

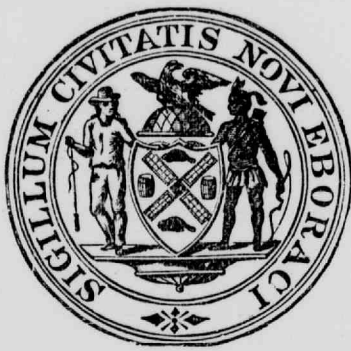

#### BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

##### STATED SESSION.

TUESDAY, November 23, 1880, {  
12 o'clock, M. }

The Board met in their chamber, No. 16 City Hall.

and On motion, the reading of the minutes of November 10, 16 and 22, 1880, was dispensed with.

##### MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

##### By the President—

Whereas, It is announced in the public press of this city that a play is now in course of preparation, called the Passion Play ; and  
Whereas, The production of this play in this country in any public place would be an insult to the Christian community ; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be requested to give this Board of Aldermen an opinion as to whether any of the laws now in force would be sufficient to prevent its introduction. And if none now exist, whether the Common Council have the power to pass an ordinance prohibiting the production and exhibition of this play before the public. And if they have the power to pass such an act, then he, the Corporation Counsel, shall prepare such an ordinance as will cover this case and all other cases that may arise in the future, and send the same to this Board for its immediate passage.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said preamble and resolution.  
Which was decided in the affirmative.

##### By Alderman Perley—

Petition of Mr. A. M. Dorley for permission to erect bay-windows on house southeast corner Fifth avenue and Eightieth street.

Petition of the Trustees of Mount Sinai Hospital, for remission of the Croton-water tax on their hospital building.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works, with instructions to report at the next regular meeting of the Board.

##### By Alderman Haffen—

Petition of Andrew J. Odell for permission to erect bay-window on house northeast corner of One Hundred and Fortieth street and Alexander avenue.

Whereupon Alderman Sauer offered the following :  
Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Andrew J. Odell to erect a bay-window on his house, northeast corner of One Hundred and Fortieth street and Alexander avenue, as shown on the accompanying diagram, said Andrew J. Odell being owner of the property fifty feet each side of said premises, the work done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works ; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.  
Which was decided in the affirmative.

##### By Alderman Strack—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to F. Kanders to retain the storm-door now in front of the entrance to No. 6 First avenue ; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.  
Which was decided in the affirmative.

Alderman Strack moved that his Honor the Mayor be requested to return to this Board a resolution, passed November 16, providing for two lamps in front of school at Nos. 15 and 17 East Third street.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

##### By Alderman Strack—

Resolved, That a lamp-post with Boulevard lamp be erected and lighted in front of Public School Nos. 15 and 17 East Third street, and that the lamp-post now in front of said school be removed and reset to a proper location, opposite said school, to conform to the new lamp, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Which was laid over.

##### By Alderman Slevin—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to H. Ahlheim to erect a meat-rack in front of his place of business, No. 61 East Houston street, the work done at his own expense ; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Alderman Marshall moved to refer to the Committee on Streets and Street Pavements.  
The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the negative.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, on a division called by Alderman Marshall, viz.:

##### By the President—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to William V. Byrne to extend the vault in front of No. 98 Greene street a distance of three feet beyond the line of the curb, upon payment of the usual fee, provided the work be done in a durable and substantial manner, and that said W. V. Byrne stipulates with the Commissioner of Public Works to save the city harmless from any loss or damage that may occur during the progress of or subsequent to the completion of the work, to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works ; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.  
Which was decided in the affirmative.

##### By the same—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Eliza G. Wilson to extend the vault in front of No. 100 Greene street a distance of three feet beyond the line of the curb upon payment of the usual fee, provided the work be done in a durable and substantial manner, and that said Eliza G. Wilson stipulates with the Commissioner of Public Works to save the city harmless from any loss or damage that may occur during the progress of or subsequent to the completion of the work, to be done at her own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works ; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.  
Which was decided in the affirmative.

##### By Alderman Sheils—

Resolved, That the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction be and they are hereby requested and, so far as in the power of this Common Council, directed to take measures to furnish the customary relief to the out-door poor immediately after the advent of cold weather—say on or about the first of December—during the present and in future years.

