To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of New York :

City of New York: I would respectfully beg leave to call your at-tention to the fact, that there is no ordinance of the Common Council, which provides a penalty for carrying on the business of Pawn-broker without license. As this business, above most of the others, which are placed by law under the supervision of the authorities, is liable to the greatest abuse, and from the facility with which stolen property may be disposed of, when under the management of improper persons, affords a strong temptation to persons dishonestly inclined to commit crime. I submit an amendment to the second section of the first article of chapter 42 of the ordinances now in force, by which a the second section of the first article of chapter 42 of the ordinances now in force, by which a penalty may be imposed upon any person who follows the business without a license, or when, from improper practices, the license may be reoked.
