Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

An adjourned regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held in the staff room of Bellevue Hospital on Tuesday, July 28, 1914, at 3 o'clock.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair, and Messrs. Paulding, Robbins and Stern, Trustees.

As there was no quorum present, the Board adjourned to meet on Thursday, July 30, 1914, at 9:40 A. M., in the office of the Commissioner of Public Charities.

An adjourned meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held in the office of the Commissioner of Public Charities, Municipal Building, on Thursday, July 30, 1914, at 9:40 A. M.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Paulding, Robbins and Stern, Trustees; and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the meeting of July 10th were held as read and approved.

Bills amounting to \$136,160.75 were presented for approval, and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

During the last week there has been an increase in the number of patients coming to Bellevue Hospital for treatment for the drug habit, and it has been necessary to employ three additional nurses to care for them. After a careful study of the situation and a confer-

ence with Dr. Gregory and Miss Noyes, it seemed desirable to segregate these cases in Ward 1, which is directly over Ward 30. This has simplified the medical supervision and nursing care of the patients.

The American Hospital Association holds its annual conference at St. Paul from August 25th to 28th. As I am on the program for a paper at this meeting, permission to be absent from the hospital is requested in order to attend, after which I would like to continue on my vacation.

In accordance with the following letters from the Contract Clerk and Auditor, request is made for transfers of funds within the appropriations named:

Invoices amounting to \$528.01, chargeable to the appropriation entitled "2093, Contingencies, 1914," are being held in this office, owing to the fact that there is no unencumbered balance in this fund. It is recommended that \$2,000 be transferred from the appropriation entitled "2089, General Repairs, 1914," to the appropriation entitled "2093, Contingencies, 1914." This will cover the amount of the invoices on hand, and the estimated additional liabilities during the balance of the year.

Funds are also urgently needed in the appropriation entitled "2077, Medical and Surgical Supplies, 1914." It would seem advisable in this instance to reduce the contract reserve 5 per cent., as provided for in clause 4 of the Standard Contract. This reduction, amounting to \$3,655.33, can be used to pay some of the open-market invoices chargeable to this ap-

propriation, about which many of the vendors are making inquiries.

This is not intended to modify the recommendation for additional funds contained in my letter of May 5, 1914.

Specifications for new laundry machinery, estimated to cost \$12,000, have recently been received from the Supervising Engineer. There remains a balance of only \$2,372.70 in the fund to which this equipment is chargeable. Under date of January 23, 1914, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transferred unencumbered balances to the amount of \$13,174.58 from several Corporate Stock funds of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals to a general fund to be used for such purposes as this. It is therefore recommended that a request be made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the transfer of \$10,000 from the fund entitled "C. F. M. 24, Monies available for permanent improvements for which corporate stock may lawfully be issued" to the fund entitled "C. B. H. 10-B, New Bellevue Hospital, Installation of new laundry machinery."

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The use of Ward 1 for the drug cases coming to Bellevue Hospital was approved.

Leave of absence was granted to the General Medical Superintendent, as requested, and it was resolved, To designate Dr. George O'Hanlon, General Medical Superintendent, as the delegate from this Department

to the convention of the American Hospital Association.

It was Resolved, To request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve of the transfer of \$2,000 within the appropriation for 1914, as recommended.

It was Resolved, To approve the reduction of five per cent. in the contract reserve for medical and surgical supplies, as provided for in clause four of the standard contracts.

It was Resolved, To request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve of the transfer of \$10,000 within the corporate stock funds, as recommended in the General Medical Superintendent's report.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.
The Conference Committee of the Second Division of Bellevue Hospital recommended the appointment of Dr. Ingila F. Frost as Assistant Physician to Out Patients on the tuberculosis service. This report was approved and Dr. Frost appointed accordingly.

The President recommended that Dr. Frederick W. Rice be promoted to the place of Physician to Out Patients on the children's service of the Fourth Division of Bellevue Hospital, he having been recommended by the Medical Board and the Conference Committee. This report was approved and Dr. Rice appointed accordingly.

The President recommended that Dr. Robert A. Cook, nominated by the Executive Committee to the place of Physician to Out

Division of Bellevue Hospital, be appointed. This recommendation was adopted.

The President reported that, in accordance with the resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on July 9th, he had informed that Commission on July 14th that the only property of the Department available for playground purposes during the summer of 1914 was the recently acquired site for the new building for the out-patient department of Gouverneur Hospital. The action of the President was approved.

