BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,) CITY OF NEW YORK, MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL, Wednesday, October 11, 1876–12 o'clock M.

The Board met in pursuance of a call issued under the authority contained in the 112th section of chapter 335, and section 1 of chapter 779, Laws of 1873, and chapters 303, 304, and 308, Laws of 1874, and indorsed by the Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, and in pursuance of the following requisition : CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, October 9, 1876.

Present—All the members, viz. : William H. Wickham, the Mayor of the City of New York ; Andrew H. Green, the Comptroller of the City of New York ; Samuel A. Lewis, the President of the Board of Aldermen ; John Wheeler, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments. The minutes of the meeting held September 29, 1876, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented the following report :

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

At a meeting held by the Board on September 29 last, a communication from Cornelius Flynn, relative to his claim for salary as Acting Assistant Clerk in the First District Court, was referred to me, and I respectfully submit the following REPORT :

REPORT : Reference is made to a late decision of the Court of Appeals in support of the claim of said Flynn, which, upon examination, I find was made in the case of John H. Whitmore, and that under said decision the Clerks of District Courts are entitled to a salary of \$3,000 per annum, and as the same provision of law contained in section 1 of chapter 438, Laws of 1872, fixes the salary of Assistant Clerks at the same amount, and chapter 275, Laws of 1876, provides that the Comptroller shall audit and certily the amount of the claim of said Flynn "at the rate established by law as the compensation for the services of the clerks of said Distrcti Courts in the City of New York at the time of the ren-dition of such services ;" that the claum of said Flynn amounts to the sum of \$1,500 for the period specified, and the report of the Comptroller of September 15, 1876, should be modified accordingly. The claim of Patrick McCabe, as Assistant Clerk in the Third District Court, is also reported on September 15, 1876, and comes under the same decision of the Court of Appeals, and being specially provided for also by chapter 300, Laws of 1876, said claim amounts to \$2,416.66, and the report of the Comptroller, of said September 15, 1876, in respect to the claim of said McCabe, should be modi-fied accordingly.

COURT OF APPEALS.

JOHN H. WHITMORE, Respondent,

against THE MAYOR, ETC., OF NEW YORK, Appellant. Per Curiam :

Per Curiam : We are of the opinion that the act, chapter 335, of the Laws of 1873, authorizing the Board of Apportionment to fix the salaries of all officers paid from the City Treasury, does not include any but city officers, such as are connected with the political organization of the city government. The act is entitled "An act to reorganize the local government of the City of New York." The plaintiff is not such an officer, but is a judicial officer embraced within the judiciary system of the State. Quinn vs. Mayor, etc., 44 How. Pr. R., 266, affirmed in this court, 53 N. Y., 627; Leardon vs. Mayor, etc., Jones & Spenser, Sup. Ct. R., 467.
If the Legislature intended to embrace other than strictly city officers, it must be presumed that the statute would have so declared in express terms. The constitutional question need not be considered. The judgment should be affirmed. "All concur." (A copy).
