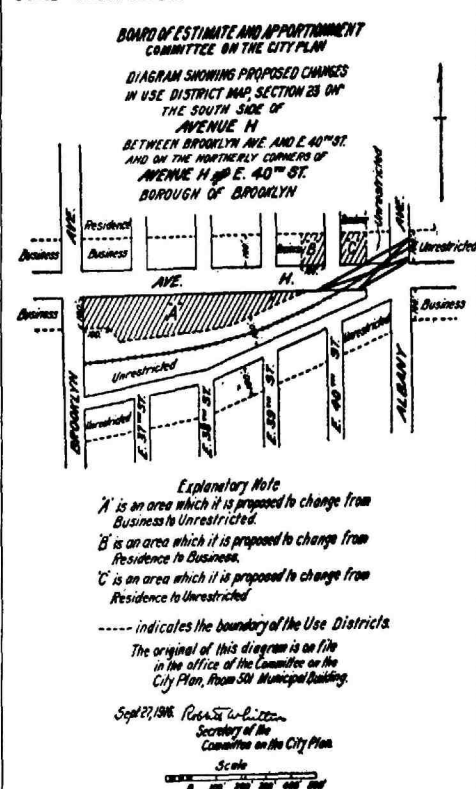

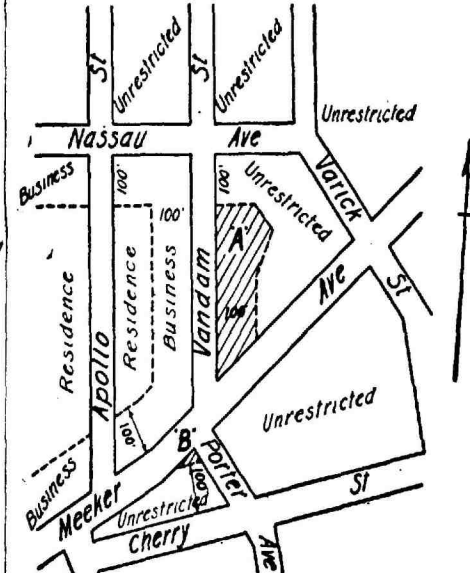

The President pro tem. laid before the Board the following communication from the Board of Ambulance Service:

Board of Ambulance Service—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$4,620, to Replenish the Account for Ambulance Service.

The City of New York, Board of Ambulance Service, Municipal Building, Tenth Floor, October 5, 1916.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Gentlemen—I hereby respectfully request your Honorable Board to authorize an issue of revenue bonds amounting to \$4,620, the proceeds to be used to replenish account "Ambulance Service," Code No. 2114.

This request is made necessary by the fact that several hospitals, which had already added new ambulances or changed from horse-drawn to motor when the 1916 budget was made up, were not provided for therein, and before the end of the year 1915 it was found that these ambulances would be absolutely necessary to the service. We therefore arranged our 1916 schedule accordingly.

President, Borough of Manhattan—Request for Authority to Purchase Asphalt, Binder Stone, Etc., Without Public Letting.

City of New York, President of the Borough of Manhattan, Municipal Building, October 3rd, 1916.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Dear Sir—Request is hereby made for permission to purchase in the open market, without public letting, such quantities as may be needed of refined asphalt, binder stone, sand and sandstone dust at an estimated cost not to exceed \$30,000.

The materials are required for immediate use in the manufacture of asphalt for repairs to street pavements, and owing to the unsettled condition of the market and the very high prices quoted for future deliveries the department finds that much better prices are obtainable at the present time in the open market than by contract.

Commissioner of Parks, The Bronx—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$22,205, to Provide Means for the Employment of Laborers, Teams and Automobile Trucks.

The City of New York, Department of Parks, Office of Commissioner for the Borough of The Bronx, Zhrowski Mansion, Claremont Park, October 6, 1916.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Sir—I have the honor to respectfully request that your Honorable Board adopt a resolution recommending that the Board of Estimate authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds in the sum of twenty-two thousand two hundred and five dollars (\$22,205), for the purpose of providing funds for the employment of Laborers, Teams and Automobile Trucks for the balance of the year.

The increase was due to the fact that there was considerable more snow to be removed during the early part of 1916 and a considerably larger number of skating days during the early part of 1916 than during the entire year 1915.

I may say that the Superintendent of this Department, some time ago, together with Examiners in the employ of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, made a thorough and scientific study of the matter of the distribution of park laborers and the amount of work which should ordinarily be performed by an average laborer in this Department during one working day.

I submit the following statement as a result of that study:

1 man to each 2 miles of road, 30 feet wide, to clean, pick paper, edge the sides, empty the manholes and open the gutters in snow weather.

1 man to each 2 miles of improved cement walks; same work as above.

1 man to each 3 miles of walks covered with screenings.

1 man to each 15 acres of lawn, pick papers, rake leaves, etc.

1 man to each 1 acre of lawn cut by hand machines on level.

1 man to each ½ acre of lawn cut by hand on hills and slopes.

Using the above as a standard, it was found that it would take the following men in the parks named:

Out of this there will have to be about 2,750 days allowed for vacations to the men.

The recreational features are also greatly increasing, which necessitates bringing out a great many men on Sundays for the purpose of directing and assisting people in locating their proper places of recreation.

Total number of men on the payroll..... 275

Total days each man can make..... 243

The services of the laborers for the days requested are necessary in order to maintain the park system in The Bronx in a creditable and proper condition, viz.:

Repairing of roads, including patching and tarring, erection of pipe fences, assisting the carpenters and other mechanics, the care of lawns, such as cutting grass, removal of paper and other refuse, and for the completion of roadways and paths which have been commenced, but up to the present time uncompleted, because of the fact that our entire laboring force has been very busy with the usual summer work.

If the request is granted, our laborers during the year 1916 will receive on an average 243 days each, at \$2.50 per day, or the sum of \$607.50.

The Examiners of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with the Superintendent of this Department, determined that the team allowance for the year of 1916 should be 4,704 days. The allowance in the budget, however, was 4,172 days, or 532 days less than asked for.

As hereinbefore mentioned, during the early part of the year 1916, the amount of 202½ days or \$1,212.50 was used in excess of the amount for the entire year 1915, for the purpose of cleaning the lakes and snow removal, due to the fact that there was considerably more snow and also considerably more skating days in the early part of the year 1916.

The 532 days mentioned above, added to 202½ days, which was the excess number of days required for snow removal, and skating on lakes, makes a total of 735 days.

To this number of days must be added 27 days in order to provide 762 days, which are the days required for the purposes mentioned in the paragraph following:

The cutting of the grass during the year 1916 has been nearly double the cutting of any year for the past fifteen years. This excessive cutting has prevented the use of the teams in the cleaning and repairing of the roads, and the completion of the driveways and paths which have been started.

