### WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU

During the Quarter Ending March 31, 1903.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health; with the execution of the orders of the Board; with the care of contagious diseases; with the inspection of foods and offensive trades; with the inspection of mercantile establishments and issuance of employment certificates; with the pathological, bacteriological and chemical research and investigations, and with the inspection of scholars attending the public, parochial and private schools:

The number of inspections and reinspections made was 338,731, classified as follows:

By the Division of Inspection.....	232,652
By the Division of Contagious Diseases.....	160,577
By the Division of Bacteriology.....	5,502

The number of complaints returned was 9,490, classified as follows:

By the Division of Inspection.....	8,888

The number of complaints received from citizens was 5,919, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instructions and authority of the Board, granted 707 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, and 3,094 miscellaneous permits, under the Sanitary Code.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the quarter ending March 31 the number of notices issued by the Board was 3,978. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violation of the Sanitary Code and Health Laws in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repairs, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 1172, chapter 466, Laws of 1901.

Petition to open Ralph avenue, between Remsen avenue and Avenue N.

There is no record of the street having been legally opened.

The following opinion from the Corporation Counsel:

Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, June 9, 1903.

Hon. WILLIAM C. REDFIELD, Commissioner of Public Works, Borough Hall, Brooklyn, N. Y.:

Sir—I am in receipt of your communication, dated May 11, 1903, referring to an application for the opening of Sheridan avenue, over the tracks of the Long Island



Railroad Company on Atlantic avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and requesting advice as to the correct procedure in the matter in order that the opening may be authorized and the relief desired granted to the property owners.

Section 61 of the general Railroad Law, adopted May 22, 1897, provides as follows:

"When a new street, avenue or highway, or any portion of a street, avenue or highway shall hereafter be constructed across a steam surface railroad, such street, avenue or highway shall pass over or under such railroad or at grade, as the Board of Railroad Commissioners shall direct. Notice of intention to lay out such street, avenue or highway, or new portion of a street, avenue or highway across a steam surface railroad shall be given to such railroad company by the municipal corporation at least fifteen days prior to the making of the order laying out such street, avenue or highway, by service personally on the president or vice-president of the railroad corporation, or any general officer thereof. Such notice shall designate the time and place and when and where a hearing will be given to such railroad company, and such railroad company shall have the right to be heard before the authorities of such municipal corporation upon the question of the necessity of such street, avenue or highway.

"If the municipal corporation determine such street, avenue or highway to be necessary it shall then apply to the Board of Railroad Commissioners before any further proceedings are taken to determine whether such street, avenue or highway shall pass over or under such railroad, or at grade, whereupon the said Board of Railroad Commissioners shall appoint a time and place for hearing such application and shall give such notice thereof as they judge reasonable, not, however, less than ten days, to a railroad company whose railroad is to be crossed by such new street, avenue or highway, to the municipal corporation and to the owners of land adjoining the railroad and that part of the street, avenue or highway to be opened or extended. The said Board of Railroad Commissioners shall determine whether such street, avenue or highway or new portion of a street, avenue or highway shall be constructed over or under such railroad or at grade; and if said Board determine that such street, avenue or highway shall be carried across such railroad above grade, then said Board shall determine the height, the length and the material of the bridge or structure by means of which said street, avenue or highway shall be carried across such railroad, and the length, character and grades of the approaches thereto; and if said Board shall determine that such street, avenue or highway shall be constructed or extended below the grade, said Board shall determine the manner and method in which the same shall be carried under, and the grade or grades thereof, and the said Board shall determine that said street, avenue or highway shall be constructed or extended at grade, said Board shall determine the manner and method in which the same shall be carried over the said railroad at grade and what safeguards shall be maintained. The decision of the said Board as to the manner and method of carrying such new street, avenue or highway, or new portion of a street, avenue or highway across such railroad shall be final, subject, however, to the rights of appeal hereinafter given. The decision of said Board rendered in any proceeding under this section shall be communicated within twenty days after final hearing to all parties to whom notice of the hearing in such proceedings was given or who appeared at such hearing by counsel or in person."

Under the provisions of this act, the railroad company affected is entitled to notice of hearing before the Board which determines whether it is necessary to open the street or highway and cause the crossing to be established over the said railroad. I think it would be a sufficient compliance with this act if a notice of the hearing before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall be actually served upon the president, vice-president or any general officer of the railroad company affected, at least fifteen days prior to the date set for the hearing of the application. I do not think such notice is required to be given of the hearing before the Local Board recommending the initiating of the proceeding.

If the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, after giving the notice required by this act and after hearing parties interested, shall determine that the opening of the street or highway across the railroad is necessary, it should adopt a resolution to that effect, and should then apply to the Board of Railroad Commissioners before any proceedings are taken, for their determination as to the character of the crossings and the nature of the grades leading thereto, on each side of the railroad. The language of the act is plain, and I have incorporated the whole of section 61 affecting proceedings in this matter, in order that you may have the provisions of the act before you as a guide.

The Chief Engineer of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, reports to me as follows:

I respectfully report that the drainage district plan of this vicinity does not call for receiving basins at the southerly corners of this intersection, nor are same necessary, from the fact that surface waters could be conveyed southerly to Sherman street, which has considerable descent from this intersection. Due to the recent paving of Reeve place it has been ascertained that basins will be required at the northeast and northwest corners of this intersection. I therefore give estimate of cost for the same, which is \$400, stating that the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$55,300.

Although I have given this estimate of cost, attention is drawn to the fact that all the basins in the Windsor terrace section of the borough are bulkheaded, to prevent the surcharging of sewers there, until the main sewer in East Fifth street is authorized. WILLIAM C. REDFIELD, Esq., Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Brooklyn:

Dear Sir—I return you herewith profile of Vanderbilt street, between Coney Island avenue and Prospect avenue. You will notice that there is about a foot difference in the elevation of the north and south curb lines. If the contention of some of the property owners is true, that the street must be graded to the established grade, the curb would have to be set according to the dotted lines in blue for the north side and according to the yellow line for the south side, which would be constructively impossible, although not physically so.

The profile also shows in red the grade of the street as contended for by this Department. You will notice by this that the water flows from Sherman street easterly toward Coney Island avenue and westerly toward Prospect avenue, thus draining the water entirely from this portion of the street. As far as the drainage is concerned, there is no reason why this condition should not be reversed, that is, the water flow

from Coney Island and Prospect avenues toward Sherman street, as in that way the pavement could be laid approximately to the present surface of the ground. This assumes that sewer basins would be constructed at Sherman street, and that the sewer already in the street would be sufficient to carry off the storm water. Should these two conditions exist, there is no reason why this change in grade should not be made, otherwise it is absolutely necessary to have the grade as shown by the red lines.

"The alteration of the grade is, no doubt, an advisable one, due to the many buildings which now exist upon this street. Dear Sir—Some time ago Mr. Lewis, Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, suggested the advisability of a new street system for that portion of the borough between Coney Island avenue and Church avenue, Ocean parkway and Fort Hamilton avenue, and I send you herewith a plan for the streets in this section.

While the proposed changes do not conform to the streets as laid down on the City map, it is practically an unimportant position of the borough, where local conditions must be met, and where I do not think it would be advisable to produce the streets as laid down on the City map at present, as the property is considerably built upon, and larger damage would be caused than I think the property could stand.

Map and technical description for the proposed changes are herewith sent.

Map A shows the streets as existing, the streets as laid down on the City map, the proposed plan and all of the improvements now on the ground.

Map B shows simply the proposed plan for this section.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
