

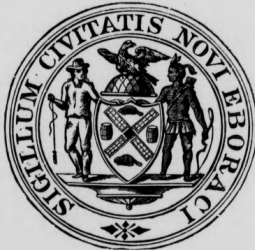

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 22, 1887:

There were 6,016 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.

There were 752 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.

There were 203 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 73 permits.

There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 3 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 7 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 46 permits.

The certificates of 765 births, 64 still-births, 266 marriages and 616 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 22, 1887. This shows a decrease of 53 births and a decrease of 3 still-births, 36 marriages and 24

deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 114 births, 1 still-birth and a decrease of 37 marriages, and 60 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from diphtheria, decreased 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; diarrheal diseases, 1; manition, 2; rheumatism and gout, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 16; bronchitis, 14; pneumonia, 4; heart diseases, 2; aneurism, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; convulsions, 6; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 9; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; premature and preterminal births, 3; suicide, 1; drowning, 4; while the deaths from small-pox increased 1; measles, 3; croup, 8; whooping cough, 2; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 3; malarial fevers, 4; puerperal diseases, 5; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 5; gastritis, gastro-enteritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 3; surgical operations, 2. The number of deaths from scarlatina, alcoholism and Bright's disease and nephritis was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 143 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 176 under two years, 237 under five years, and 52 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 6 more than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 38.47 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 137 were in institutions, 331 in tenement-houses, 129 in houses containing three families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 11 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 11 were on the basement floor, 108 on the first, 154 on the second, 98 on the third, 69 on the fourth, 28 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 597 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 19 non-residents; 98 were stated to be single, 167 married, 81 widowed, and the condition of 270 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 616; still-births, 64; bodies in transit, 19; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 75 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 765 births, 266 marriages, 64 still-births, 616 deaths, 19 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 122 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 91 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 22, 1887, was 50.4 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 29.902; the mean humidity was 65, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,164, and the total amount of rain-fall was 2.08 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 599 deaths and still-births, or 89.43 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 29; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 251; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 87; Greenwood (undenominational), 38; Lutheran (undenominational), 71; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 20; Evergreen (undenominational), 40; Woodlawn (undenominational), 16; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 17; Union (Methodist Protestant), 2; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 7; Macphelah, L. I. (Jewish), 4; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 7; Washington (undenominational), 10.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending October 15, 1887, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 4; Second, 0; Third, 4; Fourth, 7; Fifth, 8; Sixth, 8; Seventh, 26; Eighth, 15; Ninth, 28; Tenth, 22; Eleventh, 27; Twelfth, 91; Thirteenth, 13; Fourteenth, 15; Fifteenth, 10; Sixteenth, 14; Seventeenth, 46; Eighteenth, 35; Nineteenth, 106; Twentieth, 42; Twenty-first, 37; Twenty-second, 51; Twenty-third, 17; Twenty-fourth, 5.

The actual mortality for the week ending October 15, 1887, was 631; this is 53 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1886, and 37.4 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.95 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,494,816.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held October 27, 1887.

Present—Commissioners Stark, Matthews and Marshall.

The minutes of the meeting held October 21, 1887, were read and approved.

The report of Charles B. Husted, Dock Master, in reference to the application of the Knickerbocker Ice Company for permission to retain open shed, engine and tally-house on the bulkhead foot of Twentieth street, North river, was laid over for further examination.

A communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, in relation to the last half monthly roll, and in reference to the appointment of Hugh Byrne as a Watchman, was referred to executive session.

A communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, recommending the discharge of Laborers, Dock Builders and Ship Carpenters, and requesting that others be appointed to fill their places, was referred to executive session.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Counsel to the Corporation—Respecting the title to wharf property between Sixth and Thirteenth streets, East river, and stating that action has been commenced against the assignees and trustees of John Roach, deceased.

From Department Public Works—Stating that they are about to construct a sewer in West street, between Murray and Jay streets, and requesting permit to connect with the sewer built by the Department through Pier 21, North river. The action of the President in granting said request was approved.

From Counsel to the Corporation—Approving contract for building Pier, new 62, North river, and for building crib-bulkhead with appurtenances, from East One Hundred and Fourteenth to East One Hundred and Fifteenth street, Harlem river.

From New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company—Agreeing to the terms and conditions of permit to fill in ditches on Willis avenue, Harlem river.

From H. L. Herbert & Co.—Requesting permission to retain temporary coal-pocket at the foot of Twentieth street, East river, a short time longer. The President authorized to advise that the said coal-pocket must be removed on or before November 1, 1887.

From Chas. E. Emery—Requesting map of water-front below Eighth street. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief.

From Frank Doughty—Requesting appointment as Janitor of Pier "A," North river.