During the past winter, which was a very severe winter on roads, the traffic road in the Botanical Garden became in a dangerous condition and now shows many ruts; this road requires to be resurfaced; it has a Peekskill gravel surface; temporary repairs would cost more than to entirely resurface the same. There was no intention of resurfacing this road during 1916, and no allowance was requested in the budget, but the condition is such that it should be resurfaced as soon as possible, so as to avoid suits for damages.

Dear Sir—Application is hereby made to your honorable body for an issue of Revenue Bonds in the amount of \$1,970 for use of the Department of Parks, Borough of Queens, \$1,250 of which is to be used in the hire of teams for 250 days at \$5 a team, and \$720 for the hire of one horse and cart with driver for 240 days at \$3 a day.

Owing to circumstances entirely beyond my control Code No. 1400 for the hire of Horses and Vehicles is entirely exhausted. I have under my jurisdiction and am responsible for 1,186 acres of park land in the Borough of Queens and have today not a team nor a horse at work.

This money is absolutely necessary to enable me to handle the work of the Department, the teams being required for bringing in benches, hauling coal, delivery of supplies and other general work of the Department. The carts are required in outlying parks for the removal of rubbish and leaves, and work incidental to the proper maintenance of each park.

The money was exhausted because of emergencies which could not have been foreseen when the budget for this year was prepared. The heavy snow storms last spring used up 110 days of team hire that I had expected to be able to use during the season. The continued dry spell this summer and the prevalence of the infantile paralysis epidemic made it necessary to pump out, scrape and clean a number of pools and lakes in the park system which it has not been necessary, heretofore, to treat in so thorough a manner. The drainage pool in Highland Park had to be cleaned out as did the Lake in Linden Park, Corona. The ponds in Upland and Forest Parks and the Lake in Kissena Park also required additional attention. Not only were team days used, but cart days, also, were used in this emergency work.

The number of dead and dangerous trees along the streets in the Borough of Queens which it was necessary to remove in order to protect the public, also greatly exceeded my estimate. 90 days have already been used for this work and there remain other trees to be taken down without delay.

I am submitting herewith a schedule showing how the days were used, and I earnestly request your Honorable Board to take prompt action on this request since we are very badly handicapped by our present situation.

No. 902.

President, Borough of Queens—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$32,600, to Meet Deficiency in Appropriation for Vehicular Transportation in Appropriation for Bureau of Street Cleaning.

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Queens, Long Island City, October 4, 1916.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Gentlemen—I hereby request your approval, as provided by Subdivision 8 of Section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, of an issue of Special Revenue Bonds amounting to \$32,600, to provide funds with which to meet the estimated deficiency in the appropriation for 1916 for vehicular transportation in the Bureau of Street Cleaning, this Department.

This sum is necessary in order that the Bureau of Street Cleaning, this Department, may continue the collection of ashes, garbage, rubbish and sweepings until December 31, 1916. The available funds for this purpose will last until about November 15, 1916. The funds allowed this Bureau for the year 1916 are less by \$2,989.64 than was actually spent during the year 1915 for refuse collection purposes and for the employment of sweeping machines, and no provision was made in the 1916 budget for the additional work which this Bureau has been compelled to do on account of serving the increased population of the Borough.

From July 15th to September 30th, daily collections were made in sections of the Borough which formerly had tri-weekly collections, as a sanitary measure, due to the prevalence of poliomyelitis.

Trucks and teams were also employed during 1916 to a greater extent than had been anticipated, in order that better sanitary conditions could be maintained at our dumping grounds, by covering garbage, etc., with sand and loam. It was also necessary to provide additional force not provided for in the budget to transport refuse to the new destructor at Maspeth, this place being at a greater distance from part of the collection area than inland dumps formerly used.

The following is a statement of our financial condition and the estimated cost of making refuse collections until December 31, 1916:

Code 717—Balance at hand, September 25, 1916, \$21,125.50; sum (estimated) needed from September 25 to December 31, 1916, \$36,546.92; deficit, \$15,421.42.

Code 718—Balance at hand September 25, 1916, \$22,986.55; sum (estimated) needed from September 25 to December 31, 1916, \$40,165.13; deficit, \$17,178.58.

Total—Balance at hand September 25, 1916, \$44,112.05; sum (estimated) needed from September 25 to December 31, 1916, \$76,712.05; deficit, \$32,600.

Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Gentlemen—I would respectfully request your Board to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$1,500 for the purpose of maintaining the motor vehicle service of this office for the remainder of the present year.

Of the sum named about six hundred dollars (\$600) will be required for the purchase of gasoline and miscellaneous supplies. An estimated sum of six hundred dollars will be required for equipment (mainly tires), and for repairs and materials the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) is estimated.

When our budget estimate for the present year was prepared, the price of gasoline was about one-half (12 cents per gallon) of what it has been during the present year with the result that the funds allowed for this purpose are now exhausted. An insufficient appropriation for equipment, materials and repairs for motor vehicles, together with their higher cost, makes necessary the replenishment of these funds.

An Ordinance to Amend Section 144 of Article 11 of Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Licenses.

An Ordinance to Amend Section 144 of Article 11 of Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances Relating to Licenses.
Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:
Section 1. Section 144 of Article 11 of Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to licenses, is hereby amended to read as follows:

§144. Charges.

[1. *Special contract.* The amount to be charged for loading, transporting, or transmitting and unloading of merchandise, household or office furniture, or other bulky articles, by a public cartman, may be agreed upon in advance and such contract or agreement shall control and regulate the employment. In every case where such agreement is entered into, it shall be the duty of the public cartman to furnish the person with whom he contracts a written memorandum, to be signed by both parties, or their responsible and authorized representatives, setting forth clearly the terms of the contract. This memorandum shall be upon blanks to be approved by the department. (Id.)]

[2.] *General.* The [legal rates] *maximum rate* for transporting merchandise, household or office furniture, or other bulky articles (other than pianos), including the loading and unloading thereof, [unless otherwise agreed upon as set forth in the foregoing paragraph], shall be as follows (said charges to commence from the time of arrival of vehicle or vehicles at the place from which articles are to be transported, and to end when articles are delivered):

a. Where a vehicle drawn by 1 horse, and having an inside floor surface of at least 40 square feet is used, \$1.25 per hour, said vehicle to be propelled at not less than 3 miles an hour;

b. Where a vehicle drawn by 2 or more horses, and having an inside floor surface of at least 70 square feet is used, \$1.50 per hour, said vehicle to be propelled at not less than 3 miles an hour;

c. Where a motor-driven vehicle, having an inside floor surface of at least 70 square feet is used, \$1.75 per hour, said vehicle to be propelled at not less than 8 miles per hour;

d. Where a motor-driven vehicle, having an inside floor surface of at least 90 square feet is used, \$2.50 per hour, said vehicle to be propelled at not less than 8 miles an hour;

e. For the services of each man in addition to the operator or driver, 50 cents per hour.