Resolved, That crosswalks be laid at the intersection of Fourth avenue and Seventy-seventh street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works ; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Resolved, That the sidewalk be flagged on the south side of Seventy-fourth street, between Fourth and Madison avenues, where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works ; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

##### By Alderman Kenney—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Edward J. O'Connor to retain signs now in front of his place of business, No. 1486 Third avenue ; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.  
Which was decided in the affirmative.

##### By Alderman Goodwin—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Dr. Fuller to erect a hitching-post and place a sign on the top, six by ten inches, near the curb-stone in front of No. 74 Varick street, the work done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works ; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.  
Which was decided in the affirmative.

##### By Alderman Sauer—

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to take the necessary measures to cause the sidewalk in front of No. 416 Broadway to be reflagged on the established grade of the street.

## To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

I return, without my approval, the accompanying resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted November 9, 1880, fixing the salaries of Clerks, Messengers, and Court Officers for the Surrogate's Office and Court.

The resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen, on the recommendation of the Surrogate, makes an aggregate of salaries, exclusive of his own, of \$49,400. The appropriations for such salaries in the Surrogate's Office were \$35,000 for 1878, \$42,000 for 1879, and \$44,500 for 1880.

In view of this large increase of expenditure I think that the action of the Common Council should be taken only upon a full and detailed statement of the necessity for the several items of expenditure to be authorized. The papers submitted with this resolution do not appear to meet this requirement. The Surrogate, in his communication to the Common Council, mentions only one instance of increased expenditure, viz., that section 2844 of the Code requires an examination of

guardians' accounts in the month of February in each year, and merely states in a general way that the new Code has increased the clerical labors of the office as well as those of the Surrogate, without specifying what such increased duties are.

The sign, for which permission is asked, is a banner suspended over the sidewalk beyond the stoop-line. In my opinion such signs should not be permitted. These bay-windows would project four feet beyond the street-line and extend the whole height of the building. In my opinion they would constitute an "extension of building front and house fronts within the stoop-line," which the Common Council have no authority to permit, but which they are especially empowered to prevent.

These bay-windows would project three and half feet beyond the street-line and extend the whole height of the building. In my opinion they would constitute an "extension of building front and house front within the stoop-line," which the Common Council have no authority to permit, but which they are especially empowered to prevent. On October 6, 1880, I returned, with my objections, two resolutions apparently intended to authorize these bay-windows.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, viz. :

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Finck, Foster, Goodwin, Haffen, Hall, Haughton, Helbig, Jacobus, Keenan, Kenney, Kirk, Marshall, McClave, Murphy, Perley, Sheils, Strack, and Wade—19.

Alderman Kirk called up veto message from his Honor the Mayor of resolution, as follows :

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Catharine Mullins to erect a stand for the sale of oysters, coffee, etc., on South street, between James ship and Roosevelt street, the same not to interfere with public travel; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The Board then, as provided in section 13, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, proceeded to reconsider the same, and, upon a vote being taken thereon, was adopted, notwithstanding the objections of his Honor the Mayor, as follows :

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, viz.: Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Coggey, Finck, Foster, Goodwin, Haffen, Hall, Haughton, Helbig, Jacobus, Keenan, Kenney, Kirk, Marshall, McClave, Murphy, Perley, Sauer, Sheils, Strack, and Wade—21.

Alderman Keenan called up G. O. 346, being a resolution, as follows: Resolved, That Croton water-pipes be laid on First avenue, from Ninety-seventh to Ninety-ninth street, as provided in chapter 381, Laws of 1879. The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, viz.: Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Coggey, Finck, Foster, Goodwin, Haffen, Hall, Haughton, Helbig, Keenan, Kenney, Kirk, Marshall, McClave, Murphy, Perley, Sauer, Sheils, Strack, and Wade—20.

The President called up veto message from his Honor the Mayor of an ordinance, as follows: AN ORDINANCE to permit bridges to be placed over the gutters in front of certain premises in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows: Section 1. It shall be lawful for any person, who so desires, to place and keep a bridge over the gutter in front of any building other than those used as private residences, except on Broadway, Fifth avenue, and Madison avenue, on the following conditions: First—Application must be made to the Bureau of Permits, and the sum of one dollar per annum, dating from the granting of such permit, paid for the privilege. Second—Every such bridge shall be constructed under the supervision and subject to the direction of the Department of Public Works, excepting in Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, where the same shall be constructed under the supervision and subject to the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks. Third—Every such bridge shall be so constructed that it can be easily moved, and it shall be the duty of every person to whom such privilege may be granted, and to all persons now enjoying a like privilege, to clean thoroughly, or cause to be so cleaned, the gutter underneath every such bridge, on Wednesday of each week, between the hours of sunrise and 9 o'clock A. M. The Mayor may, for any violation of this ordinance, or on the complaint of any citizen, or for any cause that he may deem sufficient, revoke any such permit so granted, or like privilege now enjoyed, without a permit.

