*Street Cleaning.*

Communication from the Health Department, relative to manure dumps foot of Fiftieth and Fifty-seventh streets, North river, was referred to the Inspector of Street Cleaning for report.

On reading communication from the Health Department, it was

Resolved, That the work of filling at One Hundred and Fourteenth street and Harlem river, be stopped, and the communication ordered on file.

On recommendation of the Committee on Street Cleaning, it was

Resolved, That Daniel Daily be paid the sum of twenty-one (\$21) dollars per scow for unloading scows (loaded with street cleaning material), carrying from 350 to 450 loads each.

Resolved, That the proposal of Francis Pidgeon, to unload scows (loaded with street cleaning material), of the Department, for the sum of fifteen (\$15) dollars per scow, from and after May 27, 1878, and to charter to the Department three scows of the carrying capacity of 280 loads each, for the sum of five dollars each per day, be and the same is hereby accepted during the pleasure of the Board.

Resolved, That upon the report of R. J. Wylie, Superintendent of Stables, and the recommendation of Captain John Gunner, Inspector of the Bureau of Street Cleaning, horses known as Nos. 36, 62, 64 and 73, reported unserviceable, be advertised for sale at public auction; and the Committee on Street Cleaning be and they are hereby authorized to purchase four (4) horses to take the places of those reported as being unserviceable.

## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

*Abstract of the Proceedings of the Department of Public Parks for the week ending Saturday, June 8, 1878.*

MEETING HELD JUNE 5, 1878.

Directions were given to the Engineer in charge of construction works to prepare plans and specifications for the work directed by the following resolution of the Common Council, namely:

Resolved, That Third avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward, between Harlem river and One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, and also so much of the streets crossing or intersecting said portion of said avenue as may be necessary to preserve and facilitate approach to said avenue by said streets, be regulated and graded in accordance with the grade established by the Commissioners appointed by chapter 841 of the Laws of 1868, as said grade has been altered and amended by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, under authority of chapters 329 and 604 of the Laws of 1874; that the pavement, curb and gutter stones, bridge or crossing stones, and the flag-stones of the sidewalk now laid on said portion of said avenue be taken up and preserved; the said work to be done under the direction of the Department of Public Parks, and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Permission was given to the Finance Department to make copies of the maps of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards for the use of the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments.

Plans and specifications for the construction of sewers in One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, with branches in Third avenue, Lincoln avenue and Willis avenue, were approved, and advertisements for proposals for the work were directed to be published.

The Treasurer of the Department was authorized to accept the sum of \$906.72 from Mr. Carl H. Schultz in full for all rents or license fees due by him for the mineral springs in Central Park up to May 1, 1878.

In consideration of the sum of \$120, paid by Mr. Daniel Campbell, he was granted the privilege of shearing the sheep in Central Park and taking the wool.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon  
the Health Department, the following sections of the Sanitary  
Code for the security of life and health be and the  
same are hereby amended, and declared to form a portion  
of the Sanitary Code:

Section 196. That it shall be the duty of every owner,  
lessee, or tenant of any vacant, sunken, or excavated lot in  
the City of New York, to keep the same at all times clean  
and unoffensive, and to provide around the same a proper  
fence so as to effectually prevent the throwing or deposit-  
ing therein or thereupon any garbage or offensive thing  
whatsoever, and also to prevent persons passing from fall-  
ing into such excavation.

Section 198. That on and after the 10th day of May,  
1878, no cows or cattle shall be led or driven through or  
along any of the streets of that portion of the City of New  
York bounded by Fifty-seventh and Sixty-fourth streets,  
Tenth and First avenues, exclusive of these boundary  
streets and avenues, without a permit in writing from this  
Department, and in strict accordance with the routes,  
hours, and terms prescribed and designated therein.
