LAW DEPARTMENT.

OPINIONS OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION.

No department and no officer of the city or county government can, by merely entering or occupying premises for public business, create an obligation against the treasury for rent.

Where premises are required by any officer or department, a lease must be obtained through the proper authorities of the Corporation.

But where a department, having occupied premises under a lease with the sanction of the city authorities, holds over, the city is chargeable, like any other tenant, with rent for the use and occupation, and the amount will, in general, be determined by the rent reserved in the terms of the lease.

Hon. ANDREW H. GREEN, *Comptroller*:

SIR—I learn from your letter of the 22d instant that on the 29th of May, 1868, a lease was executed by the then Comptroller, on behalf of the city, of premises on the south side of Houston, near Allen street, for the term of five years from May 1st in that year for the use of the Fourth District Civil Court; the premises were continuously occupied by the Court, and when the term expired such occupancy still continued until May 1st, 1874. A claim for rent is now made for the year ending May 1st, 1874, at \$2,500 per annum, the annual amount reserved in the lease. You ask my official opinion as to the liability of the city for the payment of rent from May 1st, 1873, to May 1st, 1874.

It is not within the power of any department of the city or county government by merely entering into the occupancy of buildings or of offices to create a charge against the city for rent. If accommodations are wanted for any branch of the public business, resort must be had to an application for a lease to be entered into by the appropriate authorities of the city.

But in this case the District Court referred to entered upon the possession of the premises in question under a valid lease executed in pursuance of all the requisite legal forms. The possession of the Court was therefore the possession of the city, and was a legal possession which operated to charge the city with all the liabilities of a tenant. The continuance of the Court in its occupancy of the premises, was, under the circumstances, a holding over by the city itself. The city thus became a tenant from year to year, and such tenancy, having thus commenced, would continue until one party or the other, either the city or the lessors, should give six months' notice of an intention to determine it. As to the rent to be paid subsequently to the termination of the writ, ten lease, the amount, as is well settled as a principle of law, would be governed by the terms of the lease itself. (See the case of *Witt v. The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York*, decided at a General Term of the Superior Court, 6 Robertson's Reports, page 441; *Pugley v. Aiken*, 11 New York Reports, page 494; *Conway v. Starkweather*, 1 Denio, page 113, per Bronson, Chief-Justice.)

There is no legal escape from the payment of this rent.

The city authorities having agreed to purchase certain real estate for the use of one of the public schools, the Counsel to the Corporation upon examining the title found of record taxes and assessments thereon which the sellers of the property claimed to be illegal, and had taken proceedings to have such alleged illegality judicially declared; held, that under the circumstances the Comptroller was justified in accepting a proposition to close the transaction and receive a deed of conveyance

retaining however a portion of the purchase money equal to the amount of the taxes and assessments in question.

Hon. ANDREW H. GREEN, *Comptroller*:

SIR—In June last, the Board of Education adopted a resolution, authorizing the purchase, for school purposes, of lot No. 133 West Fifty-fourth street, owned by the American Female Guardian Society, and thereupon requested me to search the title of the property. I had the title examined, when it appeared by the searches, that the lot in question had been sold, in 1871, for taxes, and that there were also certain unpaid Croton water rents, and assessments. The counsel for the American Female Guardian Society claimed that the lot in question was, by law, exempt from taxes and assessments; but, as I could not, so long as they appeared as liens of record upon the property, give a certificate that the title was free and unincumbered, the passing of the title was postponed, and has been deferred, from time to time, until now. The Society owning the property has now redeemed the same from the sale made in 1871, and proposes to execute and deliver a deed upon the payment of the price agreed upon with the Board of Education, less such sum as shall be amply sufficient to pay all liens and incumbrances.

As the Board of Education is desirous of acquiring the lot in question for school purposes, and is, I believe, already in actual possession, it seems to me that the interests of the City will be fully protected if the course proposed by the attorneys of the Society is adopted. I am informed by Messrs. Man & Parsons that they propose to apply to the courts to have this lot relieved from the taxes and assessments which are liens upon it. Whether they succeed or not, the City will be fully protected if the Finance Department retains a sum sufficient to cover all such taxes and assessments. I accordingly inclose herewith a deed with my approval indorsed thereon, and recommend that the proposition made by Messrs. Man & Parsons, on behalf of the American Female Guardian Society, be accepted.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks for the two weeks ending October 24, 1874.

It was ordered that a short abstract of each advertisement inserted in the CITY RECORD be prepared by the Secretary, and be published in the following corporation papers: New York Times, New York Tribune, Staats-Zeitung, Commercial Advertiser, and Evening Post.

Requisition was made on the Comptroller for \$200,000, for the construction of Museum of Art and Museum of Natural History.

Two hundred and fifty copies of the revised map of Central Park were directed to be procured for the use of the Engineers.

The President was directed to make arrangements to have concrete flagging laid on the sidewalk on the circle at Fifty-ninth street and Eighth avenue.

The petitions signed by 327 property-owners in Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and by John J. Crane and others, a committee on behalf of the property-owners in said Wards, to have a wooden bridge constructed over Harlem river, from Madison avenue to One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, was referred to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion and advice as to the authority of the Department in the matter.

A Watchman was detailed for the care of Five Points Park.

That the Department of Docks be respectfully requested, for sanitary reasons, to dredge or cause to be dredged the slip between piers at foot of Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth streets, North river, especially that part adjacent to the bulkhead; and that said Department be also requested to dredge or cause to be dredged the south side of the pier at the foot of Thirty-eighth street, North river, near the bulkhead, for the purpose of facilitating the operations of the contractor for the removal of dead animals, offal, etc.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 24, 1874:

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 2,282, as follows: 6 public buildings, 1,216 tenement houses, 217 private dwellings, 171 other dwellings, 19 manufactories and workshops, 25 stores and warehouses, 78 stables, 1 market, 2 dumping-grounds, 2 breweries, 24 slaughter-houses, 10 fat-boiling establishments, 1 pond, 3 manure dumps, 9 manure heaps, 1 smoke-house, 5 public sewers and drains, 3 gut-cleaning establishments, 46 sunken and vacant lots, 63 yards, courts, and areas, 54 cellars and basements, 42 waste-pipes and drains, 153 privies and water-closets, 60 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 14 dangerous stairways, 5 cisterns and cesspools, 1 piggery, 3 dangerous and smoky chimneys, 20 other nuisances, together with 28 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 640.

During the past week 49 complaints have been received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 69 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 66 houses, 66 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

17 cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital, and 1 dead body to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

Permits have been granted consignees of 70 vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of this Port.

92 permits have been granted to Scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy vaults.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week ending October 24, 1874: Typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 14; scarlet fever, 52; measles, 13; diphtheria, 85; small-pox, 26; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 2.

276 loads of night-soil were removed by the Night Scavengers from the privy vaults of the city.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned during the week ending October 26, 1874, by the officers, as unfit for human food: Calves (bob), 13 carcasses; calves (case), 1 carcass; sheep, 5 carcasses; hogs, 3 carcasses; beef, 40 pounds; veal, 253 pounds; poultry, 591 pounds; and 250 pounds of fish.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending October 24, 1874, there were issued from this Bureau 526 burial permits for city deaths, 31 for bodies *in transitu*, and 35 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 526 deaths, 160 marriages, 492 births, 35 still-births, 31 applications for transit permits, and 54 returns from Coroners. There were 33 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 4 transcripts of marriage record, and 22 of death were issued from this Bureau; 4 cases of death were referred to the Coroners.
