The Secretary presented the following communication from the Comptroller relative to the adoption by this Board of a definite policy in relation to the future disposition of claims under section 246 of the Charter; also communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx on said subject:

(The above communication from the Comptroller has been laid over at various meetings of the Board since December 7, 1911.)

City of New York, Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office, December

4. 1911.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sirs—Section 246 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, has recently been construed by the Court of Appeals in the case of People ex rel. Dady vs. Prendergast. This section, as construed by the Court of Appeals, places in your Board a broad power, in its discretion, to inquire into, hear and determine any claim against the City which the Comptroller may certify in writing to your Board, as an illegal or invalid claim against the City, but which, notwithstanding, in his judgment, it is equitable and proper for the City to pay, in whole or in part, and upon such inquiry, to determine, by unanimous vote, that the City has received a benefit and is justly and equitably obligated to pay such claim, and thereupon to authorize the Comptroller to pay the claim in such amount as your Board may determine to be just, provided the claimant shall fully release the City upon any such payment, in such form as shall be approved by the Corporation Counsel. The section does not authorize the audit or payment of any claim barred by the Statute of Limitations, nor any claim for services performed under an appointment in violation of any provisions of the Civil Service Law.

Pending the decision mentioned, a large number of illegal or invalid claims, upon which relief has been asked under such section, have been held in abeyance,

but must now be disposed of.

It seems to me wise, before certifying more of these claims to your Board for consideration, that a definite policy should be adopted as to the manner in which such claims shall be disposed of

Such claims may be divided into three general classes. These classes are as

First—Those for work, labor and services, or materials, done and performed or furnished to the City, but done and performed or furnished in violation of the statutes in such cases made and provided.

Second-Services rendered by employees of the City not in violation of any provision of the Civil Service Law, but for which the City is not legally liable, such as a case where an employee has been regularly appointed from a Civil Service list, but where the compensation of such employee has never been fixed pursuant to section 56 of the Charter.

Third—Cases where property has been purchased by the City and old property, such as an automobile, taken in exchange as part payment. This practice, while not authorized by law, obviously has its advantages from a business standpoint.

As to the first class of cases, I do not believe that the claimant should be paid in full and have the same advantage as others doing business with the City who have seen that all provisions of law in connection with their claim and the letting of the work upon which it is based have been complied with. In other words, I believe that a failure to observe the provisions of the statute should be visited by a penalty. It might be said that to pay only the principal of such claims after long delays would penalize the claimant by loss of interest. But the difficulty with that principle would be that different claimants would be penalized in different proportion. I would suggest that as to this class of claims it would be wise for this Board to hold that it would be equitable and proper for the City to pay an amount equal to the outlay of the contractor without profits, but plus interest at 2 per cent. per annum, which is the amount the City earns upon its money on deposit. In other words, a claimant whose claim arose in violation of the provisions of the statute would be penalized by losing his profits, but saved from loss.

As to the second class of cases, I believe that the principal of the claim should

be paid in full, but without interest. As to the third class of cases, it would seem equitable to pay the claimant in full, without interest.

If my views as to the method in which the claims in question should be liquidated meet with the approval of the Board, I would suggest that the Board adopt a resolution expressing such approval, in order that the recommendations of the Comptroller in such matters may represent not merely his views, but the expressed views of your Board as well. There may, of course, arise cases where it would be inequitable, either to the City or to the claimant, to apply the rules I have outlined. The rules, however, are intended for general application, and exceptional cases, should they arise, will receive special consideration and be called to the attention of WM. A. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York: Gentlemen—On February 29, 1912, the resolution presented by the Comptroller approving the policy recommended by him in his report dated December 4, 1911, as the one to be pursued in the adjustment of claims presented to this Board for consideration under section 246 of the Greater New York Charter, was set for consideration on March 7, 1912. To be sure, section 246 provides a safeguard against the ill-considered adjudication of claims against the City by requiring a unanimous vote of the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. But it seems to me that in adopting a uniform rule for the consideration of such claims you should restrict the claims a little more than is suggested by the Comptroller.

