SIR—Pursuant to section 1544, chapter 376 of the Laws of 1897, the Board of Police of the Police Department of The City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending September 30, 1898:

REPORT.

On the 30th day of September, 1898, the number of the Force of all grades, including Surgeons, was 7,469. Number of Matrons, 38.

SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the Force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received, for the quarter, and the details thereof will be found in schedule annexed marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 20,779½ days; sick time paid, 10,389½ days; sick time unpaid, 10,389½ days; total, 20,779½ days. Total number of days' time of the Force was 685,815; per cent. of sick to full time, 3.03; amount paid for sick time, \$35,707.15; amount paid for preceding quarter, \$27,087.61; increase, \$8,619.54.

ARRESTS.

The total number of persons arrested by the Police Force during the quarter was—Males, 29,124; females, 7,702; total, 36,826. Number arrested for principal felonies, 2,344; number discharged without trial, 564; number acquitted, 381; number convicted, 319; number sent to other authorities, 50; number died, 9; number pending, 1,021; total, 2,344.

LOST CHILDREN (see Schedule "B").

Males, 701; females, 349; total, 1,050. Restored to parents or guardians, 442; brought to Central Office and other dispositions, 608; total, 1,050. Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

NOTE.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in felony report and general report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the general report is made up from the daily returns from the station-houses, and the felony report is made from the quarterly returns. An offense charged in the station-house at the time the arrest is made is liable to be, and frequently is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the Magistrate.

HOUSE OF DETENTION.

The number of persons committed to and detained in the House of Detention for witnesses during the quarter was: Remaining in House July 1, 1898, 6; committed during July, 12; total, 18; discharged during July, 13. Remaining August 1, 5; committed during August, 9; total, 14; discharged during August, 6. Remaining September 1, 8; committed during September, 4; total, 12; discharged during September, 9. Remaining October 1, 3. The aggregate number of days' detention was 449; number of meals, 1,347, at a cost of 25 cents each, \$336.25. For the names of persons detained and other particulars see schedule annexed marked "C."

SANITARY COMPANY.

The transactions of the Sanitary Company for the quarter, setting forth the number of steam-boilers examined and their condition, and the number of applicants for examination as Engineers, will be found in schedule annexed marked "D."

PROPERTY CLERK'S OFFICE.

The value of lost and stolen property recovered and returned to owners, and other transactions of the Property Clerk's Office, will be found in schedule annexed marked "E."

For the quarter ending September 30, 1898, there have been 1,862 applicants examined for engineers' certificates to take charge of and operate stationary and portable steam-boilers and engines. Of this number 1,806 passed a satisfactory examination and have been granted certificates, and 56 have been rejected.

The Hons. Robert A. Van Wyck, Mayor; Bird S. Coler, Comptroller, and John Whalen, Corporation Counsel, the officers designated by section 1526, chapter 378, Laws of 1897, met this day.

The minutes of the meetings of February 7 and 9 were approved as printed.

The Supervisor of the City Record presented the forms of contract, approved by the Corporation Counsel, received from the Publishers' Association of the Borough of Brooklyn, to be entered into between The City of New York and certain newspapers of the Borough of Brooklyn, designated as "Corporation Newspapers."

On motion of the Corporation Counsel, and by the concurrent action of all the members of the Board, the following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, It is provided by law that notices and advertisements shall be printed in certain newspapers known as "Corporation newspapers" and the "Brooklyn Daily Standard Union" is one of such papers;

Resolved, That a contract be entered into by the Board of City Record with "The Brooklyn Daily Standard Union," for the publication in the newspaper called "The Brooklyn Daily Standard Union" of all notices and advertisements required by the Greater New York Charter, to be published by it as a "Corporation newspaper." Such contract to commence as of January 1, 1899, and to terminate December 31, 1899; such notices and advertisements to be inserted in all regular editions of said newspaper, and to measure not more than fourteen lines to the inch; the payments for such publications to be made monthly, at the end of each month; the price to be paid therefor to be five dollars per thousand ems for each day's publication, in monthly payments not exceeding an average of one thousand six hundred and sixty-six dollars and sixty-six cents per month, nor shall the aggregate payments in any year exceed twenty thousand dollars, nor shall the aggregate of the payments which have been made or are to be made at any one time exceed the product of one thousand six hundred and sixty-six dollars and sixty-six cents multiplied by the number of months in the year which have passed at the time of such payment; further

Resolved, That the Comptroller be empowered and directed to execute the contract hereto annexed for and on behalf of the Board of City Record.

