COMMISSIONERS OF ACCOUNTS.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1912.

New York, April 1, 1913.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor:

Sir—We beg to present herewith the annual report of the Commissioners of Accounts for the year ended December 31, 1912. Respectfully,

JEREMIAH T. MAHONEY, HARRY M. RICE, Commissioners of Accounts.

A review of the activities of this Commission during the year 1912 again demonstrates its exceptional value to the Mayor in his administrative control of municipal affairs, as embracing both the corrective regulation of departmental accounts and

methods and the elucidation of sundry matters affecting the welfare of the municipality.

New conditions requiring special examination or investigation are constantly arising and are brought to our attention from various sources. Each case is given careful consideration and, if merited, is thoroughly investigated, and a detailed report of our findings and recommendations thereon is submitted to the Mayor, thereby enabling him to intelligently consider his determination on the subject.

In its relations with departmental activities, the labors of this Commission are constantly directed along lines leading to the greatest development of efficiency, its opinion being that it is more essential to prevent errors and defalcations by suggesting and installing proper methods of control, than to detect inaccuracies or losses after they have occurred. In pursuance of this idea, every man in charge of an examination is required to make a thorough study of the organization and accounting methods of a department before going into the details of the work. The idea of sending out squads to search primarily for errors in the accounts, or defalcations by employees has been made a secondary feature except in specific cases. Each squad is now working on constructive lines and in co-operation with the heads of the departments.

The promotion of efficiency in the activities of this Commission has been greatly enhanced by the direction and supervision of the Board of Control which was established by the Commission in 1911. A description of its duties was included in our report of that year.

In former years the division in the field, made up of a number of squads, has performed its duties without any determined control on the part of the executive staff; necessarily the resultant reports to the office have in many cases been of a negligible value, and in no case have they been prepared with any idea of uniformity in presentation either of facts or supporting data. Chief Examiners were provided with little more than the name of the department or bureau they were to examine and allowed to work out their own salvation. It is needless to say the results were unsatisfactory, both to them and the office. This division of the work has naturally been one to which the Board of Control has given a great deal of attention, and systematism of methods has resulted. The Board maintains a continuous supervision of the field work; the working papers are prepared along uniform lines, and at the completion of an examination the finished papers are delivered to the office files in a form adaptable to subsequent reference.

An assistant to the Chief Accountant maintains records showing the exact cost of each and every separate and distinct activity of the office. He also prepares the payroll, supervises the proper filing and care of documents, records, etc., belonging to the office, disburses and accounts for the petty cash funds and keeps a record showing the number of men engaged on each activity, their total hours of work, hours excused, sick, etc. This record is supported by individually signed time sheets from each employee, certified by his superior. A daily record is also kept showing the time of arrival of each employee, either at the office or at his place of assignment; those men who are in the field reporting by telephone through the Chief Examiner or Acting Chief Examiner in charge.

Several attempts have been made to make the audit of the offices of the Comptroller and Chamberlain more effective. The great difficulty has always been an insufficient force to properly cover all the details of an audit. To correct this condition a tabulating machine has been installed and a complete system of cards and codes prepared. Permanent operators were secured in the latter part of the year, and the operation of the machine is being advanced to a stage which will ultimately comprehend the full purposes for which it is intended. It is anticipated that it will prove not only economical, but a most desirable factor of efficiency in the audit work of the office.

Efficiency Staff.

In our report for the year 1911, attention was directed to the creation by this Commission of an efficiency staff, the purpose of which was to make a thorough study of the principles governing successful commercial organizations, and to apply those principles to the conduct of municipal departments.

The work of this staff during the year 1912 has been devoted entirely to conditions in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens. The results of our examinations of the former President's administration indicated conclusively the benefits that would accrue to this Borough through the establishment of efficient methods. Upon the invitation, therefore, of Borough President Connolly efficiency work was undertaken in the latter part of 1911 in order to co-operate with him in the reorganization of his work and forces during the year 1912.

