The action of the Treasurer in awarding the orders to the Hudson River Stone Supply Company, Murray & Co. and Peter Timmes' Son, they being the lowest bidders, approved.

The Secretary reported that the pay-rolls for the month ending August 31, 1892, amounting to \$13,609.99, and the pay-rolls for the General Repairs and Construction force for the week ending August 26, 1892, amounting to \$11,117.28, had been approved and audited and transmitted to the Finance Department for payment.

The President moved that the West Shore Railroad Company be directed to remove the fence from the new-made land at Harrison street and that the Providence and Stonington Steamship Company be directed to remove the shed on the bulkhead north of Pier, old 28.

Commissioner Post moved that the matter be laid on the table, which was carried, the President voting in the negative.

The President gave notice that at the next meeting of the Board he would move that the Engineer-in-Chief be directed to proceed with the construction of the sea-wall through Pier, old 29, North river.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to place coping-stones on the bulkhead-wall at Ninety-fourth street, East river.

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to repair and rebuild the scow of Pile-driver No. 11 for use as a mixing scow in constructing the bulkhead or river-wall under the "new plan" adopted for the improvement of the water-front; and also that he be and hereby is directed to build a new scow for Pile-driver No. 11 to be used in constructing the bulkhead or river-wall under the "new plan" adopted for the improvement of the water-front; and all the work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract, as provided by section 714 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and that all the material, tools, etc., necessary for the same not now contracted for or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed with the construction of sufficient concrete base-blocks for the bulkhead or river-wall between the southerly side of East Ninety-ninth street and the northerly side of East One Hundredth street; and also that he be and hereby is directed to proceed with the construction of about three hundred and sixty-five feet of the said bulkhead or river-wall between the southerly side of East Ninety-ninth street and the northerly side of East One Hundredth street, upon the same general plan as that of the Beach street section on the North river, and that all the work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract as provided by section 714 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and that it be done by the force of the Department by day's work, except so much of the labor as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all the material and dredging necessary for the above-mentioned work of the wall not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

The following preambles and resolutions were adopted, Commissioner Post voting in the negative:

Whereas, Under section 715 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Board of the Department of Docks of the City of New York is authorized to acquire by purchase in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, wharf property in said city, and all rights, terms, easements and privileges pertaining thereto, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and agree with such owners upon a price for the same, and in case of failure to so agree, to initiate legal proceedings, to acquire the same for the improvement of the water-front of said City; and

Whereas, Said Board is desirous of acquiring in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, all riparian and wharfage rights and all interests in or appurtenant to the following-described premises, to wit: Pier, old No. 7, North river; also the bulkhead adjoining same running from the southerly side of said pier about fourteen feet more or less southerly to a point projected on a line drawn perpendicular to the easterly line of West street at a point one hundred and twenty-one feet six inches southerly of the southerly line of Rector street; also the bulkhead adjoining said pier northerly and running from the northerly side of said pier about forty-five feet more or less northerly to a point projected on a line drawn perpendicular to the easterly line of West street at a point thirty-one feet southerly of the southerly line of Rector street, together with all the rights of wharfage, crackage, advantages and emoluments and appurtenances therewith connected; and

Whereas, It appears that William R. Grace, George F. Vingut, Henry K. Vingut, August F. Vingut, Benjamin V. H. Vingut, heirs-at-law of Elizabeth F. Floyd, deceased; and Alfred Roe, executor under will of said Elizabeth F. Floyd, Caroline W. Crane, Emilie Dore, Mary S. Whitney, Mary C. Warren, Phillips Phoenix and Lloyd Phoenix, individually and as executors, etc., under will of Stephen W. Phoenix, deceased; Alice W. Bronson, Theodore Chichester, committee of person of Ferd. W. Suydam, J. Fred. Kernochan and Edward W. Corlies, executors and trustees under will of Stephen Suydam Whitney, and Josephine, Stephen, Mary S., Arthur and Agnes M. Whitney, children of said Stephen S. Whitney, deceased; Harriette W. Berryman, Cornelia L. Hecksher, Georgianna McClellan, Emilie D. Winthrop, Maria W. Livingston, Caroline S. Fellowes, Everetta C. Whitney, Mary S. Kernochan, Stephen Whitney and the trustees of Columbia College are the owners in common of above-described premises, with all the hereditaments and easements therewith connected;

Resolved, That this Board offers to purchase the above-described premises and pay for a good and sufficient title thereto, to be approved by the Corporation Counsel of the City of New York, for said Pier, old 7, North river, the sum of one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars, and for the said bulkheads as heretofore described and adjoining said pier the sum of five hundred dollars per running foot front along the westerly line of West street, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as prescribed by law.

Resolved, That a copy of these preambles and resolutions be served upon the said owners in common as aforesaid, or their legal representatives, and that they be and hereby are requested within ten days from receipt hereof, to notify this Board in writing whether they will sell the rights and interests in above-described premises, to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, for the price above mentioned; and in the event that they shall fail to notify this Board of their willingness to so convey the rights and interests as aforesaid, it shall be deemed that no price can be agreed upon for the said premises between the said owners thereof and this Department.

Whereas, It appears that the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, Caroline W. Crane, Emilie Dore, Mary S. Whitney, Mary C. Warren, Phillips Phoenix and Lloyd Phoenix, individually and as executors, etc., under will of Stephen W. Phoenix, deceased; Alice W. Bronson, Theodore Chichester, committee of the person of Ferd. W. Suydam, J. Fred. Kernochan and Edward W. Corlies, executors and trustees under will of Stephen Suydam Whitney and Josephine Stephen, Mary S., Arthur and Agnes M. Whitney, children of said Stephen S. Whitney, deceased; Harriette W. Barryman, Cornelia L. Hecksher, Maria W. Livingston, Caroline S. Fellowes, Everetta C. Whitney, Mary S. Kernochan, Stephen Whitney and the trustees of Columbia College, and the United States Trust Company, John C. White, Francena Roulet, John P. Groschon, Adeline, wife of William F. Groschon, Henry W. Groschon, Henrietta A. C. Wagstaff, Alex. C. Bowden and Robert C. Embree,



trustee, Gouverneur Kemble, executor of the estate of Gouverneur Kemble, deceased; E. LeRoy Stewart, executor, etc., of will of Helen LeRoy Stewart, deceased, and Quincy C. DeGrove and others, heirs of Michael E. DeGrove, deceased, are the owners in common of above-described premises with all the hereditaments and easements therewith connected.

Resolved, That this Board offers to purchase the above-described premises and pay for a good and sufficient title therefor to be approved by the Corporation Counsel of the City of New York for said Pier, old 3, North river, the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; and for the said bulkheads as hereinbefore described and adjoining said pier the sum of five hundred dollars per running foot front along the westerly line of West street, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund as prescribed by law.

## TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.



The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thereupon be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Assessors and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
