REPORT OF TRANSACTIONS, MAY 25 TO 30, 1903.

Communications Received.

From Finance Department—Deputy Comptroller Stevenson transmits copy of complaint of Building Department, Borough of The Bronx, in regard to old buildings on Hart's Island. Also, request for specifications as well as plans for stone-breaking shed on that island. The Commissioner's attention had been called to these matters, and steps have been taken in regard to same.

From Civil Service Commission—Approving report of Departmental Examining Board, under date of May 20, 1903. On file. Stating that examination for Clerk, Bertillon System, will be held June 15, 1903.

From the State Comptroller—Stating that account of Kings County Penitentiary has been allowed at \$28,607.20, but that "account for board and maintenance of adult felons for terms of over five years is disallowed, not being considered a State charge." Affidavit and receipt inclosed for signatures. Affidavit transmitted to Warden Hayes, with request for explanation of cause for disallowance.

From Heads of Institutions—Reporting that meats, fish, bread, milk, etc., for week ending May 23 agreed with specifications. On file. Reports, census, labor, punishments, etc., for week ending May 23, 1903. On file.

From City Prison—Report of fines received for week ending May 23, 1903, imposed by City Magistrates, and amounting to \$68. On file.

From District Prisons—Report of fines received during week ending May 23, 1903, imposed by City Magistrates, and amounting to \$341. On file.

From Steamboats—Reporting accident to Ambrose O'Hare, Stoker, who sustained injuries from slipping on the deck of the "Massoit." On file. Acting Captain of the "Minnahanonck" states that assistance was rendered by crew of that steamboat to scow that was on fire at foot of East Sixty-first street on May 23, 1903. On file. Reporting absence of Capt. F. H. Ward, of the "Minnahanonck," on account of illness. On file.

From Storehouse, Blackwell's Island—Reporting rejection of 216 pounds of chocolate received by R. A. Lawless, the same not being in conformity with sample shown to bidders. Contractor notified that goods in conformity with sample must be delivered.

From Penitentiary, Blackwell's Island—List of prisoners received during week ending May 23, 1903: Men, 12; women, 4. On file. Prisoners to be discharged, May 31 to June 6, 1903: Men, 20; women, 2. Transmitted to Prison Association. Reporting accident to a prisoner, Benjamin Jennings, caused by breaking of cover of hatchway on which he was moving some furniture; prisoner fell through hatchway and sustained a simple fracture of the left arm. On file.

From Workhouse, Blackwell's Island—Death at Workhouse, on May 23, 1903, of Thomas Hayde, aged 45 years. Friends notified. Warden reports escape from the Workhouse, on May 20, of Michael Cannon, committed for vagrancy; prisoner had been committed thirty times, and was regarded as a "trustee"; was last seen at 12.30, midnight. On file. Warden reports suicide, on May 27, 1903, of Noa L. Burt, aged 28 years, a prisoner, committed for vagrancy, who jumped in the East river and refused to avail himself of efforts made for his rescue. On file. Report of fines paid at Workhouse during week ending May 23, 1903, which amounted to \$72. On file.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD, HELD IN NO. 320 BROADWAY, ON THURSDAY, 14TH MAY, 1903.

There were present—Alexander E. Orr, President, presiding; John H. Starin, Vice-President; Acting Mayor Charles V. Fornes, Acting Comptroller J. W. Stevenson and Commissioners Woodbury Langdon, Morris K. Jesup and John Claflin.

Albert B. Boardman, of counsel; Wm. Barclay Parsons, Chief Engineer, and George S. Rice, Deputy Chief Engineer, also were present.

The minutes of the preceding meeting, that of May 7, were read, and it was moved that they be approved.

The following letter of the President of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company as to easements for the Rapid Transit Railroad, was read:

INTERBOROUGH RAPID TRANSIT COMPANY,
No. 23 NASSAU STREET, NEW YORK CITY,
May 12, 1903.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners:

DEAR SIR—Referring to our conversation with regard to the easements, I believe we mutually admitted it was perfectly proper that this company should be completely reimbursed for its outlay in connection with the same. The contract provides that the easements shall be furnished by the Commission on the part of the City. The following are the easements now enjoyed by the underground road:

Park avenue, Forty-first and Forty-second streets;
Broadway, Forty-second and Forty-third streets;
One Hundred and Fourth street and Broadway;
One Hundred and Forty-first street and Lenox avenue;
Willson-Adams property, One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Harlem river;
Van Schaack, Hatch and Bondy properties, Hillside and Eleventh avenues;
Elm and Worth streets.

