The Chairman Pro Tem. laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 4464.

City of New York, Office of the Mayor, September 16, 1913.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

It is with deep sorrow that I announce that the Honorable William Jay Gaynor, the Mayor of this City, died while on his way to Europe to enjoy a well-earned vacation, on September 10, 1913. The news of his death has plunged our entire City into mourning, and I have felt it proper to call your honorable body together to take proper official action regarding his death. The funeral is to occur at Trinity Church next Monday morning, September 22, at 11 o'clock, and I suggest that your

body appoint a committee of nine members to attend the services. I know it to be the desire of each member of the Board to be present at the funeral and to do honor to the late Mayor, but the limited seating capacity of the church and the vast number of requests that are being made to the family and committee for seats makes it impracticable for the entire Board to attend. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR.

Mayor of The City of New York, is no more. Divine Providence has called him from his earthly career, leaving behind a record of integrity, devotion to duty and faithfulness to all the claims which public life made upon him.

A foremost citizen, great public character, constructive jurist, and in the public life of The City of New York a leading force, he will be missed.

During his extended period of service he took a most useful and active part in the affairs of the City, State and Nation, to each of which he gave uninterruptedly and unstintingly of the talent and genius with which nature had freely endowed him.

No longer will his subtle and trenchant pen, blent with a grim humor and homely philosophy, find its way into the heat and glare of official and political life with which he had been identified for nearly half a century.

"He was a man, take him for all in all, we shall not look upon his like again."

Resolved, That, in the death of the Honorable William J. Gaynor, The City of New York, the State and the Nation have suffered an especial and very great loss. In him was recognized one of the country's greatest and most conscientious public servants;

Resolved, Further, that the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York extends to the sorrowing widow and children sincere and heartfelt sympathy on the sad bereavement they have sustained, and that a copy hereof, suitably engrossed and duly authenticated by the Mayor and City Clerk, be transmitted to the family; and be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen attend the funeral of Mayor Gaynor in a body, and, as an additional mark of respect, do now adjourn.

The Chairman Pro Tem. put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

The petition of Manhattan Bridge Three Cent

Line respectfully shows as follows:

On the 10th day of July, 1912, The City of New York, pursuant to resolution of this Board, entered into a contract with petitioner whereby said City granted to petitioner a franchise to construct and operate a street surface railroad from the Denshaw Street Ferry, in Manhattan, to the Long Island Railroad Station, in Brooklyn, via the Manhattan Bridge and certain streets in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn.

Paragraph first of section 2 of said contract provides that the rights granted by the contract shall cease unless petitioner shall obtain and file with the Board, within six months from the date of the contract, consents in writing of the owners of one-half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railroad, or, in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, shall, within six months or within one month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine whether said railroad ought to be constructed.

Paragraph fourth of section 2 of said contract provides that the rights granted by said contract shall cease unless petitioner shall commence construction of its railway within three months from the date upon which the consents of property owners are filed with the Board, or from the date of the order of the Appellate Division confirming the determination of Commissioners appointed pursuant to section 174 of the Railroad Law, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within six months from the date of filing such consents or the date of such order, provided, however, that the Board may grant an extension, not to exceed six months, of either of such periods.

Prior to the execution of said contract

petitioner had obtained from the Public Service

Commission for the First District a certificate

of public convenience and necessity under section 9 of the Railroad Law, and immediately upon the execution of said contract petitioner applied to the Public Service Commission, pursuant to section 53 of the Public Service Commissions Law, for an order permitting it to exercise its said franchise. Said application was opposed by the existing surface railroads of Manhattan and Brooklyn, but was granted by an order made on the 14th day of August, 1912.

Petitioner immediately began the construction of the tracks and equipment necessary to operation on the Manhattan Bridge. Said work was

delayed by two temporary injunctions obtained

by the existing railroads in Manhattan and

Brooklyn, acting in concert, both of which were

vacated, and such work was completed and opera-

tion commenced on the Manhattan Bridge on

the 4th day of September, 1912.

Immediately on the execution of said con-

tract petitioner set about obtaining consents of owners of property abutting on the streets in which it was authorized to operate its railroad, and prior to the 1st day of September, 1912, obtained the necessary consents as to Flatbush Avenue Extension, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and began the construction of its road from Manhattan Bridge to Fulton street. This construction was delayed by the refusal of the roads constituting the Brooklyn Rapid Transit system to consent to the installation of crossings over their tracks in Concord and Willoughby streets and Myrtle avenue, and by an injunction obtained by them to prevent such installation. This action on their part made it necessary for petitioner to commence a proceeding under section 22 of the Railroad Law to obtain the right to install such crossings. Said proceeding was commenced on the 10th day of September, 1912, was tried on the 12th day of September, 1912, and decided on the 9th day of November, 1912, such decision being in favor of the contention of petitioner, and on the 16th day of November, 1912, Commissioners were appointed in said proceedings, who made their report as to the manner of said crossings on the 26th day of November, 1912, and the same was confirmed on the 27th day of November, 1912.

Said railroad was put in operation to Fulton street in December, 1912, and is still in opera-

Crabb, Engineer, Way and Structure; a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within three (3) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall, within said three (3) months, within one (1) months thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, until January 1, 1924.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sum of money:

(a) The sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one hundred and ten dollars (\$110), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of

its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one hundred and ten dollars (\$110).