From William P. Clyde & Co.—Agreeing to the terms and conditions of permit for the erection of shed on Pier 15, East river.

From New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company:

1st. Agreeing to the terms and conditions of permit for laying rail tracks, etc., on Pier at the foot of West Thirty-sixth street, North river.

2d. In relation to renewal of lease of site for Pier at West Fifty-ninth street, North river. The action of Commissioner Marshall in requesting the Counsel to the Corporation to prepare said renewal lease was approved.

From William P. Greenlie and Herman Clark—Consenting to the extension of the time for completing the bulkhead, foot of Seventy-sixth street, East river, to October 17, 1887, granted to John Gillies.

From E. W. Fisher—Requesting the Department to test a barrel of Portland cement. The action of Commissioner Marshall in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to test said cement was approved.

On motion, permission was granted to the Corporation of Public Charities and Correction:

1st. Reporting that fenders and mooring-piles are required at the bulkhead at One Hundred and Twentieth street, East river, in order to land the "Thomas S. Brennan" thereat.

2d. Reporting that piles require placing at Pier foot of Twenty-sixth street, East river.

3d. Reporting that the mooring-posts on the bulkhead at the upper landing on east side of Blackwell's Island are so insecure that captains of canal boats refuse to land there. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report.

From George A. Dearborn, Dock Master:

1st. Approving of the application of the Ridgwood Ice Company for permission to enlarge tally-house, located on the bulkhead north of Seventy-ninth street, East river.

On motion, permission was granted to the Ridgwood Ice Company to enlarge said tally-house by extending it two feet over the stringpiece.

2d. Reporting the sinking of canal-boat "A. M. Hitchcox" at north side of Pier foot Eighty-sixth street, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

3d. Reporting that obstructions in East Seventy-sixth street prevent the use of the bulkhead thereat.

4th. Reporting that the Lowe Wrecking Company have commenced to raise the canal-boat "A. M. Hitchcox," sunk at Pier foot of Eighty-sixth street, East river.

From Edward Abbel, Dock Master—Reporting that the chain fastening holding spring-pile at the outer end upper corner of Pier 44, East river, is loose. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair was approved.

From Charles B. Husted, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting that piers at Jane street, Bogart street, Bloomfield street, Little West Twelfth street and West Fifteenth street, are in need of cleaning. The President authorized to send the Department of Street Cleaning a copy of said report and request them to clean said piers.

2d. Reporting that iron spikes on fender-piles require fastening at Pier foot of West Seventeenth street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair was approved.

3d. Requesting a new stove and pipe for use in his office, with privilege to select the same. The action of the President, in directing him to report the cost of such a stove as he desires, was approved.

From Charles H. Hutchinson, Dock Master—Reporting favorably on Henry Fischer's application for permission to locate a derrick foot of Fifty-fourth street, East river, provided it is maintained for public use.

On motion, permit was granted to Henry Fischer to locate a derrick, as recommended by the Dock Master, the same to be and remain during the will of the Board.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty.

2d. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending October 22, 1887.

3d. Reporting as to ownership, etc., of the undivided one-half of Pier 8, East river.

4th. Reporting repairs and supplies needed at Dock Master's Office at Seventy-ninth street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to furnish the supplies and make the repairs required, as recommended in his report, was approved.

5th. Reporting that the work of dredging at Pier, new 37, North river, under Contract No. 254, was completed October 17th instant, and recommending that the time for the completion of said contract be extended to and including that date.

On motion, the report was received and recommendation adopted.

6th. Reporting that about forty feet in length of the bulkhead, beginning at a point about one hundred and twenty feet north of Bank street, North river, has broken down, and should be rebuilt from about low water up. The Secretary directed to notify the Knickerbocker Ice Company and Canda & Kane, alleged owners or occupants, to repair, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

7th. Reporting on Secretary's Order No. 7049, in reference to the complaint of the Dock Protective Association as to the condition of the bulkhead between Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets, East river. The Secretary directed to send a copy of said report to the Dock Protective Association.

8th. Report on Secretary Order No. 6691, as to the condition of and the repairs required to the structure formally called a pier at the foot of Ninety-sixth street, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to make temporary repairs to the sheathing, etc., as recommended in his report, at cost of about \$75.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6648, that he had directed and superintended the driving of piles and necessary repairing to Pier between One Hundred and Sixteenth and One Hundred and Seventeenth streets, Harlem river.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7024, that he had repaired Pier at Seventy-ninth street, North river.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6957, that he had directed and superintended refastening and renewing piles at Pier, new 26, North river.

12th. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 5806, 5812, that he had supervised the dredging in front of bulkhead between West Fifteenth and Sixteenth and Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets, North river.

13th. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 7004, 7008, that he had made requisition for dredging in front of bulkhead foot of Twenty-ninth street, East river, and superintended dredging south of said street.

