



PETITION.

By Alderman Moebus—

Petition of the New York Junction Railway Company for permission to construct, maintain and operate a surface railroad on Willis avenue and other streets in the City of New York.

To The Honorable the Common Council of the City of New York:

The petition of the North New York Junction Railway Company respectfully shows:

That your petitioner is a corporation duly organized under the Railroad Law of the State of New York for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating a street surface railroad for public use in the conveyance of persons and property in cars, for compensation in the City of New York, and that the said railroad is proposed to be built, maintained and operated upon and along the surface of the following streets, avenues and highways in the City of New York, namely:

Commencing at a point or place on Willis avenue south of the Southern Boulevard, thence with double tracks, through, along and upon Willis avenue to One Hundred and Forty-ninth street; thence through, along and upon One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to Gerard avenue; thence through, along and upon Gerard avenue to one Hundred and Sixty-first street; thence through, along and upon One Hundred and Sixty-first street to a point or place in said street at or near Jerome avenue, together with the necessary connections, switches, sidings, turnouts, turntables and suitable stands for the convenient working of such railroad.

The railway proposed to be constructed is to be operated by horse-power or by some power other than locomotive steam power.

And your petitioner further shows that, pursuant to the provisions of said law, it is necessary that the consent of the Common Council of the City of New York be obtained by your petitioner to construct, maintain and operate and use the railroad for the construction, maintenance, operation and use of which your petitioner was incorporated as aforesaid.

Your petitioner therefore prays, and hereby makes application to the Common Council of the City of New York, for the consent, authority and permission to construct, maintain and operate and use a street-surface railroad for public use in the conveyance of persons and property in cars through, upon and along the surface of the streets, avenues and highways as above set forth and described, together with the necessary connections, switchings, sideways, turnouts, turntables and suitable stands for the convenient operation of said road.

And your petitioner will ever pray.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

I return, without approval, the resolution of your Honorable Body, adopted October 13, 1891, which provides for the lighting of Prospect avenue, from Samuel street to Elm street.

The Commissioner of Public Works reports that the avenue is not regulated and graded, and that it has no sidewalks or foot-paths on which to place public lamps. The resolution is therefore premature.

In pursuance of the requirements contained in section 189 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment herewith submits the Provisional Estimate for the year 1892, with their reasons for it in detail.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,
CITY OF NEW YORK.

Resolved, That the Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 28th day of October, 1891, of the amount required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business in the City and County of New York, in each department and branch thereof and the Board of Education, for the ensuing financial year, to wit : for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-two (1892), be submitted to the Board of Aldermen, with the reasons for it in detail, as required by section 189 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as follows :

THE LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

The amount appropriated for the Common Council in the Provisional Estimate for 1892 is \$76,800, being the same as the appropriation in the Final Estimate for 1891 ; and as to the amounts and the objects and purposes specified in the Departmental Estimate for 1892, all of which are allowed as reasonable and necessary, including \$50,000 for salaries of Aldermen, at \$2,000 each per annum, and \$3,000 for the President of the Board, as provided and fixed by law.

THE MAYORALTY.

The amount appropriated is \$28,633.10, being an increase of \$2,633.10 over the Departmental Estimate of the expenses required by the Mayor's Office in 1892, to pay the arrearages incurred in the matter of the census, and which includes the salary of the Mayor, fixed by law at \$10,000 per annum. For the Mayor's Marshal's Office the sum of \$13,000 asked for in the Departmental Estimate for 1892 is allowed as reasonable and necessary.

THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

The sum of \$297,500 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, as required for the several objects and purposes specified therein, and is allowed as reasonable and necessary, including the salary of the Comptroller fixed by law at \$10,000 per annum, and the compensation of the Chamberlain, also provided for by law at \$25,000 per annum, and including the sum of \$40,000 for Cleaning Markets, to which was added the sum of \$1,000 towards the expenses of inspection on repaving, under chapter 346, Laws of 1889.

INTEREST ON THE CITY DEBT.

In accordance with the statements submitted by the Comptroller with the Departmental Estimate, the amount appropriated for interest becoming due and payable in 1892 on bonds and stocks of the City of New York, exclusive of interest on bonds and stocks in the Sinking Fund made payable therefrom, by chapter 178 of the Laws of 1889, and including interest on bonds of the Towns of Morrisania and West Farms issued prior to their annexation to the city, and also interest on the estimated amount of Revenue Bonds to be issued in 1892, amounting in all to \$5,140,817.19, and included in the Provisional Estimate, to be raised by tax in 1892.

THE REDEMPTION OF THE CITY DEBT.

The sum of \$39,000 is included in the Provisional Estimate for the Redemption of Revenue Bonds, made payable 1892 by special acts of Legislature ; and also the sum of \$1,136,428.36, pursuant to article 8, section 11 of the State Constitution, as amended in 1884, requiring installments to be raised by tax, annually, for the redemption at maturity of bonds issued after December 31, of that year, for the supply of water to the city.

