BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

New York, October 1, 1902.

Honorable SETH LOW, Mayor, New York City:

Sir—The Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals respectfully submits the following report for the three months ending September 30, 1902. Such changes as have been made affecting all of the hospitals under the charge of this Board are, for the sake of convenience, mentioned first, while particular changes and improvements in the service or equipment of the several hospitals follow in the order of importance of the institution concerned.

Departmental Changes.

The section of the Charter separating Bellevue and its associated hospitals from the Department of Public Charities practically created a new Department of the City Government. In order to bring the positions of the principal officials into conformity with the changed conditions, the Board of Trustees adopted a resolution placing the Superintendent in charge of the Department, and he was at the same time instructed to draw up a set of regulations defining the duties of his subordinates. Under these rules the positions of Auditor and Bookkeeper, Purchasing Agent and General Storekeeper, and Supervising Engineer, were attached to the office of the Superintendent, the duties of these officers connecting them with the Department as a whole. The storeroom, formerly used exclusively for Bellevue supplies, was turned into a storeroom for the Department generally—a central bureau of supplies—and steps were taken to establish elsewhere a separate storeroom for Bellevue. The Supervising Engineer was put in charge of the heating and lighting apparatus and of general repairs, and the employees concerned with this branch of the work—Engineers, Painters, Carpenters, Plumbers, etc., were placed under his direct control.

Ambulance, Admission and Transfer Services.

The most important change made in the medical service of the combined hospitals during the period under discussion was that affecting the ambulance and admission regulations in practice in the several institutions. In all cases these important services were attended to by the youngest and newest men on the staff, for the reason, principally, that the service, being disagreeable, was not desired by the older men, but willingly imposed as a part of his hard lot upon the newcomer. Add to this that the attending physicians and surgeons naturally prefer the older men, because of their greater experience, to render assistance in the wards and at operations in the hospital, and that ambulance service involves such nearly continuous duty as to render impossible the performance of such assistance within the hospital. It took, therefore, some little time to arrange for the change finally ordered in a resolution passed by the Board of Trustees on July 22. By this resolution the Medical Boards at the various hospitals were directed to assign ambulance service only to such members of the house staffs as had had at least six months' experience in the hospital. The desirability of having upon the ambulance an experienced man, qualified by some previous training, to deal with the delicate and difficult situations that so often confront the young ambulance doctor, seemed to the Trustees to outweigh any other consideration involved.

At the same time the Medical Boards were invited by resolution so to arrange the service of the house staffs that the examination and admission of patients might be done by the house physician or surgeon or by the senior assistant during the day, and at night by the senior or first junior assistant. This, like the change in the ambulance service, is in the direction of putting the work demanding the greatest responsibility upon the more experienced members of the staff, and both changes are expected to result in an improved public service.

In the matter of transfers from any of the hospitals under the Board's care to the Department of Public Charities, a new rule has been adopted requiring that the patient shall be accompanied by a full personal and clinical history, the first to include such data as date of admission, name, age, nationality, occupation, civil condition, religion, names and addresses of nearest friends or relatives; and the second a statement of the medical treatment afforded the patient and the nature and date of any operation which may have been performed. The private hospitals were requested to give similar information, and, to facilitate this, the superintendent was instructed to have blank cards prepared upon which such information might be conveniently stated, and to furnish the hospitals with a supply of them.

Bellevue Hospital.

Among the more important administrative changes carried out at Bellevue during the past quarter may be mentioned the appointment of a housekeeper, whose duty it shall be to care for the cleanliness of the buildings, to have the oversight of

the women employees, and to take charge of the linen and other articles of household use. The need of a housekeeper at Bellevue has long been apparent, but hitherto the presence of a matron with duties not very clearly defined made it seem inadvisable to make an appointment of this description. There is, however, enough to engage the attention of a capable woman in the ordinary duties of a housekeeper, and a considerable improvement is looked for in several matters of internal management.

On August 16 the organization of the fire brigade was completed. Twenty-four men from the working force were selected and divided into day and night squads, and an arrangement of details effected by which the hospital is guarded at all times by a force of not less than sixteen men. Fire drills are now being held two or three times a week and give increasingly satisfactory results. Additional fire hose of sufficient grade to meet the requirements of the Fire Department has been bought, and the reels formerly used for carrying the lighter hose have been replaced by racks.

Reference has already been made to the taking of the old store room of Bellevue Hospital for the general store of the Department. A place for the Bellevue store was found at the east end of the north wing, in a basement formerly used as an employees' dining room. All necessary repairs to make the room available for its new purpose were undertaken and carried out, and it is now in use as the receiving room for Bellevue supplies.

On June 19 an order was issued forbidding the removal of patients from Bellevue to any other hospital, without the signatures on the transfer slip of the doctor in charge of the ward, and the attending physician or the superintendent.

Housing the Staff.

The rooms occupied by the members of the House Staff were found by the Board of Trustees to be badly overcrowded and deficient in nearly everything needed for comfortable living. The overcrowding remains, there being insufficient space for the number of doctors required by the service. Furniture, however, has been bought, rugs placed upon the bare floors and space provided for clothing. The room formerly used by the staff as a dining room was too small to accommodate more than half their number at one sitting, and the Medical Board room across the hall was accordingly taken for a dining room. The old dining room will be used for the Superintendent's offices, and the meetings of the Medical Board will be held for the present in the ante-room of the Superintendent's apartments on the second floor.

Housing and Care of Employees.

The Building Department has approved the plans for converting the old Cornell Medical College building into a dormitory for the women employees of the hospital, and specifications upon which bids may be submitted for the work have been drawn. In the meanwhile the second floor of the old boiler house, lately used as a carpenter shop, is being repaired and furnished as temporary sleeping quarters for the employees. Many of the other dormitories have been painted, and the small and narrow windows of the men's dormitory above the female alcoholic ward have been enlarged.

Mention was made in the last report of the condition of the hospital helpers, attendants, etc., belonging to the non-competitive class, and of the character of services rendered by them. It was discovered upon examination that a number of these employees were deserving of a higher rate of wages than they had been receiving, and upon recommendation of their immediate superiors the wages of twenty-five of them were raised from \$10 and \$12.50 per month to \$15 and \$20 respectively, exclusive of board and lodging. An increase in willingness and efficiency has resulted, but further changes in organization and discipline are needed.

Prison and Alcoholic Wards.

In the first report of the Trustees the men's prison ward was described as a disgrace to the hospital and to the City. It is therefore gratifying to report that it has been vacated, and is now undergoing repairs with a view to its being fitted up as a linen room, long a necessity at the hospital. The opportunity for making this improvement, which went into effect on September 24, was found in the continued low census of the women's prison ward. Their small number made it possible to provide for the women prisoners in the women's alcoholic ward, where they were placed in charge of police officers, this arrangement leaving the women's prison ward available for the use of the male prisoners. The ward has a capacity of ten beds, and the conditions, while still unsatisfactory, are a great improvement over those which obtained in the old ward.

By a resolution passed on July 31 the Board of Trustees directed the Superintendent to receive, whenever the capacity of the alcoholic wards will permit, patients from the Department of Public Charities who develop acute alcoholism while in the hospitals of that department.

Laundry.

The reorganization of the laundry has been accomplished within the last quarter. The lack of system which prevailed has been replaced by modern methods, and much improvement has resulted. The position of Manager of Laundry has been made, and an incumbent appointed, who is expected to do the work of a specialist in his line. The unusual amount of work which has to be done for an institution of the size of Bellevue Hospital has made it advisable to make the laundry a separate department. A better class of help, at higher salaries, has been employed, and this has made it possible, by reason of the better quality of the work done, to reduce the number of employees. These formerly numbered from 25 to 30, while at present there are but 22. New machinery is still needed, and when this is obtained it may be possible to make a further reduction. When the old male prison ward has been converted into a linen room, it is expected that the laundry will have ample space for all the work to be done in it.

General Repairs.