The President presented a letter dated July 14th from the New York Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor, setting forth the estimated requirements of the new Seabreeze Hospital for the latter half of 1915. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this letter was referred to the Budget Committee.

The President reported that with the General Medical Superintendent he had inquired into the recommendation of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital that additional room be obtained for the out-patient department by renting temporary quarters, and that they had looked at several buildings in the vicinity of the hospital. The President stated that these needed so many repairs that it would be six months or more before they would be available for use, and in view of the prospect of the rapid completion of the new building for the out-patient department, recommended that no additional building be rented for the present. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the report of the President was approved.

The special committee, composed of Dr. Brannan, Commissioner Kingsbury and Mr. Paulding, appointed to consider the vacancy in the position of Assistant Medical Superintendent at Bellevue Hospital, recommended that Dr. Michael J. Thornton, now Assistant Alienist, be promoted to the place of second assistant, and that if the Civil Service Commission consents to Dr. Thornton's promotion, that Dr. Mark L. Fleming be promoted to the place of first assistant. The committee presented copies of letters addressed to the Municipal Civil Service Commission under date of July 18th and 29th, requesting that a promotion examination be held for Dr. Thornton, and that he be appointed temporarily, pending the examination by the Commission. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the report of the committee was approved.

A report was presented from the President and General Medical Superintendent, relating to the further requirements of the Department for an issue of Corporate Stock, stating that \$25,000 would be needed for the furnishings of the new ward wing of Harlem Hospital, and \$17,000 for the installation of fire protection at Bellevue Hospital in accordance with the recommendations set forth in the reports of the Fire Department and of H. F. J. Porter, under date of May 20, 1914, and December 10, 1913, respectively. After discussion, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock in the amount of \$42,000 for these purposes, and it was further,

Resolved, To rescind the resolution of June 23, 1914 (ratified July 3, 1914) requesting an issue of special revenue bonds in the amount of \$17,000 for the installation of fire walls and other fire protection at Bellevue Hospital.

COMMUNICATIONS.

A letter dated July 22d was presented from P. J. Brennan and Son, requesting an extension of four months' time to complete their contract for the erection of the new ward wing at Harlem Hospital. After discussion, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To inform the contractors that, as their application for an extension of time was made subsequent to July 21st, the date of the expiration of the contract, the Trustees, in accordance with an opinion of the Corporation Counsel under date of May 13, 1913, cannot comply with this request.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for July 8th were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the appointment of Dr. Samuel Hunt as interne on the First Division and of Dr. John M. Lee as interne on the Third Division, for one year, beginning July 1, 1914, was approved; the nominations of Dr. James P. Hunt, Dr. George N. Slatery, and Dr. Charles P. Roach were referred to the Conference Committee; and the transfer of Dr. John H. Wyckoff from the place of Assistant Physician to Out Patients on the Fourth Division to a similar position on the Third Division was approved.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for July 22d were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the report that Dr. Robert S. Irvine and Dr. Sylvain B. Wolff, appointees to the house staff of the First Division, had exchanged

places, was approved; and the granting of certificates to Doctors McClenahan, Voor, Martin and Rudner, the pathological interns who completed their service on June 30th, was authorized.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital for July 2d were presented. The recommendation that diplomas be awarded to Doctors Scholl, Wark and Muth, who completed their service on the house staff on June 30th, was approved.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for June 30th were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the recommendation that Dr. J. A. Heitlinger, Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, be granted an additional month's vacation was approved.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for July 9th were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the resolution that hereafter no cases shall be cured except after a physical examination by the Visiting Obstetrician or one of his assistants, and that this operation shall be performed by the Visiting Obstetrician or one of his assistants, or by a designated member of the house staff in the presence of the Visiting Obstetrician or one of his assistants, was approved; the rule that, in future, when members of the dispensary staff desire to issue prescriptions for appliances which are to be purchased from dealers, it will be necessary for them to secure permission from the Superintendent of the hospital, was approved.

