Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 3, 1875. The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 2,384, as follows: 3 public buildings, 1,189 tenement houses, 177 private dwellings, 132 other dwellings, 19 manufactories and workshops, 18 stores and ware-houses, 62 stables, 72 slaughter-houses, 12 fat-rendering establishments, 2 gut-cleaning establishments, 15 public sewers and drains, 6 streets and roadways, 9 dumping grounds, 1 dyeing establishment, 76 sunken and vacant lots, 63 yards, courts, and areas, 114 cellars and basements, 50 waste-pipes and drains, 149 privies and water-closets, 84 street gutters and side-walks, 9 dangerous stairways, 2 cisterns and cesspools, 5 dangerous and smokey chimneys, 11 other nuisances, together with 104 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 708.

During the past week 131 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

68 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

259 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 100 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 87 houses, together with clothing, bedding, etc. They have also disinfected 3,237 privies and water-closets, 293 yards, courts, and areas, 209 cellars and basements, and 208½ miles of street gutters.

49 cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital, and 5 dead bodies to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported during the past week: Typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 3; scarlet fever, 43; measles, 34; diphtheria, 85; small-pox, 82, and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 2.

19 tanks and 4,787 cans of night-soil were removed by the night-scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending July 3, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending July 3, 1875: Cattle, 4 carcasses; calves (case), 3 carcasses; lambs, 2 carcasses; beef, 475 pounds; veal, 241 pounds; poultry, 753 pounds; and fish, 10,300 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending July 3, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 617 burial permits for city deaths, 19 for bodies in transit, and 43 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 617 deaths, 157 marriages, 486 births, 43 still-births, 19 applications for transit permits, and 74 returns from Coroners. There were 21 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 3 transcripts of birth-record, 2 of marriage, and 19 of death were issued from this Bureau. 2 cases of death were referred to Coroners.

Parades Allowed.

Howard Mission School, July 2. Pic-nic.

An application of the Holy Innocent's Temperance Society for permission to parade on July 4, was denied, on motion of Commissioner Disbecker.

Resolved, That Patrolman George J. Radford, Special Service Squad, be granted three months' leave of absence, without pay.

The Committee on Rules and Discipline presented the following resolutions, and on their recommendation the same were adopted:

Resolved, That the application of Patrolman William H. Kelly, Seventh Precinct, for thirty days' sick leave of absence, be granted.

Resolved, That Patrolman Emory D. Parker, Eighth Precinct, be transferred to the Mounted Squad.

Resolved, That Patrolman John L. Wiegand be transferred from the Eighth to the Ninth Precinct.

Resolved, That the petition of Mary Miller, widow of the late Patrolman Peter H. Miller, Thirty-first Precinct, for pension, be granted; and that the pension be fixed at the rate of one hundred and fifty (\$150) dollars per annum—all voting aye.

Resolved, That the application of Patrolman Philip Cassidy, Twenty-first Precinct, for detailment, be denied.

COMMITTEE ON RULES AND DISCIPLINE.

June 28, 1875.

Resolved, That the following rules be amended to read as follows:

RULE 6.

The territory of the city of New York shall be divided into four districts, which shall be respectively named the First, Second, Third, and Fourth Districts.

First District to consist of Precincts Nos. 1, 4, 6, 7, 10, 11, 13, 14, 17, 18, 21, 26, and First and Third District Courts' squads.

Second District to consist of Precincts Nos. 5, 8, 9, 15, 16, 20, 25, 27, 29, and Second District Court squad.

Third District to consist of Precincts Nos. 12, 19, 19 Sub., 23, 33, 34, and Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth District Courts' squads.

Fourth District to consist of Precincts Nos. 22, 30, 31, 32, and 35.

An Inspector of Police shall be assigned to each District, who shall have an office within the limits of his District, or at such place as the Board may determine.

RULE 9.

The Police Force is divided into as many companies as there are Precincts, and such other companies and squads as the Board of Police may order.

Superintendent.

RULE 40.

The Superintendent, and each Inspector and Captain of Police within the limits of his District or Precinct, shall possess general police supervision over all licensed or unlicensed pawnbrokers, venders, junk shops, cartmen, hackmen, expressmen, dealers in second-hand articles, intelligence-office keepers, and auctioneers within the city.

RULE 43.

The Superintendent shall receive the reports of Inspectors at such hours daily as he may designate, and shall cause to be made from the District reports a daily consolidated report for the Board of Police. He shall issue to each Inspector such orders and notifications as may be intended for his District, and shall see that such orders and notifications are properly distributed by the Inspector.

