

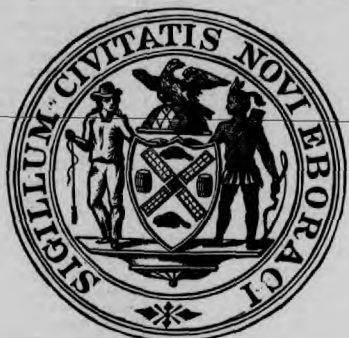

From the Clerk of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a copy of a resolution authorizing the Comptroller to issue stock for the payment of damages, etc., in the matter of the opening of Webster avenue.

From the United States Illuminating Company, desiring permission to erect poles along north side of Fortieth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues.

From the Supervisor of the City Record, stating that the requisition of this Department for printing and binding minutes, etc., had been rejected by the Board of City Record.

From the American Salt Company, relative to exhibiting a large block of salt.

From Julius Pollock, desiring permission to remove trees from in front of his premises on Boston avenue.

From Morris K. Jessup, President American Museum of Natural History, enclosing a plan for constructing a walk in connection with the roadway recently finished at Eighth avenue and Seventy-seventh street.

From Thomas S. Dick, applying for a renewal of his license for boat service on the Central Park.

From the Commissioner of Public Works, relative to remedying the gully on Riverside Drive, and Twelfth avenue at One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street.

From the Supervisor of the City Record, making requisition for a list of subordinates, etc., as required by section 111, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

The Secretary having stated that the President of the Board had replied thereto on the 26th inst., the communication was ordered on file.

From Pim, Forwood & Co, lessees—In reference to the approach to Pier, new 55, North river.

From Drew & Bucki, lessees—In reference to damage done to the Pier at Little West Twelfth street, North river, by the Fire Department boat "Zophar Mills." Secretary having stated that the President had replied thereto on the 23d inst., it was ordered on file.

From John Gillies—Accepting contract for building crib bulkhead and platform between Seventy-eighth and Seventy-ninth streets, East river.

From B. Richardson—Requesting that a dock be built at the foot of One Hundred and Twenty-third street, East river.

From Patrick Reilly—Applying to be reinstated as watchman in the Department.

From Counsel to the Corporation—Enclosing answer in the suit of the Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron Company against the Mayor, etc., for verification by the Commissioners. Secretary directed to return the same to the Counsel to the Corporation when verified.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. In reference to new cast-iron water-pipe at Pier, new 45, North river.

Secretary directed to transmit report to the Counsel to the Corporation for collection of the penalty imposed for violation of Rule 4, on December 21st, 22d and 23d instant, \$150.

A communication was received from Joseph Walsh, requesting permission to substitute a yellow-pine mooring pile in place of a white pine one, as required in his contract for repairing the platform at foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river, which, being read, was ordered on file, and Commissioner Vanderpool offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the application made by Joseph Walsh for leave to substitute a yellow-pine mooring pile in place of the white-pine mooring pile called for by the specifications in his contract for repairing the bulkhead at One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river, be and hereby is denied.

Which was adopted by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Vanderpool and Voorhis, the President voting in the negative.

A communication from the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, requesting permission to erect a hood in front of their premises on Pier 50, East river, and submitting a plan therefor, was received, read, and ordered on file, and the President offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the application made by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, for permission to erect a hood in front of their premises on Pier 50, East river, be and hereby is denied.

Commissioner Voorhis moved to amend the resolution so as to read as follows:

Resolved, That the plan submitted by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, for a hood to their premises on Pier 50, East river, be referred back to that company, and that it be requested to furnish more specific and definite plans of the structure proposed to be erected thereat.

The motion to amend the resolution was adopted by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Vanderpool and Voorhis, the President voting in the negative; and the question then recurring on the resolution as amended, it was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Vanderpool and Voorhis.

A communication from the Counsel to the Health Department, requesting that the hearing in respect to the Pier at Thirty-eighth street, North river, be laid over for a few days, was received, read, and ordered on file, and the following resolution, offered by Commissioner Voorhis in relation thereto, was adopted by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Vanderpool and Voorhis, the President voting in the negative:

Resolved, That the consideration of the matter in respect to the use and occupation of the Pier at Thirty-eighth street, North river, be laid over until January 3, 1883.

