

Morris K. Jessup and J. M. Whereas, The act of Congress incorporating the United States International Exhibition, approved April 23, 1880, provides that the said Exhibition shall be held in the City of New York; and Whereas, The act passed by the Legislature, enabling any corporation to hold, use, and improve real estate for the purposes of an exhibition, approved May 28, 1880, provides "that nothing in this act shall be so construed as to authorize the said United States International Commission to enter upon and use any of the public parks of the City of New York for the purposes of said exhibition, except that, by permission of the Park Commissioners of the said city, the said United States International Commission may erect a permanent building or buildings in such public park or parks as may be designated, and under such restrictions as may be imposed by said Park Commissioners; and Whereas, Experience has demonstrated that no international exhibition has ever achieved success unless encouraged either by governmental or municipal aid, or both; and

Whereas, Experience has demonstrated that no international exhibition has ever achieved success unless encouraged either by governmental or municipal aid, or both; and Whereas, The examinations of the sub-committee of the Commission of the various sites proposed for said exhibition, and the discussions which have been had before the same Committee by the parties advocating such respective sites, have satisfied the Executive Committee that it will be detrimental to the exhibition if any site belonging to private parties is taken therefor, because of the excessive cost of the acquisition and adaptation of the property required for the purposes indicated; therefore be it

fore be it Resolved, That it is the judgment of this Executive Committee that it is the imperative duty of the authorities of the City and State to allow a portion of Central Park to be occupied for the purposes of said exhibition.

Commissioner Green moved that the further consideration of the subject be laid over until the next meeting of the Board.

Commissioner Lane offered the following as an amendment:

Whereas, The Department have heard the reasons presented by the Committee in favor of occupying portions of the Central Park for the purposes of an International Exhibition.

Resolved, That the public interests require that the application of the Committee should be rejected, and that it is hereby rejected.

Commissioner Wenman offered the following as an amendment to Commissioner Lane's amend-

ment:

Whereas, Messrs. Stebbins and Strong, on behalf of the World's Fair Committee, having made application for a site for the World's Fair on the Central Park, and also presented views on other locations not before presented to this Board; and,

Whereas, It is the desire of the members of this Board to give the Committee's views a fair and courteous consideration; therefore

Resolved, That the subject be laid over until the next meeting of the Board.

Deduction will be made from the pay of Patrolmen and Doormen for time lost by sickness or

Deduction will be made from the pay of Patrolmen and Doormen for time lost by sickness or disability, as follows:

1st. If the period of sick time lost shall not exceed four days, no pay is allowed.

2d. When the period of such lost time shall be continued beyond the four days above mentioned, for the additional time, not exceeding eight days, one-fourth pay may be allowed.

3d. When the period of lost time is continuous, and extends beyond the twelve days above mentioned, half pay may be allowed for such extended time.

4th. Full time for such lost time will be allowed only by the Board of Police after written appliations therefor his the restrict of the party of the part

cation therefor by the party claiming it.

cation therefor by the party claiming it.

5th. When the sickness or disability is feigned or simulated, or when it arises from carelessness, improper or vicious conduct, excessive indulgence of appetite, or other bad habits, improper, illegal or immoral practices, or from any cause occurring while absent from duty, or if the sick member shall fraudulently, by concealment, false statement, or otherwise, seek to deceive or mislead the Surgeon in relation to his case, or if the member shall not remain at his residence, so as to be visited at the option of the Surgeon, or if he refuses or neglects to conform to the instructions of the Surgeon, no pay for the time lost shall be allowed.

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Sec. 2. CHAPTER 123.

An Acr in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unp-id, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over even per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.
