

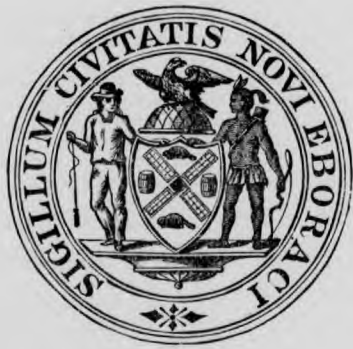

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks held January 14, 1885.

Present—Commissioners Laimbeer and Voorhis.

Absent—Commissioner Stark.

On motion, Commissioner Laimbeer took the chair.

The minutes of the meeting held January 7th instant, were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and

On motion, laid on the table to await action, as stated, to wit:

From Pennsylvania Railroad Company—Requesting permission to repair bulkhead north of Thirty-fifth street, North river, and also requesting permission to place fender piles thereat. Secretary directed to request the said Company to state the nature of the repairs they propose to make at the said premises.

From Peck, Martin & Co.—In reference to the penalty imposed upon them for violation of the rules in obstructing Pier at Eighty-sixth street, East river, and stating that they did not have any brick on the said pier at the time named. Secretary directed to advise the Dock Master that Peck, Martin & Co. deny that they had brick on the pier at the time reported by him, and to request him to furnish the Board with any further information he may have in respect to the matter.

From Funch, Edye & Co.—Requesting the Department to cause the removal of a dangerous shoal in front of Pier, new 54, North river. Engineer-in-Chief orally directed to examine and report as to the cause of the obstruction and what remedy can be suggested. Secretary directed to advise Funch, Edye & Co. of the action of the Board.

The following communications were received, read, and

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:
From Department of Street Cleaning—In reference to the obstruction complained of by Nichols & Huntley at the bulkhead between Bethune and West Twelfth streets, North river. Secretary directed to advise Nichols & Huntley that the reports received from the Department of Street Cleaning in respect to their complaint as to being prevented from berthing the bark "Rebus" at the bulkhead between Bethune and West Twelfth streets corroborates the report received from the Dock Master, of which they were heretofore advised. Secretary also directed to advise the said parties that the report received from the Department of Street Cleaning in reference to the matter can be seen by them on application at this office.

From Municipal Service Board—In reference to the application of Peter Harkins for position as Watchman.

From Commissioners of Pilots—Enclosing copy of rules adopted by the late Harbor Masters, and requesting the Board to enforce so much of the said rules as refer to the anchoring of vessels in the harbor. Secretary directed to notify the Dock Masters that they should see that the rules applicable to the anchorage of vessels in the Port of New York is enforced and carried out in strict accordance with the requirements of the law.

From Harrison & Langdon, attorneys—In reference to and requesting to be informed if the Department will favorably consider a proposition for the purchase of wharf property at One Hundred and Second and One Hundred and Fourth streets, North river. Secretary directed to advise that in view of the limited means that are now at its disposal, the Board do not consider that it would be advisable to entertain any proposition for the purchase of the premises in question.

From Philadelphia and Reading Railroad Company—For permission to replace two piles on the face of Pier 8, North river. Permission granted, the said work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From New York, West Shore and Buffalo Railway Company—In reference to repairs needed on Piers, old 33 and 34, North river, and the bulkhead between, and stating that the same will receive prompt attention.

From R. M. Montgomery—Requesting information as to the proper authorities to apply to for permission to erect a dock at Great South Bay, Long Island. Secretary directed to advise that the communication had been sent to this Board by the State Comptroller, and in reply to his request to state that this Board has no authority in the premises, but have been informed that the Commissioners of the Land Office at Albany, are the proper parties to apply to, they having jurisdiction in the matter.

From Chas. McManus—Requesting permission to use the dumping board at the foot of West Twelfth street, North river, from March 1st, 1884, and offering to pay \$700 per day for the use thereof. Secretary directed to advise that the dumping board is under the control of the Department of Street Cleaning, and that if that Department gives its consent for the use thereof, this Board will make the necessary arrangements with him, as to the amount to be paid for the said privilege.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty other than that to which they were appointed. Secretary directed to notify the Bookkeeper.

2d. Reporting amount of work done during the week ending January 3, 1885.

3d. In reference to and stating that work was commenced by the Atlantic Dredging Company on December 8th, ultimo.

4th. Reporting that James Woods, Dock Builder, was discharged through an error, and recommending that he be reinstated. The action of the Engineer-in-Chief approved, and James Woods reinstated as Dock Builder.