Sec. 2. All ordinances, resolutions, or parts of ordinances or resolutions, inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Alderman Marshall moved to postpone the reconsideration thereof indefinitely. The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion. Which was decided in the negative by the following vote, on a division called by Alderman Marshall, viz.:

Affirmative—Aldermen Foster, Marshall, and Perley—3. Negative—The President, Aldermen Coggey, Finck, Goodwin, Haffen, Hall, Haughton, Helbig, Jacobus, Keenan, Kenney, Kirk, McClave, Murphy, Sauer, Sheils, Strack, and Wade—18.

The Board then, as provided in section 13, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, proceeded to reconsider the same, and, upon a vote being taken thereon, was adopted, notwithstanding the objections of his Honor the Mayor, as follows:

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Coggey, Finck, Foster, Goodwin, Haffen, Hall, Haughton, Helbig, Jacobus, Keenan, Kenney, Kirk, McClave, Murphy, Perley, Sauer, Sheils, Strack, and Wade—20. Negative—Alderman Marshall—1.

Alderman Sauer called up G. O. 350, being a resolution and ordinance, as follows: Resolved, That Ninety-eighth street, from the west line of Fourth avenue to the east curb-line of Fifth avenue, be regulated and graded, and that the sidewalks be flagged a space four feet wide, where not heretofore flagged, and that curb be set, where not heretofore set within the aforesaid limits, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Coggey, Finck, Foster, Goodwin, Haffen, Hall, Haughton, Helbig, Keenan, Kenney, Kirk, Marshall, McClave, Murphy, Perley, Sauer, Sheils, Strack, and Wade—20.

The Board then, as provided in section 13, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, proceeded to reconsider the same, and, upon a vote being taken thereon, was finally lost, as follows:

Affirmative—Aldermen Coggey, Foster, Goodwin, Haffen, Hall, Haughton, Helbig, Keenan, Kenney, Kirk, McClave, Sauer, and Sheils—13. Negative—The President, Aldermen Finck, Marshall, Murphy, Perley, Strack, and Wade—7.

Alderman Marshall called up G. O. 323, being an ordinance, as follows: AN ORDINANCE to prevent accidents to persons in small boats in any of the navigable waters within the jurisdiction of the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Every owner or occupant of any row-boat or other small vessel, except the boats owned or used by the Police Department, while engaged in navigating or sailing upon any of the waters within the corporate limits of the City of New York, between sunset and sunrise, shall display a bright red light from the bow or stern of every such boat or vessel, suspended from the top of a pole to be not less than four feet above the gunwale of every such boat or vessel, under the penalty of not exceeding ten dollars fine, or imprisonment in the City Prison not exceeding ten days, or by both fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the Court or Police Magistrate, for every such offense or violation of this ordinance.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. The Commissioners of the Police Department are hereby required to enforce rigidly the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Alderman Sheils moved to recommit to the Committee on Law Department, and that boatmen interested be notified to appear before the Committee.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion. Which was decided in the affirmative.

Alderman Marshall called up G. O. 299, being an ordinance, as follows:

AN ORDINANCE to regulate the erection of telegraph-lines in the streets of the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. It shall not be lawful to erect any telegraph-post in front of the entrance of any dwelling-house, nor within a distance of fifty feet from the nearest telegraph-post, nor near the corner of any street upon a line with any crosswalk, nor within a distance of ten feet of any public street-lamp; and every telegraph-post now erected or hereafter to be erected within the corporate limits of the City of New York shall be painted a light brown color for a distance of ten feet, measuring upward from the level of the sidewalk, excepting those having a fire-alarm box attached to them, which shall be painted a red color, and the remainder of every such telegraph-post, and the cross-pieces thereon, shall be painted white. The name of the company, or other owner of every such post, shall be branded or painted thereon in a conspicuous place, within the distance of ten feet measured upward from the level of the sidewalk, and no sign, hand-bill, or advertisement of any kind shall be placed, pasted, or otherwise fastened on any such telegraph post.