The following outline briefly sets forth the plan of operation which has been pursued:

1. Existing conditions were determined with respect to:
 - (a) Organization and personnel.
 - (b) Functions, forms and procedure.
 - (c) Physical accomplishment.
2. Reorganization studies were made, using the information secured as above, resulting in:
 - (a) Formulation of a tentative plan of functional reorganization.
 - (b) Discussion, criticism and modification of the plan by committees of Borough employees.
 - (c) Adoption of the plan as a model to control the work of reorganization.
3. The plan contemplates a logical grouping of functions and the establishment of definite responsibility and authority under three general heads:
 - (a) Division of General Administration,
 - (b) Division of Engineering,
 - (c) Division of Maintenance.
4. Application of the plan of reorganization to existing force and work was started by selecting the maintenance forces for first attention, since it was impossible, on account of our small staff, to undertake conveniently all features of the general plan. Work on the maintenance force involved:
 - (a) Detailed planning of a comprehensive cost system.
 - (b) Concentration of effort and assumption of authority over forces in the Fourth Ward, to facilitate experimental application of the plan.
 - (c) Preparation of a large amount of statistical data necessary for the exercise of judgment and control of work assignment.
 - (d) Establishment of control over material, supplies and equipment.
5. Extension of plan will be made as rapidly as our force and the circumstances of the work will permit.

The results of the work are encouraging and it is conclusive that eminently satisfactory results will accrue in the coming year.

In addition to our efforts in the Borough of Queens, other efficiency work of a more general nature, involving a careful study of the merits and defects of the present form of segregated budgets and efforts to devise a more satisfactory means of control, has resulted in the acceptance by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of an improved method of budgetary control to be tried experimentally in the Borough of Richmond in 1913, in connection with the cost data budget submitted by the President of that borough.

Standard Testing Laboratory.

In the year 1911, by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, there was established in the office of this commission a standard testing laboratory for the purpose of testing supplies furnished to the different departments of the city government.

At January 1, 1912, there were 44 samples on hand awaiting analysis, and during the year 1912 there were submitted to the laboratory for the purpose of analysis and report 3,083 samples from the different departments or bureaus of the city government. It was found that 1,287 of these complied with the standardized specifications and 1,458 did not comply. In 307 cases analyses were made for purposes of research only. Seventy-five samples still remained awaiting research and analysis at the close of the year. Fifty-three per cent of the samples analyzed did not comply with the specifications and were rejected, or adequate deductions made on account of their deficiency. The total amount of penalties imposed upon contractors for inferior coal from January 1 to November 30, 1912, was \$33,539.63. The City would have had to

pay \$6,644 for these analyses if the work had been done by an outside laboratory. This makes a total saving to the City on the item of coal alone, through the operation of the Standard Testing Laboratory, of \$40,183.63. The entire expenses of the Laboratory for the year amounted to \$40,471.83.

It is therefore evident that this institution is self-supporting, from the saving accruing to the City through the analysis of the single item of coal without taking into consideration the value of the other analyses made, the preparation of adequate specifications and technical and expert advice of every description. The Laboratory has also given valuable assistance to the Police Department and District Attorney in the prosecution of criminals, by chemical analysis of materials found on the persons of offenders.

Duties.

The duties of the Commissioners of Accounts, as defined in sections 119 and 195 of the Charter, are two-fold:

First.—Specific duties—the examination of the receipts and disbursements in the offices of the Comptroller and Chamberlain; and

Second.—General duties—special examinations conducted at the direction of the Mayor or on the initiative of the Commission.

A review of the work accomplished under these two divisions during the year 1912 is briefly as follows:

Specific Duties Performed.

As stipulated in section 119 of the Charter, the quarterly examination of the receipts and disbursements in the offices of the Comptroller and Chamberlain were made and detailed reports thereon presented to the Mayor under the dates of January 24, 1912, May 8, 1912, July 30, 1912 and November 12, 1912.

The annual report required under section 195 of the Charter was presented to the Mayor and to the Board of Aldermen under date of February 28, 1912.

While the Charter provides that the examination of the Chamberlain's accounts shall be made in the month of January, it has been found necessary, as formerly reported, to assign a portion of the staff to this work throughout the entire year, in order to have the annual report ready in February, as specified.

