

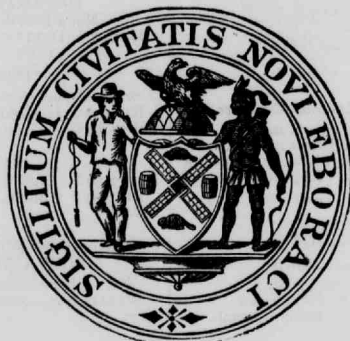

### COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held at the Mayor's office, pursuant to adjournment, October 24, 1879.  
Present—The Mayor, Comptroller, Chamberlain, and Chairman Finance Committee Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meetings held October 2 and October 21, 1879, were read and approved.  
The Comptroller submitted the following report in relation to the award of Bonds of the City, on proposals received and opened October 23, 1879:

#### To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

As provided by section 10 of chapter 383 Laws of 1878, proposals were opened at the Comptroller's office, at 2 o'clock P. M., on Thursday, October 23, 1879, in the presence of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, or such of them as attended, for \$6,000,000 bonds of the Corporation of the City of New York, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum, and payable in the year 1884, authorized by section 3 of chapter 756 of the Laws of 1873, and a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted September 30, 1879.

The Comptroller has determined, in pursuance of the provision of said section 10 of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, to award the said Bonds to the highest bidders therefor, for the amounts under their several titles, and at the prices as follows:

The report was accepted, and the resolution submitted with the report was, on motion, unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That the determination of the Comptroller to accept proposals for \$6,000,000 bonds of the Corporation of the City of New York, for which proposals were publicly opened at the Comptroller's office, at 2 o'clock P. M., on Thursday, October 23, 1879, be and the same is hereby approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, according to the list of the highest bidders therefor contained in the communication from the Comptroller of this date, amounting in all to the sum of five million nine hundred and ninety-eight thousand dollars (\$5,998,000).

The Comptroller submitted a report in relation to the receipts and payments of the Sinking Fund for payment of interest on the City Debt for the year 1878 and portion of the year 1879:

#### To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

A resolution was adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on October 2, 1879, requesting the Comptroller to furnish a statement of the amount of the receipts and payments on account of "The Sinking Fund for the payment of interest on the City Debt," for the calendar year 1878, and also from January 1, 1879, to August 1, 1879.

I herewith submit a statement such as is called for by said resolution, from which it appears that the cash balance of surplus revenues in "The Sinking Fund for the payment of interest on the City Debt" on December 31, 1878, was \$107,922.47; and on August 1, 1879, the cash balance of receipts and payments on account of that fund after January 1, 1879, was \$886,612.94.

A further statement is also submitted, showing the receipts and payments from January 1, 1879, to October 20, 1879, from which it appears that the cash balance in said fund at the latter date, not including the sum of \$107,922.47 remaining on December 31, 1878, was \$1,256,316.05.

The sum of \$226,786.23 is payable from said fund on November 1, 1879, for interest then due on bonds and stocks, for the payment of which the Sinking Fund is pledged.

No other payment is required on that account during the year 1879. The surplus revenues of "The Sinking Fund for the payment of interest on the City Debt," at the end of every year, have

heretofore been transferred to the General Fund, as provided by chapter 163 of the Laws of 1862, to be applied to the diminution of the taxes.

Section 2 of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878 provides for transferring said surplus revenues of "The Sinking Fund for the payment of interest on the City Debt" to "The Sinking Fund for the redemption of the City Debt."

Under the latter provision of law the surplus revenues in the former fund should be transferred by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and I submit a resolution for that purpose.

The report was accepted, and the following resolution, submitted with the report, was, on motion, adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That a warrant be drawn in favor of the Chamberlain, on account of "The Sinking Fund for the payment of interest on the City Debt," for the sum of \$1,000,000, transferring the same to "The Sinking Fund for the redemption of the City Debt," under the provisions of section 2 of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878.

The Mayor submitted the following resolution, viz.:

Resolved, That a warrant be drawn in favor of the Chamberlain, on account of "The Sinking Fund for the payment of interest on the City Debt," for the sum of \$107,922.47, being the cash balance, as appears by the report of the Comptroller submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on this date, in said fund on December 31, 1878, transferring the same to the General Fund under the provisions of chapter 163 of the Laws of 1862.

On motion of the Comptroller, laid over for consideration.

The application of William Mathews, for deeds of confirmation for lots of land purchased at sale at auction in May, 1866, the deeds for which were not signed by the Mayor, was received, and, on motion, referred to the Comptroller. Adjourned.