The first class of such claims, those for work, labor and services or materials, done and performed or furnished to the City, but done and performed or furnished in violation of the statutes in such cases made and provided, should not be considered unless it appear affirmatively by affidavit of the petitioner and be found as a fact by the Comptroller in his report to the Board that such work was done and such materials furnished without knowledge on the part of the person performing such work or furnishing such material that such act was in violation of the statutes.

The second class, which provides for services rendered by employees of the City not in violation of any provision of the Civil Service Law, etc., should not be considered unless it appear affirmatively by affidavit of the petitioner and be found as a fact by the Comptroller in his report that such services were rendered in good faith and without knowledge on the part of the employee that such employment was in violation of the statutes.

The third class, where property has been purchased by the City, and old property, such as automobiles, taken in exchange as part payment, should not be considered in the future. The Charter forbids such exchange and if it be deemed advisable from a business point of view to make such exchange, the Charter should be amended. Pending cases might be adjusted if the Board thought wise.

No interest should be paid on any of these claims, as the payment of interest, however small, has a tendency to make the claimant less active in the early presen tation of his claim. Yours very truly,

First-In the adjustment of claims for work, labor, services or materials done and performed or furnished to the City but not done and performed or furnished in the manner required to create a legal liability on the part of the City, but nevertheless done or performed in good faith as embraced under the contract, the maximum amount to be paid by the City shall be the actual outlay of the contractor without profit and without interest, and that only in the event that the City has received a benefit and derived an advantage which in money value is equal to such sum,

Second-That in no event shall the amount paid exceed the value of the benefit actually derived by the City from the work, labor and services or materials for which the claim is made.

Third—That in the event that the claimant in any such claim has litigated his claim, then and in all such cases the costs of such litigation, if unpaid, together with an amount which shall be a reasonable allowance to the City for the services of its different officials and employees and for its disbursements in the defense of such litigation, shall be deducted from any sum which would otherwise be paid such claimant under the policy hereby adopted. Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative-The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The Secretary presented a communication from the President of the Borough of Richmond, suggesting (in view of the approaching preparation of the Corporate Stock Budget and the schedules attached thereto) the rescindment of the resolution adopted October 5, 1911, referring to the Committee on Standardization of Salaries and Grades all requests for increases in salaries submitted with the Budgetary estimates for the year 1912, and deferring action on said requests until the Board shall have before it the report of said Committee, to be submitted not later than May 1, 1912, as said resolution would seem to preclude the possibility of necessary changes in salaries paid from funds other than budgetary if it remained in force.

From Dr. Royal S. Copeland, on behalf of the Committee of the Homeopathic Medical Society of the County of New York, opposing the request of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for an issue of \$3,000,000 corporate stock

for improvements to hospitals, etc.;
From the Sheepshead Bay Board of Trade and Improvement Association of Brooklyn, favoring an appropriation for the construction of a bridge over the waters of Sheepshead Bay to Manhattan Beach, as requested by the Department of Bridges; From the President of The Bronx, submitting departmental estimate of corporate stock requirements for the year beginning July 1, 1912, in accordance with resolution adopted December 21, 1911;

From Henry Clay Carrel, architect, commending the proposed improvement of the Manhattan Terminal of the Brooklyn Bridge, and the establishment of a Civic

Brown, 44 Court street, Brooklyn, requesting that action be taken towards putting in operation the 4th Avenue Subway, from 43d street, Brooklyn, to the Borough of Manhattan, that the extension of Flatbush avenue be paved, and that the Manhattan Bridge be thrown open to the public use.

From the West End Association of New York, favoring the proposition of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company for subway construction, and requesting the Board to accept said proposition.

The Secretary presented the following report of the Comptroller, certifying, pursuant to section 246 of the Charter, claim of the Detroit-Cadillac Motor Company in the sum of \$3,960, for automobile and other supplies furnished by the various City Departments:

(On February 8, 15, 21 and 29, 1912, the above report was laid over one week.) City of New York, Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office, November