Sec. 2. Any person offending against any of the foregoing provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof before any of the Police Magistrates or Justices of this city, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars, or in default of the payment of such fine, by imprisonment not exceeding ten days.

Sec. 3. The Commissioner of Public Works and the Commissioners of the Police Department are hereby instructed to carry into effect the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect on December 15, 1880.

Alderman Wade moved to amend by adding to the first section, at the end thereof, the following: "without consent of owners of said posts; such consent to be granted only without compensation."

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion. Which was decided in the affirmative.

Alderman Perley moved, as an amendment, that the words "15th day of December, 1880," be stricken out, and the words "January 1, 1881," inserted in lieu thereof.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion. Which was decided in the affirmative.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree with said ordinance as amended. Which was decided in the affirmative.

Alderman Marshall called up G. O. 326, being resolutions and ordinance, as follows: Resolved, That the resolution and ordinance to set curb and gutter stones in and flag a space four feet wide the sidewalks of Ninth avenue, from Eighty-first to One Hundred and Tenth street, approved by the Mayor October 20, 1880, be and are hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Resolved, That Ninth avenue, from the centre line of Eighty-first street to the south curb-line of One Hundred and Tenth street, be regulated and graded, and that curb be set with returns to the house-line at each of the intersecting streets where not heretofore set, and that the sidewalks be flagged a space four feet wide where not heretofore flagged between the aforesaid limits, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolutions. Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Coggey, Finck, Foster, Goodwin, Haffen, Hall, Helbig, Keenan, Kenney, Kirk, Marshall, McClave, Perley, Sauer, Sheils, Strack, and Wade—18.

Alderman McClave called up G. O. 343, being a resolution, as follows:

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to M. M. Stanfield to erect in front of entrance of Victoria Hotel, on Twenty-seventh street, a wooden porch twelve feet long, twelve feet high, and five feet wide; and also in front of entrance No. 1152 Broadway, an open iron porch three feet wide and one story high, substantially as per drawings hereto annexed, the work done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Alderman Sheils moved to recommit to the Committee on Public Works.

west of First avenue, and three on the south side of One Hundred and Sixth street, 325 feet east of  
Second avenue, each to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 744, for one four-story tenement-house, 25 feet 2 inches by 58 feet, to be built on a lot  
25 feet 2 inches by 70 feet, at No. 807 Fourth avenue, to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 745, for four four-story tenement-houses, each 18 feet 9 inches by 65 feet, to be built  
on lots each 18 feet 9 inches by 100 feet, on the south side of One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street,  
beginning 225 feet west of Sixth avenue, each to be occupied by five families.

Plan (No. 746) for five four-story tenement-houses each 25 feet by 64 feet, with an extension 18  
feet wide and 16 feet deep, to be built on lots each 25 feet by 100 feet, at Nos. 151, 152, and 154  
East Forty-ninth street, and 153 and 155 East Forty-eighth street, each house to be occupied by nine  
families.

Plan, No. 699 2, and plan, No. 743, were laid on the table for further consideration.

### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending  
November 13, 1880:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was  
2,114, as follows, viz.: 6 public buildings, 913 tenement-houses, 105 private dwellings, 100 other  
dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 20 stores and warehouses, 34 stables, 36 slaughter-  
houses, 1 lime kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 1 public drain, 44 sunken and vacant lots,  
1 gas works, 1 tripe and meat establishment, 1 dam, 1 line gathering, 84 yards courts and areas,  
91 cellars and basements, 220 waste-pipes and drains, 243 privies and water-closets, 63 street-  
gutters and sidewalks, 19 dangerous stairways, 2 cisterns and cesspools, 6 smoky chimneys, 25  
other nuisances, together with 83 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 681.

During the past week 155 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary  
and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 62 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the  
Health Officer of the Port.