The number of men to be engaged on any [one] job or operation is not to exceed 4, including the driver, [except when specially agreed upon by the person hiring the public cart. In case any vehicle, while engaged in the transportation of merchandise, household or office furniture, or other bulky articles, should break down or become disabled from any cause, no charge shall be made for the period of such disability. (Id.)] unless the person hiring the public cart requires additional men, then he shall pay for each of the said additional men at the rate of 40 cents per hour.

[3.] *Pianos.* a. Where a piano is transported in the same public cart as other articles of household or office furniture, and is part of the same operation or job, an additional charge of not exceeding \$1.50 may be made for transporting it.

b. Where a piano is transported as a separate operation or job and the distance travelled is 3 miles or less, the charge therefor shall not exceed \$3, including labor and use of vehicle therefor; for each additional mile or part thereof, 50 cents.

c. For transporting pianos either up or down 1 or more flights of stairs, 50 cents for each flight.

d. For transporting pianos up or down, by means of elevator, \$1 additional.

e. Where the handling of a piano involves the use of a hoist, tackle and rigging, at either or both ends of the operation or job, a charge of not more than \$5 additional will be permitted.

[4. *Adjustment of disputes.* All disputes as to the rate or amount of compensation shall be adjusted by the police officer in charge of the police station nearest to the place where such dispute is had. On failure to abide by the decision, the said load, or a part thereof sufficient to secure charges thereon, shall be taken to a convenient storage warehouse and a notice, in writing, with a brief statement of particulars, shall be sent at once by the public cartman to the commissioner of licenses. (Id.)]

3. No vehicle shall be licensed until it has been thoroughly and carefully inspected and examined and the surface space of the said vehicle ascertained by an inspector of the License Department, which surface space so ascertained shall be legibly painted on each side of the vehicle, in a conspicuous place.

4. A copy of this section shall be posted in each wagon for inspection.

5. Each cartman under this article shall keep a record in which entries must be made of the person moved, his address, a brief description of the chattels and the price paid for the removal of the same, with the address of the place to where the said chattels have been moved; said record shall be open for inspection to any member of the Police or License Department of the City of New York, any person having a proprietary interest in said chattels, and any creditor of the person moved.

6. All disputes as to rate or amount of compensation shall be adjusted by the Police Officer in charge of the police station nearest to the place where said dispute is had. Failure to abide by the decision, the said load, or part thereof, sufficient to secure charges thereon, shall be taken to a convenient warehouse and a notice in writing with a brief statement of particulars, shall be sent at once by the public cartman to the Commissioner of Licenses. Upon the determination by the Commissioner of Licenses that the amount offered by the person hiring the said vehicle or vehicles was just, the said public cartman shall forthwith deliver the said articles stored, and pay all storage charges therefor. If the said Commissioner of Licenses shall determine that the charges demanded by the said public cartman were in excess of the maximum rates enumerated herein, said Commissioner of Licenses may revoke the said license and the public cartman shall be ineligible to procure a license as a public cartman, for a period of two years from the revocation of the said license.

7. Whenever a public cartman shall be hired to move any property, he shall forthwith cause a memoranda to be made in writing, the form of which shall be supplied by the Commissioner of Licenses; the said memoranda shall state the amount of charge for the removing of the said property, which shall not exceed the maximum rate as heretofore provided for; the place from which and the place to which the said property is to be moved and the day and hour at which the cartman is to commence the removal of said property. Said memoranda shall have printed on its reverse side the substance of the provision of this section, which must include the rates provided herein.

8. A violation of any of the provisions of this section shall render the offender or offenders liable, upon conviction before any City Magistrate, to a fine of not more than \$50 for each and every offense, and in default of the payment of such fine he may be committed to prison until the same shall be paid, but such imprisonment shall not exceed ten days.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolution Requesting the Bronx Parkway Commission for a Report to the Board of Aldermen.

By the Same—

Whereas, The Bronx Parkway Commission has been created by statute for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and maintaining a parkway along Bronx River, within the Counties of Westchester and the Bronx; and

Whereas, Pursuant to the said statute, the City of New York is to pay 75 per cent. of the expense of the acquirement, construction and maintenance of the said parkway; and

Whereas, It was originally estimated that the cost of acquiring and constructing said parkway would be \$1,650,000; and

Whereas, The said Commission has been engaged in the acquisition and construction of the said parkway for about nine years; and

Whereas, The said work has not been completed and thus far the said Commission has expended a sum upwards of \$4,000,000; and

Whereas, The present indications are that the cost of the said parkway will far exceed the original estimate; therefore be it

Resolved, That we hereby request the said Bronx Parkway Commission to make a detailed report and estimate of the work completed so far and the cost thereof; the work to be done, and the cost thereof; and whether the said work so far completed has been done under and pursuant to the rules and regulations of the State Civil Service Commission; and the approximate cost to maintain the said Parkway when completed.

An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Licenses, by Adding Thereto a New Article to Be Known as Article 15, Entitled Massage Institutes and Operators, and to Amend Section 1 of Said Chapter Accordingly.

By Alderman Robitzek—

AN ORDINANCE to amend chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to licenses, by adding thereto a new article to be known as article 15, entitled Massage Institutes and Operators, and to amend section 1 of said chapter accordingly.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows: Section 1. Section 1 of article 1 of chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1. When required.

In addition to the businesses, places, trades, occupations and things required to be licensed by statute or by other chapters of this code, the following must be duly licensed as herein provided, namely:

- (a) Billiard and pool tables;
- (b) Bowling alleys;
- (c) Dealers in second-hand articles;
- (d) Dirt carts;
- (e) Drivers or chauffeurs of hacks, cabs, taxicabs and expresses;
- (f) Expresses and expressmen;
- (g) Exterior hoists;
- (h) Hacks, cabs and taxicabs;
- (i) Hand organs;
- (j) Itinerant musicians;
- (k) Junk dealers;
- (kk) Massage operators and institutes;
- (l) Peddlers, hawkers and vendors;
- (m) Public carts and cartmen;
- (n) Public porters;
- (o) Shooting galleries;
- (p) Street musicians;
- (q) Stands within stoop lines and under the stairs of elevated or subway stations;

No person shall engage in, or carry on any business, trade or occupation, or maintain any place or thing specified in this section without a license therefor.

Section 2. Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to licenses, is hereby amended by adding thereto a new article to read as follows:

Article 15. *Massage institutes and operators.*

Section 175. *Definitions.*

176. *Qualifications, license fee and term.*

177. *Violations and penalties.*

Section 175. *Definitions; Character; Institutes.*

A person who applies manual or mechanical massage or similar treatment to the human trunk or limbs shall be deemed to be intended within the terms of this ordinance a massage operator, but no person comprehended within the provisions of section 219 of the Sanitary Code, entitled Nurses, or section 173 of the Public Health Law, relating to osteopathy, shall be deemed to be intended within the provisions of this ordinance.

