf property shall be required for the purposes aforesaid, then a reasonable reduction will be made from the rent reserved by said lease; that sworn returns of the amounts of ferry receipts shall be made to the Board of Docks, when required by said Board, and that the books of accounts of the ferry shall be subject to the inspection of said Board.

The lease will contain a covenant providing for the purchase, at a fair valuation, of the boats, buildings and other property of the lessees, used in and actually necessary for the operation of said ferry, upon the termination and surrender and delivery of the premises by the lessees, if the lessees shall not become the purchasers for another term, provided that The City of New York shall not be deemed thereby to purchase said property in any event.

The rates of ferriage and charges for vehicles and freight shall not exceed the rates now charged.

The form of lease which the purchaser will be required to execute can be seen at the office of the Board of Docks.

The right to reject any bid is reserved, if deemed by the Board of Docks to be for the best interests of the city.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance:

DECEMBER 23, 1901.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—The Department of Docks and Ferries, in communication of December 18, 1901, signed by the Secretary, Mr. William H. Burke, says:

"In reply to your communication of the 17th inst., marked 'Engineers,' relative to the proposed sale of the ferry from the foot of East Forty-second street, I beg to submit the following:

"On February 10, 1899, the Brooklyn and New York Ferry Company called attention to the fact that, pursuant to chapter 792 of the Laws of 1897, the said company was about to operate a ferry between the points in the act above referred to, and petitioned the Board to fix such compensation as might be in their judgment proper.

"The Department and the company were in negotiations for some time relative to the amount of rental to be fixed, and also as to the right of the company to operate a ferry without a franchise having been granted by the Municipal Assembly. Finally plans and specifications were submitted for the erection of ferry houses and slips at the foot of East Forty-second street, and the opinion of the Corporation Counsel was requested as to whether the Board could approve such plans and specifications and grant a permit for the erection of said ferry houses and slips, and whether it should accept the rent which had been agreed upon, and in an opinion under date of November 14, 1900, the Corporation Counsel advised as follows:

"There is, in my opinion, no objection to the approval by the Board of Docks of the plans and specifications submitted by the said company, nor to the granting of a permit to said company to erect a ferry house, slips and ferry racks at the foot of Forty-second street, East river. There is also, in my opinion, no objection to the acceptance by the Board of the rent agreed upon, pending such proceedings as the company may determine to begin, to maintain and operate a ferry from the foot of said street under the provisions of said act."

"In accordance with said opinion a permit was granted said company to erect ferry-houses and slips, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and the plans and specifications therefor to be first approved by him.

"The Board, however, has granted no permit to said company to operate a ferry and no rental has been fixed by the Board. Upon learning that the Ferry Company had commenced to operate a ferry from the foot of East Forty-second street, the Corporation Counsel was requested to take steps to compel the boats to stop running until the legal requirements had been complied with, and the terms and conditions of the proposed lease were transmitted to the Sinking Fund for their approval. In the terms transmitted to the Sinking Fund, however, an error occurred, which I have been directed to request you to correct; the upset price therein mentioned is \$6,000 whereas it should be \$10,000."

The letter of the 17th instant referred to, simply asked when this ferry was "authorized and established by the Municipal Assembly, as required by the Charter."

Chapter 792 of the Laws of 1897, became a law May 24, 1897. The present Charter, chapter 378, Laws of 1897, became a law May 4, 1897.

Chapter 792 is entitled "an act relating to the Brooklyn and New York Ferry Company" and, in section 1, authorizes and empowers "the said company to establish, maintain and operate and use ferries * * * across the East river, to run from the ferry slip now at the foot of Broadway, or adjacent thereto, to the foot of East Forty-second street or adjacent thereto."

Section 2 provides for safe and suitable ferry houses, etc., and regulates charges. Section 3 prescribes the times for running of boats.

Section 4 provides that "if it shall become necessary for said company to procure the consent of any person or corporation for any franchise or interest belonging to such person or corporation, said company shall have power to procure the same, but nothing herein shall be so construed as to take away or impair any rights or franchises owned by the cities of New York or Brooklyn, but the proper authorities of the City of New York and the City of Brooklyn may lease to said company any slip or slips under their charge between the lines designated in section one of this act, in said cities within which the ferries of said company are hereby established in the manner now provided by law for the purpose of taking up and landing passengers and vehicles in accordance with the intention of this act."

By section 45 of the present charter the power to establish a ferry rests with the Municipal Assembly expressed as follows:

"And further, to the end that cheap, easy and convenient intercourse may be had between all parts of the city, the City of New York as hereby constituted shall have full and exclusive power to establish, and full power to enjoy by leasing the same or otherwise, and to maintain and regulate ferries over all streams and waterways within or adjoining the limits of said city. The Municipal Assembly may pass appropriate ordinances not inconsistent with law or with this act, or with the vested rights of existing companies or corporations, to enforce the provisions of this section and to carry out its purposes."

Notwithstanding this provision of the charter, chapter 792 establishes this ferry, to be run by the Brooklyn and New York Ferry Company. The ferry is now established and is now running, the buildings and necessary appurtenances having been erected under a permit given by the Department of Docks and Ferries, under the advice of the Corporation Counsel, quoted in the letter of Secretary Burke.

The Secretary states, however, that the Board "has granted no permit to said company to operate a ferry, and no rental has been fixed by the Board."

Under this unusual and anomalous condition of affairs, the Department of Docks and Ferries now proposes to sell the ferry franchise for a term of ten years, from December 1, 1901, "to and from the foot of Forty-second street, East river, in the Borough of Manhattan, from and to the foot of Broadway, in the Borough of Brooklyn, together with all that certain wharf property, land and land under water belonging to the City, beginning at a point where the northerly line of East Forty-second street intersects the established bulkhead-line at the foot of said street; thence running southerly along said bulkhead-line a distance of about 296 feet to the northerly side of East Forty-first street; thence easterly along said northerly line of East Forty-first street a distance of about 150 feet to the established pierhead-line; thence northerly along said pierhead-line a distance of about 296 feet to the northerly line of East Forty-second street extended; thence westerly along the northerly line of East Forty-second street a distance of about 150 feet to the point or place of beginning, in the Borough of Manhattan."

Believing as I do that even this law, chapter 792, Laws of 1897, is limited in section 4 to the extent of not taking away or impairing any rights or franchises owned by The City of New York, the ferry could not be established under chapter 792, Laws of 1897, but only by the action of the Municipal Assembly. I would recommend that the matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion as to whether such sale as is proposed would be legal under the circumstances as shown.

If the measures taken heretofore in establishing this ferry be decided to be correct in law, I see nothing to object to in the terms and conditions proposed, they being in the usual form. The upset price of \$10,000 per annum I think is a fair valuation.

"Whereas, The Sinking Fund Commissioners, at a meeting held August 8, 1900, concurred in the above resolution and authorized the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$60,000 for such purpose; and

"Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, Borough of Brooklyn, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be respectfully requested to concur in the same."

On June 27, 1901, the permit was revoked in order that the Department might proceed with the construction of a new pier at the foot of Ninety-sixth street, depriving the lessee of one month and four days of time for which rent had been paid.

Messrs. Weber & Bunke, through the Department of Docks and Ferries, ask for a refund of the pro rata of rent thus overpaid by surrender of permit as stated.

The amount so overpaid, \$95.89, was deposited in the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt No. 1, June 21, 1901.

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, First Department, at a Special Term thereof, Part III, to be held in the County Court-house, in the Borough of Manhattan, in the City of New York, on the 25th day of March, 1902, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.