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen-Under and pursuant to the provisions of section 246 of the Charter, I hereby certify that a claim has been presented by the Detroit-Cadillac Motor Car Company for \$4,292.08, alleged to be due for automobile and other supplies furnished to various City Departments. Four vouchers, each for \$990, were prepared and transmitted to this Department for payment to the Detroit-Cadillac Motor Car Company of the difference of value between four second-hand automobiles, delivered by the City to the claimant Company, and four other new automobiles delivered to the City by that Company. In each case the price allowed for the old machine, together with the cash required for the new machine, exceeded the sum of \$1,000, to which the purchase of supplies without advertisement for bids was limited. The transaction was illegal and invalid, for the reasons that if the head of a Department desired to sell an automobile as old and worn out material he must follow the provisions of section 1533 of the Charter, and sell it at auction, and if he wished to purchase a new car at an expense exceeding \$1,000, without calling for competitive bids, he must obtain the consent by resolution of the Board of Aldermen pursuant to the provisions of section 419 of the Charter. Inasmuch as the amounts allowed for the old machines were equal to and in some cases in excess of their actual value, and the new cars delivered in exchange were fully worth the amounts charged, the City has received a benefit to that extent. In my judgment it is equitable and proper for the City to pay the value for which it has received benefit, and the Detroit-Cadillac Motor Car Company should be paid the sum of \$3,960 in full satisfaction of its claim. In the matter of the application made by the Detroit-Cadillac Motor Car Company for the adjustment by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under section 246 of the Charter, of its claim for \$4,292.08, alleged to be due for automobiles and other supplies furnished to various City Departments.

Hon. WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller: Sir-In a report, dated April 4, 1910, made by me upon this application, in which the facts in the case were fully set forth, it was recommended that the Corporation Counsel be requested to advise you as to whether or not the claim was a proper one for consideration by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under section

246 of the Charter, In reply to a request for such advice, a communication, dated April 18, 1910, has been received from Acting Corporation Counsel G. L. Sterling, in which he stated in part: "The heads of the various Departments and Bureaus referred to in your communication have done what a private individual would do under the circumstances, to wit, exchanged old automobiles for new ones on a basis of cash and exchange value. Such transactions would open the door for fraud and jobbery by the heads of Departments and contractors, and the Legislature, in its wisdom, has rightfully prohibited such transactions (sections 419 and 1553 of the Charter; opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated December 18, 1909), and the claims are 'invalid and illegal.' For the reason stated they are also 'void,' and under the Corporation Counsel's opinion of July 31, 1909, rendered the Mayor of The City of New York, they are not proper to be certified by the Comptroller to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for payment. The claims 'arise out of a contract which is not void simply as ultra vires, but as a forbidden act, and in such case the statute does not apply.' (See opinion.) It does not follow, however, that the City may retain the fruits of the illegal action of its department heads. Inasmuch as the transaction was void the title to the automobiles did not pass to the City. The claimants may replevy the cars and repudiate the agreement for lack of power on the part of the City authorities, and on tendering to the City the fair value of the old cars taken in exchange by the Company, may recover the cars in question. It follows that if the claimants should file with the Comptroller a claim demanding their cars, the Comptroller, under section 149 of the Charter, could settle such claim, and the basis of that settlement might be the amount of money evidenced by the vouchers in question or any less sum. For the reason stated the claim must be rejected as presented and the claimants be advised to take such action as outlined in this communication."

The claimant has failed to avail itself of the remedy suggested by the Acting Corporation Counsel, and the decision recently rendered by the Court of Appeals in the mandamus proceedings brought by Michael J, Dady points out a way for a simpler method of adjusting this claim. In the opinion of the Court it was held:

"It is said that the Legislature has no right by provisious such as those which have been quoted to deprive the City of the benefit of the judgment heretofore rendered in the action at law dismissing plaintiff's claim. It is further urged in substance

Hon. George McAneny, President, Borough of Manhattan:

Dear Sir—I am just in receipt of a communication from Commissioner Thomas in the action at law dismissing plaintiff's claim. It is further urged in substance

that relator's claim is absolutely void because of failure to comply with the statutory provisions with reference to letting and making municipal contracts, and that therefore the Legislature has no right to authorize the City and its officials to disregard these defects in the claim and pay it even if found to be equitable. In a most excellent and well considered opinion in the Appellate Division, Mr. Justice Carr has given the reasons why these views should not prevail. So far as the first one is concerned, he has pointed out that the rule invoked by appellant does not apply to an adjudication dismissing a claim against a municipality for failure to comply with some statutory provisions as distinguished from an adjudication dismissing a claim because of its inherent and substantial invalidity. He has shown, with reference to the second argument, that the attempt to distinguish relator's claim as one which is void rather than invalid and illegal under the statute is not well founded; that the Legislature has ample power in the case of a truly meritorious claim to authorize a municipality or its officers to overlook the failure to comply with statutory provisions relating to the letting of a contract which the Legislature might have refrained from enacting in the first instance; that relator's claim is not unconstitutional and inherently bad, but is affected only by the failure to comply with rules which the Legislature need not have prescribed in the first instance.

