Appeal No. 72 of 1907, New Building 674 of 1907, premises southeast corner of One Hundred and Fifty-third street and Morris avenue, The Bronx, Bernstein & Bernstein, architects and appellants.

"Brick partition wall or steel girder required where span exceeds 26 feet." The omission of a 10-inch I-beam on all stories which the floor beams were to rest on. Said girders were to extend from shaft wall to the front. The structure has been built without the girders and floor beams extend from wall to wall in a span of 27 feet.

If girders were required to be put in the floor beams would either be laid on top of girders or framed into same. In the former method the girder would project into the ceilings, in which case we could not obtain the required height in the room, viz., 9 feet high, according to the Tenement House Laws. If the floor beams, on the other hand, were to be framed into the girders it would require two lengths of beams, which would not be as good a tie across the building as it would be in one span. Another reason given is that by using girders the floor load would be concentrated on pier of the front wall, and one pier on the shaft wall, causing eccentric loads and unequal settlement. The building has been erected without the girders and shows no sign of deflection in the floor loads.

Messrs. Cohen and Friedman appeared before the Board.

On motion, denied.

Mr. Buek, Chairman of the Committee appointed on the 15th inst., presented the report of the Committee, which was read by the Chairman. After discussion Mr. Marshall moved the adoption of the report, omitting one paragraph, also adding one paragraph of new matter.

This amendment was seconded by Mr. Marshall, and, on vote, carried.

The Chairman announced that the Committee was discharged, with thanks.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From September 29 to October 19, inclusive, one hundred and forty-two operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, twenty-two at Gouverneur Hospital, forty-nine at Harlem Hospital and thirty-two at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their assistants were present.

To insure a satisfactory supply of good water, and to avoid carrying ice through the new hospital, it is recommended that the architects, Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, be authorized to install in the different pavilions pipe lines to carry to designated points on each floor of the different buildings filtered ice water.

The contract for the vacuum cleaner system for Pavilions A and B provides for but two cabinets for utensils. It is believed that there should be an implement cabinet on each floor, as is the case at Gouverneur Hospital, and the Vacuum Cleaner Company have informed McKim, Mead & White that they will supply six separate cabinets at an additional cost of \$125. It is recommended that this be authorized.

Mr. J. H. Freedlander has presented a bill for \$191.75, in accordance with clause 4 of his contract, being 2½ per cent. on the lowest bid, \$7,670, for the vacuum cleaning plant for Harlem Hospital. The clause of the contract referred to provides that in the event that a bid is not accepted in ninety days that this percentage must be given on the lowest bid. It is believed that the claim should be allowed, and that I be authorized to approve it.

It is recommended that in view of the requested issue of \$30,000 Revenue Bonds to pay Nurses because of the fact that the Nurses have had to be paid from the appropriation for salaries, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to appropriate \$18,000 for salaries for the balance of the fiscal year; and to meet deficits in other appropriations it is recommended that they be asked to appropriate \$12,000 for supplies and contingencies, \$2,500 for ambulances and \$2,500 for clothing for the insane. The large demand on these several appropriations because of the increased amount of supplies required for the hospitals, has necessitated this request.

In order to protect the patients from the inclemency of weather at the ambulance entrance of the new Harlem Hospital, it is recommended that it be inclosed on the three open sides with a metal and glass partition, which can be done for something less than \$300. This work should be commenced as soon as possible.

The General Superintendent of Training Schools recommends that two additional Messengers be employed in the admitting office. Of the nine men charged that office one has the care of the elevator, and there is such a demand on the other men carrying patients to operating rooms, etc., that two more men are needed, and it is recommended that authority be given to employ them.

Report is submitted of the deposits to the City Chamberlain of money received from the sale of fat and bones and from patients during the months of July, August and September.

The consumption of coal at Fordham Hospital has been in excess of the architect's estimate, and it is necessary to advertise for new bids for coal. Advertisement has been made, and it is recommended that this action be approved.

There is sufficient balance in the appropriation for the construction of Harlem Hospital to install a standard electric clock system. The lowest bid for this work was \$720. The system has been installed in Gouverneur Hospital and has worked satisfactorily, and it is recommended that authority be granted to install it in Harlem Hospital.

In order to afford after treatment for patients who have been discharged from State hospitals for the insane, and also to treat patients with mild mental and nervous diseases who on examination by our alienists are found to be in a condition that may not necessitate transfer to a State hospital, it is recommended that a clinic for mental and nervous diseases be authorized in the out-patient department, Bellevue, to be placed in charge of our Resident Alienist, who is willing, for the benefit of the patients, to undertake this important work.

There seems to be some confusion in the different hospitals of the department in regard to the right of individuals to medicines and dressings; that is, City employees, government employees and others present themselves to ask for medical supplies. It is believed that to give such supplies is a violation of the dispensary law, and it is recommended that the Trustees approve of a rule that no prescriptions will be filled or dressings issued except for patients who are treated in the out-patient department or in the hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the matter of installing in the different pavilions of the new Bellevue Hospital pipe lines to carry filtered ice water to designated points on each floor be approved.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That an implement cabinet should be placed on each floor for the vacuum cleaner system in Pavilions A and B, and the recommendation that six separate cabinets be supplied at an additional cost of \$125 was approved.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the bill of J. H. Freedlander, of \$191.75, be approved, it being 2½ per cent. on the lowest bid, \$7,670, for the vacuum cleaning plant for Harlem Hospital, which was not accepted, and which is in accordance with clause 4 of the contract.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the recommendation that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to appropriate \$18,000 for salaries for the balance of the fiscal year, and to meet deficits in other appropriations that they be asked to appropriate \$12,000 for supplies and contingencies, \$2,500 for ambulances and \$2,500 for clothing for the insane, be approved.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the ambulance entrance of the new Harlem Hospital should be enclosed on three sides with a metal and glass partition, which can be done for something less than \$300.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the recommendation of the General Superintendent of Training Schools to employ two additional Messengers in the admitting office be approved.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That an advertisement be inserted in the CITY RECORD calling for bids for coal, as the consumption of coal at Fordham Hospital has been in excess of that estimated on.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That a standard electric clock system should be installed in Harlem Hospital, the lowest bid for this work being \$720.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, and submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