A report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 2788, submitting specification and form of contract for building a crib bulkhead at foot of Seventy-fifth street, East river, at an estimated cost of \$3,000, was received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, and the following resolution unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the specification and form of contract, as prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief, for building a crib bulkhead, and platform in front of the same, at the foot of Seventy-fifth street, East river, be and is hereby approved and adopted, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and that the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed and proper advertisements inviting bids for doing the said work inserted in the papers designated by law.

A report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 2722, submitting specification and form of contract for repairing Pier 52, East river, jointly with the alleged owners of the easterly half of said pier, at an estimated cost of \$6,500 for the whole work, was also received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, and the following preamble and resolutions in relation thereto were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, The unsafe condition of Pier 52, East river, has made it necessary for this Department to fence it off from public use until placed in good repair; and

Whereas, It is the judgment of this Board that Pier 52, East river, should be immediately and thoroughly repaired, in accordance with the plans and specifications submitted therefor by the Engineer-in-Chief; therefore,

Resolved, That the alleged owner or owners of the easterly half of Pier 52, East river, be and hereby are notified to file in this Department, within five days after receipt hereof, a written agreement, that he or they will enter into a contract jointly with the Corporation of the City of New York, owners of the westerly half of said pier, for repairing the structure, upon plans and specifications submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief, and approved by this Board, and will become liable for the payment of one-half of the cost and expense of doing such work.

Resolved, That the specification and form of contract as prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief for repairing Pier 52, East river, jointly with the alleged owners of the easterly half thereof, be and is hereby approved and adopted, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and that the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed and proper advertisements, inviting bids for doing said work, inserted in the papers designated by law.

AGREEMENT FOR THE SALE OF BULKHEAD AND PIERS 13 AND 14, EAST RIVER.

This agreement, made and entered into this nineteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, between Harriet T. Potter and Elizabeth S. Jones, by James F. Chamberlain, her attorney in fact; Jane C. Mead, by Geo. V. N. Baldwin, her attorney in fact; Edmund H. Schermerhorn; Caroline W. Astor, wife of William Astor; Abigail S. Whipple, by David Whipple, her attorney in fact; Mary Mason Jones; Alice Iselin, wife of William E. Iselin; Arthur Mason Jones, Mary Mason Jones, second, and William C. Schermerhorn, James F. Chamberlain, and Albon P. Man, executors of the last will and testament of Elizabeth S. Jones, deceased, each for himself or herself, and not for another, parties of the first part, and the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, acting by the Department of Docks of said city, parties of the second part, witnesseth:

