

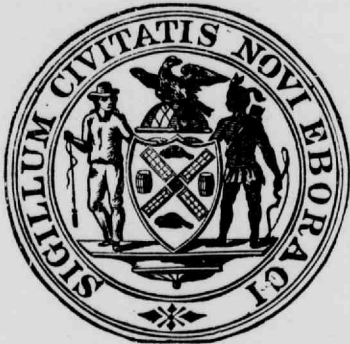

### HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,  
NEW YORK, August 19, 1879.

The Board of Health met this day.

#### Reports Received.

From the Sanitary Superintendent: On the operations of the Sanitary Bureau; on contagious diseases; on slaughter-houses; on application for permits; weekly report from Riverside Hospital; on operations of the Disinfecting Corps; weekly report of Sanitary Company of police; on work performed by Vaccinating Corps; on street pavements.

From the Attorney and Counsel: Weekly report, and opinion in reference to letter of Executive Committee of National Board of Health, suggesting inspection of vessels in port.

From the Register of Records: Weekly mortality statement; weekly letter on mortality; weekly abstract of marriages, births, and still-births; weekly report of deaths from contagious diseases; on attendance of clerks; on violations of Sanitary Code.

#### Hearing.

Mr. Langbein and David Frank, in respect to driving cattle through streets to slaughter-house at the foot of One Hundred and Sixth street, East river, and after a hearing the subject was referred to the President and Chairman of the Sanitary Committee.

#### Reports Referred to other Departments.

To the Department of Public Works: On street pavement in West Ninety-fourth street, corner Ninth avenue; in front of No. 47 Canal street, and on westerly side of West street, between Vesey and Barclay streets; on street crossing at north side of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street and Lexington avenue.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 252), for light and ventilation of the portion of the proposed building, No. 28 Stanton street, intended to be used as a lodging-house, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by F. W. Klempt, provided the windows thereof be not obstructed, be and is hereby approved.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 16, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was as follows: 1 public building, 667 tenement-houses, 149 private dwellings, 70 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 24 stores and warehouses, 42 stables, 16 slaughter-houses, 1 wool pulling establishment, 1 lime kiln, 1 public bridge, 12 sunken and vacant lots, 1 oil refinery, 1 garbage dump, 4 manure dumps, 1 tripe house, 59 yards, courts and areas, 114 cellars and basements, 83 waste-pipes and drains, 304 privies and water-closets, 50 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 1 dyeing establishment, 3 piggeries, 1 dangerous stairway, 7 smoky chimneys, 22 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 817.

During the past week 243 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 104 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

175 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 22 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 22 houses, 22 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 2,665 privy-sinks, 149 yards, 106 cellars, 54 garbage boxes, and 48½ miles of street-gutters.

The Ambulance Corps have removed 4 cases of small-pox to Riverside Hospital, and 1 dead body to the morgue.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 584 births, 41 still-births, 118 marriages, and 503 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, August 16, 1879. This shows an increase of 58 births, 2 still-births, and 11 marriages, and a decrease of 207 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was an increase of 117 births, and a decrease of 66 deaths, the number of still-births and marriages being the same as those reported for the past week. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from croup decreased 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; puerperal diseases 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 103; inanition, 8; alcoholism, 7; rheumatism and gout, 4; cancer, 11; phthisis pulmonalis, 8; bronchitis, 6; pneumonia, 6; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 6; meningitis and encephalitis, 7; convulsions, 5; direct effect of solar heat, 10; apoplexy, 2; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 27; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 8; Bright's disease and nephritis, 6; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; premature and pretermatural births, 15; drowning, 3; while the deaths from small-pox increased 1; measles, 3; scarlatina, 3; whooping-cough, 7; erysipelas, 4; typhoid fever, 7; malarial fevers, 2; heart diseases, 3; aneurism 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2. The deaths from diphtheria and suicide were the same as those reported for the previous week.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 177 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 224 under two years; 265 under five years, and 25 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 135 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 52.68 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 82 were in institutions, 274 in tenement houses, 136 in houses containing 3 families or less, 3 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 112 on the first, 138 on the second, 97 on the third, 42 on the fourth, 16 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth. 503 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 0 non-resident. 43 were stated to be single, 109 married, 44 widowed, and the condition of 307 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows: City deaths, 503; still-births, 41; bodies in transitu, 30. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 45 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 584 births, 118 marriages, 41 still-births, 503 deaths, 30 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 52 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 6 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 32 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 16, 1879, was 70.8 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.887, the mean humidity was 72, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 910, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.79 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 497 deaths and still-births, or 91.36 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 9; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 213; City, (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 67; Greenwood (undenominational), 41; Lutheran, (undenominational), 74; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 12; Evergreen (undenominational), 37; Woodlawn (undenominational), 12; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 9; Union (Methodist Protestant), 2; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 5; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 3; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 1; Washington (undenominational), 12.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending August 9, 1879, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 16; Second, 2; Third, 6; Fourth, 11; Fifth, 12; Sixth, 14; Seventh, 37; Eighth, 19; Ninth, 20; Tenth, 30; Eleventh, 27; Twelfth, 67; Thirteenth, 12; Fourteenth, 6; Fifteenth, 10; Sixteenth, 22; Seventeenth, 48; Eighteenth, 31; Nineteenth, 108; Twentieth, 33; Twenty-first, 44; Twenty-second, 54; Twenty-third, 20; Twenty-fourth, 4.

The actual mortality for the week ending August 9, 1879, was 653; this is 74 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1878, and 2.6 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 30.89 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,099,095.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns, of Philadelphia was 22.79; Brooklyn, 25.99; St. Louis, 14.5; Baltimore, 22.74; Boston, 29.03; Cincinnati, 21.04; New Orleans, 20.80; San Francisco, 10.75; Charleston, 22.81; Dayton, 15.45; Erie, 26; Lowell, 30.31; Worcester, 29.80; Cambridge, 29.20; Fall River, 34.40; Lawrence, 21.84; Lynn, 19.94; Springfield, 29.79. Monthly returns—Milwaukee, 19.01; Providence, 22.10; Paterson, N. J., 38.40; Selma, Ala., 31.11; Toledo, O., 19.20; Nashville, Tenn., 33.67; Keokuk, Iowa, 16.92; Chattanooga, Tenn., 29; Columbia, S. The actual mortality for the week ending August 9, 1879, was 653, which is 2.6 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 30.89 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,099,095.