A letter dated July 17th was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting certified copies of four resolutions adopted on July 9th, (1) approving of the issue of special revenue bonds in the amount of \$1,500 to pay the salaries of ten physicians in the out-patient department of Gouverneur Hospital, at the rate of \$300 per annum each, from July 1st to December 31, 1914; (2) revising salary schedule 2062 as of July 1st, so as to include the above sum; (3) revising salary schedule 2062 as of July 1st, as requested, and (4) approving of the amended specifications and estimate of cost of \$5,700 for the painting of pavilions L and M of the new Bellevue Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file, and it was

Resolved, To appoint the President and General Medical Superintendent a committee to determine which members of the out-patient staff of Gouverneur Hospital should receive salaries; and it was further

Resolved, To authorize an advertisement for bids for painting pavilions L and M of the new Bellevue Hospital.

A letter dated July 14th was received from Dr. Herbert L. Wheeler, recommending the appointment of Dr. F. Bedrick as Assistant Visiting Dentist to Bellevue Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this recommendation was approved and Dr. Bedrick appointed accordingly.

A letter dated July 18th was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copy of a resolution adopted on July 10th approving of the issue of Corporate Stock for the completion of the new Harlem Hospital, \$30,000 for the equipment of the new ward wing and present building, and \$29,000 for enlarging the mechanical plant in the power house and the vault space. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file.

A communication dated July 18th was presented from the Law Department, stating that title had been vested in The City of New York for the property at the northeast corner of Gouverneur Slip and Front Street, Manhattan, which was acquired as a site for a new dispensary, power house, etc., for Gouverneur Hospital, and that the deed of conveyance had been sent to the Register of New York County for record and would be forwarded to the Comptroller. This letter was ordered placed on file.

A communication dated July 7th was presented from the Health Department, stating that an application for the erection of a stable at 622-624 Water Street had been approved by the Bureau of Buildings on April 24th, and that the Health Department had no power to prevent its erection. It was moved, seconded, and carried, to place this letter on file, and to send a copy to the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital.

A letter dated July 27th was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copies of two resolutions adopted on June 19th, (1) transferring unencumbered balances in appropriations and special revenue bond accounts to the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, and (2) retransferring funds from the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation to various accounts. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file.

A letter was presented from McKim, Mead and White, under date of July 27th, stating that the National Surety Company, bondholder for Daniel J. Ryan, had completed the new roof awards of pavilions A and B on May 1, 1914. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, this letter was referred to the Building Committee, and it was

Resolved, To request the Corporation Counsel for advice and assistance in the preparation of the certificate of completion and overtime.

NEW BUSINESS.

The President referred to the need of providing a permanent covered passageway from the pathological building to that part of the pier at 29th Street reserved as a landing place for the boats transporting bodies for the Department of Public Charities. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to instruct the architects to prepare plans and specifications for this purpose as soon as possible, in order that the passageway may be available for use by the time pavilions I and X are ready for occupancy.

The President reported that, as a result of an inspection of pavilions I and X with the General Medical Superintendent, the Assistant Medical Superintendent, and the General Superintendent of Training Schools, a decision had been arrived at in regard to the color of the floors to be installed in these pavilions, and that he had accordingly instructed McKim, Mead and White, under date of July 27th, to use red on all floors, with a brown border in the wards. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this selection was approved.

Mr. Stern called attention to a report of the General Superintendent of Training Schools to the Executive Committee of the Medical Board under date of July 22d, relating to the surgical service at Bellevue Hospital, and in particular to that part referring to the preparation of patients for operation. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, to direct the General Medical Superintendent to inform the surgeons that a report is to be presented to the Trustees in all cases where patients are prepared for operation and not operated upon on that day.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, a special committee, composed of Dr. Brannan, Commissioner Kingsbury, and Mr. Paulding, was appointed to devise plans for simplifying the business of the Board of Trustees.

Mr. Paulding, of the Committee on Officers and Employees, presented a letter dated July 28th from the Contract Clerk relative to the salary of that position. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to include this place in the Department Estimate for 1915 at a salary of \$3,000 per annum.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

REPORT FOR WEEK ENDING SEPTEMBER 12, 1914.

FINED TEN DOLLARS FOR NOT MUZZLING DOGS.

Failing to muzzle their dogs as provided by section 80a of the Sanitary Code, three residents of the upper West Side were arraigned last week before Magistrate F. X. McQuade in the Fifth District Magistrate's Court. The offending dog owners were Mrs. Albert Tinsdale, 2593 Eighth avenue, Manhattan; Aaron Straus, 116 Sherman avenue, Manhattan; Alphonse Bisogno, 204th street and Broadway, Manhattan.