5th. Reporting absence from work of the following employees:

The said employees were dropped from the rolls, and the Secretary directed to mark them as discharged, to take effect on December 31, 1884.

6th. In relation to the condition of and the repairs required to Pier, new 21, North river. Secretary directed to notify the lessees to repair the said pier within ten days, under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief.

7th. Reporting that no material was excavated by the Union Dredging Company with Department dredges during the months of November and December, 1884.

8th. In reference to and reporting repairs required to the bulkhead at the northerly end of Second avenue, One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, Harlem river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to prepare specifications for the work required to be done, as recommended in his report, and to be directed to make requisition for doing the work on the portion of the premises which belongs to this Department to do.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4005, that he had superintended the repairing of the Pier at foot of West Thirty-third street, North river.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4068, that he had repaired backing-log and half-round fenders of north half of Pier 56, East river.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4070, that he had repaired the block pavement immediately adjoining the platform, foot of West Twenty-fourth street, North river.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4072, that he had repaired the chocks on Pier at West Forty-sixth street, North river.

13th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4083, in reference to the damage done to the fender-piles by the steamship "Orinoco" on December 23, 1884, and reporting that the fender-piles were sound and well-fastened, and there was no good reason for their having been broken by the said steamship if she had been properly and carefully handled. Secretary directed to send copy of report to A. E. Outerbridge & Co., and to advise that, from the report of the Engineer-in-Chief, the Board feels that it is their absolute duty to direct them to make the repairs to the said pier forthwith, under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, or this Department will do the work at their cost and expense.

14th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4090, that he had repaired the deck of Pier at foot of West Forty-seventh street, North river.

15th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4060, that he had repaired the bulkhead at foot of Seventeenth street, East river, and had also replaced the necessary fender-piles on the north side of the East Seventeenth Street Yard.

16th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4078, that instead of driving an additional pile on the south side of Pier, new 57, North river, he had placed a large wooden cleat at the inshore end of the said pier.

17th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 3782, that he had stopped the leak in the Croton water-pipe, opposite Pier, new 45, North River.

From John M. Smith, Dock Master—Reporting that a mooring pile on the south side of Pier foot of Eighteenth street, North river, was broken off on the night of January 9, instant. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to repair.

From Edward Abeel, Dock Master—Reporting that the pavement at the bulkhead between Piers 49 and 51, East river, is in a dangerous condition and requires immediate attention, the filling under the same having settled, leaving the pavement without any support in some places. Secretary to request the Department of Public Works to have the necessary repairs made to the premises in question.

From Bernard Kenney, Dock Master—Reporting that the erection of a mast derrick on the bulkhead between East Seventy-eighth and Seventy-ninth streets, East river, would be an accommodation to the coal dealers in that vicinity, and would not interfere with others doing business on the bulkhead. The Dock Master authorized to permit the placing of a mast derrick temporarily on the said bulkhead, to be erected and used only when the said bulkhead is not required for wharfage facilities for other business interests and is to be taken down and removed when not in use discharging coal.

From Edward Gilon, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting that several of the chocks on the south side of Pier at West Forty-fourth street, North river, have been driven out of place and require to be fastened to the string-piece, and also reporting that in his opinion, the said damage was caused by throwing stone from trucks engaged in loading scows thereat for J. A. Boukers' Nephew & Co., of No. 110 Wall street. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to repair. Secretary directed to notify Mr. Bouker that the Dock Master reports that the injury to the pier has been done by him, and to request him to call and see the Commissioners in respect thereto.

2d. Reporting that on December 30, 1884, he served a notice on William Brooks' Son, No. 613 West Forty-ninth street, notifying him to remove sand from the south side of the Pier at foot of West Fifty-first street, North river, on or before January 2 instant; the said sand was not removed on January 12 instant. Penalty of \$100 imposed on William Brooks for violation of rule 8, and the Secretary directed to advise him that unless the sand is removed forthwith, an additional penalty will be imposed. The Secretary also directed to notify the said Brooks to call and pay the amount of the penalty imposed within five days, or the claim will be sent to the Counsel to the Corporation for collection.

A report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 3935, in reference to the shoal or obstruction forming outside of Pier, near new 54, North river, was received, read, and was referred back to the Engineer-in-Chief to report as to the probable cause of the obstruction, and also as to what remedies can be suggested in respect thereto.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to drive three fender-piles on the south side of Pier, new 59, North river, and four fender-piles at the bulkhead north of Pier, new 60, North river.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the Board of Civil Service Examiners that this Department required the services of an Inspector of Dumping of Dredged Material, and to request that the names of persons eligible for that position be sent to this Board.

