OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVE-BOARD MENT.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met at the Mayor's office on Friday, March 10, 1893, at 11.30 o'clock A. M., pursuant to the usual notice. The roll was called, and the following members were present and answered to their names : The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Depart-ment of Public Parks, and the President of the Board of Aldermen-5. Absent-The Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards-1. The minutes of the meeting of February 24, 1893, were read and approved. The Mayor then stated that, owing to the absence of the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, no matters relating to that section of the City

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would be considered at this meeting. He furthermore announced that due public notice would be given of the time and place when a special meeting of the Board would be held, to give a further hearing upon the adoption of certain changes and revision of maps in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, submitted by the Commissioner of Street Improvements of said wards, at a meeting of the Board held on the 24th of February, 1893. Mr. Stephen P. Nash then addressed the Board in support of a memorial or petition, presented at the last meeting of the Board, on behalf of Trinity Church, and relating to the taking of St. John's Cemetery for a public park. Assemblyman W. H. Walker and Judge Lynn, on behalf of residents of the Ninth Ward, spoke in opposition thereto.

in opposition thereto. After a full consideration of the matter, the Board declared the hearing closed. Whereupon the President of the Board of Aldermen offered the following resolution : Resolved, That this Board does not concur in the petition or memorial, submitted on behalf of Trinity Church, and relating to the action of this Board as already taken, in the matter of acquiring St. John's Cemetery for a public park, and hereby declines to reconsider its action as already taken in that matter, and to discontinue the present proceeding. Which was adopted by the following vote : Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, the President of the Board of Aldermen—5. The following report from the Commissioner of Public Works, relating to the laying out of One Hundred and Eighty sixth street, between Amsterdam and Wadsworth avenues, was presented and read :