After hearing that all had been fairly warned before the service of a summons, Magistrate McQuade imposed a fine of ten dollars on each offender, remarking that he was in entire accord with the action taken by Commissioner Goldwater, and that he would lend it his hearty support.

During the past two weeks, the Health Squad under Lieutenant Belton has served warnings and copies of the new muzzling law on over five hundred dog owners throughout the city. All those not promptly complying will be summoned to court.

MACARONI AND CHEESE IN PLACE OF MEAT.

Let the American housewife take a lesson from her Italian cousin and learn the many palatable dishes to be made from macaroni and spaghetti. Very few realize the amount of nourishment contained in an average helping (2 heaping table-spoonfuls) of macaroni baked with cheese. Such a helping contains three times as much nourishment as a slice of lean roast beef, and is practically equal to the latter in building up muscle, bone and sinew. Study the following comparison:

Roast Beef (Lean). A helping (100 grams) contains 150 calories, of which 90 calories are protein.

Macaroni Baked with Cheese. A helping (150 grams) contains 450 calories, of which 80 calories are protein.

Smash the high cost of living. Meat every day is unnecessary.

REPORTABLE DISEASES.

Duties of Physicians, Hospitals, Dispensaries and Other Institutions with Respect to Such Diseases.

In order to bring the provisions of the Sanitary Code relating to infectious diseases more thoroughly into harmony with modern scientific conceptions, the Board of Health at its regular meeting on August 25th, 1914, amended the Sanitary Code to read as follows:

Section 133. It shall be the duty of every physician and of the commissioners or managers or the principal, supervisor, superintendent or physician, of each and every hospital, public institution or dispensary, in this city, to report to the Department of Health in writing, the full name, age and address of every person suffering from any one of the infectious diseases included in the list appended, with the name of the disease, within twenty-four hours of the time when the case is first seen:

Section 134. It shall be the duty of every physician and of the Commissioners or managers or the principal, supervisor, superintendent, or physician, of each and every hospital, public institution or dispensary, in this city, to report to the Department of Health in writing, the full name, age and address of every person suffering from any one of the diseases included in the list appended, with the name of the disease, within twenty-four hours of the time when the case is first seen:

Section 135. It shall be the duty of every physician to report forthwith, in writing, to the Department of Health, the death of every person who dies from, or while suffering with, any infectious disease, and to state in such report the specific name and type of such disease.

Section 136. It shall be the duty of every person having knowledge of the existence of any person afflicted with any one of the infectious diseases named in Section 133, who requires or appears to require the attention of the Department of Health, at once to report to the Department all facts in regard to the case.

Section 137. No person shall interfere with or obstruct the entrance to or inspection or examination of any building or house, or the occupants thereof, by the inspectors of the Department of Health, when any case of one of the infectious diseases named in Section 133 has been reported as existing in such house or dwelling, nor shall any person interfere with or obstruct, mutilate or tear down any notice of the Department posted in or on any premises in the City of New York.

Section 138. It shall be the duty of every person sick with pulmonary tuberculosis and of every person in attendance upon any one sick with the said disease, and of the proprietors of public and private institutions or dispensaries wherein any person is afflicted with the said disease, to observe and enforce all the sanitary regulations of the Department of Health for preventing the spread of pulmonary tuberculosis.

Section 139. Any inspector of this Department shall report in writing that any person is sick with any infectious disease, under such circumstances that the continuance of such sick person in the place where he or she may be is dangerous to the health of other persons residing in the neighborhood, the Sanitary Superintendent, an Assistant Sanitary Superintendent, or the Director of the Bureau of Infectious Diseases, upon the report of a Medical Inspector of the Department, may cause the removal of such sick person to one of the hospitals under the charge of this Department or to a hospital designated by the Board of Health.

Section 140. In every sanatorium, convalescent home, convalescent hospital, home for children, reformatory, training school, boarding school, hospital, dispensary, or institution for the care or treatment of persons in the City of New York, there shall be provided and maintained a suitable room or rooms for the isolation of persons suffering from such infectious diseases as the rules and regulations of the Department of Health may from time to time designate as being subject to the provisions of this section, and such persons shall immediately be isolated in such room or rooms.