The Auditing Committee presented an audit of fifteen bills or claims, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of \$14,182.96, which was accepted and adopted, and the Secretary directed to enter the same in full in the minutes, as follows:

On motion of Commissioner Dowd, the recommendations of the Committee of Finance and Audit, as set forth in the above report, were then unanimously approved by the Commissioners; and the Secretary was directed to communicate this action to Messrs. Morris, of counsel for Mr. Dashwood; and Mr. P. T. Barlow, of counsel for Mr. Samuel L. M. Barlow; and also to inform them of the steps taken by the Counsel to the Corporation to procure a speedy determination of these matters in case of the non-acceptance of the above-named terms of adjustment.

And, upon motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the communication of Mr. P. T. Barlow, dated January 12, 1885, was referred back to the Committee of Finance and Audit, with the request that they investigate, and as soon as practicable report to the Commissioners such an adjustment as to them seems equitable, for the fee and perpetual easement rights taken upon the lands of Mr. S. L. M. Barlow, for the construction of the New Aqueduct; and the damages inflicted upon his adjoining lands by such taking and use of said fee and easement rights.

The Committee of Finance and Audit next submitted a report, dated this day, upon "By-Laws and Rules of Order" for transacting the business of the Commission; and of which report copies were furnished to each of the Commissioners.

On motion of Commissioner Dowd, the report was received, and laid over for consideration and future action by the Commissioners.

The Comptroller presented a report, of this date, and estimate of the amount of additional funds required during the next six months for payments to the contractors, and for other expenditures of the Commissioners; which report was read and ordered placed upon file.

The following resolution was then offered by the Mayor :

Whereas, In the estimation of the Aqueduct Commissioners the sum of fifteen hundred thousand dollars will be required within the next six months to defray the necessary and lawful current expenditures of the said Commissioners ; to make the monthly payments to become due to contractors on contracts now awarded for the construction of the Aqueduct between the Harlem river and Croton dam, and for the payment of such right of way and land damage claims as may be determined within the aforesaid period ; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Comptroller of the City of New York be and he is hereby requested to raise the said sum of fifteen hundred thousand dollars upon bonds of the City of New York, in conformity with the requirements of section 32, chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883, of the State of New York, for the use and purposes of the Aqueduct Commissioners, as set forth in said chapter and section of said laws.

This resolution was adopted unanimously, and the Secretary directed to transmit a copy thereof to the Comptroller.

The Commissioner of Public Works submitted a "General Plan of the location, plan, and profile for the New Aqueduct, shafts, gate-houses, pipes, etc., from the east side of the Harlem river to the Reservoir in Central Park; to replace Exhibit 'P,' of February, 1884," accompanied by a report thereon, dated January 14, 1885.

On motion of Commissioner Spencer, the above-named plan and report were received, and referred to the Chief Engineer and Consulting Engineer, with directions to examine the same and to make report thereon at the earliest day practicable.

Chief Engineer Birdsall presented to the Commissioners, for their information, a tabulated statement of the rain-fall, and daily flow from the Croton Dam, for the years 1866 to 1884, inclusive; which was ordered placed on file with former tables relating to the same subject.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Counsel to the Corporation, dated January 14, 1885, requesting that an applicant be selected for examination by the Board of Municipal Civil Service Examiners, to initiate the proceedings to procure a legal decision of questions relating thereto; which was read, and, on motion of Commissioner Dowd, the Secretary was directed to comply with the request of said Counsel, and to cause such application to be made.

A communication from Engineer of Construction Craven, dated January 12, 1885, in relation to the lands of Henry Welcker, at the Pocantico river cut, was then submitted by the Secretary; and, on motion of Commissioner Spencer, the matter was referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit for investigation and report.

Chief Engineer Church then presented communications, dated this day, as follows :

1st. A report recommending certain persons for appointment, and others for promotion, in the Engineer Corps of the Commission ; which, on motion of Commissioner Spencer, was referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit, for consideration and report.

2d. A report of the work so far done by the contractors upon the New Aqueduct; which was ordered to be placed on file, and copies to be made and delivered to each of the Commissioners.

3d. A letter requesting :
 (1.) The appointment of a Purchasing Agent, in order to relieve the Engineers of that work.
 (2.) Authority to obtain an apparatus from Fairbanks & Co., for testing certain materials to be used in constructing the New Aqueduct ; the said apparatus to cost fifty dollars, with an additional charge for each test.