Stocks and Bonds amounting to the sum of \$4,286,315.13 become due in 1892, which were made payable by law from taxation, at maturity, for which no appropriation is included in the Provisional Estimate, as the amount can be paid from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, pursuant to the provisions of sections 176, 177 and 192 of the Consolidation Act of 1882, without in any way impairing the preferred claims on that fund.

THE STATE TAXES.

The State Taxes to be raised in 1892 amount to \$2,385,989.34, which is less by \$1,252,086.03 than the amount allowed for 1891, to which is added \$12,515.57 for compensation and expenses of the Shore Inspector, as provided by law.

RENTS.

The sum of \$132,883.50 is appropriated for rents of premises leased to the city for various departments, public offices, court-rooms, etc., other than armories and drill-rooms.

For rents of armories and drill-rooms, not provided with quarters belonging to the city, the sum of \$39,050 is allowed, and the amount appropriated for wages of Armories, Janitors, Engineers and Laborers, required for military organizations, is \$49,776.

JUDGMENTS.

For the payment of judgments against the City that have been or may be obtained, and not otherwise provided for, the sum of \$750,000 is included in the Provisional Estimate for 1892 and is deemed to be required and necessary for this purpose.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS.

As provided by chapter 57, Laws of 1879, the sum of \$15,000 is appropriated for the Seventh Regiment New Armory Fund ; and \$6,000 for necessary expenses of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and of real estate belonging to the city.

LAW DEPARTMENT.

The sum of \$205,000 is appropriated for the necessary expenses of the Law Department and offices connected therewith as bureaus, including the amount of salaries fixed by law of the Counsel to the Corporation, the Public Administrator and the Attorney for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes, a reduction of \$8,600 being made from the amount of the Departmental Estimate.

THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.

The sum of \$3,101,176 is appropriated for all objects and purposes, being \$319,000 less than the amount of the Departmental Estimate, and \$23,294 less than the Final Estimate for 1891, reductions being made of various items not deemed necessary.

THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

The sum of \$963,150 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all objects and purposes which is less than the Departmental Estimate by \$111,395, and \$31,630 more than the Final Estimate for 1891.

THE DEPARTMENT OF STREET IMPROVEMENTS, TWENTY-THIRD AND TWENTY-FOURTH WARDS.

The sum of \$308,700 is appropriated for all the purposes and objects of this Department, being \$172,166.40 less than the Departmental Estimate for 1892, and \$48,500 more than the amount of the Final Estimate for 1891.

THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES AND CORRECTION.

The sum of \$2,269,125 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all purposes and objects, being \$608,120 less than the Departmental Estimate for 1892, and \$102,888 more than the appropriation of 1891.

THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

The sum of \$437,388 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all objects and purposes reductions being made in various items in the Departmental Estimate amounting in all to \$6,900.

THE POLICE DEPARTMENT.

The sum of \$5,018,801.65 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all objects and purposes, being \$326,891.65 less than the Departmental Estimate, and \$241,286.27 more than the appropriation for 1891.

THE DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

The sum of \$1,978,540 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all objects and purposes, including \$73,000 for services of Policemen detailed to the Department, under the provisions of chapter 549, Laws of 1890, being \$394,290 more than the amount allowed in the appropriation for 1891, and \$91,625 less than asked for in the Departmental Estimate of 1892.

THE FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The sum of \$2,296,282 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all objects and purposes, being \$381,715 less than the Departmental Estimate, and \$150,714 more than the appropriation for 1891.

THE DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

The sum of \$117,320 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for the expenses of this Department, being \$3,200 less than the Departmental Estimate, and the same as appropriated for 1891.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The sum of \$4,446,656.64 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all objects and purposes, excepting the purchase of school sites and the erection of school buildings, which are provided for by the issue of bonds, the amount of the appropriation being \$181,175.66 less than the Departmental Estimate, and \$179,289.64 more than the appropriation for 1891, exclusive of transfers amounting to \$24,150.

THE COLLEGE OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The sum of \$147,000 is appropriated for the expenses of this institution, being the amount of the Departmental Estimate and the same as appropriated for 1891.

THE NORMAL COLLEGE OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The sum of \$125,000 is appropriated for the expense of this institution, being the amount of the Departmental Estimate and the same as appropriated in 1891.

PRINTING, STATIONERY AND BLANK BOOKS.

The sum of \$254,200 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for these objects and purposes, including the publication of the CITY RECORD, etc., a special appropriation being made for advertising miscellaneous items, and which amount is \$7,000 more than the appropriation for 1891, and which is \$3,000 less than the Departmental Estimate for 1892.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINING BOARD.

The sum of \$25,000 is appropriated for expenses, being the amount of the Departmental Estimate and the same as the appropriation for 1891.

THE CORONERS.

The sum of \$52,500 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all objects and purposes, being the amount of the Departmental Estimate and the same as the appropriation for 1891.

THE COMMISSIONERS OF ACCOUNTS.