Section 141. It shall be the duty of every undertaker having notice of the death of any person within the City of New York of acute cerebro-spinal meningitis, acute poliomyelitis (infantile paralysis), Asiatic cholera, diphtheria (croup), measles, plague, scarlet fever, smallpox, typhus fever, and yellow fever, or of the bringing of the dead body of any person who has died of any such disease into such city, to give immediate notice thereof to this Department. No person shall retain or expose, or assist in the retention or exposure of, the dead body of any such person except in a coffin or casket properly sealed; nor shall any person allow any such body to be placed in any coffin or casket unless the body has been wrapped in a sheet saturated with a proper disinfecting solution, and the coffin or casket shall then be immediately and permanently sealed. No undertaker shall assist in the public or church funeral of any such person. No undertaker shall use, or cause or allow to be used at any funeral, or in any room where the dead body of any such person shall be, any draperies, decorations, rugs, or carpets, belonging to or furnished by him or under his direction.

Section 142. A public or church funeral shall not be held of any person who has died of acute poliomyelitis (infantile paralysis), Asiatic cholera, diphtheria (croup), epidemic cerebro-spinal meningitis, measles, plague, scarlet fever, smallpox, typhus fever or yellow fever, but the funeral of such person shall be private, and it shall not be lawful to invite to, or permit at the funeral of any person who has died of any one of the above diseases, or of any infectious disease, or at any services connected therewith, any person whose attendance is not necessary, or from or to whom there is danger of contagion thereby.

Section 143. No person shall within this city, without a permit from the Board of Health, carry, remove, or cause or permit to be carried or removed, any person sick with any infectious disease, or remove or cause to be removed, any such person from any building or vessel to any other building or vessel or to the shore, or to or from any vehicle in any part of the city. Nor shall any person, by any exposure of any individual sick of any infectious disease, or of the body of such person, or by any negligent act connected therewith, or in respect of the care or custody thereof, or by a needless exposure of himself, cause or contribute to, or promote the spread of disease from any such person, or from any dead body.

Section 144. It shall be the duty of the physician or physicians, and the officers and managers of every sanatorium, convalescent home, convalescent hospital, home for children, reformatory, training school, boarding school, hospital dispensary, or institution for the care or treatment of persons in the City of New York, immediately to report or cause to be reported to the said department, the name, age (so far as can be ascertained) and residence of every person received therein or treated therein who is afflicted with puerperal septicemia or suppurative conjunctivitis, with the name of the disease with which the person is afflicted; and such physicians, officers and managers shall also report the name and address of the physician or midwife in attendance at the time of the onset of the disease, which information it is hereby made the duty of every institution herein specified to obtain and record among its records.

Section 145. No principal or superintendent of any school, and no parent, master or custodian of any child or minor (having the power and authority to prevent) shall permit any child or minor having acute poliomyelitis (infantile paralysis), chicken-pox, diphtheria (croup), epidemic cerebro-spinal meningitis, measles, mumps, rubella (rotheln), scarlet fever, smallpox or whooping cough, or any child or minor in any family, or living with any family, in which any such disease exists or has recently existed, to attend any public or private school until the Department of Health shall have given its permission therefor, nor shall any such principal, superintendent, parent, master, or custodian permit any child or minor to be unnecessarily exposed, or to needlessly expose any other person to the taking or to the infection of any contagious disease.

Section 146. No person shall allow to be retained unburied the dead body of any human being for a longer period than four days or, where death has resulted from acute poliomyelitis (infantile paralysis), Asiatic cholera, diphtheria (croup), epidemic cerebro-spinal meningitis, measles, plague, scarlet fever, smallpox, typhus fever and yellow fever, for a longer period than twenty-four hours, after the death of such person, without a permit from the Sanitary Superintendent, an Assistant Sanitary Superintendent, or the Director of the Bureau of Infectious Diseases, which permit shall specify the length of time during which such body may be retained unburied.

HOW TO KILL FLY LARVAE IN MANURE.

Just as all rational mosquito extermination work aims to prevent the breeding of these pests, so work directed against the extermination of flies should be directed principally against fly breeding. It is now well established that the house fly breeds mainly in horse manure, though if this is not available garbage and other refuse are made to serve the purpose. The United States Department of Agriculture has recently carried on a series of tests to discover a method of treating manure so as to kill fly larvae. Among the substances tested were kerosene, iron sulphate, potassium cyanide, formaldehyde, calcium cyanamide, pyroligneous acid, common salt, copper sulphate, lime sulphur mixture, Paris green, sodium borate, several proprietary disinfectants and borax. In passing on the utility of the substances mentioned three factors were considered essential: 1, Destructive action on fly larvae; 2, non-injurious effect on manure; 3, lack of extremely poisonous properties.

