undertaker shall use, or cause or allow to be used at any funeral, or in any room where the dead body of any such person shall be, any draperies, decorations, rugs, or carpets, belonging to or furnished by him or under his direction.

Section 142. A public or church funeral shall not be held of any person who has died of acute poliomyelitis (infantile paralysis), Asiatic cholera, diphtheria (croup), epidemic cerebro-spinal meningitis, measles, plague, scarlet fever, small-pox, typhus fever or yellow fever, but the funeral of such person shall be private, and it shall not be lawful to invite to, or permit at the funeral of any person who has died of any one of the above diseases, or of any infectious

disease, or at any services connected therewith, any person whose attendance is not necessary, or from or to whom there is danger of contagion thereby.

Section 143. No person shall within this city, without a permit from the Board of Health, carry, remove, or cause or permit to be carried or removed, any person sick with any infectious disease, or remove or cause to be removed, any such person from any building or vessel to any other building or vessel or to the shore, or to or from any vehicle in any part of the city. Nor shall any person, by any exposure of any individual sick of any infectious disease, or of the body of such person, or by any negligent act connected therewith, or in respect of the care or custody thereof are by a part of the care or custody thereof respect of the care or custody thereof, or by a needless exposure of himself, cause or contribute to, or promote the spread of disease from any such person, or from any dead hady.

Section 144. It shall be the duty of the physicians or physicians.

shall be the duty of the phy and the officers and managers of every sanatorium, samtorium, day nursery, convalescent home, home for children, reformatory, training school, boarding school, hospital dispensary, or institution for the care or treatment of persons in the City of New York, immediately to report or cause to be reported to the said department, the name, age (so far as can be ascertained) and residence of every person received therein or treated thereat who is afflicted with puerperal septicemia or suppurative conjunctivitis, with the name of the disease with which the person is afflicted; and such physicians, officers and managers shall also report the name and address of the physician or mid-wife in attendance at the time of the onset of the disease, which information it is hereby made the duty of every institution herein specified to obtain and record

among its records.

Section 145. No principal or superintendent of any school, and no parent, master or custodian of any child or minor (having the power and authority to prevent) shall permit any child or minor having acute poliomyelitis (infantile paralysis), chicken-pox, diphtheria (croup), epidemic cerebro-spinal meningitis, measles, mumps, rubella (rotheln), scarlet fever, smallpox or whooping cough, or any child or minor in any family, or living with any family, in which any such disease exists or has recently existed, to attend any public or private school until the Department of Health shall have given its permission therefor, nor shall any such principal, superintendent, parent, master, or eustodian permit any child

any such principal, superintendent, parent, master, or custodian permit any child or minor to be unnecessarily exposed, or to needlessly expose any other person to the taking or to the infection of any contagious disease.

Section 165. No person shall allow to be retained unburied the dead body of any human being for a longer period than four days or, where death has resulted from acute poliomyelitis (infantile paralysis). Assatic cholera, diphtheria (croup), epidemic cerebro-spinal meningitis, measles, plague, scarlet fever, small-pox, typhus fever and yellow fever, for a longer period than twenty-four hours, after the death of such person, without a permit from the Sanitary Superintendent, an Assistant Sanitary Superintendent or the Director of the Bureau of Infectious an Assistant Sanitary Superintendent, or the Director of the Bureau of Infectious Diseases, which permit shall specify the length of time during which such body may be retained unburied.

EFFICIENCY STUDIES IN THE BUREAU OF CHILD HYGIENE In order to promote the efficiency of the bureau's activities, the Director of the Bureau of Child Hygiene some time ago organized a Division of Research and

The activities of this division are well indicated in the following summary of the investigations conducted and recommendations made since the beginning of the present year.

A detailed analysis of the causes of infant mortality in New York City, arranged

by boroughs and wards, and showing distribution with reference to race and cause of death. This exhaustive study has been kept up to date by the Chief of Division for the purpose of forming a basis for the infant mortality work of the Bureau.

Investigation of the methods of distributing supplies. This led to the adoption of a plan for facilitating such distribution and keeping a record of all supplies on hand, dates and amounts of distribution and quantities used. This covers the distribution of supplies not only to the offices of the Bureau but also to the infants' milk stations and children's clinics.

Investigation as to the methods of tabulating statistics regarding school medical impection. This led to the adoption of an entirely new set of report forms for the inspectors and nurses and tabulation sheets for the central office. The new forms make it possible to have on file in each school of the city, an exact statement, keep up

to date daily, of the conditions existing in the school with regard to contagious diseases, physical defects and treatment provided.

Investigation into the possibility of reducing the amount of elerical work performed by the inspectors and nurses by the use of a weekly report care. This plan was in aperation in Philadelphia and it was determined to see if it could be put into effect in this city. An investigation by the Division of Research and Efficiency and an intensive study in two localities of about six weeks' duration proved that the scheme was not workable under our system and that the amount of clerical work was not materially reduced thereby.

Detailed investigation of the actual causes of mortality in deaths reported as due to congenital diseases.

Detailed analyses of distribution of forces and other data necessary to support the estimate for both salary and supply budget for the Bureau of Child Hygiene. To the Chief of this division are daily referred a large number of letters of inquiry, the answers to which require the preparation and collection of special data.

DISINFECTIONS, SECOND QUARTER, 1914.

The accompanying statistical data present the activities of the Division of Dis-infection during the second quarter of 1914. While fewer houses were visited for the purpose of disinfection—8,836, as against 8,951 during the corresponding quarter of 1913—it is noted that almost 3,000 more rooms were disinfected. In the removal of goods for steam sterilization there has been a decrease of over 30 per cent. in the number of bundles removed.