The more important features of the annual report are given below:

The annual examination provided by law to be made by the Commissioners of Accounts, under section 195 of the Charter, is, in its results, merely an audit of the Chamberlain's receipts and disbursements, verifying the cash balances in the books at the beginning and close of the calendar year, and certifying to the amount of corporate stock and bonds issued. The Charter makes no provision for an examination, either by the Commissioners of Accounts or by any other agency, which would comprehend the City's income and expense account. This subject has been discussed in our previous reports.

General Duties Performed.

Examinations made at the direction of the Mayor or on the initiative of this Commission would be classed under this head. Section 119 of the Charter authorizes the Commissioners of Accounts to examine every phase of activity in the City and County Government. To facilitate these examinations they are also empowered to subpoena and examine witnesses under oath, and are given access to any record relating to the City Government. There were one hundred and seventy-one examinations and investigations under way during the year 1912. Seven hundred and twenty-five witnesses were examined, and the testimony transcribed covered six thousand and fourteen type-written pages. The total amount expended for the year was \$203,311.19. To accomplish these results, the members of the staff worked 10,506 hours overtime, for which they received no pay.

The inquiries led practically into all of the various bureaus and departments of the City Government on matters pertaining to their administration. In a number of these thorough constructive studies were made, resulting in recommendations for new and improved methods and the preparation of appropriate forms and books therefor. In several departments the work of installation was supervised by us. The work of this Commission during the year shows a marked advance in such constructive development.

It has been the aim of the Commission to further establish a plan of systematic, periodic examinations of the various subdivisions of the municipal government which would comprehend a thorough audit and review of accounts and methods, but, with the limited force at hand for the work it has not been possible. The investigation of special phases of departmental activity and other matters demanding immediate attention has kept our available forces fully occupied.

The following paragraphs constitute a brief summary of some of the examinations undertaken during the year which developed noteworthy conditions:

Courts.

The examination of the accounts of the several courts of inferior jurisdiction is a continuous feature of the work of this Commission. Thirty-six separate reports thereon were presented during 1912. A marked improvement over the accounting of previous years was noticed, and may be ascribed to the regular attention given to these features by our Examiners. But few minor differences were found where formerly large aggregations of differences existed, and adjustments were readily made. In one instance, however, the accounts of the Clerk were found to be badly involved by mixing his personal funds with the bank account containing the court funds, and a shortage of \$4,134.27 was disclosed, which was subsequently made good. In another court it was found that commissions had been allowed to the court by the telephone company for the maintenance of slot machines on the premises, and that the commissions had not been treated as a revenue of the court in the remittance of the Clerk to the City Chamberlain.

Fraudulent Auction Sales.

Following a complaint which alleged the conducting of fraudulent auction sales in prominent sections of the City, a series of inspections was made to determine the facts. Section 943 of the Penal Code makes it a misdemeanor for any person to engage

in a mock auction, i. e., to make a pretense of buying or selling at public auction without an actual exchange of ownership.

As a result of the espionage of our Inspectors, legal evidence was obtained against three places, two of which were in a conspicuous section of Broadway, and three proprietors, or financial backers, were arraigned for trial, convicted and sentenced on the evidence produced by us, and another case is now under prosecution. Evidence was secured against other fraudulent auction places, which, while not sufficient to secure a conviction, will serve to guide the City Clerk in the issuance of licenses for the ensuing year. The entire fraudulent system was exposed to the public and resulted in the permanent closing of many of the places before evidence could be secured against them.

A general report was prepared, embodying constructive changes in the present laws regulating the conduct of public auctions, and appropriate legislation is anticipated at an early date.

Billboard Advertising.

Numerous complaints from time to time were received by this Commission from residents of the City in relation to nuisances created by billboards and signs used for advertising purposes. In consequence thereof, a comprehensive study of existing conditions was made and an exhaustive report of our findings was submitted.

The legal control of the erection of billboards in The City of New York is provided by section 144 of the Building Code, which defines the permissible activities related to the subject.

