STATION-HOUSES.

The District Surgeons report that the sanitary condition of the following Station-houses is good:

Fourth, Eighth, Eleventh, Eighteenth, Nineteenth, Twenty-third, Twenty-fourth, Twenty-fifth, Twenty-seventh, Twenty-eighth, Thirtieth, Thirty-second and Thirty-seventh Precincts.

The following station-houses are in fair sanitary condition:

Second, Sixth, Seventh, Ninth, Tenth, Fifteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-second, Twenty-sixth, Twenty-ninth, Thirty-first, Thirty-third, Thirty-fourth, Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth Precincts.

The sanitary condition is reported as bad in the following station-houses:

First, Fifth, Twelfth, Thirteenth, Fourteenth, Sixteenth and Twenty-first Precincts, and the Wakefield station of the Thirty-eighth Precinct.

Precinct Reports in Detail.

House of Detention—Excellent condition.
First—Sanitary condition bad, on account of sewer-gas being driven back through drain-pipes at high tides; would recommend that the building and ground be sold and a modern station-house be erected on higher ground.

Second—Fair, but ventilation poor, and the health of the Patrolmen is menaced by the reception of tramp lodgers.

Third—(City Hall).

Fourth—Good.

Fifth—Sanitary condition bad.

Sixth—Fair.

Seventh—Fair.

Eighth—Good.

Ninth—Fair condition.

Tenth—Fairly good.

Eleventh—No cause for complaint.

Twelfth—Condition is bad.

Thirteenth—Bad.

Fourteenth—Bad.

Fifteenth—Fair sanitary condition.

Sixteenth—Overcrowded; bad sanitary condition; unfit in all ways.

Seventeenth—Condition bad.

Eighteenth—Sanitary condition good.

Nineteenth—Good condition.

Twentieth—Fair.

Twenty-first—Sanitary condition is bad; its dormitories all overcrowded and without heat.

Twenty-second—Sanitary condition is fair.

Twenty-third—No cause for complaint.

Twenty-fourth—Good.

Twenty-fifth—Good sanitary condition.

Twenty-sixth—Sanitary condition is good.

Twenty-seventh—Good sanitary condition.

Twenty-eighth—Good sanitary condition.

Twenty-ninth—The prison cells for female prisoners are poorly lighted and ventilated; heating is inadequate, and Matrons are subject to great exposure to cold in winter, when they are obliged to pass out-of-doors through a court-yard and climb a stairway without extra covering about the head or chest.

Thirtieth—Heating facilities are insufficient.

Thirty-first—Dormitories crowded and cold; some being without heat during the entire winter.

Thirty-second—The most comfortable house in the Department for warmth, ventilation, light and cleanliness.

Thirty-third—Fair, except dormitories crowded and very cold in winter.

Thirty-fourth—Fair, except dormitories very cold in winter.

Thirty-fifth—Dormitories crowded; insufficiently heated in cold weather; ground is low, and the cellar contains water after rains.

Thirty-sixth—

Thirty-seventh—Good sanitary condition.

Thirty-eighth—First Westchester Village Station-house—Fair, except very cold in winter; no water-closet in building.

Second. Wakefield Station-house—Bad; the building is unfinished; water and cesspool matter collects in cellar; dormitories very cold in winter, and are without plastered walls and ceiling, these consisting only of beams and outside boards; no water-closet conveniences, except urinals.

Third. City Island Station-house—Fair, except no water in building or on premises; privy vault needs cleaning out.

The sanitary condition of station-houses must always be a source of anxiety so long as a portion of the houses is set apart for the homeless vagrants who are nightly allowed to lodge there. These men and women are filthy in the extreme, their clothing saturated with the germs of disease, and their skins the habitat of animal parasites.

They absorb the exhalations from one another all night in rooms from which they rigorously sweep the doorman to ventilate during his visits; and in the

morning they separate, each to become the possible focus of infection for numbers of people during his or her daily wanderings. These people should be sent to lodging-houses where provision can be made for—First, disrobing; second, bathing the entire body; third, furnishing a cotton shirt to be worn at night; fourth, disinfection, by dry heat, the clothing of the lodger; fifth, disinfection, during the day, the bed and night-shirt used.