Of these the Rapid Transit Commission has not acquired a single one, except from this company. It has been necessary for us to buy the properties and grant the easement. The adjustments made have been for the following easements:

Park avenue, Forty-first and Forty-second streets..... \$140,000 00
Broadway, Forty-second and Forty-third streets..... 50,000 00

Inasmuch as it has been impossible to reach an understanding with regard to any of the other easements, and the carrying of the properties purchased for the purpose of securing the easements to the rapid transit road will amount as per June 1, 1903, to \$1,208,943.60, which represents actual cost to us not contemplated under the contract, and is a severe burden, I now propose as a final effort that the question of the easements be disposed of by an agreement on the part of the Commission with the Interborough Rapid Transit Company to pay, as the cost of all the remaining easements, the difference between the cost, interest and carrying charges of the several properties, giving credit for any revenues received and the proceeds of the sale of the properties, such sales to be made in accordance with the dates mentioned in connection with each parcel as given below:

One Hundred and Fourth street and Broadway, by July 1, 1903;
 Elm and Worth streets, by July 1, 1903;
 Hillside and Eleventh avenues, by September 1, 1903;
 One Hundred and Forty-first street and Lenox avenue, by November 1, 1903;
 Willson-Adams property, One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Harlem river, by January 1, 1904.

The Interborough Rapid Transit Company is entitled under the contract to receive these easements without cost to it, and it is fair to ask now that this matter be definitely adjusted and that we be protected from loss and cleared from this burden promptly, which is all that we ask.

With regard to the One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Westchester avenue property we request that we be authorized to buy the same immediately, with the distinct understanding that it is to be bought and sold and the difference to be paid to us without question on or before November 1, 1903. This being an easement for an elevated structure, there is no reason why this company should be asked to carry the property beyond that date.

DEAR SIR—It is or, at least, may be of great consequence to the prosecution of our rapid transit work in Brooklyn that the order appointing the Commissioner in the condemnation proceeding should be entered at the earliest possible day. At one point on Joralemon street we are making an excavation which is much opposed by the adjoining owners, and it will be embarrassing to have an injunction taken out against us. As the City does not own the fee of the street, I am advised by our counsel that our right to proceed is not complete until the order appointing a Commissioner in the condemnation proceeding is entered and until the oath of the Commissioner is filed.

To the Honorable Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners of The City of New York, No. 320 Broadway, New York:

SIRS—The provisions of the certificate and franchise granted by your Board to the New York and Jersey Railroad Company, dated July 10, 1902, and approved by the Honorable the Board of Aldermen for The City of New York on December 16, 1902, provide, among other things (section 5) that "all plans for and the method of doing the work shall, from time to time, be subject to the approval of the Board," and, further, that "excavations necessary in the course of construction by the tunnel company shall be made without disturbing the surface of the streets, except the portions of Greenwich, Christopher and West Tenth streets, adjoining the terminal station aforesaid; provided, however, that the Board may, wherever elsewhere local conditions make excavations from the surface necessary for efficient construction, grant the right to make such excavations from the surface, subject to such conditions as the Board may prescribe."

I beg to present herewith drawings and specifications providing for the construction of the approach from the shaft at the foot of Morton street, eastwardly under Morton street to Greenwich street, and thence northwardly under Greenwich street to and including the subsurface portion of the terminal station at Christopher, West Tenth and Greenwich streets. These plans and specifications provide for the execution of a portion of this work in Greenwich street in open cut, this being necessary for efficient construction, and I respectfully request your approval of these plans and specifications, which for identification are entitled and numbered as follows:

Specifications entitled "Hudson Improvement Company, specifications for approach of the Tunnel Railroad of the New York and Jersey Railroad Company, in the Borough of Manhattan, City, County and State of New York, March, 1903. Charles M. Jacobs, Chief Engineer, No. 128 Broadway, New York."

Plans and drawings numbered 1185, 1179, 1180, 1173, 1181, 1182, 1184, 1144, 1141, 1187, 1168, 1093, 1094, 1095, 1096, 1097, 1167, 1175 and 1177.

I beg to say that the plans showing the alteration of sewers in the streets affected by the construction of the road of this company have been submitted to and have received the approval of the President of the Borough of Manhattan and Chief Engineer of Sewers.