Five hundred billboards in different locations throughout the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx were inspected. In 412 of these locations the code regulation as to height of wood structures was found to be violated. The requirement limiting the height of metal billboards was found to be almost entirely ignored. In 188 locations violations of this nature were found, these instances being practically all of the inspections of signs which were constructed of metal, or of wood covered with metal. In some cases signs were doubled and trebled one above another to a height of forty feet. One hundred and sixty-five signs were found extending beyond the building line. In ten cases signs were found to be in a dangerous condition because of faulty construction or lack of repair. In addition to these violations, other unpleasant, unsanitary and undesirable conditions were found, including quantities of rubbish and inflammable materials at base of signs, a dead dog and numerous evidences of public use creating nauseating odors. Some of these were in the most prominent locations of the City. The picturesque features of Riverside drive and the surroundings of Central Park were offensively marred in fifty-four locations, all but eight of which constituted violations of the Building Code. For example, on a block on Riverside drive a large billboard erected in violation of law shut out from the lower floors of the residences on the two adjoining streets the entire view of the drive, leaving an ugly exterior back of the sign facing the houses. At the base of the sign rubbish and litter in an unsanitary state had accumulated. In another instance a large sign with a metal front and metallic skeleton frame was found on the top of a building so placed as to prevent escape in case of fire by the ladder leading from the fire escape.

For the purpose of intelligent consideration of the subject, there were incorporated in our report numerous citations of legal opinions and brief abstracts of the regulations in force in various cities of this and other countries.

Tentative suggestions for remedial ordinances for The City of New York were also submitted. The Mayor subsequently appointed a Billboard Commission, which is conducting hearings preliminary to remedial recommendations.

Our report was printed in pamphlet form, with illustrations, and the public interest in the subject has been shown by requests for copies from cities throughout the United States.

Department of Public Charities—Division of Relief to Grand Army of the Republic and Spanish War Veterans.

Under the Laws of 1910 provision is made for the relief of poor or indigent war veterans. Funds for such relief are initially disbursed by the post or camp that is interested in the beneficiary, and reimbursement is obtained from the Comptroller through the Bureau of Dependent Adults of the Department of Public Charities.

An analysis of the records of the Bureau for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx disclosed a remarkable difference in the amounts paid to individuals in the different posts or camps, due to the fact that the more prosperous posts, with funds in their treasuries, are in a position to advance, pending reimbursement by the City, substantial sums for the relief of their beneficiaries. On the other hand, the posts with little or no funds are restricted in the amount of their advances to the small sums their financial conditions permit, and, in many cases, are unable to advance an amount necessary to avoid destitution. Recommendations were made for the adoption of a plan to adjust the unequal distribution of relief funds, and remedial measures are now under way.

An examination of the accounting methods of the Bureau disclosed a lack of cohesion, duplication of work, etc., and a new method of accounting to control the activities of the Bureau was devised and installed throughout all of the boroughs.

Investigation was made of the transactions of ten posts located in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens. Forty-one witnesses were examined, and it was developed that in six of these posts the law was constantly violated, and that evidence existed of fraud and misuse of funds in connection with the handling of the moneys by those in charge. The irregularities embraced the unlawful distribution of funds to officers and members of relief committees, and relief to members of the posts, on certificates signed by persons other than those receiving relief; the voucher representation to beneficiaries of sums greater than they had actually received; the procuring of blank receipts for the avowed purpose of dispensing relief to members or officers of the post, although prohibited by the provisions of law; the non-receipt of money set forth on vouchers bearing beneficiaries' signatures; the decease of a beneficiary prior to the use of a signature purporting to be his; the denial of beneficiaries that signatures were written by them; the distribution of relief to individuals who were not in a destitute condition or in circumstances warranting the disbursement; numerous relief certificates signed by a widow of a former commander with the intention of applying funds so obtained to the use of the officers and committee members of the post; and the custom of substituting for cash disbursements orders for coal and groceries, drawn on dealers selected by the committee or officers, at prices usually higher than obtainable by the beneficiaries.

The necessity for rigid inspection of the circumstances connected with each applicant being apparent, a form for the control of such inspection was devised and submitted.

Relief to Spanish War Veterans.