These are duties manifestly not within the scope of the Police Department, but necessary to protect the health of the community.

BOARD OF SURGEONS.

The following table shows the sick time of the force, by Precincts and Squads, during the year, together with other results of the labor of the Surgeons of the Department.

The first table shows the time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disabilities and injuries during the year. It will be seen that the time actually lost was 44,237 days—3.22 per cent. of the total days' time of the force. This is a decrease of 1,825 days' sick time, and 0.06 per cent. from the figures of 1894. The amount paid for sick time lost was \$82,714.63, an increase of \$6,915.46.

The increase in amount paid for sick time, notwithstanding the decrease in days' time lost, is due to the larger salaries now paid to Patrolmen.

The allowance made for sick time lost during the year, by resolution of the Board of Police some time subsequent to recovery, aggregated the sum of \$3,269.79, making the total sum so paid \$85,984.42, an increase of \$7,148.13.

DISCIPLINE OF THE FORCE.

The number of charges preferred against members of the force during the year was 3,757, a decrease of 389 as compared with 1894.

The grounds of complaint in these charges were as follows:

Complaints, no disposition, December 31, 1894, 513; intoxication, 60; neglect of duty, violation of rules and disobedience of orders, 3,491; complaints of citizens and conduct unbecoming an officer, 206—total, 4,270.

The judgments rendered by the Board were as follows:

Dismissals, 94; fines, 3,181; judgment suspended, 1; reprimands, 96; complaints dismissed or withdrawn, 515; complaints, no disposition, December 31, 1895, 383—total, 4,270.

Elsewhere in this report will be found a table of arrests for a series of years.

It will be seen that the arrests for 1895 were 14,681 greater than in 1891.

The number of arrests in the Fourth, Sixth, Tenth and Eleventh Precincts still show a striking feature in the table, though the percentage to the entire number has somewhat decreased. The number arrested in this district in 1895 was 28,084, an increase of 1,663 over the preceding year. The percentage of arrests in the district was 24.82, a decrease of 2.06 per cent. The percentage of arrests in the Eleventh Precinct was 11.13 of the entire number.

Attention is directed to the very considerable increase in the number of arrests made in the Detective Bureau and Court Squads, the former showing an increase of 1,793 (an increase of 489 more than the total arrests for 1894) and the latter an increase of 1,323. It must be remembered that the arrests made by members of the Court Squads are almost entirely upon warrants issued.

In the enumerated felonies found in table of arrests for a series of years, it appears there was an increase of 171, while in the designation of "felonious assault" there was an increase of 212, showing a general decrease in other felonies named. In arrests for intoxication and disorderly conduct there is found an increase of 3,621 over 1894, but a decrease of 2,703 as compared with the figures for 1891.

EXCISE ARRESTS ON SUNDAYS.

The following comparative table of arrests on Sundays, exhibits the work of the Police in its endeavor to enforce the provisions of the Excise Law. In the first half of the year there were 4,276 arrests on Sundays and in the last half 1,631 arrests, showing clearly that violations of the law grew less as the Police exertions grew greater in the law's enforcement.

The total number of arrests for this offense increased 279 as compared with 1894, the percentage was 7.70 of the total arrests and the average for each Sunday was 113.

HOUSE OF DETENTION FOR WITNESSES.

The above table shows a decrease of 2,469 in the number of lodgings furnished in the Station-houses during 1895 as compared with the preceding year. This decrease, which has been continuous since 1890, was accounted for in our report for 1894 as due to the arrest of persons applying frequently for lodgings on the charge of vagrancy. During the year just closed 3,065 arrests

were made for this offense, a decrease of 474. In view of the fewer applications for lodgings during the year, and the decreased arrests for vagrancy, there can be little doubt that the views expressed last year were correct and that the apparently harsh measure adopted to decrease this evil of "trampdom" was successful to the extent indicated.

SANITARY COMPANY.

BUREAU OF STEAM BOILER INSPECTION AND ENGINEERS.

The report of this Bureau shows the number of steam boilers examined, tested hydrostatically and their condition together with the number of applicants examined as to their qualifications as engineers to take charge of and operate stationary and portable steam boilers and engines in the City of New York; also the amount of money paid to the Treasurer of the Police Pension Fund, collected from owners of steam boilers for certificates of inspection.