The sum of \$32,500 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient, being \$5,000 more than the appropriation for 1891, and \$7,500 less than the amount of the Departmental Estimate for 1892.

THE SHERIFF'S OFFICE.

The sum of \$119,252 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all objects and purposes, being \$5,240 less than the amount asked for, and \$2,980 less than the appropriation for 1891.

THE REGISTER'S OFFICE.

The sum of \$130,250 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all objects and purposes, being the same amount as asked for, and \$5,250 less than the appropriation for 1891.

THE BUREAU OF ELECTIONS.

The sum of \$411,300 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all objects and purposes, being the same amount as the Departmental Estimate, and \$28,000 less than the appropriation for 1891.

TO THE PUBLIC.

OWING TO THE CONTINUANCE OF THE drought in the water-sheds of the Croton river and the Bronx river, and the consequent depletion of the supply held in reserve in the storage reservoirs, it becomes necessary to carefully husband the water supply and to limit its consumption to actual necessities for domestic and business use and for protection from fires until the supply at its sources is replenished and increased by copious rainfall. The people of this city are, therefore, earnestly requested to use the greatest possible economy in the consumption of water, and to abstain from careless or wanton waste, or any use of the water except such as is necessary for domestic and business pursuits and the protection of the public health. For some time past, and up to this date, the daily consumption has been 165,000,000 gallons, or nearly 100 gallons per capita, and there is no possible doubt that, with the exercise of care and economy, the consumption can safely be reduced to one-half that quantity without interfering with the comfort, business and health of the population. Persistence in wasteful or luxurious use of the water would result in curtailing the supply to the extent of diminishing it below the actual needs for comfort, health and protection from fires by the decrease of the pressures in the distributing mains and the elevation at which the water can be delivered in the houses, and this contingency can only be averted by the economical use of the water on the part of every consumer.

The draughts upon the reserve supply in the storage reservoirs and lakes began on May 15, when the natural flow of the Croton river fell below the quantity drawn for daily consumption, and have continued without interruption to the present day. The total quantity of stored water drawn to date is 13,040,000,000 gallons, averaging 75,000,000 gallons per day, and amounting at times to 120,000,000 gallons per day.

The holders of permits for using water through hose for washing house-fronts, stoops, areas and sidewalks, have been notified to discontinue such use of water at once, and the members of the Police Force are earnestly requested to enforce this prohibition, and to exercise special vigilance to prevent the use of water through hose and from the fire-hydrants except by the uniformed force of the Fire Department or under special permits from this Department.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement

the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

Second—That the abstract of our said estimate and assessment, together with our damage and benefit maps and also all the affidavits, estimates and other documents used by us in making our report, have been deposited with the Commissioner of Public Works of the City of New York, at his office, No. 31 Chambers street, in the said city, there to remain until the twenty-fourth day of November, 1891.

Third—That the limits of our assessment for benefit include all those lots, pieces or parcels of land, situate, lying and being in the City of New York, which taken together are bounded and described as follows, viz.: Northerly by a line parallel with, and distant 100 feet northerly from, the northerly line of Boscobel avenue, and beginning at the point of intersection of said line with the prolongation northerly of the easterly line of Aqueduct avenue and extending to Elliot street; easterly by a line beginning at a point in the northerly line of Elliot street, distant 100 feet easterly from the easterly line of Jerome avenue; running thence southerly and parallel with the easterly line of Jerome avenue to the intersection of said line with a line parallel with, and distant 100 feet easterly from, the easterly line of Mott avenue; thence southerly and parallel with Mott avenue to the intersection of said line with the prolongation northerly of a line parallel with, and distant 100 feet easterly from, the easterly line of Gerard avenue; thence southerly and along said last-mentioned line to the northerly line of Endrow place; southerly by a curved line beginning at a point in the northerly line of Endrow place, distant 100 feet easterly from the easterly line of Gerard avenue, thence westerly curving to the right on the arc of a circle whose radius is 1,000 feet and whose centre is the point of intersection of the westerly line of Boscobel avenue with the westerly line of Jerome avenue to the point of tangency between said arc and a line parallel with, and distant 1,000 feet westerly from, the westerly line of Boscobel avenue; and westerly by a broken line parallel with, and distant 1,000 feet westerly from, the westerly line of Boscobel avenue and extending from the point of tangency with the preceding course to Aqueduct avenue, the easterly line of Aqueduct avenue and the prolongation northerly of said easterly line of Aqueduct avenue to the point of beginning; excepting from said area all the streets, avenues and roads, or portions thereof, heretofore legally opened, and all the unimproved land included within the lines of streets, avenues, roads, public squares and places shown and laid out upon any map or maps filed by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874, and the laws amendatory thereof, or of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, as such area is shown upon our benefit map deposited as aforesaid.

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, at a Special Term thereof, to be held at the Chambers thereof, in the County Court-house, in the City of New York, on the eleventh day of December, 1891, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.