The camps in Manhattan, presumably for purposes of control, instituted a central body, composed of delegates elected from each council. It is designated the Manhattan Borough Council Memorial and Executive Committee, United Spanish War Veterans. Warrants of the Chamberlain, for reimbursement of relief dispensed, are drawn to the order of the commander of the central body and by him transmitted to the quartermaster treasurer, who reimburses the camps entitled thereto.

Our examination disclosed certain warrants drawn by the Chamberlain to Walter V. McCoy, commander of the central body, which had not been properly transmitted to the treasurer for distribution. Officers of the camps to whom the relief was due were notified by this Commission, with the result that legal action to recover was instituted. A new commander was elected and Mr. McCoy was relieved from further connection with the financial transactions of the committee.

Department of Public Charities—Emergency and Accepted Cases in Hospitals.

An examination was made by the Bureau of Dependent Adults, dealing with its methods of inspection and accounting in connection with the maintenance at the expense of the City, of patients who are unable to pay for their treatment in private or county hospitals. It was found that during the year 1911 there were 79,748 patients so treated at an approximate cost to the City of \$1,000,000. Of this amount, the City was reimbursed by patients in the amount of \$5,840.75 only.

With the purpose of securing reimbursements to the City from patients or their relatives when financial conditions will permit, forms were devised for a system to control the inspection and accounting work of this feature of the Department's responsibilities.

Treatment of City Patients in Private Institutions.

At certain dates in previous years deeds of conveyances of land were made by The City of New York to certain religious and charitable institutions, and were practically a gift to the institutions. In three instances, however, the conveyances contained covenants by which the institutions receiving the property agreed in return therefor to furnish The City of New York, without charge, treatment and care to the indigent sick and infirm poor for varying amounts in each year.

An investigation was made to determine to what extent the City has availed itself of these agreements. It was found that the financial amount of the benefit accrued to the City under these agreements amounted at December 31, 1911, to \$214,

753.35. The annual value to the City under the three agreements amount to \$21,000. Inquiry at the Department of Public Charities disclosed the fact that the Commissioner has received no official notification of these agreements, and consequently had not, on behalf of the City, taken advantage of them.

The City pays yearly large sums to the different hospitals in the City for the care and treatment of patients who have no resources. In order that advantage may be taken of the covenants mentioned and a substantial saving secured to the City in the amount annually paid for the care of the indigent sick in the hospitals, we recommend that measures be taken by the Commissioner of Public Charities to enforce the terms contained in the conveyances by the City to these institutions. We are informed by the Commissioner that the matter is receiving his attention.

Office of County Clerk, Kings County.

An examination of the accounts and methods of this office was instituted, but, after a study of the methods prevailing in the conduct of its business, it became evident that a complete and satisfactory audit of the accounts could not be made. Our efforts were therefore directed to the accounting needs of the office for the purpose of preparing a system that would be susceptible to audit, and which would establish control over the revenues. Forms of new records were accordingly submitted by us and installed by the County Clerk.

Office of County Clerk, New York County.

An examination of the accounts and methods of this office disclosed conditions showing no proper control by the County Clerk of the accountability for the moneys passing through the several divisions of the office. The records of the Naturalization Bureau were remarkably imperfect and incomplete, and applications prior to 1911 could not be found and were reported to have been lost.

Suitable forms were accordingly prepared for the establishment of a proper method of recording and accounting for all fees received in the office, and submitted to the County Clerk for installation.

Board of Elections.

By reason of the failure of the Board of Elections and the City printer to deliver ballots, tally sheets and statements for use at the primaries in many of the election districts on March 26, 1912, thousands of voters were effectually disfranchised. Moreover, the form of the ballots in many of the election districts were such as greatly to embarrass the citizen desiring to cast an intelligent vote.

With the idea of preventing a recurrence of such conditions this Commission made a careful study of the circumstances surrounding the March primary.

It was found that in many election districts ballots were either not received at all or were received too late to be of service. In several assembly districts incomplete sets of ballots were delivered. In other locations some of the ballots went entirely astray, and some were delivered at the wrong districts. Another complication was added by the varying sizes of the ballots, the largest being fourteen feet long, and the average length in all election districts being nine feet. Other contributory causes to the general fiasco included unnecessary delay by the Board of Elections in awarding the printing contract, and in the supply of copy to the printers when awarded.