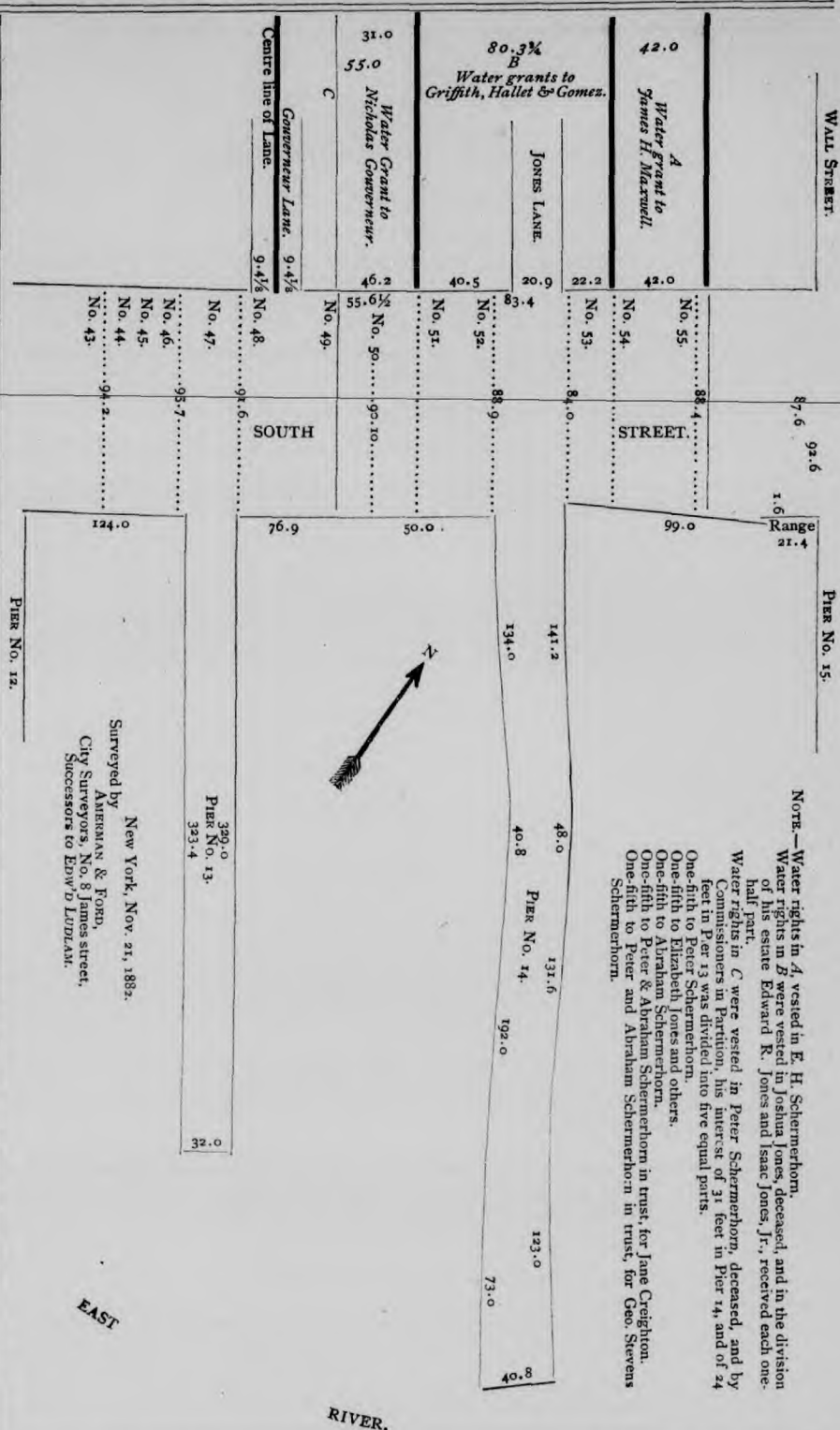
Whereas, The said parties of the first part are the proprietors of the riparian rights, titles, easements, and privileges incident to and in front of and opposite to the respective stores and land on the westerly side of South street, northerly of Gouverneur Lane, known as numbers 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 54, and 55 South street, and nine feet and two inches in front of the northerly part of Gouverneur Lane, and twenty feet and nine inches in front of Jones Lane, and including an interest in Pier 13, and the whole of Pier 14, East river, having a total frontage of wharf or bulkhead line on South street of one hundred and eighty feet six inches (180' 6") ;

And whereas, By subdivision 4 of section 6, chapter 574 of Laws of 1871, the Board of the Department of Docks is authorized to acquire by purchase, in the name of and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, wharf property in said city, and all rights, terms, easements, and privileges pertaining thereto, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and to pay such owners the price agreed upon, and in case of failure to agree upon a price, to initiate legal proceedings to acquire the same for the improvement of the water-front ;

And whereas, The said parties of the second part are desirous of acquiring the bulkhead, wharves, rights, terms, easements, and privileges, and land under water in front of the said stores and in front of the northerly part of Gouverneur Lane, and in front of Jones Lane, hereinbefore described :

Now, therefore, this agreement witnesseth : That the said parties of the first part, each for himself or herself, and not for another, for and in consideration of the sum of one dollar, lawful money of the United States of America, paid to each of the parties of the first part by the parties of the second part, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, hereby severally agree to sell unto the said parties of the second part all the riparian rights, terms, easements, and privileges on the easterly side of South street, commencing at a point on the wharf or bulkhead four and one-half inches northerly of the centre of Gouverneur Lane, and running along said wharf or bulkhead to a point thereon opposite to the northeasterly corner of Lot No. 55 South street, a distance of one hundred and eighty feet six inches (180' 6"), including the bulkhead, docks, wharves, and Piers 13 and 14 in front thereof, and the land under water, and the wharves and other advantages accruing therefrom, or from the water or river opposite the said stores and opposite the northerly part of Gouverneur Lane and in front of Jones Lane, and any and all existing right and rights to any and all future and further water grants in front of said several lots or stores and lanes as hereinafter mentioned for the just and full sum of one hundred and eighty thousand five hundred dollars (\$180,500),

It being stipulated by the parties of the first part, each for himself, and not for another, and of the essence of this agreement, that the said several parties have good title to and full right to convey their several rights, titles, and interests in and to the said one hundred and eighty feet and six inches of wharf or bulkhead and piers as hereinbefore set forth, with the land under water, and riparian and other rights in front thereof and connected therewith.