92 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 91 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have  
disinfected and fumigated 85 houses, 85 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Three cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

for the two weeks ending November 13, 1880:

The certificates of 587 births, 48 still-births, 176 marriages, and 605 deaths, reported to have  
taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, November  
13, 1880. This shows an increase of 83 births, 12 still-births, 1 marriage, and 22 deaths when  
compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the  
corresponding week of the year 1879, there was an increase of 93 births, 10 still-births, and 102  
deaths, and a decrease of 85 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding  
week the deaths from diphtheria decreased 14; croup, 1; whooping cough, 2; erysipelas, 1;  
typhoid fever, 10; diarrhoeal diseases, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; bronchitis, 8; pneumonia, 4;  
meningitis and encephalitis, 4; convulsions, 6; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5;  
gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; surgical operations, 1; while the  
deaths from scarlatina increased 14; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; ale holism, 5; cancer, 9; phthisis  
pulmonalis, 3; heart diseases, 4; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 4; hydrocephalus  
and tubercular meningitis, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 12; prema-  
ture and prenatual births, 2; suicide, 1; drowning, 4. The number of deaths from malarial  
fevers, puerperal diseases, inanition, aneurism, and apoplexy, was the same in the two succeeding  
weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and  
Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three  
preceding weeks.

The ages of 125 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 166  
under two years; 240 under five years, and 59 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths  
of children under five years of age was 20 more than the number reported during last week, and  
represent 39.67 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 101 were in institutions, 300 in tenement-houses, 180 in houses containing 3 families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 11 were on the basement floor, 121 on the first, 176 on the second, 108 on the third, 51 on the fourth, 16 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth. 601 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 4 non-residents. 58 were stated to be single, 131 married, 73 widowed, and the condition of 343 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week is as follows, viz.: City deaths, 605; still-births, 48; bodies in transit, 26. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 70 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 587 births, 176 marriages, 48 still-births, 605 deaths, 26 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 44 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 3 of marriage, and 33 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 13, 1880, was 49.3 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.984, the mean humidity was 73, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,742, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.64 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 564 deaths and still-births, or 86.37 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 12; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 260; City, pauper burial ground (undenominational), 63; Greenwood (undenominational), 39; Lutheran, (undenominational), 80; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 24; Evergreen (undenominational), 27; Woodlawn (undenominational), 20; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 6; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 5; Macphelah, L. I. (Jewish), 6; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 5; Washington (undenominational), 13.

The actual mortality for the week ending November 6, 1880, was 601; this is 112 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1879, and 145.8 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.90 per 1,000 persons living, the population, according to the last United States census, being 1,200,577.

## PROPOSALS FOR LIGHTING THE PUBLIC LAMPS.

**PROPOSALS FOR FURNISHING THE GAS OR** other illuminating material for, and Lighting, Extinguishing, Cleaning, Repairing, and Maintaining the Public Lamps (and supplying Gas, etc., for new lamps when required) on the Streets, Avenues, Piers, Parks, and places in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of the City of New York, excepting that portion of the Twenty-fourth Ward formerly known as the Town of Kingsbridge, for the period of four months, commencing January 1, 1881, and ending April 30, 1881, both days inclusive.

Proposals for the above, made in accordance with sec. 73, chap. 335, Laws of 1873, and chap. 478 of the Laws of 1879, and the Revised Ordinances of the City of New York, chap. 8, article 2, and inclosed in a sealed envelope, indorsed, "Proposals for furnishing the illuminating material for, and lighting and extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, and maintaining the public lamps," with the name of the party making the same written thereon, will be received at the office of the Commissioner of Public Works, until 12 o'clock M. of Monday, November 29, 1880, at which place and hour they will be publicly opened by said Commissioner and read.

Bidders are required to state in their proposals their names and places of residence; the names of all persons interested with them, and, if no other person be so interested, they shall distinctly state the fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making any estimate for the same supplies and work; and that it is in all respects fair, and without collusion or fraud; and, also, that no member of the Common Council, head of a Department, Chief of a Bureau, Deputy thereof, or Clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof; which proposals must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each proposal shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders of the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person or persons making the bid or proposal, they will, on its being so awarded, become bound as his or their sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he or they shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he or they would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of security required for the completion of the contract, and stated in the proposals, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety, and otherwise; that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith, and with an intention to execute the bond required by section 27, article 2, chapter 8, of the Revised Ordinances of the City of New York, if the contract shall be awarded to the person or persons for whom he consents to become surety. The adequacy and sufficiency of the sureties offered to be determined by the Comptroller.

Bidders are required to state in their proposals the several streets or parts of streets in which they propose to perform the requirements herein contained, and also the illuminating or candle-power of the gas they propose to furnish, when tested at a distance of not less than one mile from the place of manufacture, and bidders proposing to furnish any illuminating material other than illuminating or coal gas, must state distinctly what kind of material they propose to furnish, and the illuminating power of the burner they propose to use for the same.