Recommendations were accordingly made for remedial legislation and for the guidance of the Board of Elections in facilitating its future activities.

Interest of City Official in Municipal Contracts.

A number of witnesses were examined concerning the acceptance by Henry A. La Chicotte, Deputy Chief Engineer of the Department of Bridges, of the sum of \$40,000, for professional services rendered to the Ryan-Parker Construction Co. during the progress of their contract for the erection of the Manhattan Bridge.

Section 1533 of the Charter prohibits City officials from becoming directly or indirectly interested in municipal contracts. The construction company was working under the direction of the Department of Bridges, and Mr. La Chicotte's name appears on the final payment voucher, which settled the account of the City with the contractor. In a portion of the work on the Manhattan Bridge, Mr. La Chicotte had supervisory charge in his official capacity.

The attitude of Mr. La Chicotte was clearly illustrated in his testimony, and following the recommendation of this commission, he was immediately dismissed from the Department of Bridges.

Municipal Ferries.

For the purpose of determining the result of the first comprehensive experiment in municipal ownership by the City, an investigation was made of the accounts of the ferries owned and operated by the municipality. An analysis of the receipts and expenditures produced the following statistics:

Municipal operation of the Staten Island ferry was begun on October 25, 1905, and of the ferry to 39th street, Brooklyn, on November 1, 1906.

During the period from October 25, 1905, to December 31, 1911, the net loss from the operation of both ferries was \$6,625,606.86, or an average of \$2,934.28 per day. Considered by divisions, the net daily loss in operations was \$1,977.89 for the Staten Island ferry, and \$1,152.57 for the 39th street ferry. These calculations include the item of interest on the capital invested, which, at December 31, 1911, amounted to \$10,739,267.87. Other interesting statistics were set forth in our report, particular comment being made on those pertaining to the Staten Island ferry, which is maintained primarily for the benefit of the Borough of Richmond, in providing its residents with a ferry service to Manhattan. The amount of tax levied on real and personal property in the Borough of Richmond for the seven years ended December 31, 1911, was \$7,680,578. The net loss from operating the Staten Island ferry for the same period was \$4,450,699.25, or nearly 58 per cent. of the entire tax levy.

Roosevelt Street Ferry.

This ferry is operated by the Brooklyn and Manhattan Ferry Company, under a partnership agreement with the City, by which the City participates in the net earnings, if any, and contributes \$11,000 per month to provide against a deficit from operation. Under the agreement, the ferry company also operates a ferry from 23d street, Manhattan, to Broadway, Brooklyn (which is likewise the terminal of the Roosevelt street ferry); but its operation is not included in the partnership agreement with the City. In March, 1912, the ferry company presented a statement to the City, showing the City's share of the net profits for the period from March 16, 1911, to December 31, 1911, to be \$32,250.07. From this amount certain deductions were made, amounting to \$13,074.65, and the balance of \$19,175.42 was paid to the Department of Docks and Ferries. An examination of the company's books would indicate that the City was entitled to \$35,510.20, or \$16,334.78 more than the amount paid by the ferry company, the difference being caused by improper adjustment of the operations of the two ferries, and certain charges to the City, which it would appear should not be allowed. A detailed report of our findings was rendered in June, 1912.

From that time to the present, constant efforts have been made by the City for the collection or adjustment of the disputed items. As the ferry company has been equally constant in its opposition to the items of greatest magnitude, although conceding most of the smaller ones, a full adjustment has not yet been consummated.

Examining Board of Plumbers.

An investigation was undertaken of the methods employed by this body in the examination of applicants, and the certification of the qualifications of such applicants as master plumbers. It was found that the methods of examination were distinctly lax and incompetent. Applicants who had passed the examination satisfactorily to the board were examined by us, and found to be unable to answer the questions propounded at their examination before the board. Conclusive evidence was obtained tending to show the use of previously prepared sets of answers, and the existence of many irregularities. As a result of our investigation, the members of the board were removed from office, and a special Corporation Counsel was appointed to assist in the organization of a new board.

Our investigation is being continued in anticipation that evidence of a criminal nature will be obtained for use in the prosecution of culpable officials.