There is nothing to be added to the opinion which has thus been summarized."

The decision of the Court of Appeals is therefore adverse to the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, in which he advised you that the claim of the Detroit-Cadillac Motor Car Company was void and not proper to be certified by the Comptroller to

the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for payment.

It is undoubtedly true that the City has received a benefit in this case, and is justly and equitably obligated to pay to the claimant the value which it has received. The items of this claim are as follows:

July 14 Topographical Bureau, Borough of Brooklyn, 1 Cadillac car, Nov. 30 Topographical Bureau, accessories...

July 24 Bird S. Coler, President, Borough of Brooklyn, 1 Cadillac car, \$990 00 car, exchange Oct. 31 Police Department, 1 Cadillac car, exchange..... Plus Nov. 30 Police Department 162 00

In a report by Assistant Engineer James W. Reed, dated February 1, 1910, he stated in reference to these items: "As to the first item, \$990, the Cadillac car mentioned was in exchange for a Pope-Toledo car which has been in use about four years. There is no question but that the difference between the full price of the Cadillac car and the value of the Pope-Toledo at the time of exchange was in excess of, rather than under, \$990. The next item, \$98.10, has been paid by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and should have no place here. The third item, \$990, covers the balance of an exchange of a fully equipped Cadillac car for a Peerless car which had been in use three years. There can be no doubt, in this instance, that the Cadillac car as delivered was worth considerably more than the Peerless car and the \$990 mentioned. Item No. 4, \$990, covers the amount promised in exchange of a Cadillac car, fully equipped, for a second-hand Corbin car which had been in use two or three years. In this case, as in the other abovementioned, the City received full value, and there is no doubt that the \$990 is fairly due the Detroit-Cadillac Motor Car Company. Item No. 5, \$990, covers the balance offered in exchange of a Cadillac car for an Oldsmobile which had been in use for three years. In this case, as in those above, the Cadillac car, as delivered, represented, in my opinion, considerably more than the value of the Oldsmobile and the \$990 claimed. The remaining two items are for equipment, one of which has been paid, and there is no reason, so far as I know, why the claim should not be paid directly by the Police Department."

The estimate of the value received by the City made by Mr. Reed is reasonable and just, and the aggregate of \$3,960 should be paid.

It is, therefore, respectfully recommended that the certificate, prescribed in section 246 of the Charter, as a requisite for consideration of this claim by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, be issued in favor of the Detroit-Cadillac Motor Car Company in the sum of \$3,960. Bellevue and Allied Hospitals requesting, and report of the Comptroller recommending, the modification of salary schedules Nos. 202, 206, 208, 211, 214, supporting the appropriation made in the Budget for the year 1912, for said Department, providing for changes in line items, by placing Waitresses, Seamstresses, etc., at rates of compensation of \$360 per annum, or less, under the item, "Hospital Helpers":

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, Office of the Board of Trustees, 1st Avenue and 26th Street, New York, February 13, 1912.

Hon. Joseph Haag, Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, 277 Broadway. New York City:

Sir-We have received the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 1, denying the request of the Trustees for the modification of the salary schedules for the current year so far as the striking out of line items for individual positions is concerned. In transmitting the request for the amendment of the schedules it was stated:

"Second-To combine the funds allowed for Hospital Helpers, Laundresses, Waitresses, etc., into one sum for each of these classes of employees. The grade of Hospital Helper is established at various grades not exceeding \$600 per annum. All the low paid help could therefore be properly classed as Hospital Helpers, and at one time they were so classified. The Trustees, however, for the past three years have endeavored to segregate the titles according to the duties performed. For the last two years the money appropriated for each of these groups of employees was given in a lump sum. For 1912 it has been appropriated in amounts covering different grades. If the schedules were put into effect, it would entirely prohibit the increasing of wages of low paid Helpers except when a vacancy occurred. For years the Trustees have striven to increase the wages of these employees, and have endeavored to have them begin at a minimum wage of \$20 and \$15 per month for men and women respectively, increasing at the end of six months by \$2.50. A better grade of worker will be obtained when it is generally known that increases will be secured for a definite length of service. This demands elasticity and not limitation of the number which can be appointed at the various grades."