On motion of the Mayor, so much of this communication as referred to a Purchasing Agent was referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit for report; and the Chief Engineer was authorized to procure the testing apparatus from Fairbanks & Co., upon the terms named in his letter.

The Chief Engineer then made a verbal statement in relation to a proposed arrangement for erecting poles for telephone wires at joint expense of the Commissioners and the contractors ; and on motion of Commissioner Dowd, the Chief Engineer was directed to ascertain and report the cost of erecting said poles, and the terms upon which telephone service could be obtained.

The Chief Engineer also stated that, by a clerical error in his report of December 24, 1884, in relation to the appointment of Ira A. Shaler as Rodman, the compensation named was \$70, instead of \$75 per month, the latter being the rate at which others appointed to the same rank are paid, and asked that said error be corrected and Mr. Shaler's pay fixed at \$75 per month; and, on motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the Chief Engineer was authorized to make said correction.

The report of the Committee of Finance and Audit upon the appointment of an Auditor, laid over from the last meeting, was then called up.

The application of Mr. John H. Timmerman for the position of Auditor was presented, and his selection and appointment recommended by the Comptroller.

The Commissioner of Public Works nominated for the position Mr. William E. Lucas ; and Commissioner Spencer nominated Mr. Bird W. Spencer, late Treasurer of the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railway Company.

Whereupon, on motion of the Mayor, the report of the Committee of Finance and Audit was referred back to them, for consideration of the above-named application and nominations and further report to the Commissioners.

The matter of a permanent form of organization for the Engineer Corps of the Commission was then called up by Commissioner Spencer, and the Committee of Finance and Audit was requested to make report thereon at the next meeting.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 78 Tribune Building, Wednesday, January 14, 1885, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Commissioners present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners James C. Spencer, William Dowd, and C. C. Baldwin; also, Chief Engineer Church, Executive Engineer Fteley, and Consulting Engineer Davis; also, Chief Engineer Birdsall and Consulting Engineer Adams of the Department of Public Works.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills included in Vouchers Nos. 472 to 478, and, upon motion of Commissioner Dowd, the said vouchers were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee also reported upon the application of George Lucas for an increase of compensation, and recommended that his salary as Stenographer, Type-writer and Engrossing Clerk of the Commissioners, be increased to the sum of sixteen hundred dollars per annum; which recommendation was, on motion of Commissioner Dowd, approved by the Commissioners, the said increase to commence at this date.

The Committee then submitted the following report and accompanying documents :

AQUEDUCT COMMISSIONERS' OFFICE,

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—The Committee of Finance and Audit, to which was referred for consideration and report the matter of the temporary easement rights upon lands of Gulian L. Dashwood and Samuel L. M. Barlow, in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the city, required by the Commissioners for the construction of the New Croton Aqueduct, and upon which matter Mr. Fordham Morris was heard by the Commissioners on the 7th instant, report as follows:

The Committee have conferred with Mr. Morris, as counsel of Mr. Dashwood, and with Mr. Peter T. Barlow, as counsel for Mr. Samuel L. M. Barlow; and have received from them the written propositions herewith submitted to the Commissioners, for the adjustment of the respective claims of Messrs. Dashwood and Barlow.

The Committee have also consulted the Counsel to the Corporation in relation to these claims, and now recommend to the Commissioners:

1st. That the claim of Gulian L. Dashwood, for the sum of \$5,954, be paid to him for all use of and damages to his property upon condition that he gives to the Commissioners the full use and occupancy of the dwelling-house and premises upon which said claim is based ; and full acquittance for all damages inflicted upon his property by the use of the temporary easement in question and the construction of the said Aqueduct, the said dwelling-house and premises to be occupied and used by the Commission during the construction of said Aqueduct, and to be surrendered upon its completion in as good order and condition as when taken possession of, reasonable wear and tear excepted.

Or that, if Mr. Dashwood refuse to give the full use and occupancy of said dwelling-house and premises, that the sum of four thousand dollars be paid him for the temporary easement rights required for the construction of said Aqueduct; and in full acquittance for all damages inflicted upon his property during, and by reason of such construction.

2d. With regard to the claim of Mr. Barlow, it will be observed that his communication of January 7, related only to the use of the temporary easement required upon his lands; but that his proposition now submitted includes compensation for the parcels taken in fee, for easements in
