Communications from City Departments.

From the Police Department—Weekly report of the Sanitary Company of Police, inclosing copies of reports of Inspector Thorne and Captains Gunner and Mount, in respect to the condition of Sixty-third street, between Second and Third avenues.

Communication Received.

From P. H. Frost, asking extension of time on order upon No. 46 Forsyth street.

Resolutions.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to deny permits for burial in city cemeteries, except in vaults, and under the rules of the Board.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be authorized to purchase a horse for use in the Disinfecting Department.

Whereas, Dr. Elisha Harris was in charge of the Bureau of Vital Statistics during the years 1874 and 1875, and has expressed a desire to prepare the reports for those years; therefore

Resolved, That Dr. Harris be requested to prepare, without delay, the statistical reports for the years 1874 and 1875, and that the sum of \$200 be appropriated for his services; and that Dr. Day, Sanitary Superintendent and Register of Records, be directed to furnish such clerical assistance as may be required.

That Dr. A. T. Liantard be requested to inspect the city stables, and take such action in respect to diseased horses as he may think necessary, and report to this Board on contagious diseases among horses, and that the sum of \$50 be appropriated for this purpose.

That permission be granted to the Board of Police to deposit on Fourth avenue, between Seventy-second and Seventy-third streets, one hundred loads of ashes, provided the same is free from garbage, and that Sanitary Inspector Viele of that district recognizes it as such.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 4, 1876: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,699, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 815 tenement houses, 159 private dwellings, 73 other dwellings, 8 manufactories and workshops, 4 stores and warehouses, 41 stables, 63 slaughter-houses, 9 sunken and vacant lots, 14 fat-rendering establishments, 1 cemetery, 1 brewery, 35 yards, courts, and areas, 60 cellars and basements, 208 waste-pipes and drains, 106 privies and water-closets, 4 street-gutters, 2 dangerous stairways, 1 dangerous chimney, 1 piggery, 1 violation of the Sanitary Code, 8 other nuisances, 82 visits to contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 541. During the past week 40 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report. 33 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port. 36 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 40 houses where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 37 dwellings, 37 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. 17 persons sick with small-pox were removed to Hospital, and — dead bodies to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending March 4, 1876, there were issued from this bureau 651 burial permits for city deaths, 25 for bodies *in transitu*, and 45 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 651 deaths, 152 marriages, 503 births, 45 still-births, 25 applications for transit permits, and 51 returns from Coroners. There were 32 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 3 transcripts of birth record, 50 of marriage, and 24 of death were issued from this bureau.

SIR—During the week ending Saturday, March 4th inst., 651 deaths were reported in this city, being an increase of 52 over the previous week, and of one over the corresponding week of 1875. The actual mortality for the week ending February 26 was 629, or 7 more than occurred during the corresponding week of the previous year, showing an annual death-rate of 30.96 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,056,195. The increase in the number of deaths reported during the week was from the following diseases, viz.:

Small pox, 9; measles, 3; scarlatina, 6; membranous croup, 9; whooping-cough, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 9; cancer, 9; phthisis pulmonalis, 11; pneumonia, 17; marasmus and scrofula, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2. There was a decrease in diphtheria of 13; typhoid fever, 2;

puerperal diseases, 4; bronchitis, 8; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 8; and Bright's disease and nephritis, 8. Deaths in institutions and of children under five years of age increased 26 respectively. During the month of February diphtheria caused 236 deaths; scarlatina, 80; membranous croup, 57; malarial fevers, 23; and cerebro-spinal fever, 12. The average age of those who died of diphtheria was 3 years, 11 months, 24 days; scarlatina, 4 years, 1 month, 24 days; membranous croup, 2 years, 5 months, 12 days; malarial fevers, 13 years, 2 months, 29 days; and cerebro-spinal fever, 12 years, 10 months, 29 days.

266 of the 408 deaths from these causes occurred in houses containing over 3 families; 124 in houses containing less than 3 families; 1 on a canal boat; 4 in hotels and boarding houses; and 13 in institutions; 6 deaths were reported to have occurred on the basement floor, 122 on the first, 137 on the second, 77 on the third, 25 on the fourth, 1 on the fifth, and 26 on the top. The Wards that furnished the highest mortality from these causes, were the Twenty-second, (45), Nineteenth (44), Seventeenth (43), Twentieth (31), Twelfth (30), Twenty-first (25); and the lowest was reported from the Second (1), Fifteenth (3), First (5), Twenty-fourth (5), Fifth, Sixth, and Fourteenth (7 each), while the Third Ward was entirely exempt from any fatal cases during the month. The hours at which most of the above deaths took place were 6 and 7 A. M. (22 each), 4 and 5 A. M. (21 each), and the least at 2, 6, 10, 11 P. M. (13 each), 5, 8, and 12 P. M. (14 each).

There were 2,498 deaths, 190 still-births, 654 marriages, and 2,077 births reported during the month of February, 1876, against 2,420 deaths, 187 still-births, 579 marriages, and 1,888 births reported during the corresponding month of 1875.

The mean temperature for the week was 27.2 degrees Fahr., and the humidity 75.100 of total saturation (as reported by Daniel Draper, Director Meteorological Observatory, Central Park).

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks for the two weeks ending March 4, 1876.

March 1, 1876.

The owners of property were given permission to lay the sidewalk and flagging along Marion avenue, from Kingsbridge road to Ridge street at their own expense, upon certain conditions.

The report of the transactions of this Department for the three months ending December 31, 1875, was transmitted to his Honor the Mayor.

The Superintendent of Parks reported that the roadway through Washington square has become entirely out of repair, and estimated the cost of paving it with Belgian stones at \$25,000, and of macadamizing it at \$12,000.