By far the most effective, economical, and practical of all the substances tested is borax in the crystalline form in which it is available throughout the country. In using borax as a fly-breeder the following general directions should be observed.

Apply one pound of borax to every 12 bushels (75 cubic feet) of manure immediately on its removal from the barn. The borax should be applied particularly around the outer edges of the pile with a four wheel or other fine sieve, after which two or three gallons of water should be sprinkled over the borax-treated manure. As borax costs from five to six cents a pound in 100 pound lots, and twelve to fifteen bushels of manure represent the approximate amount of manure from each horse, this treatment costs practically one cent per horse per day.

These directions to kill the larvae of flies instead of killing fly larvae are referred to in the Department of Health Bulletin, July 13, 1914.

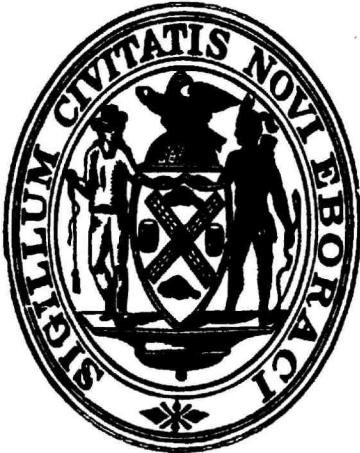

(d) For temporary burglar alarm service for which the telephone circuit connecting the telephone in the subscriber's premises with the central exchange of the telephone company is used, a monthly charge of seven and 50/100 dollars (\$7.50), provided such service is taken for at least two months.

(e) For temporary watchman service which it may be found necessary to furnish to any subscriber to any of the before mentioned classes of burglar alarm service or which may be required by any such subscriber, the sum of forty cents (40c.) per hour for each hour of such service actually furnished.

(f) For any other service furnished or to be furnished by the Company, the rates charged shall be reasonable and fair and before being put into effect shall be submitted to the Board for its approval.

Within thirty (30) days from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, the

Company shall furnish to the Board certified forms of all the contracts used by it with subscribers for its various classes of service, and thereafter when any change shall be made in any such form of contract, a certified copy of the same shall be filed with the Board within thirty (30) days after the said change goes into effect. The Company shall also file with the Board on February 1 of each year a verified schedule of the rates charged by it for each class of service which it furnishes.

The Company agrees, upon request of any Board, Department or Bureau of the City or other government, the expenses of which are paid out of the City treasury, to furnish burglar alarm protection service to any and all buildings under the control of such Board, Department or Bureau, within the territory in which the Company is authorized to operate, subject to the provisions of this contract, at six and two-thirds per cent. (66 2/3%) of the rates above authorized to be charged by it for whatever class or classes of service may be required.

Nothing herein contained shall be deemed, nor is the same intended to require the Company (except as specified in clause (d) above) to furnish burglar alarm service for any period less than one year, nor to install the equipment or apparatus which may be required by a subscriber without charge, but the Company may and it is hereby authorized to write its contracts for service on an annual basis and charge the reasonable and fair cost of value of such equipment and apparatus under such reasonable and general restrictions as it may see fit to impose. Provided, however, that this exception as to equipment and apparatus is not intended to nor shall the same apply to watchman supervisory service and the rate specified in subdivision (c) above, for such service, is intended to include each and every charge for installation, rental of instruments, service furnished and everything incidental thereto, except where temporary watchman service may be required, as specified in subdivision (c) above.

Sixteenth—During the term of this contract, or any renewal thereof, the Board shall have the power, by resolution, to regulate and fix the maximum and minimum rates to be charged by the Company in the City, provided such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Seventeenth—The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills, unless due from its owner, shall never be charged against property, and no person not himself in arrears shall be denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the Company for service.

Eighteenth—The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purposes than those explicitly set forth herein and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes or to illegal places.

Nineteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the system authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Twentieth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions in the territory covered by this contract, or any part thereof.

Twenty-first—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company, specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Board may, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of One hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-second—If for a period of three consecutive months the system of the Company shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of six months out of any consecutive twelve months, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings at law or in equity.