Ward No. 31 (The Marquand Pavilion), where both women and children are received, has been divided by a partition, and a bathroom and water-closet built in the end of the east division, thus providing a separate ward for children. The ward has been painted, the floor waxed and the steam main underneath it repaired.

The work of rebuilding the elevator shaft with fire-proof material, as required by the Fire Department, has been done, and fire doors have been placed at the foot of the staircases. New ceilings and wiring have been placed in the telephone room. The soil pipes in some of the wards have been repaired. A new sink has been built in the dressing room of Ward No. 3 by our own men. New steam coils have been put in the hot water tank.

The carpenter shop has been transferred to the lower floor of the old boiler house, and that portion which is separated by a partition from the rest of the building is being used for the storage of drugs, gauze, cotton, etc., which have been kept heretofore in the basement of the main building. The removal of these commodities has been in compliance with the recommendations of the Fire Department.

The amphitheatre on the sixth floor has been rewired and fitted with lighting apparatus of sufficient power to illuminate the work of the surgeons to a more satisfactory degree than ever before. The Crane Operating Room has been connected with a room newly equipped for sterilizing purposes, and aseptic glass tables, filters and sterilizers have been provided.

In the Male Training School and the old College Building repairs and alterations have been made in the system of steam radiation to permit the heating of these buildings independently of each other.

Nursing Service.

The changes outlined in the last report, owing to delay due to the arrangement of minor details, only went into effect on September 22. The Superintendent of the Training School for Women Nurses was placed in charge of the nursing and instruction in the hospital and male and female training schools on that date. A committee on nursing, consisting of two members from each of the two training schools and two members from the Medical Board of the hospital, will be appointed in October to have

entire charge of this department. In the further prosecution of the plan, two more women head nurses have replaced men nurses in charge of male wards. The appointment of one or more assistant superintendents to manage the two training schools is contemplated in the near future.

Pavilion for the Insane.

By resolution adopted at the meeting of the Board of Trustees on August 28 it was decided to abolish the positions of Examiners of Lunacy, and to assign the duties up to that time performed by them to the Resident Physicians of the Pavilion. The employment of skilled alienists, as related in the report of July 1, in the place of internes inexperienced in the treatment of mental diseases, made such a change possible. The fact that the Examiners in Lunacy had their own private practice and were required to attend at the Pavilion for but two hours in the afternoon of each week day, necessitated many delays in the examination of such cases as for any reason were not ready for treatment in those hours. These delays and the shortness of time allowed for observation made the continuance of these positions inadvisable, in view of the fact that the Resident Physicians are permanently at the Pavilion. This addition to the duties of the resident staff made it desirable to acquire the services of a Second Assistant Resident Physician. Such an officer has been engaged from the State Hospital Service, to begin his labors on October 1. The additional responsibility necessitated an increase in the salaries for the resident staff, but this increase was more than met by the saving of the salaries of Examiners, so that the present salary list of the Pavilion for the Insane is less by \$400 per annum than before.

Shower baths and sleeping accommodations have been provided, making it possible for one of the medical officers to be constantly present in the pavilion and in close proximity to the ward, so as to be instantly available in case of emergency. There has been considerable improvement in the table service, which has been brought into conformity with hospital practice through the use of table cloths and a suitable variety of crockery. During the warm season daily baths in the men's ward were given. The men are regularly shaved, and when necessary their hair is trimmed, this being done by the attendants. Out of five hundred and eighty-seven patients, mechanical restraint has been very rarely required, and the restraining sheet has been used not more than a dozen times.

Gouverneur Hospital.

During July the elevator at Gouverneur received some needed repairs, and the children's and isolating wards, the reception room and front hall were redecorated and painted. Swinging doors were placed in the hall to separate the kitchen and laundry from the general administration department of the building.

A sink, which was not needed in the emergency ward, was transferred to the laboratory during August, and the work of painting the wards was continued. Since then the hospital carpenter has built tables and cupboards for the laboratory. Improvements have been effected in the kitchen and laundry, and two showers have been placed in the doctors' bathroom.

In September the house doctors asked permission to place a billiard table in their sitting room, and this request was granted by the Board of Trustees.

Resolutions were passed by the Board of Trustees in September requesting the Medical Boards of Gouverneur and Harlem hospitals to so arrange the service of the attending physicians and surgeons that each shall receive two consecutive months' service during each year. The Gouverneur Medical Board was also requested to appoint a Committee of Inspection of its own number to serve for one year, and to consist of two or more members.

Harlem Hospital.

On the 1st of August the externe service was abolished, and one physician who had been serving in that capacity was transferred to the interne service of the hospital.

The dilapidated condition of the building made it necessary on July 31 to put up new metal ceilings and walls in the main hall, the senior doctor's room, sewing room and three of the wards. On July 26 awnings were put up in the female surgical ward,

male medical ward and in the room of the supervising nurse. On August 11 a new galvanized iron boiler was put in the laundry, thus increasing the efficiency of the plant.

During September the nine-room house at No. 518 East One Hundred and Twentieth street was hired to provide quarters for the women employees and was furnished completely at an expense of \$209.85. Four nurses and ten of the help have been given rooms there. Not only is the relief from the overcrowding of the old building a great gain, but the character of the accommodation has had an appreciable effect upon the ease with which discipline is maintained. A sitting room is now kept for those who wish to spend the evenings reading or sewing, while those who wish rest are not disturbed as formerly by the conversation of the others. By the removal of the women, room has been made in the sleeping quarters vacated for four of the men employees, and their removal in turn has relieved the overcrowding in the dormitory for men over the stable. The additional expense incurred by the renting of this house amounts to something less than \$20 per month, the women having been boarded formerly in much less comfortable quarters at more than half of the new rent.

On September 25 work was begun on inclosing the shed adjoining the ambulance stable, thereby making room for one horse, as well as for hay, straw, feed and harnesses. This will do away with the necessity for using any longer a ramshackle building which for many months afforded a merely nominal shelter for animals and equipment.

On July 15 Mr. J. H. Freedlander was employed as consulting architect upon the plans for the new Harlem Hospital, and on September 25 Mr. W. J. Baldwin, of No. 107 West Seventeenth street, was employed as consulting engineer to aid in the preparation of the ventilating and heating systems of the new hospital.

Fordham Hospital.

At Fordham Hospital a new board walk has been constructed from the entrance of the hospital grounds to the administration building. Individual lockers have been built for the patients' clothing, and a pavilion for isolating contagious diseases has been provided. The hospital Carpenter has completed the roof of the stable and made a number of screens of excellent patterns for use in the ward. A general improvement of closet space has also been effected, so that each floor has now three closets, one for patients' clothing, one for linen and a third for general storage. The Board has instituted correspondence with the owner of the property now occupied by the hospital with a view to the payment of a reasonable rental for the three years ending April, 1905, by which time it is hoped that a hospital building worthy of the needs of the Borough of the Bronx will have been provided by the City.

Report for Quarter Ending September 30, 1902.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, New York City:

Sir—Pursuant to section 1544, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, the Police Commissioner of the Police Department of The City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and Force for the three months ending September 30, 1902:

REPORT.

On the 30th day of September, 1902, the number of the Force of all grades (including those on probation) was 7,722.

Sick Time.

The time lost by members of the Force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received for the quarter and the details thereof will be found in schedule annexed marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 16,367½ days; the sick time paid, 8,183¾ days, and sick time unpaid, 8,183¾ days. Total days' time of the Force was 701,958. Per cent. of sick to full time, 2.30; for preceding quarter, 2.48.

Arrests.

The total number of arrests by the Police Force during the quarter was: Males, 31,028; females, 7,767. Total, 38,795. Number arrested for principal felonies, 2,961; number discharged without trial, 869; number acquitted, 472; number convicted, 399; number sent to other authorities, 43; number died, 14; number pending, 1,164.

Lost Children.

Males, 463; females, 236. Total, 699. Restored to parents or guardians, 657; other dispositions, 42. Of this number there were disposed of from Central Office, 536.

Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

Note.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in felony report and general report (in schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the general report is made from the daily returns from the station houses and the felony report is made from the quarterly returns. An offense charged in the station house at the time of arrest is liable to be, and often is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the Magistrate.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for Week ending Saturday, December 13, 1902.

The following communications were received and ordered on file, action being taken thereon as stated, to wit:

From the Mayor—

First—Giving notice of hearing to be held before the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in the matter of applications for a lease of the Fulton Fish Market water front, on December 17, 1902.

Second—Stating that a hearing could probably be arranged before the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund relative to the offer of W. J. Pollock respecting the improvement between Bloomfield and West Eighteenth streets (together with communication from the Corporation Counsel relative thereto).

Third—Transmitting communication from James M. Gaffney requesting employment as Laborer. Referred to the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

From the Comptroller—

First—Requesting that information relative to ferries be furnished Examiner Feeny.

Second—Suggesting the appointment of Bryan L. Kennelly as appraiser of the New York and Staten Island Ferry Company's property.

From the Corporation Counsel—

First—Stating that the agreement of the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey not to claim title to improvements at Pier, old 12, North river, is sufficient.

Second—Stating that there is no objection to inserting in contracts the clause desired by the Comptroller, namely: "And I do hereby certify that the above-estimated amount is based on the lowest bid for such supplies required by this Department."

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—

First—Stating that they have deducted the name of Peter Taylor, Lumber Inspector, from the payroll for the week ending November 28, 1902, it being claimed that he is performing duties not appropriate to his title. Engineer-in-Chief directed to assign Taylor to lumber-inspecting work.

Second—Authorizing the appointment of a Lumber Inspector temporarily pending the preparation of an eligible list for such position.

Third—Requesting list of employees of the Department together with location of employment.

Fourth—Requesting to be advised as to the number of Boatmen required by the Department, and the borough in which they are to be employed.

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—

First—Transmitting certified copy of resolution adopted December 3, 1902, approving change in lines of Pier, new 10, North river.

Second—Transmitting copy of resolution adopted December 3, 1902, calling a hearing in matters affecting the Fulton Fish Market. Secretary directed to notify the parties to call and examine proposed plan.

From the Board of Estimate and Apportionment—

First—Transmitting copy of resolution suggesting that hereafter recommendations for the fixing of salaries when they affect positions in the graded schedules shall take the form of a suggestion substituting the position of a higher salary in place of the position at the existing salary, such promotions calling for competitive examinations.

Second—Transmitting copy of resolution adopted December 5, 1902, fixing the salary of Frederick T. Ealand, Stenographer and Typewriter, at \$1,000 per annum, and that of Francis J. Ryan, Clerk, at \$2,100 per annum.

From the Commissioner of Public Works—

First—Requesting repairs to cribwork at Pier, new 25, East river. Notified that the work of improvement is about to be begun at that point.

Second—Stating that the repairs will be made as soon as possible to the pavement at the foot of East Twenty-eighth street.

From the Department of Taxes and Assessments—Stating that the bulkhead between Maiden Lane Pier east and Burling Slip Pier west (formerly known as Piers, old 19 and 20, East river), is assessed for the year 1902 at \$27,500.

From the Fire Department, in relation to permit granted by this Department to the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company for the maintenance of signal station on the East Ninety-ninth street Pier.

From the Commissioner of Public Charities, requesting to be advised as to what progress is being made in the construction of dock at Metropolitan Hospital, Blackwell's Island. Notified that construction will be commenced in about seven weeks.

From the Acting Secretary of War, stating that the President of the New York Harbor Line Board has been instructed to notify this Department of all applications for changes in harbor lines within the limits of Greater New York.

From the Engineer-in-Chief, recommending that the resolution of the Board of Docks of November 16, 1900, fixing the length of the Claremont Section be amended so as to read:

"Beginning at the southerly side of West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, extending to the northerly side of West One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, North river, a distance of about 1,364.09 linear feet." Recommendation adopted.

From the Superintendent of Docks, stating that the People's Co-operative Ice Company have removed the ice bridge from the bulkhead, foot of West Eighty-first street, and have granted to Curtis & Blaisdell the right to unload coal thereat until April 1, 1903.

From J. M. Ceballos & Co., consenting to the erection of shed on Pier 11, East river.

From John B. Rose Company, requesting berth for fifteen or eighteen barges to be tied up for the winter season at basin, foot of Fifty-second street, North river. Notified that the Dockmaster has provided accommodations for them.

From William L. Peck, requesting repairs to Pier 62, East river. Requested him to advise what repairs are required.

From the Kill Van Kull Protective Association—

First—Transmitting list of members and officers of said Association.

Second—Suggesting that a remonstrance be presented by the Department against the transfer of the channel from the south of Shooter's Island to the north of said island. Secretary directed to transmit protest to the Secretary of War.

From Slawson & Hobbs, requesting information as to a lease of land under water between Two Hundred and Third and Two Hundred and Sixth streets, Harlem river, extending from high-water mark to the bulkhead line. Secretary directed to furnish.

From Frederick S. Wait, Attorney for Charles DeHart Brower, with reference to the strip of land between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets, East river.

From John T. McDonough, Secretary of State, transmitting copies of 122 grants of land under water in the Boroughs of Richmond, Brooklyn and Queens. Chief Clerk directed to prepare requisitions.

From Association of Civil Employees, stating that under section 15 of the Civil Service Law the Department has the right to transfer without the consent of the Municipal Civil Service Commission wherever the employee to be transferred has passed the examination and is on the eligible list to which the transfer is made.

From L. S. Weber, requesting permission to occupy a space 100 by 100 feet north of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, North river. Secretary directed to notify him that permission can be granted him between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets at the usual price.

From the North Side Board of Trade, thanking the Department for the consideration shown in the matter of the proposed improvement of Bronx water front.

From Ryan & Parker, requesting permission to drive clusters of piles at the foot of Fifty-ninth street, East river. Application denied, as the premises are outside of the established bulkhead and pierhead lines.

From Edward Lauterbach, submitting plan for ferry at the foot of Arrietta street, Tompkinsville, in the Borough of Richmond.

From William G. and Henry C. Alger, and Eugenia A. Jenkins, submitting notice of application to be made to the Commissioners of the Land Office for grant of land under water of the East river in the vicinity of Pierce avenue, First Ward, Borough of Queens. Referred to the Corporation Counsel.

From Jesse Stearns, requesting that the Department submit proposition in relation to the improvement of the water front at Pier, old 36, East river.

From Barber & Co., offering to sell Scotch anthracite coal.

From the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, requesting the removal of Christmas trees stored in the vicinity of Barclay street, North river. Application denied.

From the American Ice Company, requesting extension of time to accept the privilege of using the south side of the Pier foot of West Thirteenth street.

From Adam Weber Sons, in relation to wharfage on schooner "Adam Weber."

From the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, in relation to their application for permission to erect bulkhead shed extending from Liberty to Albany streets, North river.

From W. W. Little, requesting employment as Inspector of Creosote Work.

From the New York Harbor Line Board, stating that an application has been made to the Secretary of War by Milliken Brothers for the extension of the pierhead line in the vicinity of Holland's Hook, Borough of Richmond. Secretary directed to advise that in the opinion of this Department the modification of the line as applied for would be a detriment to the interests of the City if any narrowing of the channel beyond the present approved lines were to be effected.

From the New Jersey Steamboat Company, agreeing to pay cost of driving four spring piles at West Forty-eighth street and West Fiftieth street piers. Engineer-in-Chief directed to drive the piles and report cost for collection from said Company.

From John J. Cauldwell, requesting appointment as Dockmaster.

From the Brooklyn Union Gas Company, reporting stoppage in drain foot of Twelfth street, Gowanus Canal, Borough of Brooklyn. Referred to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

From the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, requesting repairs to pavement at approach to Pier 22, North river. Notified that the Uvalde Asphalt Paving Company has been directed to repair same.