And said parties hereto of the second part hereby agree to pay to said parties of the first part, on or before the fifteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, said sum of one hundred and eighty thousand five hundred dollars, in the manner aforesaid, and the said deeds shall be delivered and the consideration paid at the office of the Comptroller of the City of New York, on the fifteenth day of March, 1883, at 12 o'clock, noon, and the consideration money may be paid in warrants of the said Comptroller, drawn in favor of the respective persons as aforesaid, for the respective amounts before mentioned; and each of the said parties of the first part, on receiving such payments at the time and in the manner above mentioned, shall, each at their own proper cost and expense, execute, acknowledge, and deliver to the said parties of the second part, a proper deed, the executors to give the usual executor's deed if sufficient for the conveying and assuring to them all and each of their said riparian rights, terms, easements, and privileges, bulkheads, docks, wharves, and piers hereinbefore mentioned, free from all incumbrances, and that the rights and titles therein and thereby conveyed shall be such as shall be approved by the Counsel to the Corporation of the City of New York.

And it is hereby mutually covenanted and agreed by and between the several parties hereto, that this contract is made subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and further that time is of the essence of this contract, which shall be utterly void unless performed by said parties of the second part on or before the fifteenth day of March, 1883, as before mentioned, and further, that the stipulations aforesaid are to apply to and bind the successors, heirs, executors, and administrators of the respective parties.

In witness whereof, the said parties of the first part have hereunto set their respective hands and seals, and the said Department of Docks has caused its seal to be affixed to these presents, and these presents to be signed by its President, Treasurer, and Secretary, for and on behalf of the said parties of the second part, the day and year first above written. And these parties hereto have executed this agreement in four parts, one of which is to remain with the counsel of the parties of the first part, one with the Department of Docks, one with the Counsel to the Corporation, and one with the Comptroller of the City of New York.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending December 30, 1882:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,497, as follows: 791 tenement-houses, 71 private dwellings, 49 other dwellings, 10 manufactories and work shops, 11 stores and warehouses, 37 stables, 55 slaughter-houses, 1 mill, 2 public sewers, 2 lodging-houses, 1 gas main, 1 well-house, 12 sunken and vacant lots, 50 yards, courts, and areas, 46 cellars and basements, 166 waste pipes and drains, 140 privies and water-closets, 19 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 7 dangerous stairways, 9 smoky chimneys, 2 cesspools, and 15 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 386.

During the past week 88 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

48 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

49 permits were issued to the scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 65 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 64 houses, 64 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

3 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 621 births, 56 still-births, 249 marriages and 581 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, December 30, 1882. This shows an increase of 118 births, 2 still-births, and 29 marriages, or a decrease of 36 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was an increase of 77 births, 11 still-births and 60 marriages, and a decrease of 160 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 2; scarlatina 10; diphtheria, 4; infantile, 4; cancer, 8; pneumonia, 9; heart diseases, 6; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 12; convulsions, 4; apoplexy, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 7; gastritis, gastro-enteritis and peritonitis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 5; premature and pre-natal deaths, 3; suicide, 2; while the deaths from croup increased, 2; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro spinal fever, 6; malarial fevers, 2; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 3; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 11; bronchitis, 8; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; surgical operations, 1. The number of deaths from whooping cough and drowning, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 138 were in institutions, 285 in tenement-houses, 150 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 3 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 11 were on the basement floor, 91 on the first, 156 on the second, 109 on the third, 58 on the fourth, 15 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 574 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 7 non-residents; 72 were stated to be single, 141 married, 101 widowed, and the condition of 276 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 581; still-births, 56; bodies in transit, 15; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 65 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 621 births; 249 marriages; 56 still-births; 581 deaths; 15 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 48 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 2 transcripts of the birth record, 10 of marriage, and 29 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending December 30, 1882, was 34.4 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.033, the mean humidity was 68, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,005, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.61 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 554 deaths and still-births, or 86.97 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 20; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 241; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 79; Greenwood (undenominational), 40; Lutheran, (undenominational), 70; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 17; Evergreen (undenominational), 35; Woodlawn (undenominational), 21; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 5; Union (Methodist Protestant), 2; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 9; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 2; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 9; Washington (undenominational), 4.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment.