14th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7008, that he had repaired deck of Pier at Forty-sixth street, North river.

15th. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 6482 and 6327, that he had superintended erection of sheds on Pier 9, and platform between Piers 8 and 9, North river, in accordance with plans and specifications.

16th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6516, that he had directed and superintended the necessary repairing of bulkhead and dumping-board thereon foot of Thirty-ninth street, East river.

17th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6561, that he had superintended and directed the driving of fender-piles and putting on of fenders at Pier 45, East river.

18th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6890, that he had directed and superintended the further repairing of bulkhead, from Eleventh to Thirteenth street, East river.

19th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6927, that he had superintended and directed driving piles on the southwest corner of Tripp's grain elevator, at Pier, foot of Thirty-fourth street, North river.

20th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6979, that he had superintended dredging at bulkhead foot of Montgomery street, East river.

21st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7014, that he had superintended dredging at Pier, old 23, North river.

22d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7047, that he had superintended and directed the repairing of bulkhead, between Seventy-ninth and Eightieth streets, East river.

23d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7053, that he had repaired Pier, new 46, North river.

24th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7073, that he had directed and superintended repairing sheathing on the deck of north half Pier 62, East river.

25th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7074, that he had directed and superintended the repairing of the sheathing on the deck of south half of Pier 62, East river.

The action of the President in issuing a permit to Frank R. Bonnell to drive seven spring piles on the south side and end of Pier 6, North river, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, was approved.

On motion, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, Permission was given to the Old Colony Steamboat Company, occupant of Pier, old 28, and bulkhead adjoining, by resolution of this Board on the 9th July, 1879, to construct a platform on piles in front of the bulkhead adjacent to the northerly side of said pier, about fifty-three feet long, and extending westerly about fifty-five feet, and providing that the Company should pay for the land under water covered by said platform, the sum of \$250 per annum; and,

Whereas, By resolution of the Board of Docks passed on the 23d July, 1879, permission was granted to said Company to extend the platform then in course of erection a distance of sixty-seven

feet westerly instead of fifty-five feet, and to pay therefor an additional sum of \$50 as rent for land under water to be covered by the increased width of said platform; and,

Whereas, By resolutions of the Board on the 16th June, 1886, and the 12th January, 1887, the Old Colony Steamboat Company was authorized and permitted to build an additional platform on piles, extending from the existing bulkhead westwardly about sixty-five feet and from the existing platform erected under permit granted to the company July 23, 1879, to about ten feet southerly of the southerly side of Pier, old 29, North river, and to erect a shed thereon, and to pay therefor the sum of twenty-five cents per square foot per annum for all land under water covered by the platform to be erected under this permit; now be it

Resolved, That the above resolutions of the 9th and 23d July, 1879, the 10th June, 1886, and the 12th January, 1887, be amended by the addition of the following:

Resolved, That the Old Colony Steamboat Company be and hereby are granted permission to maintain and occupy during the will and pleasure of the Board, the platform constructed at the premises above described, and in accordance with the terms and conditions of the resolutions aforesaid, provided that the Company agree in writing to accept all terms and conditions and to pay for the land under water covered by all said platforms at the rate of twenty-five cents per square foot per annum, the same to be payable to the Treasurer of this Department quarterly at the end of each quarter, or so much of the time as they may occupy it; and further provided, "that the platforms erected under the foregoing resolutions and the sheds maintained thereon, are for temporary purposes only and that the permits are revocable at any time by this Board; and also provided that the company will, within ten days from the date of this resolution, file an agreement to remove any and all structures of every kind that have been built and are now maintained under this and preceding permits, and restore the premises to the same condition that they were in at the date of the permits, granted by the resolutions aforesaid, natural wear and tear excepted, within twenty days after notice be given for such removal."

The following preambles and resolution were, on motion, adopted:

Whereas, It appears that John Nesbit's Sons have erected a fence on the south side of Thirty-seventh street, East river, also projection of a shed beyond the Pier line on the south side, and a small shed on the bulkhead at the northerly side, all said erections being on land belonging to the city and under the charge and control of this Department; and,

Whereas, Notice was sent on the 2d July, 1887, to said John Nesbit's Sons to remove said fence, and again on the 18th July, notice was sent to remove the fence and projection and small shed, referred to, and again on the 12th of August following a similar notice was sent to said firm of John Nesbit's Sons, ordering and requiring them to remove all said structures on or before September 1st, or the penalty for violation of the rules and regulations of this Department would be imposed; and,

Whereas, A final notice was served on W. H. Nesbit, one of said firm, by the Dock Master of the District on the 15th September, imposing a penalty of twenty dollars per day for each and every day after September 1st, till said structures should be removed, unless the orders of the Board in respect to the matter should be complied with forthwith; and,

Whereas, The said firm of John Nesbit's Sons have neglected to conform to and comply with the repeated orders of the Board as stated, and remove the structures as above described, but still maintain and use the same contrary to law and contrary to the notice and direction aforesaid of this Board,

Resolved, That the said John Nesbit's Sons be and they are hereby fined a separate penalty of twenty dollars for each and every day from the first day of September, 1887, to this date, the 27th day of October, 1887, being the time that has elapsed since the expiration of the time within which they were required to remove the said structures.