From the Maine Steamship Company, requesting permission to place awning shed on bulkhead westerly of Pier, new 32, East river. Application denied.

From the Hudson River Day Line, requesting release from bond furnished on lease of Pier at West Twenty-second street. Granted.

From Gerry & Murray, in reference to printing Annual Report and Index.

From James W. Elwell & Co., stating that the Pier foot of West Forty-eighth street would be suited to their needs if consignees and shippers did not object to the distance, and also that a draught of not less than 25 feet would be required for their purposes.

From the Consolidated Gas Company, requesting to be advised as to what method is to be pursued in relaying asphalt pavement taken up to make repairs to gas pipes, etc. Notified that the permittees must agree to pay the asphalt company which laid the pavement or which has the contract for maintaining same.

From the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, consenting, as surety, to the subletting of a portion of Pier, new 46, North river, by the Citizens' Steamboat Company to the Old Dominion Steamship Company.

From Theresa A. S. Sheridan, requesting permission to amend plans for dumping board between Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh streets, North river. The plans as amended by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department were approved, the dump and runway not to extend outside of the area of present permit.

From George R. Rockwood, recommending Captain Elihu R. Rockwood for appointment as Photographer in the Department. Notified that it is not considered expedient to employ any one outside of the Department at present.

The contract for building a new pier on the westerly side of Blackwell's Island, in the vicinity of Metropolitan Hospital, and for furnishing machinery, was approved, subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form, and the Secretary directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of contract printed and the

proper advertisement inviting estimates inserted in the newspapers designated by law.

The Engineer-in-Chief reported the commencement of work of delivering piles under Contract No. 755 on December 8, 1902, the delivery of coal under Contract No. 758 on December 8, 1902, of dredging between Twenty-first and Twenty-third streets, North river, under Contract No. 749, December 9, 1902.

The Comptroller advised that his certificates were attached to Contracts No. 755, for furnishing piles, and No. 758, for furnishing soft coal, on December 6, 1902. The Corporation Counsel approved printer's proof of Contract No. 762 and blank form of Contract No. 761.

A credit account was granted the Receivers of the Export Lumber Company.

Alfred R. Loweth, of East One Hundred and Eighty-first street and Boston road, Manhattan, was appointed Topographical Draughtsman, on probation, at the rate of \$1,200 per annum, to take effect when he reports for duty.

The compensation of Robert Pritchard, Laborer, was fixed at \$17.50 per week, and the wages of William Quinn, Laborer, at the rate of 33 cents per hour.

The name of Patrick Monohan, Dockbuilder, deceased, was ordered taken from the list of employees.

The application of James J. Gallagher, Recreation Pier Attendant, for reinstatement in the Department was ordered on file.

The following orders were issued to the Engineer-in-Chief:

First—To prepare map of the water front around Manhattan Island showing property owned by the City, improved and unimproved, and property not owned by the City, improved and unimproved.

Second—To make general repairs to pavement on the East river, not including asphalt, from time to time when required, at an aggregate cost not to exceed \$500.

Third—To place fenders around the bases of gas lamps on Pier foot of West Thirty-fifth street.

Fourth—To order dredging at the dumping boards foot of East Sixty-first street and East Eightieth street.

Fifth—To prepare a plan for the improvement of the water front extending from the centre line of Twenty-eighth street to the centre line of the block between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, South Brooklyn.

Sixth—To make certain alterations to the small room west of Room 2 on Pier "A," North river.

The following permits were granted, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks:

U. S. Volunteer Life Saving Corps, to keep life saving boats at the Pier foot of South Fifth street, Borough of Brooklyn, provided they do not interfere with the regular wharfage at the pier.

Pennsylvania Railroad Company, to place protecting hoods at Pier 2, Wallabout Basin.

The following permits were granted, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, but not longer than May 1, 1903:

Washington Bulkley, to use an additional space 100 by 100 feet at the Wallabout Basin, Borough of Brooklyn, at \$600 per annum; allowance to be made, in consideration of permittee regaining the area, of \$300, which is made to him out of rent accruing after the first \$300 has been paid to the Department.

Z. O. Nelson & Son, to use and occupy bulkhead on the westerly side of Degraw street, Gowanus Canal, Borough of Brooklyn, at \$200 per annum.

Harlem and Morrisania Consolidated Transportation Line, to land the propeller "Mount Morris" or "Alert" at the Pier foot of North Second street, Borough of Brooklyn.

Swift & Company, to place a triangular shaped shed for a distance of about 65 feet along the crib bulkhead between Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth streets, North river, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

The Whitestone Hollow Spar and Boat Club, to repair retaining wall, etc., at Whitestone Landing, Borough of Queens.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, and to be kept within existing lines:

Compania Transatlantica, to repair bulkhead between Piers 10 and 11, East river. Moquin-Offerman-Heissenbittel Coal Company, to replace fender piles at the foot of Adams street, Borough of Brooklyn.

The following permit was granted on the usual terms:

Erie Railroad Company, to make general repairs to their wharf property for a period of six months.

The following permits were revoked:

O'Brien Bros., to use and occupy space on bulkhead between Seventy-eighth and Seventy-ninth streets for unloading stone.

Morrisania Yacht Club, to place boathouse landing south of One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, East river.

T. A. S. Sheridan, to load stone at the foot of Eightieth street, North river.

The following orders were issued:

Gerry & Murray, 10,000 white cards, \$11.

Gerry & Murray, 20,000 sheets typewriter paper, 8 by 13 inches, \$42.40.

Gerry & Murray, 2 copying baths, \$4.50 and \$14.50, respectively.

John J. O'Brien Printing Company, printing index to Minutes of Annual Report, \$2 per page.

Harry Martin, W. R. Moore and George Snyder, services of horse, cart and driver, at \$3.50 per day for sixty days, each.

Consolidated Ice Company were directed to remove the building formerly used as a stable, and to repair bulkhead south side of Ninety-third street, East river, within ten days, and in the event of their failure to comply with the order, the structure was ordered removed and the premises fenced off by the force of the Department.

Horatio D. Mould was directed to make repairs at once to the bulkhead lying westerly of Pier, old 53, East river, and pending such repairs the premises to be fenced off.

The Municipal Civil Service Commission was requested to furnish a list of persons eligible for appointment to the position of Boatman in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Writ of certiorari and petition in the matter of the application of Thomas Brady, Relator, who was discharged from the Department, were referred to the Corporation Counsel.

The Engineer-in-Chief was directed to proceed with the construction of the bulkhead or river wall extending from a point about opposite the middle of the block between Carlisle and Albany streets, on the North river, northerly to a point about 40 feet southerly of the northerly line of Cedar street, extended, a distance of about 346 feet more or less, to be hereafter determined by the Commissioner of Docks, in accordance with the new plan for the improvement of the water front, as adopted by the Commissioner of Docks, November 25, 1902, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, December 3, 1902, and to proceed with the construction of said bulkhead or river wall and other improvements, and the removal of old structures, including Piers, old 12, 13 and 14, North river, together with the sheds thereon, and to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for the building of new piers in front of said bulkhead wall, and that all work hereby ordered except the construction of new pier or piers, and dredging, be performed otherwise than by contract as provided by section 821 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, and that it be performed by the force of the Department by days' work.

The Secretary reported that the net proceeds of auction sale of old material on December 9, 1902, amounted to \$380.93.

The Superintendent of Docks was directed to furnish a statement of the places where street cleaning is done around the water front, with approximate area to be cleaned, the number of men and the number of carts employed.

The Erie Railroad Company was directed to remove the barge from bulkhead between Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets, North river, on or before the 6th instant.

List of applications, verbal and written, for leases of wharf property in the Chelsea section were ordered to be transmitted to the Secretary to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in accordance with his request.