Any place in which two or more massage operators give treatment shall be deemed to be intended within the terms of this ordinance, a massage establishment or institute. No establishment incorporated as a hospital or sanitarium or comprehended under section 226 of the Sanitary Code, entitled Hospitals, or section 340 of the Sanitary Code, relating to bathing establishments, shall be deemed to be within the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 176. *Qualifications, license fee and terms.*

The Commissioner of Licenses, with the approval of the Police Commissioner, shall license in his discretion such operators and institutes as shall have complied with the rules and regulations laid down by the Board of Aldermen and further any such rules and regulations to be subject at all times to amendment by the Board of Aldermen. The annual license fee for each massage institute shall be \$10, and for each massage operator \$3. All licenses shall be issued as of December 1st of each year, and shall expire on November 30th next succeeding the date of issue thereof.

Section 177. *Violations and penalties.*

The Commissioner of Licenses, after a hearing, shall have power to suspend or revoke at any time any license granted in accordance with this article. He shall revoke the license of any massage institute, the proprietor of which employs as an operator a person not licensed in accordance with the provisions of this article, or permits the premises to be used in violation of any of the provisions of section 1146 of the Penal Law, entitled "keeping disorderly houses" of section 150 of the Tenement House Law, entitled "vagrancy," or of subdivision four of section 887 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, entitled "who are vagrants," and also the license of any operator who personally violates any one of those sections. For the purpose of this ordinance it shall be deemed to be a violation of these sections for any operator to treat a person of the opposite sex, except upon the signed order of a licensed physician, osteo, which order shall be dated and shall specifically state the number of treatments, not to exceed ten, to be given, except as such treatments are given in the residence of the patient, the office of a physician, or in a hospital or sanitarium. The date and hour of each treatment given and the name of the operator shall be entered on such order and the same shall be subject to inspection by the police.

Every massage operator and institute to whom or for which a license shall have been issued, pursuant to the provisions of this section, shall display a sign upon which the words "Licensed Masseuse," "Licensed Masseuse," or "Licensed Massage Institute," in accordance with the license as issued, shall be conspicuously and legibly set forth in English in such manner that the said words may be readily seen by persons entering the said premises where massage is given.

Resolution to Direct the Committee on Finance to Make Inquiry Into the Cost of Establishing a Municipal Plant for the Distribution of Milk.

By Alderman Crane—

Resolved, That the Committee on Finance be and it hereby is directed to make inquiry into the cost of establishing a municipal plant which will enable producers to have milk pasteurized under the direction of the Board of Health; and report the results of their investigation, with recommendations, to this Board.

No. 915.

Resolution Relative to Appointment of a Special Committee to Investigate Conditions Relative to the Cost and Distribution of Milk.

By Alderman Quinn—

Whereas, A controversy exists not only between the producers and the distributors of milk, but also among the distributors themselves, in the City of New York, resulting in a serious shortage of milk, thereby jeopardizing the health and lives of many infants and sick persons in the City; and

Whereas, The Health Department of the City of New York exercises exclusive control, through the issuing of licenses to dealers, over the distribution of milk in the City of New York, and as it is claimed by those exercising said licenses, namely, distributors, that said rules of the Health Department greatly complicate and increase the cost of distribution of milk in the City of New York; and

Whereas, The Health Department of the City of New York has established grades of milk, making rules applicable to each grade which are claimed to be wholly arbitrary and unreasonable, resulting in unnecessary and unwarranted increase in the cost of production and distribution of milk, and further resulting in the exclusion from the poorer classes of certain grades that would be available to them at a fair price except for such grading, e. g. Commissioner Dillon, of the State Department of Foods and Markets, asserts that the cost to produce and deliver to distributors or storekeepers is less than seven cents per quart and the average price of milk to the consumer is about ten cents per quart, to which distributors assert that their profit do not exceed a mill per quart, assertions unreconcilable, and

Whereas, The law of the State of New York excludes skim milk from the counties of Kings and New York, it being asserted that skim milk is a valuable and wholesome article of food, and except for such exclusion, great waste could be saved and the public would have available additional supply of milk for cooking purposes at a very much lower price than any milk can be obtained in New York at the present time; and

Whereas, Over seven dealers deliver milk in an average block in the City of New York, greatly thereby advancing the cost of the distribution of milk, much of which excess could be saved by a practical business organization for collective distribution of milk in the City of New York; and

Whereas, The Department of Agriculture of the State of New York, the Department of Health of the State of New York, the Department of Health of the City of New York, the Department of Foods and Markets of the State of New York, and the Department of Weights and Measures of the City of New York, each has its separate duties and responsibilities and each exercises separate and distinct control over the milk industry and according to the best information obtainable there is a conflict between such duties, responsibilities and control, adding greatly to the cost of milk to the consumer in this City; and

Whereas, There appears to be a combination, monopoly and conspiracy to control the production and distribution of milk in pursuance of which among other things a committee has been formed, claimed to be representatives of the producer, distributor and consumer, but in reality wholly controlled by the producers and distributors, leaving the City entirely at the mercy of said committee, even though said committee had any power to control the subject of their investigation; and

Whereas, Although there have been many State Legislative investigations and proceedings on application by the Attorney-General to the Supreme Court, there never has been an inquiry made with especial reference to the necessities of the people of the City of New York.

Resolved, That a committee of seven members of the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York be and the same is hereby constituted to inquire into such conditions; and be it further

Resolved, That such committee be hereby authorized to sit in the Aldermanic Chamber or in such other places in the City of New York as such committee may select, to choose a chairman from among its members and such other assistants, secretary and counsel, as may be needed to take testimony and make inquiry into such conditions, and make recommendations and reports.

Resolution Relative to Appointment of a Special Committee to Investigate the Bronx Parkway Commission.

By Alderman Curley—

Whereas, Chapter 594 of the New York State Laws of 1907, and as amended by chapter 757 of the Laws of 1913, entitled "An act to provide for preserving the waters of the Bronx River, from pollution, creating a reservation of the lands on either side of the river; authorizing the taking of lands for that purpose, and providing for the payment thereof; and appointing a commission to carry out the purposes of the act," had for an object primarily, the creation of a most worthy project, that would eliminate a public nuisance and a danger to the health of the community; and, in addition, provide a Parkway that would extend from the north side of Bronx Park to the south side of Kensico Dam, a distance of fifteen (15) miles; and

Whereas, In compliance with the provisions of the aforesaid act, a commission of three (3) members, known as the Bronx Parkway Commission, was created, each of whom to receive as salary the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500) per annum for their services, which would include their traveling expenses; and

Whereas, This Parkway of fifteen (15) miles extends for the greatest part in Westchester County, and but three (3) of which is in the City of New York, it is mandatory on the City of New York to pay for seventy-five (75) per cent. of the total cost of the improvement, the balance to be paid by Westchester County; and

