

Report for the Quarter ending March 31, 1891.

#### WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections and reinspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police was 146,774, classified as follows:

The number of citizens' complaints received was 3,543. All of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police for investigation

and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent, during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 429 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 142 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 24 permits to land rags (in bulk), under bonds; and 33 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

The death-rate for the quarter was 24.58, lower than for the corresponding quarter of any year since 1884, when it was 23.83. The actual number of deaths (10,214) was lower than in any year since 1887, when there were 9,723.

The number of deaths from contagious diseases varied little from the number in the first quarter of 1890, excepting in measles and scarlet fever, the deaths from which were respectively 235 and 303, against 106 and 146 in 1890. Even with this increase, however, the death-rate from these diseases differed little from the average for five years past, viz.: measles .57 against an average of .54, and scarlet fever .73 against .76. Typhoid fever showed a considerable decrease, the deaths having been 42, against 62 in 1890, and an average of 55 for the past five years.

Toward the end of March an epidemic of influenza began to affect the mortality, there having been 10 deaths from that disease reported during the week ending March 28, out of the unusually large total of 895\*, and the deaths from pneumonia for the quarter being high, viz.: 1,626 against a 5-year average of 1,493, this average, it should be remembered, including the similar epidemic of 1890.

The deaths from phthisis were more than a hundred below the 5-year average, viz.: 1,367 against 1,491.

The deaths of children under 5 years of age numbered 3,882, against a 5-year average of 3,922, the corresponding death-rates, estimated upon the entire population, being 9.34 against 10.31.

#### OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY-NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the quarter ending March 31, 1891, the number of notices issued by the Board was 5,973. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

The subjects of the notices of the Board above referred to are as follows:

A TIENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and obligation as 3 paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns, shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.
