BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK, MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL, THURSDAY, December 14, 1882—11 o'clock A.M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present-All the members, viz. : Wm. R. Grace, the Mayor ; Allan Campbell, the Comptroller ; Wm. Sauer, the President of the Board of Aldermen ; Thos. B. Asten, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments. The minutes of the meeting held December 13, 1882, were read and approved.

On motion, the Board proceeded to the consideration of the Final Estimate for the year 1883. The estimate for the Police Department was taken up for consideration. Joel W. Mason and James Matthews, Commissioners of Police, appeared before the Board and made statements relative to the estimate for the said Department, and presented a petition of taxpayers residing in the Twenty-eighth Police Precinct, requesting an appropriation for a new station-house in the said precinct. Which was ordered on file.

The estimate for the Board of Education was then taken up for consideration.

Stephen A. Walker, Frederick W. Devoe and Gilbert H. Crawford, Commissioners of Education, appeared before the Board and made statements relative to the estimate for school buildings, etc.

SIR-There were 578 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, December 9, 1882, which is a decrease of 6, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 102 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881. The actual mortality for the week ending December 2, 1882, was 603, which is 30.0 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.21 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,295,174.