M. J. Tracy was directed to remove the canalboat "William H. Doran," sunk south of West One Hundred and Fifty-eighth Street Pier, and the Hughes Transportation Company were directed to remove the canalboat "Hub," sunk about 500 feet from the West One Hundred and Fifty-eighth Street Pier.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan was requested to cause to be transferred to the custody of this Department certain water-front maps now in charge of the Department of Highways, for which said Department probably has no use.

Engineer-in-Chief reported that the following work had been done under Bureau orders:

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for the Week Ending Saturday, December 20, 1902.

The following communications were received and ordered on file, action being taken thereon as stated, to wit:

From the Mayor, requesting a resume of the work of the Department for the year 1902, to be used in preparation of annual message to the Board of Aldermen. Secretary directed to furnish.

From the Corporation Counsel—

First—Approving form of blank application to be signed by owners of private property for the work of repairing, construction and rebuilding.

Second—Approving form of lease of bulkhead between Piers, new 18 and 19, North river, and assignment of lease of Pier, new 59, North river.

Third—Stating that section 1560 of the Greater New York Charter forbidding the employment of pensioners from other City Departments has been declared unconstitutional.

Fourth—Stating that the Department is at liberty to remove the dumping board on Pier, new 12, North river, as soon as the original stay has expired.

Fifth—Transmitting certified copy of order taxing bill of costs in condemnation proceedings between Twentieth and Twenty-first streets, North river.

From the Comptroller—

First—Transmitting claim filed by Smith & Loughlin for erection of iron railing at recreation ground foot of East Seventeenth street, and requesting information relative thereto. Secretary directed to furnish.

Second—Suggesting that in future before expenses of such an unusual character as an official visit to Europe are incurred it would be well to submit the matter to the Comptroller.

Third—Recommending that payment be withheld on contract for repairing Pier at South Fifth street, Borough of Brooklyn, until pavement has been satisfactorily restored. Contractor notified to relay the pavement.

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, requesting a list of salt water pipe privileges. Engineer-in-Chief directed to furnish.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—

First—Stating that George F. Pollard, of No. 159 Madison avenue, successfully passed the non-competitive examination for Lumber Inspector. Said Pollard was appointed provisionally to fill a vacancy, the appointment to continue for a period not more than ten days after notice to the Department that an eligible list for such position has been prepared, and in no case for a longer period than two months, at the rate of sixty cents per hour while employed.

Second—Stating that James M. Gaffney cannot be reinstated in the Department, and that no reinstatement can be made after the expiration of one year from the date of leaving the service.

Third—Stating that a competitive examination for the position of Lumber Inspector will be held January 16, 1903.

From the Commissioner of Bridges, requesting to be advised as to the practice of the Department in regard to pay of Inspectors of Masonry and Steel Construction. Engineer-in-Chief directed to furnish.

From the Department of Street Cleaning, requesting repairs to pavement at entrance to dump foot of Clinton street, East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order.

From the Department of Parks, Borough of Manhattan, requesting that the Department construct a timber foundation for the sea wall to be built at the foot of East Eighty-sixth street, agreeing to pay the cost thereof. Engineer-in-Chief directed to proceed with the work and to report the cost for collection from the Department of Parks.

From the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, requesting dredging in Cromwell's Creek. Notified the Commissioner of Parks in accordance with the report of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From the Department of Taxes and Assessments, transmitting assessed valuations of water-front property between Gansevoort and West Eighteenth streets, North river.

From the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in reference to removal of pipes from the Pier foot of East Twentieth street. Engineer-in-Chief directed to submit a map showing available places on the water front as storage places for water pipes.

From the President of the Borough of Richmond, transmitting communication from the United States Geological Survey requesting information respecting borings in the vicinity of New York. Notified that there are no records of any borings in the Borough of Richmond.

From H. W. Putnam and others, in reference to the removal of the dock of the Midland Railway Terminal Company at the foot of Red lane, Borough of Richmond. Notified said parties that in the opinion of the Department it is a matter for adjudication by the Courts or action by the Attorney-General.

From Isaac G. Johnson & Company, requesting the removal of sunken canal-boat at Spuyten Duyvil creek. Engineer-in-Chief directed to remove.

From John B. McDonald, in reference to rental of Pier at Lenox avenue and One Hundred and Fiftyth street, Harlem river. Rental fixed at \$208.37 per annum.

From Ocean Steamship Company of Savannah, requesting the Department to extend Pier, new 35, North river, to the new pierhead line and that a lease of said Pier as extended be granted, with the privilege of erecting a shed on said extension for a term of ten years from May 1, 1903.

The Commissioner thereupon issued the following order:

By virtue of the power and authority vested in me by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, as Commissioner of Docks I hereby agree to lease, assign and to farm let unto the Ocean Steamship Company of Savannah all and singular the wharfage and cranes which may arise, accrue and become due, in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, or Pier, new 35, North river, together with the right to use the shed on said Pier, as extended to the pierhead line, for a term of ten years from May 1, 1903, at a rental of forty-seven thousand seven hundred and five dollars and four cents (\$47,705.04); the Department to at once commence the work of extending said Pier and push the work to completion as rapidly as possible; the Company to pay rent at the present rate until such time as the extension is completed and ready for occupancy, when it shall pay an additional rental at the rate of two thousand nine hundred and forty-six dollars (\$2,946) per annum from the date of completion of extension until May 1, when new lease goes into effect.

The lessee to have the right to erect a shed on said extension when completed, the said shed on said extension to revert to and become the property of The City of New York upon the expiration or sooner termination of the new lease.

The lessee to do all dredging whenever so directed by the Commissioner of Docks, and to agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions as at present embodied in leases of wharf property now used in this Department, a copy of which may be seen at the office of the Secretary; it being understood and agreed that this agreement to lease shall be of no force or effect unless the terms hereof are approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

From Morris & Fay, attorneys for Martin H. Healey, requesting to be advised when the rental of dumping board on the West Thirtieth Street Pier will commence. Notified that rental will not commence until the lease is approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

From the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey in relation to rentals of Piers, old 12, 13 and 14, North river, together with the bulkheads between. Secretary directed to reply.

From the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, requesting the privilege to place two clusters of three piles each on the outer end of Pier, new 41, North river. Application denied unless the consent of the French Line is obtained.

From the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line, requesting permission to erect a pile platform southerly of Pier 11, East river, and to erect a shed on said platform and also on the pier. The Commissioner, on December 16, 1902, adopted the following order:

"By virtue of the power and authority vested in me by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, as Commissioner of Docks, I hereby agree to lease, assign and to farm let to the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line of Maryland all and singular the following described property, to wit: The land under water in the easterly half of the slip between Piers 10 and 11, East river, extending from the present bulkhead out to the new bulkhead line adopted by the Board of Docks November 3, 1899, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund December 6, 1899, for a term of ten years from February 1, 1903, with privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years, the rental for the first term to be at the rate of 25 cents per square foot per annum, and the rental for the renewal term to be at the rate of 26 cents per square foot per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of this Department. The lessee to have the privilege of erecting and maintaining upon said land under water a pile platform with shed thereon; said plat-

form and shed to be erected in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Commissioner of Docks. The lease to contain the following terms and conditions:

"First—The lessee to make the necessary repairs and do the necessary painting to structure erected on the premises.

"Second—The lessee to do all necessary dredging whenever so ordered by the Commissioner of Docks.

"Third—The lessee to be responsible for all damage to person or persons on the property.

"Fourth—The lessee to comply with all laws, by-laws and ordinances now in force or hereafter to be made.

"Fifth—For non-payment of rent the City may re-enter and lease cease.

"Sixth—In case the land under water is required for improvement under the New Plan, the lessee shall, when so ordered by the Commissioner of Docks, or his successor, remove any and all structures erected under the provisions of the lease, and shall make no claim or demand for the value of said structures.