Whereas, The cost of purchasing the lands along the Bronx River, which has, according to the statement of the Secretary of the Bronx Parkway Commission to the Budget Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on Friday, October 6, 1916, amounted to close to four million dollars (\$4,000,000). The original idea as to the estimated cost for this purpose, was thought to be one million six hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$1,650,000), an excess over such estimate of two million three hundred and fifty thousand dollars. This will not complete the total expense as it is thought it would take an additional amount of two million dollars for this purpose; and

Whereas, It has been shown that the labor employed on the Parkway was not supplied from the lists of either the Municipal or State Civil Service, but were hired and discharged by the Superintendent in charge of the work; and

Whereas, The taxpayers of the City of New York are suffering severely from the burdens they carry in the support of the government in the administration of our affairs in the City and State, and while they willingly pay what just assessments are allotted them they strenuously object to such an imposition as is the case in the mandatory provisions of the Bronx Parkway act, which prevents the Board of Estimate and Apportionment from affording the City of New York any relief in the premises; therefore be it

Resolved, That following out the provisions of section 54 of the Greater New York Charter a Special Committee be appointed to investigate the Bronx Parkway Commission; and be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York shall designate as members of the Special Committee at least one member from the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, Bronx, Queens and Richmond, in the City of New York, and that the aforesaid Committee shall make a thorough investigation of the Bronx

Parkway Commission, and report the result of their findings to the Board of Aldermen for final action.

City of New York, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Municipal Building, Bureau of Contract Supervision, October 9, 1916.

MR. FRANCIS P. KENNEY, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—You asked me to report on a request of the Commissioner of Public Charities for \$80,000 in revenue bonds to meet a deficiency in account No. 1950, Food Supplies, for the year 1916. I report thereon as follows:

The budget for 1916 provided in account No. 1950 an appropriation of \$1,193,362 for food for the Department of Public Charities. This appropriation was based upon a per capita allowance as follows: For physicians, 58 cents; for nurses, 41 8/10 cents; for other employees, 22 1/2 cents; for ordinary patients, 16 3/10 cents; for tuberculosis patients, 33 3/10 cents; for inmates of almshouses 13 7/10 cents. The allowance for all classes was on the same per capita basis as the allowance for the Health Department except that the Health Department has no almshouse inmates.

The Bureau of Contract Supervision had nothing to do with the preparation of the budget for the Department of Public Charities for 1916. However, I am informed the Commissioner of Public Charities was in full agreement with every item recommended in his budget.

Under date of June 6, 1916, the Deputy and Acting Commissioner requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer \$6,000 from account No. 1950, Food Supplies, to account No. 1952, Fuel Supplies. The Deputy Commissioner of Public Charities stated that owing to a lower census than was estimated in making the allowance for food supplies the appropriation for food appeared to be excessive. At the same time the department requested the transfer of \$3,000 from wearing apparel account to the general plant materials account. In connection with that transfer it was stated that the appropriation appeared to be excessive. On these statements from the department, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the transfer of the funds from food supplies and wearing apparel.

Under date of August 30, 1916, the first deputy and acting commissioner, Henry C. Wright, requested \$80,000 in revenue bonds to meet a deficiency in the food account. In support of his request, he stated as follows:

"In spite of the strictest economy, the department finds it necessary to make this request. The food prices have advanced considerably, particularly the largest items, such as milk, meats and sugar. Contracts for the last quarter of this year for meat, eggs, flour and vegetables would have to be entered into by September 30. I request that your honorable board give prompt attention to this matter, in order that the department will not be embarrassed in caring for the city's poor."

Immediately after receiving your request for a report on this matter, I began an examination to determine the needs of the department.

I failed to discover the strict economy referred to in the request of the first deputy. I found that the first deputy had ordered an increased per capita allowance in the large class of employees and that there was practically no control over the per capita consumption by doctors and nurses. According to figures furnished by the department, doctors and nurses have in a number of cases exceeded their large per capita allowance. In connection with this, I wish to state that the Department of Health, in presenting its budget for 1917, called attention to the fact that 58c. for doctors and 41 8-10c. for nurses was in excess of the requirements. The Department of Health requested a reduction to a per capita rate of 50c. per day for doctors and 37c. a day for nurses.

The first deputy's assumption that there had been a considerable advance in the price of meat is not borne out by the most recent contracts for meat for a part of the last quarter of this year. The contract for meat for the last quarter was at a very low rate as compared with 1915 prices or the prices of the two preceding quarters.

As a basis for estimating the requirements for the fourth quarter of this year, the deputy of the Department of Public Charities furnished average census figures amounting to 15,781 for all classes of employees, patients and inmates.

I examined into the actual census of each institution and found the actual census very much below the census proposed for the last quarter. The first deputy commissioner is now making his estimate of requirements on a census of 15,500, but, in order to be more than liberal in an estimate of requirements, I have used the excessive figures of 15,781. I have applied to this inflated census the per capita allowance in the budget. The following statement shows the needs of the department for the last three months of the year as computed on this basis:

After ascertaining, I examined closely into the available funds in the Department of Public Charities and found that there was no necessity for the authorization of \$80,000 in revenue bonds.

The following statement, made as of September 30th, shows the amounts available to meet the needs of the department for the last three months of this year and to provide a working stock on hand for the first week of January, 1917:

It appears from this statement that the available funds, together with the stock on hand, amount to \$21,965.11 in excess of actual requirements under the per capita allowance in the budget, even when an inflated census is used.

I have already recommended verbally to your committee an authorization of \$7,500 special revenue bonds to provide for Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners for employees, patients and inmates. This, added to the \$313,867.31, makes a total available of \$321,367.31.

This amount is within a few hundred dollars of the amount which the first deputy states he will require. It is almost \$30,000 in excess of the reasonable requirements of the department, but, in view of the announced determination of the first deputy to disregard the budget per capita allowance, it may be assumed that he will use practically all of the available funds and the available stock on hand.

In addition to the available funds, other funds will become available through accruals before the end of the year.

It is my recommendation that your Board authorize only \$7,500 in special revenue bonds for the specific purpose of providing Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners.

Reference to the departmental budget estimate sheets for the year 1916 disclosed that in Accounts 412F and 420A, the recommendation of the Budget Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment granted the amount requested by the department, and reduced the amounts requested in Code 424H from \$24,830 to \$21,830, and in Code 424I from \$40,000 to \$36,400. During the year a request for additional funds for elevators in the Harlem Court was made, but owing to the amount being available in an unencumbered balance in the proper account, Code 424I, \$3,900 was charged to said account with the understanding that additional funds would be recommended if urgently needed. \$600 has already been added to Code 412A, making a total of \$1,600, and \$1,200 has been added to Code 420A, making a total of \$10,200.

The five thousand dollars requested in Code 412F is for two belt conveyors at the asphalt plant, and as this is a part of a general programme of expanding the plant facilities it is believed to be a better policy to consider this item with other items for the same account appearing in the Budget Request of the Department for 1917.

The request in Code 424H was insufficient for the work proposed, but the needed funds have been provided by a transfer and revenue bonds.