The minutes of the executive sessions of October 5, 19 and 21, and of the stated meeting of October 19 were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 3045 to 3059, inclusive, and, on motion of Commissioner Dowd, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

Also recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That an appropriation of two hundred and forty-five dollars be made for the purchase of disk diagrams for the use of the Division Engineers.

Adopted.

Also reported that they had considered the recommendation of the Chief Engineer that an appropriation be made for the purchase of coal for the offices of the Engineers of the various divisions and the Tarrytown headquarters, and recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That an extension of time, to and including Monday next, October 31, 1887, be and the same is hereby granted to John Brunton & Co., contractors, within which their bondsmen or security may execute stipulations extending their liability on the bond for and during the completion of the work under their contracts on the New Croton Aqueduct, under the extension of time granted by the Commissioners.

Adopted.

Also recommended the adoption of the following resolution.

Resolved, That an appropriation of \$1,150 be made for the purpose of exchanging the diamond drill and engine now in use on the work of the New Croton Aqueduct for one of a more improved style, to be selected by the Chief Engineer.

The resolution was adopted and the appropriation made.

Also reported on the claims of Inspectors John Donnelly, John H. Decker and William Fitzgerald for pay for absence caused by sickness contracted upon the work, which were referred to them on the 5th instant; and submitted an opinion from the Counsel to the Corporation, wherein he holds that the Aqueduct Commissioners are liable for such claims; and recommended that the Committee of Finance and Audit be directed to settle said claims in accordance with said opinion.

And, in connection therewith, recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That hereafter, when any employee is absent for more than one month continuously, from sickness or otherwise, such employee be suspended, without pay, and the Chief Engineer is hereby directed to promulgate this action with regard to the members of the Engineer Corps.

The report of the Committee was approved, and the recommendation and resolution therein contained adopted.

The Committee on Real Estate submitted the following report:

Upon the lands taken from the Chesborough estate, near Shaft No. 25, there is an old dwelling house now inhabited by workmen employed by the contractors, which house must soon be removed to make way for the dump, etc. We have had the house examined by several of the largest dealers in second-hand building materials, and have received bids from them, and also one from Mr. Charles Petersen, whose bid of \$150 is the highest, and who will remove the building at his own expense, as soon as its removal is required by the progress of the work. We therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Committee on Real Estate are hereby authorized and empowered to sell to Charles Petersen, for the sum of \$150, the old dwelling-house now standing upon Parcel No. 71 of the lands taken for the New Aqueduct at Shaft No. 25, in the Twelfth Ward of this City, the bid of that amount by said Petersen being the highest bid obtainable for said dwelling.

The report of the Committee was approved and the resolution adopted.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Public Works, dated October 24, 1887, transmitting a copy of an opinion received by him from the Counsel to the Corporation, having reference to the specifications for building Section No. 16 of the New Croton Aqueduct, from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue to the reservoir in Central Park, and setting forth some changes which, in his opinion, should be made in said specifications, which were read, and the whole subject matter was referred to the Committee on Construction.

The Secretary gave notice of the filing of a lien by the Okonite Company against Sections 13 and 14 of the New Croton Aqueduct, which was ordered filed, and notice given to John Brunton & Co., contractors, for said sections.

The Chief Engineer made verbal report that he required the services, temporarily, of three laborers for work on the East Branch Reservoir, and recommended that he be authorized to employ three men for that work; and, on motion of Commissioner Barnes, the recommendation was adopted.

By Commissioner Ridgway:

Resolved, That the President and Secretary be and they are hereby authorized and directed to publish in the CITY RECORD and in the New York "Tribune," and in the New York "Star," the notice and advertisement for sealed bids or proposals for doing the work and furnishing the materials for the masonry dam and other work to be constructed on the east branch of the Croton river, in the Town of South East, Putnam County, New York, as called for in the forms of contract approved by the Aqueduct Commissioners on the 19th instant.

Commissioner Barnes moved to amend by inserting the "Sanitary Engineer" and the "Engineering and Contract Journal," which amendment was carried.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of the contract, over and above all his debts or liabilities, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety and otherwise; and that he has offered himself as surety in good faith and with the intention of executing the bond required by law.