"Together with the other terms and conditions at present embodied in the form of lease now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries, the lessee shall also furnish a bond with surety or sureties to be approved by the Commissioner of Docks, in the penal sum of double the annual rent for the faithful performance of the covenants and conditions of the lease. It is understood that this agreement shall be of no force or effect unless the terms thereof are accepted within ten days by the lessee or their authorized representatives, who shall also agree to execute a lease, the form of which may be seen at the office of the Secretary of the Department of Docks and Ferries, Pier 'A,' Battery place, and this agreement shall also be null and void unless the same shall be approved by resolution in writing passed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

"Permission be and hereby is granted the owners of Pier 11, East river, to erect a shed on said pier in accordance with the rules and regulations in such cases made and provided, and in conformity with plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by the Commissioner of Docks, all the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of the Department of Docks and Ferries. It being understood that this permit shall be of no force or effect unless the said owners or their authorized representatives shall file in this Department a written agreement, to be approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel, that in the event that the Commissioner of Docks shall decide that said pier is needed for the improvement of the water front, that then and in such case no additional item of value shall be claimed or allowed by reason of the erection of a shed on said pier and that no additional item of value shall be claimed or allowed beyond the value of the pier if no shed had been erected thereon, in any proceedings being instituted for the acquisition of said property either by purchase or condemnation."

From the Saugerties and New York Steamboat Company, requesting a release from rental, during the winter season, in consideration of their vacating the berth at Pier, new 43, North river. Application denied.

From Brockway Brick Company, in reference to complaint of Dockmaster of their refusing to vacate berth at West Thirty-fifth street.

From L. Boyer's Sons, in relation to rental charged for use of one-half of Pier foot of South Fifth street, Borough of Brooklyn. Notified that the rental to be paid has been fixed at \$1,200 per annum.

From W. J. Pollock, stating that he desires a hearing before the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in relation to his offers for improvement of water front in the Chelsea Section.

From Empire City Subway Company, requesting permission to build, for the accommodation of the New York Telephone Company, a subsidiary connection from the northeast corner of Broome and East streets to Pier 57, East river. Notified that a permit will be granted provided they agree to pay rental at \$300 per annum.

From the American Manufacturing Company, requesting to be advised if it is necessary to obtain permit for the erection of a one-story iron shed between Noble and Milton streets, Borough of Brooklyn. Notified that permit must be obtained, together with proof of ownership of property, and that the work must cease until permit is issued.

From Slawson & Hobbs, requesting information as to ownership of property between Two Hundred and Third and Two Hundred and Tenth streets, Harlem river. Secretary directed to furnish.

From Folsom Brothers, accepting appointment as appraisers of property between Forty-second and Forty-third streets, North river.

From the Erie Railroad Company, stating that the barge at bulkhead between Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets, North river, would be removed at once.

From the Hoboken Ferry Company, protesting against the news-stand in front of Barclay street ferry-house. Notified that the stand has been removed.

From the Charity Organization Society, stating that the old material has been all removed from Pier, old 54, East river.

From the West End Association, requesting information relative to proposed lease of bulkhead between Seventy-eighth and Seventy-ninth streets, North river. Secretary directed to furnish.

From New York and Cuba Mail Steamship Company, requesting a lease of one or both of the piers to be constructed at the foot of Peck Slip, East river. Application denied.

From C. D. Jackson, requesting permission to extend certain enclosures of shed between One Hundred and Fifth and One Hundred and Sixth streets, Harlem river. Application denied.

From Benjamin Brown, in reference to ferry facilities to the Borough of Richmond.

From Simmons & Harris, attorneys for the Independent Wholesale Fish Dealers' Association, transmitting list of members.

From the Tartar Chemical Company, requesting permission to amend plan for the construction of drying shed on south side of Seventh street, Borough of Brooklyn. Application granted.

From Henry Taylor, in reference to the construction of platform on the southerly side of Pier 11, East river.

The work of delivering Portland cement under Contract No. 743 was completed December 12, 1902.

Forms of contracts Nos. 762, 763 and 764 were approved by the Corporation Counsel.

Plans, specifications and forms of contract for extending Pier foot of Canal street, North river, and for dredging in the East and Harlem rivers, were approved, subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form, and the Secretary directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of contract printed and the proper advertisement inviting estimates inserted in the newspapers designated by law.

The following claims were ordered to be collected:

Department of Street Cleaning—

First—Cost of constructing ramp to connect inner dumping board on Canal Street Pier, \$3,641.87.

Second—Cost of removal and repairs to dumping board on Canal Street Pier, \$1,178.72.

Third—Strengthening platform on the westerly side of Riker's Island, \$932.90.

General Tunnel Engineering Company, driving piles for tunnel and outlet pipes between Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth streets, East river, \$8,265.06.

The resignation of Alfred J. Fairbrother, Painter, was accepted, to take effect immediately.

The Municipal Civil Service Commission were requested to submit a list of persons eligible for appointment as Enginemen, to fill two vacancies.

The Engineer-in-Chief reported the refusal of Peter Taylor to report for assignment to duty as Lumber Inspector. Leave of absence was granted said Taylor, without pay, until January 5, 1903.

The application of R. G. Bagley for appointment to the position of Timber or Lumber Inspector was filed and Bagley notified to apply to the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

The wages of John Fitzgerald, Laborer, were fixed at 25 cents per hour while employed.

The Engineer-in-Chief preferred charges of habitual lateness and incompetency against Addison Kavanagh, Stenographer and Typewriter. Secretary directed to transmit copy of said charges to said Kavanagh, and the latter was ordered to appear before

the Commissioner of Docks on Friday, December 26, 1902, at 12 o'clock noon, at which time he would be afforded an opportunity to make an explanation.

Patrick O'Dwyer and Thomas King, Scowmen, were notified to call on the Labor Clerk of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, as requested by said Commission.

The Engineer-in-Chief was directed to repair water pipes at Pier, new 33, East river, and the attention of the Superintendent of Docks was called to the fact that the water is being used by other parties for the purpose of supplying water to steamers.

The following permits were granted, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks:

United Electric Light and Power Company, to erect a pole on the Pier foot of East Twenty-eighth street.

Moquin-Offerman-Heissenbittel Coal Company, to change location of hoisting mast, engine house, etc., between Ninety-fifth and Ninety-sixth streets, North river.

The following permits were granted, the privilege to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, but not longer than May 1, 1903:

Postal Telegraph Cable Company, to place a cable house on new pier to be built at the foot of West Seventy-ninth street and to run a three-inch iron pipe from the present cable house to the new location; a rental to be paid therefor at the rate of \$300 per annum.

O'Brien Bros., to occupy berth for loading stone at the bulkhead foot of West Seventy-ninth street.

Cusick & Ryan, to occupy a space for the storage of sand between Piers 47 and 48, North river.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department:

Merritt-Chapman Derrick and Wrecking Company, to dredge at Stapleton, Staten Island.

Erie Railroad Company, to make temporary changes in baggage room at West Twenty-third street, the new structures to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks.

Department of Health, to repair and enlarge waiting room on Pier foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street.

George Ehret, to replace three broken piles at pumping station foot of East Ninety-third street.

Greenpoint Chemical Company, to dredge and construct bulkhead at Newtown Creek and Greenpoint avenue, Borough of Brooklyn.

Brady Brothers, to repair the Long Dock at Stapleton, Staten Island.

John F. Walsh, James Tregarthen and James A. Tregarthen, to dredge at the Pier foot of East Eighth street.

The Corporation Counsel was requested to advise the Department as to whether the machinery now in the buildings in the Chelsea section is owned by the City at the present time, and stating that some of the machinery could be used in the Department yards, and that the remaining portion of the machinery could be sold at auction, with the buildings, if owned by the City.

The Comptroller was requested to advise as to the significance of the proposed new clause to be inserted in contracts in reference to the lowest bids.

The Auditing Department was directed to prepare at once a list of all men who are on the rolls of the Department and whose names have not appeared on the payrolls since January 1, 1902.

The Tebo Yacht Basin Company were directed to cease work of driving piles between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, Borough of Brooklyn, until a permit had been obtained therefor.

Eureka Cement Company were notified that they might remove the balance of cement delivered under Commissioner's Order No. 21697, and said order was thereupon canceled.