Whereas, It is provided by law that notices and advertisements shall be printed in certain newspapers known as "Corporation newspapers" and the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" is one of such papers;

Resolved, That a contract be entered into by the Board of City Record with the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" for the publication in the newspaper called the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" of all notices and advertisements required by the Greater New York Charter to be published by it as a "Corporation newspaper." Each bid or estimate shall contain and state the name and place of residence of each of the persons making the same, the names of all persons interested with him or them therein, and if no other person be so interested it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Municipal Assembly, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. When more than one person is interested it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, on its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled on its completion and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting, the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of this contract, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety or otherwise, and that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith and with the intention to execute the bond required by section 12 of chapter 7 of the Revised Ordinances of the City of New York, if the contract shall be awarded to the person or persons for whom he consents to become surety. The adequacy and sufficiency of the security offered to be approved by the Comptroller of the City of New York.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the National or State Banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the security required for the faithful performance of the contract. Such check or money must not be inclosed in the sealed envelope containing the estimate, but must be handed to the officer or clerk of the Department who has charge of the estimate-box; and no estimate can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said officer or clerk and found to be correct. All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned to the persons making the same within three days after the contract is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited and retained by the City of New York as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid the amount of his deposit will be returned to him.

Should the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded neglect or refuse to accept the contract within five days after written notice that the same has been awarded to his or their bid or proposal, or if he or they accept but do not execute the contract and give the proper security, he or they shall be considered as having abandoned it and as in default to the Corporation, and the contract will be re-advertised and relet as provided by law.

Bidders are cautioned to examine the plans and specifications for particulars of the work, etc., required before making their estimates, and are cautioned against referring to any specifications other than those furnished by the Department. Such references are cause for rejecting bids wherein they are written, and will in no case govern the action of the Department officers in passing upon tenders.

Bidders will write out the amount of their estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Payment will be made by a requisition on the Comptroller, in accordance with the terms of the contract.

The form of the contract, including specifications, and showing the manner of payment, can be obtained and plans seen at the office of Horgan & Slattery, architects, No. 1 Madison Avenue, New York City, and bidders are cautioned to examine each and all of its provisions carefully, as the Board of Public Charities will insist upon its absolute enforcement in every particular.

Third—That the limits of our assessment for benefit include all those lands, tenements, and hereditaments and premises situate, lying and being in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz.: Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the northerly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street with the easterly side of The Grand Boulevard and Concourse; thence easterly along the northerly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, to its intersection with the middle line of the blocks between Sheridan avenue and Carroll place; thence northerly along said middle line of the blocks to its intersection with the middle line of the blocks between East One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street and McClellan street; thence easterly along said middle line to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the easterly side of Sheridan avenue and distant 100 feet easterly therefrom; thence southerly along said parallel line to the northerly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street; thence easterly along the said northerly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street to the westerly side of Sherman avenue; thence southerly along said westerly side of Sherman avenue and said westerly side produced southerly to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the southerly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-first street and distant 100 feet southerly therefrom; thence westerly along said parallel line to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the easterly side of Sheridan avenue and distant 100 feet easterly therefrom; thence southerly along said parallel line to the northerly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street; thence westerly along said northerly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the westerly side of Sheridan avenue and distant 100 feet westerly therefrom; thence northerly along said parallel line to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the easterly side of the Grand Boulevard and Concourse; as such streets are shown upon the final maps and profiles of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of The City of New York, excepting from said area all streets, avenues and roads or portions thereof heretofore legally opened, as such area is shown upon our benefit map deposited as aforesaid.

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, First Department, at a Special Term thereof, Part III., to be held in the County Court-house, in the Borough