For the year there have been 7,591 applicants examined for engineers' certificates, to take charge of and operate stationary and portable steam boilers and engines. Each applicant has been examined as to his experience, qualifications and knowledge of steam boilers and engines.

Of this number, 7,089 passed a satisfactory examination and have been granted certificates and 502 have been rejected.

There have been no explosions of steam-boilers or of such attachments or connections thereto which are required by law to be supervised by this Department during the year past.

Although a number of accidents occasioned by steam have occurred at which several lives have been lost, together with severe injuries to persons and considerable damage to property. Many cases of a like nature may be averted, or at least the dangers therefrom reduced to a minimum, by an amendment to the law regulating the inspection of steam-boilers, that would require all steam-pipes and fittings which are a direct connection to steam boiler be subjected to the same inspection and tested to the same pressure as that which is applied to the boiler. This would necessitate the selection of better material in the construction of steam lines.

The following cases have been investigated during the past year, occasioned by the explosion of steam-pipes and other connections to steam boilers, and the improper care of heating boilers, which the law exempts from the inspection of this Department.

February 8.—The water in a heating boiler in the apartment house No. 151 West Sixty-sixth street was allowed to get low and the steam generated to such a degree that it filled the house with steam, creating an alarm among the tenants at 1 o'clock in the morning. Upon investigation it was found that the janitor knew nothing about the care of a boiler.

August 14, at 8.30 P. M.—A stop valve on the main steam line blew out, at the Edison electric-light plant, No. 47 West Twenty-sixth street, and severely scalded Louis Cohen, an oiler.

October 5, at 3.45 A. M.—A steam boiler exploded at Howells & Son's soda factory, at Westchester, killing the Engineer, Frank C. Thorn. This plant is in the recently annexed district, but had not been inspected by this Department. Upon investigation it was shown that the cause of the explosion was the feeding of water into the boiler when the water was low and the sheets overheated. All the boilers now in this district have been placed under the supervision of this Department, and competent licensed engineers are now in charge.

November 11, at 9.50 P. M.—The blow-off pipe of one of the boilers in the Tribune Building, No. 5 Frankfort street, burst, severely scalding Michael Valley, a fireman.

November 15, at 6.30 A. M.—An elbow on the main steam line burst in the Brush electric-light plant, No. 210 Elizabeth street, severely scalding James Dean, an oiler. The cause of the rupture was the steam coming in contact with water after the engine had been shut off, causing a water hammer.

November 26, at 9.30 A. M.—A 6-inch cast-iron elbow, on a connection with the main steam-pipe in the engine-room of the Olympia Theatre, Broadway, Forty-fourth and Forty-fifth streets, burst, killing Fred. Weise and Andrew Huggins, and severely scalding seven other persons, all employed about the place. The cause of the rupture was the turning on steam at the main-valve, which came in contact with the condensation collected in the pipes.

December 6, at 8.10 A. M.—A copper cylinder, 24 inches high, 18 inches diameter, used to steam hats in the factory of Jacob Radinowitz, No. 25 Willett street, exploded, severely scalding Mr. Radinowitz.

December 13, at 4 P. M.—One of the tubes in a heating boiler blew out in Trinity Methodist Episcopal Church, No. 319 East One Hundred and Eighteenth street; no person was injured.

December 13, at 6.30 P. M.—An explosion occurred at the works of the Consolidated Gas Company, Twenty-first street and Avenue A, killing Daniel Oakley, a laborer, and severely scalding James McAleer,

There have been fourteen engineers' licenses suspended during the year for negligence and allowing their boilers to become corroded to a degree to make them dangerous to operate.

TENEMENT-HOUSE SQUAD.

The Squad, consisting of 2 Roundsmen and 47 Patrolmen, is detailed to the service of the Health Department of the City. They are paid by a special annual appropriation, though numbered among the regular uniformed Police force. The following schedule sets forth a portion of the work of the Squad. They are not exempted from the performance of police duty when required in an emergency. During the year the Squad made 298 arrests:

Recapitulation.

Total number of messages, 128,677; total general alarm messages, 234,306; total number dead animal messages, 35,103—total, 398,086.