Bidders are also required to state the price for which they will furnish the gas (of not less than sixteen-candle power by photometrical test, at a distance of not less than one mile from the place of manufacture) or other illuminating material for each lamp, including the lighting, extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, and reglazing the lanterns, and replacing the cocks, tubes, burners, cross heads, lamp irons, and lanterns thereto, for the period from January 1, 1881, to April 30, 1881, both days inclusive, stating the price, for the above named period of four months, for each lamp.

Bidders are also required to state a price for which they will repair lamp-posts, including straightening and reeading, and for each new lamp fitted up, as follows:

For each lamp-post straightened, stating the price per post.  
For each column releaded, stating the price per post.  
For each column refitted, stating the price per post.  
For each lamp-post removed, stating the price per post.  
For each lamp-post refitted, stating the price per post.  
For each new lamp fitted up, stating the price per post.

The bidders are required to write out the amount of their bids in their estimates, in addition to inserting the same in figures.

The number of public lamps to be contracted for is about 2,950.  
The burners for illuminating gas are to be of a capacity to burn three cubic feet of gas per hour under a pressure of one inch, and in case the illuminating material shall be other than illuminating gas, then the burners to be used for such illuminating material shall give a light (by photometrical test) equal to the light given by the gas-burners in use in the public lamps in the City of New York.

Should any alteration or attachment be required to any portion of the lamps for which proposals are made in consequence of the use of illuminating material other than gas, then such alteration shall be done and such attachment placed on the lamps without expense to the city.

The number of hours the lamps are to be kept burning during the contract is 1,383 1/2.

The amount of security required is sixty per cent. of the total amount of the bid.

The award of the contract will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids.  
Should the person or persons to whom the contract is so awarded neglect or refuse to accept to contract within forty-eight hours after written notice that the same has been awarded to his bid or proposal, or if he accept, but does not execute the contract and give the proper security, it may be re-advertised and relet as provided by law and ordinance.

Bidders are informed that no deviation from the specifications will be allowed, unless a written permission shall have been previously obtained from the Mayor, Comptroller, and Commissioner of Public Works.

The right is reserved to assign and designate to any bidder, whose bid shall be accepted, the number and location of the lamps to be lighted by such bidder, in any portion of the city for which proposals are received, and to increase or diminish such number.

The right is reserved to determine and designate, after the proposals are opened, what illuminating material shall be used in the public lamps, or any number of them, during the period before mentioned; also to decline any or all proposals if deemed for the interests of the Corporation, and no proposal will be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to the Corporation, upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as security or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.

If the proposal of any bidder proposing to furnish illuminating gas shall include any lamps with which the pipes or mains of such bidder are not connected at the time of the making of the bid, and a contract for furnishing the gas for and lighting, extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, and maintaining any such lamps, shall be awarded to such bidder, in that case, thirty days from the date of the execution of such contract shall be allowed to such bidder in which to connect such pipes or mains with such lamps.

But no payment to such bidder, on account of any such lamps, will be made for the time so allowed, nor until the same shall have been connected with the mains of such bidder, nor except for the time during which all the requirements herein mentioned shall have been fully performed.

If any such assessment shall not be paid before the first day of December, 1880, the rate of interest thereon will be twelve per centum per annum thereafter, as provided by law, from the date of confirmation to the date of payment. The said act of 1880 is published herewith.

## CHAPTER 195.

**AN ACT** in relation to the payment of assessments for local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Sec. 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chapter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assessment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein prescribed.

Sec. 3. Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assessments not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore requiring the payment of any penalty or interest over the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assessment.

Sec. 4. No provision of this act hereinbefore contained shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assessment for the collection of which assessment the property has been sold.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

## ARREARS OF TAXES.

## NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS

**THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW** York hereby gives notice to owners of Real Estate in said city, that, as provided by chapter 123 of the Laws of 1880, they may now pay any arrears of taxes and Croton water rents levied prior to the year 1877, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum. If, however, such taxes and Croton water rents are not paid before the first day of October next, the property on which they are due will be sold for taxes immediately thereafter with the addition of accrued interest thereon at the rate of 12 per cent. per annum from the respective dates of which they were levied.

## CHAPTER 123.

**AN ACT** in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over and above seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, whole or in part, for such period as he may determine not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