Hon. A. E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Board:

MY DEAR SIR—In accordance with your instructions I have examined the plans and specifications submitted by the New York and Jersey Railroad Company for the construction of their subway from their terminus at Greenwich and West Tenth streets to the tunnel beneath the Hudson river.

I find that the plans and specifications provide a railway structure that will be safe, and I therefore approve the same. I understand that the alterations in the sewer plans have already been submitted to and received the approval of the Commissioner of Public Works.

I beg leave to call the attention of the Board to the fact, however, that the distance between track centres is only 11 feet, as compared with similar distance of 12 feet 6 inches in the Rapid Transit Subway. It seems to me that it is in the interest of the private companies, as well as the public, that all subways to be constructed, whether by the Board or under its supervision, should be substantially of similar dimensions, so as to permit at any time the same equipment to be run through any and all such subways. I would recommend, therefore, that the company be requested to widen the proposed subway so that the track centres shall be 12 feet 6 inches.

The bonds on the various sections were assigned to the City and it seems a hardship for the sub-contractor to have to pay the full premium on these bonds if they can now be equitably released from a proportionate part of the same. If your Commission sees any way in which this can be done this company is willing to waive a portion of the bond where the work is sufficiently completed and of a quality warranting such release.

The following opinion of counsel was read:

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Board, No. 320 Broadway, New York City:

DEAR SIR—The Board has referred to the Counsel the question whether the Rapid Transit Contractor, not having the consent of the Rapid Transit Board or other sufficient consent of the City, could under an arrangement between himself and the owner of private property immediately adjoining the wall of a rapid transit station open a doorway through such wall of a station, as at present designated, into such private property.

Although the answer to this question is not perfectly free from doubt, we strongly incline to the belief that as a practical matter the courts would not interfere with such an arrangement. Neither the rapid transit contract nor the rapid transit statute contains any clause specifically bearing upon the question. The contractor is under obligation to maintain and operate the rapid transit railroad during the term of the lease, carefully and skilfully, according to the highest known standards of railway operation. The contractor is also bound at the expiration of the fifty years' lease, or its renewal, to re-deliver the property in thoroughly good order. In the case of the letting of a house or a building, the technical rule is that the tenant may not make any structural alteration. If he does he is liable to an injunction or suit for waste. It has thus been held that the tenant may not cut a door through a wall, although it be his intention, as well as his obligation, at the end of the lease, to restore the wall to its original condition. But cases like this dealt with specific buildings; and in most, if not all of the cases, the length of the leases was short. It seems to us difficult to apply the same technical rule to a rapid transit road upwards of twenty miles long in a great city, which is to cost \$40,000,000, and which has been leased for a term of fifty or perhaps seventy-five years. The question is far more like the usual lease of a steam railroad or railroad system for a long term. In such a case it would be assumed that the lessee company could make any changes of detail necessary for efficient operation and not involving radical alteration. Every such lease implies that the railroad is to be operated to the highest degree of efficiency, and that such changes of grade, elimination of curves, improvements of stations and the like are to be made as contribute to such efficiency. The intention of such a lease is that there shall be the largest practicable amount of traffic. That is the interest of the lessee in order that he may earn the rent and profit beyond, and it is the obligation of the owner of the railroad to the public.

The same considerations are applicable to a rapid transit railroad for the construction of which municipal bonds have been issued, the interest and principal of which are to be met out of such rent. The public policy which dictated municipal construction included accommodation of the largest practicable number of passengers and their accommodation in the manner practically the most convenient for them.

The purpose of such an opening as is under consideration is the ingress and egress of passengers. They will not, of course, avail themselves of such means except as they find it convenient to do so. If they find it convenient to do so, it would seem in general to be within what may be called rapid transit public policy that such convenience shall be permitted them wherever the doors or passages lead. The City would not seem to have an interest as against the passengers, that they shall go here, or that they shall not go there. The fact that such use is a convenience, or brings benefit or profit to the owner who permits his private property to be used for such ingress or egress hardly seems to us a sufficient reason for refusing such additional accommodation to the traveling public. It is obviously the interest of the City that the contractor shall be encouraged to reduce fares; and precisely the same principle is involved in every additional facility offered the traveling public.

We cannot, therefore, think that it is within the contemplation of the rapid transit contract that the contractor shall not be permitted, in the manner now suggested, to increase the facilities of access to rapid transit stations so long as he violates no requirement of the contract. Indeed, it is well open to argument that it is the duty of the contractor to do every reasonable thing within his power to increase the facilities of egress and ingress to the railroad.