A careful analysis of the estimated requirements of the department during the remainder of the year for which funds herein recommended could be made available (about two months), indicates that allowances cited in the following codes should not be exceeded:

Sir—On October 3, 1916, you requested the Bureau of Contract Supervision to investigate this request.

The original resolution requesting the authorization of revenue bonds in an amount of \$5,635 for repaving the approaches to the City Island Bridge was adopted by your Board on May 8, 1916, and the issue was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 23, 1916.

Bids were received for this work on September 25, 1916, from two concerns, the Barber Asphalt Paving Company and the Asphalt Construction Company. The low bidder's price is \$6,656.10, only \$80.40 lower than the higher bidder. This low bid is \$1,021.10 over the amount authorized for this purpose, and the price per square yard of pavement is increased from \$1.75 estimated to \$2.07.

The increase in cost of this work, over what had been originally estimated as adequate for the purpose, is stated to be due to the increased cost of labor and materials over what were prevailing prices when the estimate was made in the early spring.

The revision of prices appear to me to be reasonable under the circumstances, and the amendment of the authorizing resolution increasing the amount to \$6,656.10 should be granted. Respectfully, TILDEN ADAMSON, Director.

Report of the Committee on General Welfare in Favor of Filing an Ordinance Relating to Motion Picture Exhibitions.

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on June 20, 1916 (Minutes, page 1245), the annexed ordinance amending an ordinance relating to motion picture exhibitions, respectfully

REPORTS:

That, having heard the representatives of the various interests affected and also the Deputy Commissioner of Licenses, the committee concludes the provisions of this ordinance are too drastic. It, therefore, recommends that the accompanying ordinance be placed on file.

AN ORDINANCE amending an ordinance relating to motion picture exhibitions.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Sections 30 and 32, article 2, chapter 3, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York, are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. Section 30. Definitions—Unless otherwise expressly stated, whenever used in this article, the following terms shall respectively be deemed to mean:

1. Motion pictures, a display on a screen or other device of pictures or objects in motion or rapidly changing scenery, whether or not such display shall be accompanied by a lecture, recitation or vocal or instrumental music;

2. Motion picture theatre, any public hall or room in which motion pictures are displayed [in which the seating capacity does not exceed 600 persons and in which there is no stage or scenery;] excepting theatres operated under theatrical licenses;

3. [Open air motion picture theatre, any public place or space in the open air in which motion pictures are exhibited and in which there is no stage or scenery.] A motion picture theatre in which the seating capacity does not exceed 600 persons must comply with the provisions of this article and also with the provisions of article 24 of chapter 5;

4. A motion picture theatre in which the seating capacity exceeds 600 persons must comply with the provisions of this article and also with the provisions of article 25, chapter 5, excepting the provisions of section 523, subdivisions 2 and 4 of section 524, subdivisions 1 and 6 of section 526, and sections 529 and 533 of article 25, chapter 5;

5. Open-air motion picture theatre, any public place or space in the open air in which motion pictures are exhibited;

6. Open-air motion picture theatres situated or erected on the street level shall comply with the provisions of this article relating to open-air motion picture theatres and also with the provisions of section 506 of chapter 5;

7. Open-air motion picture theatres situated or erected above the street level shall comply with the provisions of this article relating to open-air motion picture theatres and also with the provisions of article 25 of chapter 5;

8. There shall be no stage or scenery in a motion picture theatre or open-air motion picture theatre. For the purposes of this article the word stage shall be

construed to mean any raised platform capable of bearing one or more persons, whether or not it has a proscenium opening or arch or is supplied with footlights or whether or not there are dressing rooms on the premises.

The provisions of the preceding paragraph relating to stages shall not apply to motion picture theatres in which stages have been erected, provided, however, that the flooring of the said stages are so graded or altered otherwise as to be incapable of being walked upon.

Section 2. Section 32. Licenses—1. Issue and re-issue. [All motion picture theatres and open-air motion picture theatres must be duly licensed.] No person shall operate or maintain a motion picture theatre or open-air motion picture theatre without first having OBTAINED A LICENSE FOR THAT PURPOSE. The commissioner may grant and issue any license required by this section. [Motion picture theatre licenses and open-air motion picture theatre licenses.] Licenses for motion-picture theatres and open-air motion picture theatres shall expire on the 30th day of June next succeeding the date of the issue thereof.

2. Fees. License fees shall be as follows:

For each motion picture theatre in which the seating capacity exceeds 600 persons, \$125.00;

For each motion picture theatre [,] in which the seating capacity does not exceed 600 persons, \$100.00;

For each open-air motion picture theatre, \$50;

[For motion picture theatre licenses and open-air motion picture theatre licenses] Licenses for motion picture theatres and open-air motion picture theatres, issued between the 1st day of January and the 30th day of June, inclusive, of any year, one-half the above mentioned fees shall be paid.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Report of the Committee on General Welfare in Favor of Filing an Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances by Adding a New Article Entitled Massage Institutes and Operators.

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on June 27, 1916 (Minutes, page 1337), the annexed ordinance to amend chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to licenses, by adding thereto a new article to be known as Article 15, entitled Massage Institutes and Operators, and to amend section 1 of said chapter accordingly, respectfully

REPORTS:

That the report of the subcommittee proposes an ordinance, which more fully deals with the subject. It, therefore, recommends that the accompanying ordinance be placed on file.

AN ORDINANCE to amend chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to licenses, by adding thereto a new article to be known as article 15, entitled Massage Institutes and Operators, and to amend § 1 of said chapter accordingly.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 1 of article 1 of chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 1. When required.

In addition to the business, places, trades, occupations and things required to be licensed by statute or by other chapters of this code, the following must be duly licensed as herein provided, namely:

- (a) Billiard and pool tables;
- (b) Bowling alleys;
- (c) Dealers in second-hand articles;
- (d) Dirt carts;
- (e) Drivers or chauffeurs of hacks, cabs, taxicabs and expresses;
- (f) Expresses and expressmen;
- (g) Exterior hoists;
- (h) Hacks, cabs and taxicabs;
- (i) Handorgans;
- (j) Itinerant musicians;
- (k) Junk dealers;
- (kk) Massage institutes and operators;
- (l) Peddlers, hawkers and vendors;
- (m) Public carts and cartmen;
- (n) Public porters;
- (o) Shooting galleries;
- (p) Street musicians;
- (q) Stands within stoop lines and under the stairs of elevated or subway stations.

No person shall engage in, or carry on any business, trade or occupation, or maintain any place or thing specified in this section without a license therefor.

Section 2. Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances relating to licenses is hereby amended by adding thereto a new article to read as follows:

Article 15. Massage institutes and operators.

Section 175. Definitions

176. Qualifications, license fee and term.

177. Violations and penalties.

§ 175. Definitions.