According to the report of the Comptroller attached to the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the above was not considered sufficient reason to grant the request. Under the circumstances, the Trustees have given the subject very careful consideration, and have decided to renew the request and to ask that equal consideration be given the subject by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as the aim of the Trustees to increase the wages of the low paid helpers at regular intervals would otherwise be prevented.

The Trustees fully appreciate that the appropriations upon which the changes have been requested are in the so-called temporary class, in which the amount to be spent each month is not limited to one-twelfth of the appropriation available. Under ordinary circumstances a few increases could be given with such elasticity, but it must be remembered that the total appropriation allowed for the temporary employees in this Department is barely enough to meet the payroll of those regularly employed. As a matter of fact, the amount required for January for employees in this class is in excess of one-twelfth of the total allowance. In effect, therefore, we are limited to twelfths, and the proper supervision demands that the allowance each month should barely exceed that proportion. As a matter of fact, however, the number of changes in the low paid helpers which take place each month, causing vacancies for one or two days at a time, saves just so much on the payroll. These balances, while small on each line number, amount to a good deal in one year when considered as a total, and would probably be sufficient to enable the Trustees to carry out consistently the plan of increasing the wages of these low paid helpers at regular intervals. For example, it is the desire to have ordinary Helpers, Laundrymen, Laundresses, etc., begin at a wage of \$20 and \$15 per month for men and women respectively. In some instances, however, such as in the case of Shirtwaist Ironers and Waitresses, the minimum salary paid is \$16 per month, increasing to \$18 at the end of six months, and again increasing to \$20 at the end of one year. Ward and Kitchen Maids begin at \$15 per month, increasing to \$17.50 at the end of six months, and to \$20 at the end of one year's service. Orderlies begin at the minimum wage of \$20 per month, and are allowed an increase of \$2.50 at the end of each of these two periods. To carry out this plan it is necessary that there should be an elasticity in the supporting schedules far greater than is possible with the limitations now attached to them. An additional handicap under the present circumstances is the fact that the Trustees, in an effort to segregate the payroll as far as possible, have described the employees by their duties, and not merely listed all who receive less than a certain sum as "Hospital Helpers." This segregation, while of an advantage from an executive standpoint. retards efficiency when it restricts the amount of money available for increasing the wages of these employees. In the Department of Public Charities, practically all these grades of employees are included under the title of Hospital Helpers and the appropriation is allowed in a lump sum. We fail to see why there should money be given in a lump sum for each class, such as Hospital Helpers, Waitresses. Laundresses, etc.

In the allied hospitals, where there are only two or three employees in these various groups, it is absolutely impossible to give an increase at the end of any period if the schedules are continued as at present.

The situation is aggravated by the fact that the employment agencies which send workers to the Department state the salary and the rate of increase. When the employees do not receive that increase, it is natural that they should feel a resentment and question the practice. If, therefore, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is not prepared to grant our request, a statement to that effect should be made, in order that the Trustees may definitely rule that increases are not to be given at regular intervals, so that the employees may not come to us under a false impression that length of service will be rewarded.

We are fully aware that it is not the intention of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to embarrass or handicap any Department in its administration by needless rules and regulations, and feel convinced that a proper study of this situation would result in a compliance with our request. The Comptroller's office, in passing upon this request, is asked to remember its own frequent commendation of the efforts of this Department to accept all suggestions made by that office, and that it is not with a mere desire to evade the regulations that have been laid down that this protest is made.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, our General Medical Superintendent, will be glad to furnish the Examiners with additional details of the conditions leading to this request and of the disadvantages of the schedules as now allowed.