Twenty-third—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account and shall, on or before February 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending December 31, next preceding. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts received from the operation of the system hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company in the City, together with such other information and in such form and detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-fourth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than February 1 of each year for the year ending December 31 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year, and the rate of same.
11. The names of the directors and officers elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
12. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
14. Number and location of premises served by the Company in the City, and central stations to which same are connected.
15. Total receipts of the Company for each class of business in the City.
16. Amounts paid by the Company for dam-

age to persons or property on account of construction and operation in the City.

Twenty-fifth—Total expenses for operation, including salaries, in the City, and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-sixth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of Thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privileges hereby granted, in default of which payment of the annual charges, the City shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund, after ten (10) days' notice to the Company.

In case of failure of the Company to comply with the terms of this contract relating to the filing of annual statements, furnishing of service to applicants as herein provided, the installation or maintenance of its structures and equipment, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board or other municipal officials, made pursuant to the terms of this contract, or under the authority of any laws, ordinances or departmental regulations now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any of these events, the Company, except as hereinafter provided, shall pay to the City a penalty of Fifty dollars (\$50.) for each violation.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the provisions of this contract. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or after a hearing appears, in the judgment of the Board, to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund, the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Twenty-seventh—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board, by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the portion of its system constructed and in use by virtue of this contract and located in the public streets and avenues shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company served in the same manner as a summons in an action in the Supreme Court to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-eighth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned, or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Twenty-ninth—The words "notice" or "direction" wherever used in this contract shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall, except as otherwise in this contract provided, be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or, if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirtieth—The words "streets and avenues" or "streets or avenues" wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement, included within the limits of the territory in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Thirty-first—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues of the territory in which the Company is authorized to operate by this contract.

Section 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Section 4. First. It is understood and agreed that neither this contract nor anything herein contained, nor any operation of the Company's business under this contract, nor any act or acts of the Company or its officers or servants in the course of such business in the streets of said City or elsewhere shall be construed or interpreted to be or to effect a waiver, surrender, abandonment, modification, impairment or limitation of such rights, privileges or franchises as the Company may have heretofore acquired, or claims to have acquired, in any manner whatsoever, to lay, maintain, use or operate wires or other lines of electrical conductors in, over, along or under the streets or avenues within the City or any portion thereof for the purpose of carrying on or operating a telegraph burglar alarm or other telegraph or telephone system, or business nor shall such rights, privileges or franchises, or any of them, be nor be deemed to have been merged by, with or into this contract, and this contract and the acceptance and execution thereof is and shall be entirely without prejudice to any such rights, privileges or franchises, or to the Company's claim that it is and should be entitled, to lay, maintain, use or operate wires or other lines of electrical conductors in, over, along or under the streets or avenues within the City or any portion thereof for the purpose of carrying on or operating a telegraph burglar alarm or other telegraph or telephone system, or business.

Section 5. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to nor is the same intended to be an admission or recognition on the part of the City or any of its Boards, Departments or Officials of any authority, franchise, right or privilege in the Company, except as granted by this contract, nor shall the same in any manner bind the City, or affect or waive its right, freedom or privilege to defend any action commenced or prosecuted by the Company for the purpose of establishing its alleged rights, privileges or franchises independent of this contract.

Section 6. The Company shall not claim or demand any money compensation or damages from the City for or by reason of any moneys paid to the City under this contract or any expense, suits or other disadvantage incurred by it because of entering into this contract and it hereby expressly waives and surrenders to the City any such claim or demand.

Section 7. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to nor is the same intended to be an admission or recognition on the part of the City or any of its Boards, Departments or Officials of any authority, franchise, right or privilege in the Company, except as granted by this contract, nor shall the same in any manner bind the City, or affect or waive its right, freedom or privilege to defend any action commenced or prosecuted by the Company for the purpose of establishing its alleged rights, privileges or franchises independent of this contract.

Section 8. In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused the corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but undischarged at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on day of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walls, structures and cellars of whatever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolitions shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be equated to curb level. All walls, cornices, chimneys, etc., existing on the property must be fitted to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in case thereof same to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all trees, shrubs, etc., growing on the main street in the street and the openings of the main street

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with certificates from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession, will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the walls pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, marked with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contractor, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will verify the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application to the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