The owners of canal boat "F. B. Morris," which sank at Pier 5, East river, were ordered to remove same.

The owners of canal boat "H. B. Dawson," which sank at the West Ninety-sixth Street Pier, were ordered to remove same.

The Auditor was requested to furnish a list of all contracts entered into by the City in regard to condemnation proceedings or doing new work in which any financial return is made to the City, and of all contracts on which there is no revenue to the City paid directly by the parties to the contract or their assignees; and a statement of all bonds issued for property acquired and work thereon, showing what revenue may be charged against the bonds.

The Commissioner of Docks adopted a new plan for the improvement of the water front in the vicinity of South street, St. George, Borough of Richmond, which was ordered sent to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their approval, a technical description of which follows:

"Beginning at a point in the bulkhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1889, where the westerly line of the area proposed for ferry structures adopted by the Commissioner of Docks October 22, 1902, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund November 5, 1902, intersects the same; running thence westerly along said bulkhead line to a point distant 857 feet westerly from the centre line of South street; thence northwesterly about 535 feet more or less, to a point in the pierhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1889, distant 884 feet from the westerly line of the area proposed for ferry structures adopted by the Commissioner of Docks October 22, 1902, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund November 5, 1902; thence easterly along said pierhead line 884 feet, more or less, to said westerly line adopted by the Commissioner of Docks October 22, 1902, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund November 5, 1902; thence southerly and along said westerly line (said westerly line being 400 feet westerly from and parallel with the northerly extension of the centre line of South street) 558 feet, more or less, to the point or place of beginning; all as shown on a map submitted herewith in duplicate."

The following permits were revoked:

John J. O'Hare, for ice bridge south of Third street, East river.

Carroll Box and Lumber Company, to lay tracks on Pier foot of East Eighteenth street.

John P. Kane Company, to use and occupy bulkhead and uplands between Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh streets, North river.

ART COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting Held at Its Office, Room 21, City Hall, on Tuesday, January 13, 1903, at 4 o'clock p. m.

Present—President Warner (presiding), the Mayor, Commissioners Dielman, Healy, Marshall, Rhinelander, Farragut and Proctor.

Minutes of meeting of December 23 were approved.

A communication, dated January 12, was presented from the Mayor announcing the appointment of A. Phimister Proctor as Sculptor member of the Commission to succeed Daniel C. French, and of Loyall Farragut as a lay member of the Commission to succeed Samuel P. Avery, each appointment being for a three-year period and to expire December 31, 1905.

Communications were presented from Commissioners Bigelow and Coombs expressing regret that it was impossible for them to attend; their absence was excused.

On motion, the Commission referred nominations for officers for the year 1903 to a committee of three to be appointed by the Chair. Commissioners Rhinelander, Marshall and Proctor were named. After brief consultation the committee reported through Commissioner Rhinelander, Chairman, nominating the present officers for the year 1903.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot for the persons nominated, which being done, the following officers were considered duly elected: John DeWitt Warner, President; Frederick Dielman, Vice-President; A. Augustus Healy, Secretary.

The President reported the appointment of the following committees on matters submitted to the Commission since the last meeting, December 23:

Submission No. 81. Arsenal Public Comfort Station, Central Park—Commissioners Marshall, Chairman; Dielman and Rhinelander. Appointed December 23, 1902.

Submission No. 82. Hicks Street Public Bath, Brooklyn—Commissioners Marshall, Chairman; Healy and Warner. Appointed January 9, 1903.

Submission No. 83. Eastchester Bay Bridge—Commissioners Rhinelander, Chairman; Marshall and Dielman. Appointed January 12, 1903.

Submission No. 76. Hall of Records Sculptures—Commissioners Proctor, Chairman; Healy and Dielman. Appointed January 12, 1903.

Submission No. 80. The Committee on Williamsburg Bridge Decorations, reported through Commissioner Marshall, Chairman, upon designs submitted by Hon. Gustav Lindenthal, Commissioner of Bridges, as follows:

"The propositions submitted to the Commission as stated on the memorandum sent with the drawings are seven (7) in number, and are considered in this report in two groups.

"Your Committee advise the Commission to approve the following:

"C. Enlargement and embellishment of balconies flanking the towers at roadway level.

"D. The building of four (4) public comforts on granite anchorages.

"E. The construction of four (4) small bridges leading to public comforts from pedestrian paths.

"F. The application of bronze tablet at the entrance of the stiffening truss.

"G. The substitution of a more elaborate railing over the anchorages only.

"In relation to

"A. The housing of cables and

"B. Alternate designs for architectural embellishment of tops of towers, after careful consideration your Committee advise the Commission to disapprove these in order to avoid complications; as in its opinion the Commission is not in a position to act intelligently upon the data now in its possession, and as such additional designs as seem required could not be prepared within 60 days from date of the submission.

"In the opinion of your Committee the proposed changes to the tops of the towers involve aesthetic considerations, so unusual in character and of such importance, that no adequate judgment can be made from the drawings presented; and your Committee urges the Commission to call either (1) for a scale model of the whole bridge in which one set of towers shall be shown without and the other with the proposed embellishments, or (2) preferably, for the building upon one of the towers, in inexpensive material, a full size model of the proposed embellishments, so that the effect of the proposed changes may be judged *in situ*.

The report was received and ordered placed on file.

On motion, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Certificate No. 82.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and location for decorations of the Williamsburg Bridge, represented by Exhibits "58A," "58B," "58C," "58D," "58E" and "58H" of record in this matter, so far as they relate to the balconies, flanking of towers at roadway level, four public comforts upon the anchorages, four small bridges leading to public comforts from pedestrian paths, bronze tablets upon the stiffening trusses at each anchorage and railings at anchorage piers; and that the action of the Commission be certified with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted to Hon. Gustav Lindenthal, Commissioner of Bridges.

Certificate No. 83.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby disapproves the designs represented by Exhibits "58A," "58B," "58F," "58G," "58I," "58J" and "58K," of record in this matter, so far as they relate to housing of cable saddles and embellishment of tops of towers, and that the action of the Commission be certified with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted to Hon. Gustav Lindenthal, Commissioner of Bridges.

On motion, the Secretary was requested to call the attention of Commissioner Lindenthal to the fact that no design for the inscription upon the bronze tablet noted in Exhibit "58D" had been submitted to the Commission, and to suggest that an early submission would facilitate prompt action.

On motion, the Commission voted that Commissioner Lindenthal be requested to furnish with his next submission a scale model of one of the pairs of towers, with the proposed embellishments shown thereon, and to be prepared to erect a full sized model in place.

The Committee was thereupon discharged.

Submission No. 82.

The Committee on Hicks Street Public Bath (Brooklyn) reported through Commissioner Marshall, Chairman, recommending that the design for an inscription submitted by Axel S. Hedman, architect, be disapproved. The designs for the Hicks Street Public Bath (Brooklyn) were referred to the Commission on request of the Mayor.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Certificate No. 84.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby disapproves the design and location for an inscription upon the facade of the Hicks Street Public Bath (Brooklyn), represented by Exhibit "40 J" of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified with return of duplicate of Exhibit herein noted to Axel S. Hedman, architect, who made the submission, and to Hon. J. Edward Swannstrom, President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to inform President Swannstrom and Architect Hedman that the Commission does not object to the placing of the architect's name upon a building, provided a suitable location is designated; and that the disapproval of the above submission was of the location rather than the inscription itself.

The Committee was thereupon discharged.

The Committee on Mural Paintings, Hall of Records, reported, through Commissioner Dielman, Chairman, upon the following communications received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

"January 16, 1903.

"Mr. MILO R. MALTBY, Secretary, Art Commission, City Hall, City of New York: "Dear Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held January 9, 1903, the Secretary presented a communication from the President of the Borough of Manhattan requesting that some steps should be taken to provide for mural paintings in the Hall of Records, and the matter was referred to the Art Commission for report.