In conclusion, I would state that the appropriation allowed for Helpers in 1911 was granted in a lump sum. In 1910 the money was appropriated in line numbers, but the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 11, after an investigation by the Comptroller's office, saw fit to change the schedules in order to combine the items. It would therefore seem to be a backward step to continue the schedules for 1912 as drawn. Respectfully,

The recent opening of these pavilions for 160 patients has so reduced the help in other buildings at Riverside

In an application for retirement to the Commissioner, dated November 13, 1911 Mr. McGonigie states that he has been in the City's service for over 38 years, having been appointed as Laborer in the Board of City Works of the old City of Brooklyn in April, 1873. He further states that on two occasions he was temporarily transferred to the Civil Service preferred list, but re-employed as soon as weather conditions permitted his class of work to be resumed.

The earliest date which your Committee has been able to verify is April 7, 1875 on which date he was appointed in the Department of City Works of the old City of Brooklyn.

An examination of the list of appointments and discharges of employees from 1875 to 1881 fails to disclose either the discharge or reappointment of Mr. McGonigle during that period. Labor payrolls of the Engineer of the Department of City Works for February, August and October, 1880, show that McGonigle performed service as a Paver on those dates.

A record memorandum of the Municipal Civil Service Commission shows that Mr. McGonigle was appointed as Paver on September 1, 1881, and has been twice "discharged" and "reinstated" and once "suspended" and "re-employed." The aggregate of these three periods is slightly over 11 months. It appears that his total service, from the date of his first certified appointment, April 7, 1875, will at least equal 30

Mr. McGonigle has been examined by J. H. Byrnes, M. D., Physician to the Department of Finance, who, in a communication to the Commissioner of Bridges,

dated November 28, 1911, states as follows:

Gentlemen-On December 18, 1911, the Mayor recommended the retirement, purant to the provisions of sections 165, 166 and 167 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 669 of the Laws of 1911, of Peter Kiernan, an Inspector of Masonry in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, on an annuity of \$750. In connection therewith we report as follows:

In an application for retirement, under date of October 31. 1911, Mr. Kiernan states that he has served the City continuously since August 22, 1878, a period of over 33 years, and that he also had served as Building Inspector for two or three years prior to that date. He also states that he is over 75 years of age.

In a communication to the Mavor, under date of December 7, 1911, the Commis-

sioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity states, in part, as follows: 'Mr. Kiernan has rendered over 33 years' continuous service in this Department as an Inspector of Construction and Inspector of Masonry. He has during the past few weeks been forced to remain away from his duties, owing to physical disability. His advanced years render him unfit to continue in his employment with the Department. I recommend Mr. Kiernan's retirement on a pension of \$750, this being one-half of his present salary, which he has been receiving since October 1. 1905."

The Physician to the Department of Finance examined Mr. Kiernan on February

1912, and certifies as follows: "Upon examination I find he has a dilated and hypertrophied heart, but the latter does not compensate when he is obliged to make any physical effort, and he then suffers from dyspnoea. The arteries are hardened, and the pulse is small and hard and there is a blood pressure of 205 mm. He has had several severe attacks of vertigo while at work, has fallen with same and had to be taken home. On the theory that any appropriation made for park work in the Borough of Queens would automatically fall under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Parks for that Borough, it would not be necessary to amend the resolution authorizing the corporate stock. However, it appears to us that it would be safer to amend the resolutions and thereby obviate all questions concerning the matter.

Attached hereto are resolutions amending the various authorizations so that they will read "Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Queens," instead of "Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens." We recommend their adoption.

Gentlemen-I beg to call your attention to the matter of an appropriation for corporate stock for the use of our Topographical Bureau, for which only \$35,000 was appropriated in the last Corporate Stock Budget.

It seems that the various Topographical Bureaus throughout the City were originally requested to make application for an amount of corporate stock sufficient to supply their needs for six months, or from July, 1911, to January, 1912. In accordance therewith request was made for \$35,000 corporate stock. Before the adoption of the Corporate Stock Budget, your Committee decided that each Topographical Bureau should receive an appropriation which would allow for their expenses until July, 1912. All the other Topographical Bureaus did receive the necessary appropriations, with the exception of the Topographical Bureau in this Borough, for which an appropriation for only six months was made. When the matter was called to the attention of your Committee, we were advised to make application for the additional \$30,000 when the appropriation for \$35,000 was exhausted.