Unlawful Use of Master Plumbers' Certificates.

Under the law, certain alterations or installations of plumbing work are permitted to be done only by regularly licensed plumbers holding certificates of competency issued to them by the Examining Board of Plumbers after due examination into their qualifications. All such work must be approved by the Bureau of Buildings.

Numerous instances were found in the business transactions of the bureau, indicating that certain licensed plumbers permit the use of their names and certificates to secure the desired official approval of work of unlicensed plumbers, which is prohibited by law. This practice, which is commonly known throughout the plumbing trade as "protection," has been a constant source of annoyance to the administration of the Bureau of Buildings, and is obviously productive of improper conditions in the installation of plumbing work throughout the city.

Several flagrant cases which pointed to a licensed plumber named Otto Goodman as one of the principal offenders, were selected for investigation, and fourteen witnesses, including Goodman, were examined under oath. The unlawful conditions indicated were clearly demonstrated in the testimony, and an examination of Goodman on sundry ordinary subjects which should be well within the knowledge of any master plumber, disclosed an astonishing ignorance and incompetency.

Recommendation was therefore made that immediate action be taken to cancel the certificate of registration issued to Goodman by the Bureau of Buildings, and the matter is now pending in the hands of the Superintendent of Buildings.

Probation Officers.

An examination was made of the various City Magistrates' Courts to determine the methods employed by probation officers attached thereto in the discharge of their duties, which are by law placed under the direction and control of the Magistrates. It was found that no rules or regulations had been formulated for their guidance by the Magistrates, consequently the judgment of the probation officer has dictated his method of dealing with each probationary offender assigned to his supervision. A certain laxity in the investigation of cases submitted to them has ensued, as disclosed in numerous cases selected at random for our examination. An inspection of the records of assignments disclosed a very unequal apportionment to the different officers, some having an excessive number of cases, making proper attention to all of them difficult and perhaps impossible, while others have a ridiculously small number of assignments.

As a result of our findings, recommendations were submitted leading to the establishment of a central probation bureau, under the direct supervision of a chief Probation Officer and a thorough reorganization of the methods of control of probationary cases.

Sheriff's Office, New York County.

In the course of an examination of the accounts and methods of the Sheriff's Office, certain tests of the records of cash receipts disclosed greater amounts of fees collected than were accounted for in the Cashier's records. An analysis was made of 237 working days to determine the extent of the shortages, and 160 days were found which contained varying amounts short, ranging from 20 cents to \$16.60 per day, and aggregating \$440. It was found that erroneous entries concealing the shortages had been made in each instance by a certain Clerk having access to the fee receipts. While the peculations may have existed for a considerable period, we did not attempt to establish them, in view of the labor and time which would be required therefor.

The report of our findings resulted in the immediate discharge of the Clerk and the recovery of the money from his bondsman. The case was submitted to the grand jury on November 11, 1912, for its consideration.

Standards of Measures in the Retail Milk Business.

As the results of a number of complaints, an examination was undertaken of the prevailing standards of measures in the retail milk business throughout the City. Our inspection of 2,597 bottles disclosed varying percentages of short capacity of bottles used by the various milk dealers. A further inspection of 1,019 bottles as to the measure of actual contents disclosed varying percentages of short filling. The milk dealers contended that the responsibility for the conditions which we discovered rested wholly with the bottle manufacturers.

Following our investigation conferences were held between the milk dealers, the bottle manufacturers and the Commissioner of Weights and Measures, and an agreement was drafted to govern all future transactions, by which the bottle manufacturer guarantees all bottles to be within the requirements of law, and assumes responsibility for all penalties or fines imposed upon the dealer for defective bottles, etc.

This agreement, under the close supervision of the Commissioner of Weights and Measures, should be effective in correcting the conditions which were discovered.

In connection with this examination, forms were prepared and submitted for an improved system of statistical work as applied to the inspections of the Bureau of Weights and Measures.

Department of Street Cleaning—Use of Municipal Scows.