All of this argument doubtless relates to questions of policy with which the Counsel are not primarily concerned. But our reference to them is not irrelevant, but necessary to the legal question. For that question itself involves matters of policy and for a plain reason. If the questions submitted to us were mooted in a law suit, the Court, beyond a doubt, would consider them. If the contractor were to open such a communication between a station and private property without the consent of the Board, and if it were to be held a technical violation of the right of the City as landlord, the City would have to assert its right in one of two ways: either by a suit for damages or by a suit to enjoin the contractor from making the opening or permitting it to continue. If the suit were one for damages the award would be nominal, for the City would have to show its actual damage. And actual damage, it seems to us, would be limited to the actual pecuniary injury sustained by the City, and the amount of which would apparently be trifling—perhaps not exceeding the cost of properly filling in the opening. If, on the other hand, the City were to apply for an injunction, the courts would deal with the rapid transit contract rather on general than technical lines, and with regard to the whole purpose of rapid transit construction and the public policy. Any such injunction would be a matter of grace. This general doctrine we have ourselves again and again asserted in court, in behalf of the Board. We have, in various suits against rapid transit construction, asked the courts—and successfully—to hold that, upon any application for an injunction relating to a public work, the public convenience itself must be regarded, and that, where public convenience was inconsistent with granting the injunction, the party applying for the injunction must be left to his claim for money damages. We have been unable as yet to think out specifications which would command respect in court of real injury to the City resulting from an increase of the accessibility of a rapid transit station without imposing upon the City any additional expense, or the occupation of any municipal property, not already dedicated to rapid transit purposes.

We incline, therefore, to advise the Board that, although it may be doubtful whether as a technical matter the rapid transit contractor, even with the consent of the owner of immediately adjoining property, will have the right before the expiration of his lease to open a doorway from a rapid transit station into such property, it is, nevertheless, not likely that a court would prevent the contractor from doing so or would punish him with any serious award of damage if he were to do so.

If the Board incline to think this view sound, it might, nevertheless—for the sake of precedent—give a formal assent to any proposed opening which may be

approved without deciding the question, and in form at least reserving the supervisory right of the Board.

BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO THE Erie Railroad Company the right or franchise to construct and operate a railroad in and upon

Thirteenth avenue and the marginal wharf or way lying between Thirteenth avenue and the waters of the Hudson river, between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of the City of New York hereby grants to the Erie Railroad Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the franchise, right and privilege to construct and operate a double-track surface railroad, with a single switch connecting the two tracks, to be operated by steam locomotives or other motive power which may be lawfully employed, except horses or the overhead system of electricity, across Thirteenth avenue and the marginal wharf or way extending from the westerly side of Thirteenth avenue to the waters of the Hudson river, between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, City, County and State of New York.

Sec. 2. The grant of this franchise is subject to the following conditions:

First—This ordinance as to the marginal wharf which extends from the westerly line of Thirteenth avenue to the waters of the Hudson river shall not be operative and no rights thereunder shall vest in the grantee, its successors or assigns until the Commissioner of Dock, under the provisions of section 819 of the Charter of the City of New York, shall approve by resolution, license or otherwise, the use of such marginal wharf by the grantee in the manner herein provided, or in such other manner as he may prescribe, not inconsistent with the terms of this ordinance.

Second—The said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate such railroad shall be held and enjoyed by the grantee, its successors or assigns, for the term of twenty-five years from the date when this ordinance is signed by the Mayor, unless sooner terminated as hereinafter provided, with the privilege of renewal of the grant for a further period of twenty-five years, upon a fair revaluation of said right, privilege and franchise, but such renewal shall not provide for any further renewal. Such revaluation shall be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railroad by itself, and is not to include or valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railroad by the grantee, its successors or assigns. It shall be made in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successor in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railroad company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the grant, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller or his successor in authority within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience, and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the railroad company. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last five years of the original franchise.