As this amount is practically exhausted, I would respectfully request that your Committee recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the appropriation of the additional \$30,000 of corporate stock for the use of our Topographical Bureau up to July 1, 1912. Yours very truly,

In the Corporate Stock Budget for 1911, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved an authorization of corporate stock amounting to \$35,000 for the Topographical Bureau. The amount was the estimate for six months, from July 1, 1911, to January 1, 1912. The appropriations for the other Topographical Bureaus were for the full year. The President of the Borough of Brooklyn requested an appropriation of \$65,000 for the year, but through a misunderstanding only six months' provision was made. Of the \$30,000 requested, it is estimated that \$29,000 will be needed for salaries, and \$1,000 for supplies and incidental expenses. The appropriation is to be applied to the existing schedule for the Bureau.

We recommend approval of the request by the adoption of the attached reso-

The Secretary presented a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, recommending the appointment of a committee of the Board to examine into and report upon the advisability of presenting a bill to the Legislature establishing a new bureau for the purchase of automobiles and automobile supplies for The City of New York, and possibly the establishment of a central automobile

The Comptroller announced that it is expected that a report on this subject will be presented at the next meeting of the Board, March 14, 1912.

The Committee on Finance respectfully reports that the deficiency in the fund for compensation of Janitors for 1911 was estimated, at the beginning of the year, to be \$66,920.92, and an application of this Board for an issue of special revenue bonds for that amount has been favorably reported by the Comptroller to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the request of the Board of Aldermen.

Certain unforeseen liabilities have accrued during the year which were not contemplated in the original calculation. The cost of janitorial services in evening and vacation activities, which fluctuates with the number of rooms in use, has been

greater than anticipated.

There is also pending before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen the matter of the fixation, under section 56 of the Charter, of certain enlarged rates of compensation for Janitors who have been required to render extra services in connection with additions to buildings, new machinery installed,

The accrual of these liabilities will cause a further deficit of \$13,000.

The following resolution is offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen be and it is hereby respectfully requested to adopt a resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000), pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Revised Charter, for the purpose of meeting the deficiency in the appropriation for compensation of Janitors for the year 1911, and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby respectfully requested to authorize such issue upon request of the Board of Aldermen.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On February 6, 1912, the Board of Aldermen requested an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$11,230, the proceeds to be used by the Board of Education to cover a deficit in the 1911 Budget appropriation for the compensation

of Janitors. In connection therewith I report as follows:

The original appropriation for the compensation of Janitors for 1911 was \$1,402,697.60. This sum included no allowance for extra service in evening schools, recreation centres, vacation schools and kindred activities, which extra service had been costing approximately \$80,000 per annum. The Budget Committee in recommending the appropriation was of the opinion that the pending investigation of the whole matter of janitorial service by the Special Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would result in economies, making it feasible to reduce necessary expenditures to the allowance made. On January 18, 1911, the Board of Education requested special revenue bonds in the sum of \$66,920.92, for the purpose of maintaining the existing rates of compensation until the Committee had reported. This request was approved by the Board of Aldermen on March 21, 1911, and by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 14, 1911.

Meanwhile it had become evident that the issue of special revenue bonds would be insufficient to cover the deficit, and the Board of Education had already requested the issue of \$13,000 additional. It was stated that the cost of janitorial service in the evening and vacation schools had been greater than was anticipated when the first request was made, and that the extra service on account of the opening of the materially to the work and responsibilities of the position. The grade of \$3,800 was established in accordance with the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New vilities. Subsequently, upon the advice of the Chairman of the Committee on Buildings of the Board of Education, the Board of Aldermen recommended by \$11,230. On October 26, 1910, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution authorizing the appointment of a committee to conduct an inquiry into the organization, equipment and methods, both financial and educational, of the Department of Education. A resolution adopted by this Board on December 9, 1910, authorized the payment of any necessary expenses incurred by this committee in 1911, in the employment of experts or otherwise, out of the 1911 budget appropriation for the contingent expenses of your Board. He, therefore, requests the transfer to the account to cover the outstanding bills of the committee. The sum of \$10,000 is available for the transfer from the 1912 appropriation entitled "Miscellaneous, City—Special Contract Obligations, No. 1615, Advertising, not otherwise provided for, including arrearages." The appropriation for No. 1615 was \$175,000.