Any place where manual or mechanical massage or similar treatment is applied to the human body shall be deemed to be intended, within the terms of this ordinance, a massage institute, unless such place shall hold a permit from the board of health in accordance with §§ 220, 335 and 340 of chapter 20 of this code, entitled the Sanitary Code. A person who applies manual or mechanical massage or similar treatment to the human body shall be deemed to be intended, within the terms of this ordinance, a massage operator, unless such person be comprehended within the provisions of § 219 of this code, entitled the Sanitary Code, or § 173 of the Public Health Law.

§ 176. Qualifications, license fee and term.

The commissioner of licenses, the health commissioner and the police commissioner shall constitute a board to determine the requirements for a license for a massage institute and the qualifications of massage operators. The commissioner of licenses shall license in his discretion such institutes and operators as shall have complied with the requirements imposed by the said board. The annual license fee for each massage institute shall be \$25, and for each massage operator \$5. A fee of \$10 shall be paid by the proprietor for the original inspection of the premises, which shall be made by the commissioner of licenses before the issuance of the original license and the same fee shall be paid by each operator for the consideration of his or her qualifications for a license. This fee shall not be paid upon an application to renew any such license if made, in the case of the institute within 6 months and in the case of the operator, within 2 years after the expiration of the original license. All licenses shall be issued as of October 1st of each year and shall expire on September 30th next succeeding the date of issuance thereof.

§ 177. Violations and penalties.

The commissioner of licenses shall have power in his discretion to suspend or revoke at any time any license granted in accordance with this article. He shall revoke the license of any massage institute, the proprietor of which employs as an operator a person not licensed in accordance with the provisions of this article, or permits the premises occupied by such institute to be disorderly; and the place shall be deemed to be disorderly if massage is given by a person of one sex to a person of the opposite sex. The commissioner shall likewise revoke the license of any massage operator who treats a person of opposite sex, unless the person receiving such treatment is in his or her own home, or in an institution holding a permit in accordance with § 220 of chapter 20 of this code, entitled the Sanitary Code.

Any person not licensed in accordance herewith who shall display a sign reading "Massage" or "Massage Institute" or reading so as to convey a like meaning, shall be presumed to be violating this ordinance.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect October 1st, 1916.

"We are sending you herewith a copy of the City of New York, which was recently published under the name of Henry Collins Brown, 15 East 40th Street, Manufactured by the Winthrop Press, 141 East 23th Street, which concern failed up, and the plates, right, title, copyright and sheets were taken in by us in settlement of our account."

"We have since bound the balance of these books and are selling them. The question has come up in our minds as to whether or not we need a license from your office to use the rough reproduction of the seal which appears on the front cover. According to the writer's recollection this is not a true copy of the present seal, consequently is not of any serious import. We would, however, appreciate your advice in this connection as we desire to be entirely within the law."

The City of New York is authorized by its Charter to have a corporate seal. The Board of Aldermen have adopted the device of such corporate seal. Such seal, so adopted, is kept by the City Clerk and used by him as provided by law or ordinance.

While the City of New York does not object to the use of its seal for purely decorative purposes, such as, for instance, during a public celebration, it is averse to having the same used for other purposes. Gentlemen—On February 9, 1916, a contract for repairs to sewer in 110th Street, between 7th and 8th Avenues, was let. It was awarded on February 10, 1916, signed on February 18, registered on February 21, 1916, and on February 24th the contractor was ordered to commence work.

The total amount bid was \$17,327.55. To date \$16,202.72 has been earned on the contract, and it is estimated that, in order to complete the work as laid out in the contract, an additional payment of approximately \$5,215 will be necessary. This will bring the total amount of the contract up to approximately \$21,417.

It is, therefore, observed that the final estimate would be approximately \$4,090 in excess of the contract figures. This has been brought about by the fact that four items have exceeded the estimated quantities, namely, 3-foot 6-inch by 2-foot 4-inch brick and concrete sewer, timber and planking for bracing and sheeting, wedge rock excavated and removed, and rock excavated and removed. The principal reason for the excess, however, is due to the last two items. The estimated quantity for wedge rock excavated and removed was 10 yards, whereas the actual quantity to be removed is estimated to be approximately 300 yards. The estimated quantity of rock excavated and removed was one (1) cubic yard, whereas the actual quantity to be removed is estimated to be approximately 300 yards.

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, Sept. 12, 1916, at 2 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Paulding, O'Keeffe, Farley, Robbins and Stern, Trustees. Excused—Mr. Sachs and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the meeting of Aug. 22 were held as read and approved.

Dr. Mark L. Fleming, Acting General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

The daily average census at the various hospitals during the month of August was as follows: Bellevue, 1,313; Gouverneur, 170; Harlem, 230; Fordham, 199; Neponset, 91.

At present there are under treatment in wards 32 and 40, 142 cases of acute anterior poliomyelitis. Most of the patients have been under treatment at least two weeks, and many are now reaching the end of the quarantine period, which is eight weeks. In spite of the difficulty in obtaining nurses and other employees we have been able to give very satisfactory care to these cases. The problem at hand at the present time is the after-care. The parents of almost all the patients insist upon bringing the children home, so that it becomes largely the question of orthopaedic men caring for them in the out-patient department of the hospitals.

Under the rules of your Board the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital consists of Visiting Physicians and Surgeons, the Consulting Physicians and Surgeons being honorary members of the Board without the privilege of a vote. A ruling is desired as to the standing of physicians in charge of the special services, ear, nose and throat, eye, neurology, etc.; also in

regard to the three visiting physicians to the tuberculosis service, Dr. James Alexander Miller having been appointed Director and Visiting Physician, Doctors Waters, Whidden and Class visiting physicians to the tuberculosis service.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

After discussion, it was resolved to request the President to formulate a plan for the treatment and after-care of cases of poliomyelitis that come to the hospitals of the department.

Before passing on the standing of physicians and surgeons in charge of the special services as members of the Medical Board it was resolved to request the Executive Committee to present their suggestions and recommendations.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Mr. Farley presented a list of bids received at Bellevue Hospital on Aug. 28, for repairing and re-enameling the ward furniture in pavilions A and B. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, to award the contract to the lowest formal bidder, the Hospital Supply Company, in the sum of \$970.10.

Dr. Brannan reported that he had reviewed the credentials of Dr. Armin von St. George and recommended that he be appointed as Pathologist to the First Division of Bellevue Hospital, service to date from Aug. 15, 1916. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved and appointment made accordingly.

The President reported that under date of Sept. 1 he sent a letter to Honorable Frank L. Dowling, Acting Mayor, enclosing a copy of a report from Dr. Mark L. Fleming, outlining the preparations which have been made to furnish food supplies to the hospitals of the depart-

ment in the event of a railroad strike. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the action of the President was approved.