Prior to April, 1909, the final disposition of ashes and rubbish in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx was performed by the City, and numerous flat scows were acquired and employed in the work. The City has retained ownership of these scows, and in August, 1912, there were 58 scows so owned, representing an original investment of \$271,670. Of this number, 22 scows were built in the year 1880.

Since April 1, 1909, the work has been entirely performed by private parties under contracts, thereby materially reducing the cost of final disposition. The terms of the contracts have included the use of the City scows by the contractors at a rental rate of \$6 per day per scow, with the understanding that each contractor should employ at least 18 scows continuously each month.

Our examination disclosed an expenditure by the City of \$251,379.55 for operation and maintenance of these scows during the period from April 1, 1909, to December 31, 1911, exclusive of the unrecorded expense of legal actions resulting from carelessness or accident coincident with their operation. Of this amount \$133,587.50 was expended for wages of scow Captains. It was found that about 25 per cent. of the scows assigned to the contractors were continuously idle, with a resulting cost of idle time in wages of \$28,557.50 during the period stated, or 21.37 per cent. of the total expenditure for wages. Final analysis showed that, exclusive of unrecorded legal costs, the maintenance of scows had involved a loss of \$5,645.55 for the period under review.

In consideration of these facts, we recommended that measures be taken to dispose of such scows as are not absolutely essential to the work of the Department for stake boats, etc., no detrimental effect being obtained thereby in the execution of further contracts, as the open market rental rate of scows is \$5 per day. No disposal of the scows has as yet been effected.

Theft of Supplies.

Information was received of the misappropriation of supplies belonging to Public School 49. The premises were placed under observation and a Porter was detected in the act of carrying bags of coal to his home and to that of the School Janitor. Full confession was obtained from the Porter, and sundry other supplies were found in his house, which were identified as the property of the Board of Education. Both men were prosecuted and committed to the City Prison.

Taxicabs and Vehicles for Hire.

A systematic study was made of the regulation of passenger carrying vehicles kept for hire, with particular reference to taxicabs. It was found that the existing ordinances of the Board of Aldermen, which were intended to regulate and control this business, were utterly inadequate, most of them being indefinite and some of them conflicting. The need of new ordinances to cause more effective regulation being apparent, a report was rendered for the purpose of suggesting numerous necessary regulatory measures for the consideration of the Board of Aldermen.

In relation to special cabs, the ordinances prescribe a fixed license fee, with an additional fee of \$25 for each vehicle using a special cab stand. In effect, however, licensees have permitted any cab controlled by them, other than public hacks, to go upon these cab stands. Investigation developed the fact that of 1,320 specially licensed vehicles over 800 have thus evaded the \$25 fee. The revenue lost to the City from this source would appear to approximate \$20,000 per annum.

The following subjects were thoroughly investigated and existing abuses and irregularities therein fully discussed in our report, and many suggestions and recommendations pertinent thereto were submitted:

1. The control of special and public cab and hack stands.
2. The adjustment of license fees for all passenger carrying vehicles and methods of issuance of licenses.
3. The adjustment of license fees for drivers of vehicles kept for hire, and the control of such licenses.
4. The regulation and control of taximeters.
5. The adjustment and control of rates and fares.
6. The regulation and control of conditions pertaining to sightseeing cars.

A committee was appointed by the Board of Aldermen to examine into and report on existing conditions, and numerous public hearings were held by it. The hearings are now closed, and it is understood that the committee report is being prepared.

Miscellaneous.

In addition to the foregoing summarized examinations many other investigations and examinations have been made and reported upon during the year, and a perusal of Appendix I, attached to this report, will demonstrate the diversity of the activities of this Commission and the unlimited range of conditions continuously confronting its labors. Examinations of various departmental activities are constantly in progress, and the increasing harmony between departmental officials and this Commission in the conduct of such examinations is a source of gratification. Special investigations

of various subjects at the request of the Mayor, on the complaint of citizens, or on information otherwise acquired, are, to a considerable extent, also under way at all times.

The corrective possibilities of the resources and powers embraced in this Commission are undoubtedly given greater recognition by the public in each succeeding year, and it is the desire of the present Commission to employ their powers at all times in procuring beneficial results to The City of New York and its citizens. 

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the contract, and the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