During the year 1895, 398,086 messages were transmitted by telegraph and telephone, an increase of 19,698 over 1894. A record of these messages is made in the telegraph blotters. Fully 75 per cent. of the messages are received by telephone and retransmitted to their destination; the remainder are handed in at the telegraph office for transmission. In addition to this class of service, some 300,000 connections were made at the telephone switchboard, connecting the officials of the Department with the Police-stations and other places, and the Police-stations, Courts and Hospitals one with another, for the purpose of transmitting messages direct and holding communications of a conversational nature regarding business of the Department. Since the completion of the telephone system business of this kind has steadily increased, so that during certain hours of the day four operators are required, and at no time can less than two operators attend to these calls.

POLICE TELEGRAPH AND TELEPHONE SYSTEM.

The work of extending the underground system of wires was continued during the year, and the remaining precincts equipped with the improved service, as far as the subways extend, One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, West side, One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, East side. North of these points there are no subways, and the conductors have been bunched in cables and strung on the poles of the Metropolitan Telephone and Telegraph Company and on the Elevated Railroad structures. The placing of the conductors in these cables reduces the possibility of the usual interruption caused by storm to a minimum. To complete the connection between the underground and aerial cables a 12-wire cable was laid in the Harlem river, crossing at Second avenue, also a 6-wire cable crossing Harlem Ship Canal, at Boulevard. This is the first time the Department has had any submarine conductors of its own. They were usually borrowed from the various telegraph and telephone companies.

The work of supplying electrical conductors, completed last year, furnished ample wiring facilities for telephone and telegraph systems to the Twenty-ninth, Thirtieth, Thirty-first, Thirty-second, Thirty-third, Thirty-fourth, and Thirty-fifth Precincts, Fifth and Sixth District Police Courts, and Manhattan Hospital. These wires give to each station a direct means of communication with Headquarters (metallic circuits), and enables them to communicate with one or more stations at the same time. These conductors are all copper, 14 B. & S. rubber insulation, and showing a high test of efficiency.

This completes the work of furnishing the Department with underground conductors for its telephone and telegraph systems, having all the modern improvements, and with all the advantages of exclusive control. Formerly all Police wires were strung on the poles of the various companies. These underground conductors are not only protected from the usual disturbances to which the former overhead lines were subject, they are also protected from interference in case of riot, etc.

In furnishing the Department with underground wires, provision was made for maintaining a telegraph system. Each station is therefore connected with Headquarters by telegraph as well as by telephone, having the advantage of a duplicate plant. The telegraph is used principally with several of the upper precincts where there is more than one station on a telephone circuit. It is deemed advisable to maintain the telegraph system, particularly at such stations, as the cost is comparatively slight.

On June 6 the annexation of part of Westchester County went into effect. The Superintendent of Telegraph was directed at once to establish communication between the points where the Police were to be located and these Headquarters. Through the courtesy of the Westchester Telephone Company and the Western Union Telegraph Company he was authorized to take possession of any wires belonging to said companies to effect the same, and was therefore enabled to establish the desired communication on the afternoon of June 7, placing these Headquarters in communication with Westchester, Wakefield and Williamsbridge by telephone, and City Island by telegraph (W. U. wire).

October 24 the work of building our own line between Tremont and Westchester, Thirty-eighth Precinct, was completed (metallic circuit), thereby placing that station in direct connection with the Department telephone system. Having obtained an appropriation for wiring this territory, we will, in a short time, have our own lines connecting Wakefield, Williamsbridge and City Island with the Thirty-eighth Precinct Station.

Patrol Wagon Stables.

Five and a half miles of line were built on house-tops for the purpose of connecting the Patrol Wagon Stables by telephone with the following Station-houses: Sixth, Eleventh, Fifteenth, Sixteenth, Eighteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-first, Twenty-second, Twenty-third, Twenty-fourth, Twenty-fifth, Twenty-sixth, Twenty-seventh, Twenty-eighth, Twenty-ninth, Thirtieth and Thirty-eighth Precincts.

Additional telephone stations have been established at these Headquarters, viz.: Commissioner Grant's office, Property Clerk's office, Bureau of Elections office, Civil Service Board's office.

The telephone was transferred First District Police Court Squad (Tombs) to New Criminal Court Building to office of Squad; connections all underground.