RULE 44.

He shall keep at his office books of record, in which shall be entered—

First.—A record of orders issued from his office.

Second.—A record of current and incidental expenses of his own office, as well as those of the offices of District Inspector.

Third.—A record of suspicious persons and places in the City of New York.

Fourth.—A record of all crimes and misdemeanors committed in the City of New York.

Fifth.—A record of houses of prostitution, assignation-houses, gambling-houses, and disorderly or disreputable houses of every kind in the City of New York, with the names of the owners and keepers thereof.

RULE 45.

The Detective Force, Mounted Squad, Sanitary Company, and Harbor Police shall be under the direct orders of the Superintendent.

RULE 46.

The Superintendent shall be authorized to detail such Captains, Sergeants, or Roundsmen of the force as the Board may approve, to aid in office and inspection duties.

Inspectors.

RULE 200.

Each Inspector shall be responsible for the preservation of the peace in his district, and for the discipline of the force under his command. He shall daily inspect or cause to be inspected thoroughly each station-house in his district, and shall make or cause to be made such inspections of the members of the force in his district while on duty, as may be necessary to satisfy himself that the duties are properly performed. He shall receive the reports of the Captains and other officers in command of members of the force in his district at A. M. daily, and carefully examine them, and make such remarks thereon as may be proper, and transmit them in person together with his own report to the Central Office at such hour as the Superintendent may direct, at which time he shall receive such orders as may affect the force within his district, and see that they are promptly and properly distributed within his district.

RULE 201.

Abolished.

RULE 202.

He shall see that within his district the laws of the State and the ordinances of the corporation, of which the Police Department has cognizance, are enforced, and shall cause nuisances to be removed, preserve peace and order at elections, and provide an adequate police force at every fire and at every public assemblage of citizens.

RULE 203.

Abolished.

RULE 204.

He shall transmit to the Superintendent all charges made against members of the force in his district.

RULE 205.

He shall make quarterly reports in writing to the Superintendent on the state of the police force in his district, with such statistics and suggestions as he may deem advisable for the improvement of the police government and discipline.

RULE 206.

He shall keep at his office books of record, in which shall be entered—

1st. A record of orders issued by the Superintendent through him.

2d. A record of current and incidental expenses defrayed by him while discharging his duties as Inspector.

3d. A record of suspicious persons and places in his district.

4th. A record of all crimes and misdemeanors committed in his district.

5th. A record of the houses of prostitution, assignation houses, gambling houses, and disorderly or disreputable houses of every kind in his district, with the names of the owners and keepers thereof.

RULE 210.

It shall be the duty of the Inspectors to see that the station-houses and other police quarters in their districts are clean and in good order; that the men are comfortably provided for, and that the books are kept in conformity to the rules, and that the officers and men are faithful in the discharge of their duty.

RULE 211.

Inspectors shall report in person daily at the office of the Superintendent. They shall, from time to time, submit reports in writing to the Superintendent, setting forth the condition of each station-house, and other police quarters, and the manner in which the books are kept in their respective districts, with such suggestions in regard to them as will conduce to the comfort of the officers and men, and insure a thorough performance of duty.

RULE 212.

Abolished.

RULE 213.

Amended by striking out the word "District" before "Inspectors."

RULE 215.

Abolished.

RULE 216.

Amended by striking out the word "District" before "Inspectors."

RULE 218.

To each Inspector shall be assigned for office and inspection duty such aid from the Force as the Board may approve, two of whom shall always be on duty, and one at least always in the office of the Inspector.

RULE 219.

It is obligatory upon all Inspectors, Captains, Sergeants, and Roundsmen of the Police Force, to report all violations of the Rules and Regulations by the members of the Force under their command, and any failure so to do shall be treated as neglect of duty.

Resolved, That the Superintendent promulgate the above amendments to the Force by General Order.

Resolved, That leaves of absence be granted to members of the Force as follows: Captains, ten days; Sergeants, five days; Patrolmen, three days; and Doormen, three days—under direction of the Superintendent.

On hearing the report of the Finance Committee, it was

Resolved, That the Treasurer be directed to pay over to the Comptroller the sum of one hundred thousand dollars of the unexpended balance of the appropriation for the year 1874, for the purpose of having the same transferred to the general fund of the city, in accordance with resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, passed June 24, 1875—all voting aye.