Provided, however, and this grant is upon the express condition that the right, privilege and franchise conferred by this ordinance may be cancelled and annulled upon one year's notice in writing to the grantee, its successors and assigns, by the joint act of the Commissioner of Docks of the City of New York and of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or their respective successors in authority, and thereupon all the rights of the grantee, its successors or assigns in and upon the street and marginal wharf or way aforesaid shall cease, and the railroad and its structures thereon shall be forthwith removed and the pavement of the street or wharf restored under the same conditions and covenants as are contained in the following paragraph of this section, designated third:

Third—Upon the termination of such franchise, right or privilege, whether original or by way of renewal, the plant and property, with its appurtenances, of the Erie Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, in the street and upon the marginal wharf or way aforesaid, shall be forthwith removed by the grantee, its successors or assigns, and the surface of the said street or marginal wharf or way upon which such railroad was laid shall be restored to a condition equal to that of the surrounding surface and pavement

of such street and wharf. In default of the performance of this condition by the grantee, its successors or assigns, the proper legal authorities may cause such property and plant to be removed from the street and wharf aforesaid and the surface thereof to be restored in the manner above described at the expense of the grantee, its successors or assigns, and such expense shall be recovered by The City of New York by action or otherwise.

Fourth—The grantee, its successors or assigns shall pay for this franchise to The City of New York the following sums of money:

During the first term of five years the annual sum of \$675.

During the second term of five years the annual sum of \$700.

During the third term of five years the annual sum of \$725.

During the fourth term of five years the annual sum of \$750.

During the fifth term of five years the annual sum of \$800.

Such sums shall be paid into the Treasury of The City of New York on November 1 in each year.

Fifth—The rights and franchises granted hereby shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Erie Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—The said railroad may be operated by locomotive steam power or by any other motive power which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law, excepting overhead electrical power and horse power, provided, however, that the locomotive steam engines used shall be housed or boxed so as to conform to the type commonly known as the dummy engine.

The number of cars to be included in any train operated upon the railroad shall be limited to ten, and the speed of the engines and cars shall not exceed six miles per hour. No car or engine shall be permitted to remain stationary within the limits of Thirteenth avenue, or upon the marginal wharf or street at any time.

Seventh—The railroad constructed under this ordinance shall be maintained and operated solely for the purpose of the transportation of goods, wares and merchandise and for no other purpose, and especially for no purpose in connection with the passenger traffic as commonly understood.

Eighth—Such railroad shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railroad construction and operation, and solely upon the terms and according to the lines and surveys and of the character of the rails and other parts of the construction approved by the Commissioner of Docks of The City of New York and the President of the Borough of Manhattan. Such railroad of the grantee, its successors or assigns shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this grant.

Ninth—Said railroad shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of The City of New York, and especially shall in all respects be subject to the power and authority of the Commissioner of Docks to regulate and control the uses of the marginal wharf or way above described, and the transportation of property thereon.

Tenth—The grantee, its successors or assigns, shall at all times keep the street between the tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow.

Eleventh—The grantee, its successors or assigns, shall keep in permanent repair the portion of the surface of the street and of the marginal wharf or way between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And The City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of the street and marginal wharf or way, and in that event the grantee, its successors or assigns shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twelfth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this grant may be forfeited and annulled by The City of New York by an action brought by the Corporation Counsel on ten days' notice to the grantee, its successors or assigns.

Sec. 3. This grant is upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted relating to surface railroads operating in The City of New York shall be strictly complied with.

Sec. 4. The grantee, its successors or assigns shall commence the construction of the railroad under this franchise and complete the same within six months from the date when it has obtained the necessary permits and resolutions of the City officials and Departments, and on or before January 1, 1904, otherwise this grant shall be forfeited forthwith and without any proceedings either at law or otherwise for that purpose, provided, however, that such time may be extended under and for causes specified in section 99 of the Railroad Law, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for a period not exceeding six months.

Sec. 5. This grant is upon the express condition that the grantee, within thirty days after it has been duly authorized to construct or operate its railroad hereunder, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of \$1,500, either in money or in securities, to be approved by him, which shall be security for the performance of the terms and conditions of this grant, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the franchise, the repairs of the street pavement and the removal of snow and ice, and the quality of construction of the railroad. In case of default in the performance by said company of such terms and conditions, The City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same with interest from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said company.

In case of any drafts so made upon this security fund, the said company shall, upon thirty days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of fifteen hundred dollars, and in default thereof the grant hereby made may be canceled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said

City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Sec. 6. This grant shall not become operative until said railroad company shall duly execute, under its corporate seal, an instrument in writing wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York within thirty days after the signing of this ordinance by the Mayor.

Sec. 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 430 of the Greater New York Charter.