The Police Pistol Practice Squad, Ninety-fifth street and Park avenue, was also connected with our telephone system.

32 miles (underground), varying in size: 2, 8, 10, 12, 16, 18, 20, 22, 24, 26, 30, 60, 62 conductors, containing 386 miles of single conductors.
10 3/4 miles (aerial) cable, 4 conductors, containing 43 miles single conductors.
1,185 feet (submarine) cable, 6 and 12 conductors, containing 16,470 feet single conductors.
5 1/2 miles house-top lines (stables).

Complete List of Stations Connected with the Police Telephone System.

All Police Precincts, Station-houses, including Sub-stations at Piers "A" and "B", North river; Detective Bureau, No. 13 Wall street; all offices and bureaus at Police Headquarters; following hospitals—Jay and Hudson Street, St. Vincent, New York, Bellevue, Presbyterian, Roosevelt, Flower and Manhattan Hospitals; Society Prevention Cruelty to Children; President Board of Surgeons; Houston and Bleeker streets elevated railroad stations, by means of which communication can be had with all elevated railroad stations; Department Charities and Correction, Eleventh street and Third avenue; Board of Health, Centre and Elm streets; Brooklyn Police Headquar-

ters: First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth District Police Court Squads; Police Pistol Practice Squad.

Metropolitan Telephone and Telegraph Company, four trunk lines connecting with the Exchanges, viz.: 20, 28 and 54 Spring and 44 Cortlandt, an increase of two trunk lines, which were leased in November.

The lease of these additional lines to the Exchanges was necessary owing to the fact that the extension of the Department's telephone system, covering all Precincts, increased the telephone business to such an extent as to render two lines entirely inadequate to carry the incoming and outgoing business with the degree of promptness essential to this service.

A rule which took effect January 1, 1896, prohibits the subscribers of the Telephone Company from obtaining direct connection by telephone with any of the stations connected with the Police telephone system other than those at Headquarters. This does not, however, prevent said subscribers from transmitting their message to Police Headquarters and having them retransmitted by the Police operator to their destination, and obtaining a reply. This rule requires that all messages received for transmission shall be recorded in the blotter, and will benefit the Department in many respects.

It secures a concentration of responsibility, as all messages transmitted between the public and Police stations will thus be brought under the scrutiny of the proper Police official at Headquarters, and if such means as this were not adopted, messages in the nature of an order or the countermanding of orders already promulgated could be interfered with by persons familiar with the details of Police affairs, leaving the Department subject to possible confusion. An operator's duty is, whenever a message received for transmission to a Police station appertains in the slightest degree to the issuing of an order, or the countermanding of an order, that under no circumstances must such messages be forwarded to destination without first submitting them to the officer in charge at Headquarters. It also secures an accurate record in the blotter of all messages passing between the public and the Police stations, which is very desirable. So that this rule, while increasing the clerical work of the Bureau considerably, secures to the department absolute protection from unwarranted interference with the Department's business by persons who might be maliciously inclined.

Removal of Overhead Wires and Poles.

During the year 37 miles of Police wires and 19 Police Department poles were removed.

Signal Box System.

The signal-box system, in operation in the Thirty-first, Thirty-second, Thirty-third, Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth Precincts, has worked satisfactorily during the year. The lines in Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth Precincts extended so as to afford proper Police protection in the vicinity of the work in progress at Jerome Park in constructing new reservoir. A signal-box has been located on westerly side of the work, Thirty-fifth Precinct, Sedgwick and Boston avenues, and on easterly side of said work, Thirty-fourth Precinct at Jerome avenue and Travers street, thereby furnishing ample facilities for calling ambulances, help, etc., in case of necessity. In the other Precincts the lines have been given considerable attention, in many cases old lines removed and transfers of wire made, so as to remove old and decayed poles. During the past year the service rendered by these boxes has been more satisfactory than formerly.

Police Signal Telephone and Telegraph System.

One experimental plant, consisting of a home station apparatus, a patrol-wagon table call, and four boxes, has been installed during the last year in the Nineteenth Precinct Station-house. This work was done by the Municipal Signal Company of Boston, purely for the purpose of experiment, and without any obligation of any kind upon the part of the Board.