"I transmit herewith copy of the communication above referred to.

"J. W. STEVENSON, Deputy Comptroller."

"January 8, 1903.

"Hon. SETH LOW, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

"Dear Sir—Now that the Hall of Records is approaching completion, I believe that in the interests of art and education, steps should be promptly taken to provide for mural paintings in that beautiful architectural structure, with designs representing important historical events, either national or municipal, as may be deemed most appropriate. The paintings now in the Courthouse of the Appellate Division are a source of gratification to all who visit that building, and it is really the only public building in the city where this matter has been seriously and instructively treated.

"With a view of developing the artistic sentiments of our people, I believe it would be eminently proper to have this new building not only attractive architecturally, but that its interior should be decorated with reproductions of these events in such a manner as to make it one of its conspicuous features.

"I would suggest that this matter be referred to the Municipal Art Commission and it be requested to confer with the Fine Arts Federation, so that it will be thoroughly considered by persons possessing high professional and artistic attainments, and that the Art Commission report to this Board its recommendations as to the particular events which in their opinion should be so reproduced, together with an estimate of the money necessary to accomplish the work.

"Very truly yours,

(Signed) "JACOB A. CANTOR, President."

The report submitted by the Committee was as follows:

"In reporting upon the reference to the Art Commission by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the matters covered by President Cantor's letter of January 8, 1903, transmitted therewith, your committee note:

"In April last the Board of Estimate and Apportionment referred to this Commission the memorial of the Municipal Art Society, requesting that an appropriation of \$50,000 for the then current year be made, to procure works of art for beautifying public buildings, grounds and parks; and recommending that \$25,000 thereof be expended for a series of mural paintings for the new Hall of Records. This Commission—as appears from its minutes of April 1, 1902—approved such request; but suggested that, in the case of the new Hall of Records, the selection of subjects for historical pictures should be made only after a complete and harmonious scheme of decoration, to which individual paintings should conform, had been elaborated. Further, while not attempting to construe the law or anticipating its duties, this Commission then expressed its belief that, should adequate appropriation be made, it would be practicable for the Commission to select under the law the works of art provided for.

"Your committee, therefore, assumes the present reference to have been made in view of such former action, and to call for report in accord with the two-fold recommendation of President Cantor's letter, transmitted as a part of such reference; that is that this Commission should act upon each branch of such letter, viz.:

"First—The suggestion of a general plan of decoration, as to which it asks that the Fine Arts Federation be conferred with; and

"Second—Report by this Commission of the particular events which, in its opinion, should be made the subjects of mural painting—with estimate of the necessary cost thereof.

"Not forgetting the limited scope within which this Commission has jurisdiction; but believing that, within such scope, it should invite the confidence of City officials and departments by the utmost helpfulness possible, your committee recommends that communications be made as follows:

"First—To the Fine Arts Federation—Forwarding it copies of the resolution of reference by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under which we are acting, and of the letter of President Cantor, referred to therein, noting that, while this Commission, since it must finally act thereon, does not feel it should otherwise co-operate in devising a plan of decoration, it takes pleasure, in accord with the suggestion of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in asking that the Fine Arts Federation submit for the approval of this Commission such plan or plans as it may recommend for decoration of the Hall of Records by mural paintings.

"Second—To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Acknowledging the reference in question; reporting progress, with copy of our letter, to the Fine Arts Federation; and further advising the Board of Estimate and Apportionment—

"(1) That, upon submission of plans by the Federation, this Commission will promptly act thereon, and report such action to the Board, together with such estimates of cost as it may secure;

"(2) That, upon any appropriation therefor permitting selection under the act of 1900, it will promptly make selection as thereby permitted; and

"(3) That, under its general powers, it will promptly act in approval or disapproval of such proposed paintings or other items as may be submitted to it for approval.

"All of which is respectfully submitted."

This report was received and ordered placed on file.

On motion the report was unanimously adopted, and the Assistant Secretary directed to communicate to the Fine Arts Federation and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the action taken.

Submission 83.

The Committee on Eastchester Bay Bridge reported, through Commissioner Marshall, recommending the approval of the designs submitted by Hon. Gustav Lindenthal, Commissioner of Bridges. After discussion the designs were referred back to the Committee for further consideration and report.

Minutes of meeting of the 20th instant read and on motion approved.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the resignation of Mr. Francis C. Moore from membership in this Board of Examiners, after a service of over eight years thereon as the representative of the New York Board of Fire Underwriters, is deemed a civic loss by his fellow members. His recognized standing among underwriters as the leading authority on fire insurance subjects was fully maintained during his term of membership in this Board; and, from a broader standpoint even than that of the great business interests which he so ably represented, his influence and vote were always for justice and liberality in determining questions submitted to the Board. Never narrow-minded, wise and generous within the restrictions imposed by the laws and ordinances under which the appeal cases had to be decided, with an intimate and extended knowledge of building construction both in practice and in theory, earnest and painstaking in every duty imposed on him, his fellow members hereby record their appreciation of the faithful and able services rendered by Mr. Moore and their regret that in consequence of his retirement from the insurance business his connection has been severed with this Board of Examiners.

The Clerk was directed to forward a copy of this resolution to Mr. Moore, also to the New York Board of Fire Underwriters.

Appeal 10 of 1903. Alterations 89 of 1903. No. 737 Broadway, Manhattan; Charles Volz, architect and appellant.

The building is constructed fireproof with iron beams and columns and terra cotta floor arches, with the exception of present elevator and stair inclosures, which are wooden partitions.

The building above first story is and will be used almost exclusively for light storage; on two or three floors a few persons only are or will be employed.

The interior improvements contemplate the removal of the wooden partitions around elevators and stairs and substituting fireproof inclosures of terra cotta blocks and angle iron frame. The openings in these inclosures to be provided with self-closing fireproof doors, jambs and wire glass.

It is intended to remove the rear staircase and substitute in its stead on both fronts outside stairs of iron, with regular treads and risers.

The reason for this change is that the building is and will be rented each floor separately, and the tenants have continuously blocked up the rear stairs with their goods and boxes, making the stairs absolutely useless as a means of egress.

By providing the above mentioned outside stairs and inclosing the inner front stairs and both elevators with fireproof material and self-closing doors, far greater and safer means of egress will be provided, and of such character that blocking and obstructing will be impossible.

Mr. Charles Volz appeared before the Board.

On motion, denied.

Appeal 11 of 1903. New Building 13 of 1903, north side One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, about 202 feet from Locust Avenue, The Bronx; New York and College Point Ferry Company, appellants.

Permit is desired to build an iron-clad frame building, to be used as a ferry house.

Mr. L. C. L. Smith appeared before the Board.

On motion, laid over.

Appeal 12 of 1903. New Building 1 of 1903, south side of Driggs Avenue, near Morgan Avenue, Brooklyn; Switzer & Walker, appellants.

The front wall on the second and third floors contains over 30 per cent. of openings, in violation of section 28 of Building Code, for 12-inch walls.

Your petitioner requests permission to build same of brick 12 inches thick and laid in cement mortar mixed in proportion to suit Bureau of Buildings in this borough.

On motion, approved.

Appeal 13 of 1903. New Building 67 of 1903, south side Meeker Avenue, about 106 feet 4½ inches from Morgan Avenue, Brooklyn; Philip Bierschenk, appellant.

That the front wall as drawn and filed in the Department of Buildings in this borough contains over 30 per cent. and not over 45 per cent. of openings, as per section 28 of the Code. Your petitioner requests that he be allowed to construct said front wall 12 inches thick, as drawn and filed, but that the bricks in said wall be laid in cement mortar, mixed in proportions to suit said Bureau of Buildings.

Mr. F. S. Lowe appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved on condition that the front brick are laid in regular courses, not clipped courses.

Appeal 14 of 1903. New Building 73 of 1903, south side Driggs Avenue, about 100 feet from Morgan Avenue, Brooklyn; Philip Bierschenk, appellant.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate or the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