COMMUNICATIONS.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for Aug. 23 were presented.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the nomination of Henry Sichel as Assistant Surgeon to Out-Patients, urological service, on the Second Division, was referred to the Conference Committee; the resignation of Harold E. Bates as interne on the First Medical Division was accepted, and the request for leave of absence of W. K. Caldwell for ten days from Aug. 20, was approved.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital for Aug. 30 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the nominations of Dr. Shields, Dr. Warren and Dr. Bradbury as Associate Physicians were referred to the Conference Committee; the resignation of Dr. William Spielberg as Assistant Physician to Out-Patients was accepted, with regret, and the recommendation that Dr. I. P. Starr be appointed to the salaried position at \$50 per month in the tuberculosis clinic of the out-patient department was approved.

A communication, dated Sept. 7, was presented from the Acting Superintendent of Fordham Hospital in regard to obtaining the lease of the floor at 2529 Cambreling ave., or the house at 2533 Cambreling ave., for use as a residence for the nurses at Fordham Hospital. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to refer this matter to Mr. Farley.

A letter, dated Aug. 25, was submitted from McKim, Mead and White, stating that the contract of A. W. King for the construction of the radiographic department in pavilions I and K of Bellevue

Hospital was completed within the contract time and recommending final payment. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, to authorize the preparation of a voucher in payment of this contract.

A communication, dated Aug. 26, was presented from Miller, King, Lane and Trafford, attorneys for the Union Trust Company of New York, the executors of the last will of William Washington Cole, which will was admitted to probate May 12, 1916, and in which a legacy of ten thousand dollars was given to Bellevue and Allied Hospitals under certain conditions. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to ask the Corporation Counsel if it is within the power of the Trustees to accept this legacy upon the terms and conditions under which it is given, and if so, to represent the department in preparing the necessary resolutions and affidavits that may be required.

An opinion was presented from the Law Department, under date of Sept. 1, on a matter laid before the Trustees by the Charity Organization Society regarding the commitment of an alleged insane person against his will or the wishes of his immediate family. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to send a copy of this opinion to the Charity Organization Society for its information and to the General Medical Superintendent for his guidance.

A letter, dated Sept. 12, was presented from Dr. Sayre, submitting an outline of a plan of organization for an orthopaedic service and asking for additional wards and equipment, and also in regard to obtaining funds from the City to pay for the services of masseurs in the treatment of children suffering from infantile paralysis. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to refer this matter to the President in connection with

the formulation of a plan for the treatment and after-care of cases of poliomyelitis.

A communication was presented from the Automatic Electric Company, under date of Sept. 7, requesting an extension of time on their contract for the installation of the automatic telephone system at Bellevue Hospital on account of the delay in obtaining certain telephone locations and also on account of certain changes desired by the department. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, to grant an extension to Oct. 1, 1916, to complete the work.

A letter was submitted from the Eccentric Firemen, Local Union No. 56, dated Sept. 5, requesting the Trustees to give attention to a petition of the firemen of Harlem Hospital to obtain an additional coal passer for each crew employed in the boiler house. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to instruct the General Medical Superintendent to include in the departmental estimate for 1917, if possible, a supplemental request for the payment of three additional coal passers for Harlem Hospital.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

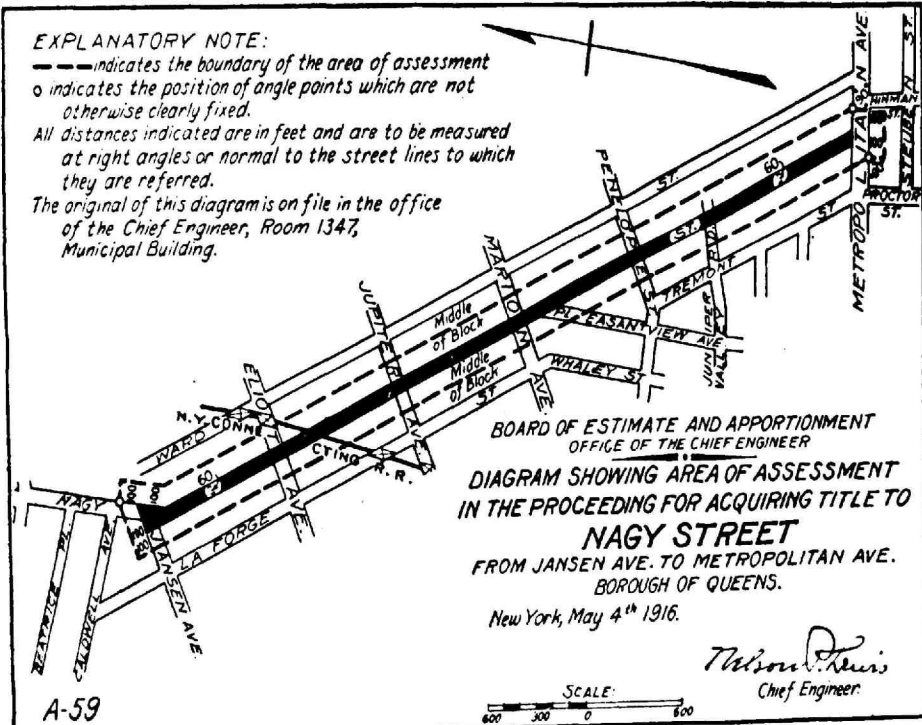

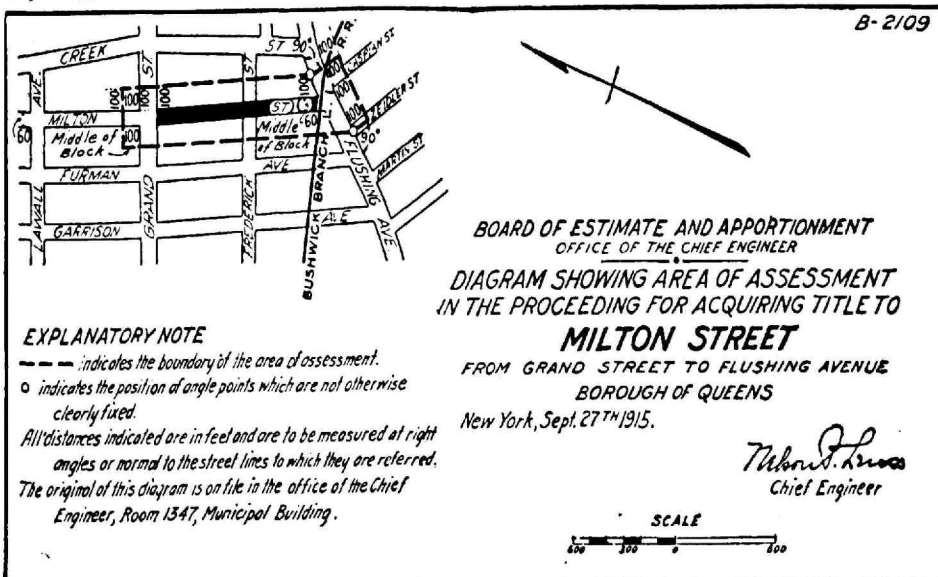

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause to be permitted to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchman or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession, will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for the City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three per centum of the amount of the estimate, or the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