Two or three other companies are considering the matter of putting in experimental plants in the hope that the Board may have at an early date sufficient funds with which to carry on the work.

Banks, Exchanges, etc.

The lines and instruments connecting the various banks, exchanges, etc., with the several Police Stations have worked satisfactorily; they have been examined from time to time and found to be in good order.

One addition was made this year, silk factory of Bernstein & Altmeyer, with Twenty-eighth Precinct.

Electric Light and Power.

The electric plant at Headquarters used for elevator purposes and for incandescent lighting is in good order. The lighting of the building has been extended during the year to include the Court-room, the Bureau of Elections, and the Commissioners now have under consideration the advisability of furnishing the remainder of the building with this light. The electric plant on board the Police-boat "Patrol" is also in good order.

Compared with 1894, the foregoing tables show an increase of 1 in the number of pawnshops; a decrease of 66 in the number of liquor and beer saloons, and an increase of 262.028 in the number of cheap lodgings furnished. The number lodged in the cheap dormitories in the Fourth, Sixth, Tenth and Eleventh Precincts was 2,644,528—an increase of 159,455 over the preceding year. More than 64 per cent. of the entire number thus lodged in the city were furnished in the above designated district. Attention is again called to the number of arrests made in this section of the city, and the apparent relationship between arrests and low-priced lodgings.

By adding to the total of cheap lodgings, as above, the number of Station-house lodgers for the year (65,556), we find the total to be 4,167,925, an average of 11,419 per night. These figures are worthy of much more serious reflection than appears to be given them by those who are interested in matters of social reform and kindred subjects. It is respectfully suggested that these cheap dormitories, to which thousands of men resort every night of the year, are schools of vice, and from which are graduated the more skilled in crime.

During the year 1895 the Board of Police retired and pensioned the following:

116 officers, drawing in the aggregate \$63,937.50; 48 widows, drawing in the aggregate \$9,027; 17 orphans, drawing in the aggregate \$720—total, \$73,684.50.

During the year the following were stricken from the fund:

47 retired officers died, drawing in the aggregate \$31,545; 16 widows died, drawing in the aggregate \$4,470; 9 orphans, time expired, drawing in the aggregate \$940—\$36,955. Amount added to disbursements from the fund during the year, \$36,729.50.

There are at this date 84 retired officers, 426 widows and 40 guardians, representing 69 orphans, beneficiaries of the fund.

APPROPRIATIONS.

The appropriations for the years 1895 and 1896 made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for the purpose of conducting the business of the Police Department, are given so that information can be had at a moment's notice by all interested in the matter. BUREAU OF ELECTIONS.

The following schedules show a portion of the work performed by the Bureau of Elections during the year:

The number of election districts in the city in 1895 was 1,392, an increase of 251 as compared with the preceding year. The number of election officers in each district were 4 Inspectors, 2 Poll Clerks and 2 Ballot Clerks.

The preparation of ballots and all the labor involved in the preliminaries of election in this city was smoothly and accurately accomplished, and no complaints were received relative to any failure to comply with any provision of the statutes governing elections.

The Chief of the Bureau of Elections, by the direction of the Board, adopted a special system for examination as to the qualifications of Election Officers, with the result that better and more accurate work was performed.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR PLUMBING, DRAINAGE, WATER SUPPLY AND VENTILATION OF BUILDINGS.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN OF THE FOLLOWING change in the Rules and Regulations for Plumbing, Drainage, Water Supply and Ventilation of Buildings in regard to the use of washtubs:

In lieu of the clause "wooden and cement washtubs are prohibited," existing in the regulations now in force, the following is inserted:

"Wooden washtubs are prohibited. Cement or artificial stone tubs will be permitted, provided the same be made in the following manner, to wit: The cement or artificial stone to be one part good Portland cement to not more than three parts crushed or broken granite, gneiss, or equally hard stone, broken to a size not larger than will go through a 1-inch ring, well tamped; each tub to be branded with the owner's name and with the absolute mixture stamped on said tub, samples of which shall be filed and approved by this Department; each compartment of the tub shall have a separate bottom outlet with a through-and-through fitting, and overflows shall be external to the tub.

"No tubs made with cedar, ash or Roseendale cement, or any other materials than above specified, will be allowed."
