



The 718 deaths represent a death-rate of 20.38, against 20.62 for the previous week and 22.72 for the corresponding week of 1891.

Contagious and infectious diseases continue to decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 59, 59, 36, 46 and 6, against 58, 73, 40, 42 and 11 for the previous week, a total of 206 against 224. Diphtheria increased slightly between Fourteenth and Twenty-sixth streets East and West, and in the annexed district, decreasing, as a rule, elsewhere, the decrease being most marked between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets West. Measles increased between Division street and the East river, and between Grand and Rivington streets, east of Norfolk street, decreasing generally in other parts of the city. Scarlet fever increased below Liberty street, and between Rivington and Fourteenth streets, east of Avenue B, decreasing, as a rule, elsewhere, the decrease being especially marked between Twenty-sixth and Fortieth streets West; 22 of the 46 cases of typhoid fever were below Fourteenth street, and 17 of these were east of Broadway. Of the remaining 24, 13 were above Fortieth street By order of the Board.

A TTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT A. act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1839), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and she expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaying or repairing, such payment shall release and obligation as to paving, repaying and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaying or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give

the commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are torever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereatter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commonsconer of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common rouncil and the pavement, repavement or repairs.
