MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By Alderman Purroy—

Whereas, The Legislature of our sister State of Louisiana, when peacefully assembled and in the act of organizing—as it lawfully might in a time of peace, without interference from or by military rule—was invaded in its chamber by United States troops under the command of General De Trobriand—and his action subsequently approved by his superior officer, Lieut.-General Philip H. Sheridan—and the members of that Legislature forcibly removed from their places by such troops; and

Whereas, Such action of the Federal officers and troops has been approved by President Grant and his Cabinet, contrary to the express provision of the Constitution of the United States, which says that "no soldier shall in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war, but in the manner to be prescribed by law;" and

Whereas, This usurpation of the freedom and rights of the people of a sovereign State, unless promptly rebuked by the American people and the Congress of the nation, will become dangerous to the rights and immunities of the people of the several States, and to democratic republican liberty; therefore,

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of this City, representing the entire people thereof, for, and in their name, solemnly protest against the conduct of the Federal troops in New Orleans, in their recent military interference with the rights of civil government in the State of Louisiana; and we condemn and denounce the conduct of General Sheridan, and the infamous doctrines promulgated in his telegraphic dispatch to the President, to have him issue his proclamation declaring the citizens of Louisiana a "banditti"—to be summarily arrested, tried, convicted, and punished by a military court-martial—as only worthy of a despotic government, and in direct antagonism to the teachings and admonitions of our Declaration of Independence, the Constitution and laws of the United States, and as being repugnant to the views and wishes of lovers of constitutional liberty throughout the civilized world.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to adopt said resolution.

Whereas, In the Message of his Honor the Mayor to the Common Council, January 4, 1875, the following occurs: "The time has arrived when, in my judgment, the actual financial condition of the City should be ascertained and published in detail. The tax-payers should be in possession of the fullest information on this subject, and without such information it will be impossible to devise or carry out any practical measures of effectual relief.

A first step toward furnishing such periodical information, is the preparation, at as early a date as possible, of a balance-sheet, showing the financial position of the City at the close of the last year;" and, as the Board fully coincides with the views thus expressed by his Honor the Mayor, and is as fully alive to the importance of obtaining the desired information; be it

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby directed to report to this Board, within a period of thirty days or at the next meeting of the Board thereafter, a statement in detail, showing:

1. The amount of the indebtedness of the City.
2. The amount of receipts from all sources during the past year, including the unexpended balances of former years; the interest on unpaid taxes and assessments; and the interest, if any, paid upon the deposits of the City.
3. The expenditures for the past year.
4. The claims in his office against the City, unadjusted.

5. The amount of the judgments obtained against the City during his term of office, with the costs taxed upon the City.

6. The amount saved to the City by litigation during the same period by decisions in its favor.

7. The amount of the bonds and stocks of the City, created by authority of the State Legislature, and not asked for or approved by the Common Council or the Board of Supervisors, and the amount approved or asked for by the corporate authorities of this City and the late County authorities, respectively.

8. The amount of unpaid taxes and assessments up to December 31, 1874, and the amount of assessment bonds outstanding at the same date; and

9. A balance sheet showing the financial position of the City at the close of the past year.

Alderman Vance moved that the paper be laid over and printed.

AN ORDINANCE to prevent non-residents from holding office in any of the Departments or branches of the Government of the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. No person who is not a citizen of the State of New York, and a resident of the City and County of New York, shall be eligible to appointment to any office, in any or either of the Departments of the City Government, either as president or commissioner, chief of bureau, clerk, or officer thereof, or employee therein, whether legislative, executive, or judicial; nor shall any person not a resident of this City, who may be so employed or appointed, have any valid claim against the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of said City, for any salary, wages, or compensation, under or by virtue of holding any office in either of such departments or branches of the City Government.

SEC. 2. Any person holding any appointment or office, or employed in any of such departments or branches of the City Government, who shall, while holding such appointment or office, or so employed, remove from within the limits of this City, shall be deemed thereby to have resigned such appointment, vacated such office, or abandoned such employment; and it shall be the duty of the head of every such department or other person authorized to make appointments or give employment, to appoint or employ a resident of this City to the office made vacant, or employment so surrendered, by said removal from this City, as provided in section 1 of this ordinance.

SEC. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

SEC. 4. This ordinance shall take effect on the first day of May, 1875.

The number of foremen, mechanics, and laborers, that has been employed weekly; the salaries paid to foremen, the number of laborers employed under each foreman, and the names and residences of such foremen; the number of horses and carts owned by the Department; the amount paid for the same, their cost of keeping, including stables, etc.; also the number of horses and carts employed by the said Department, and the amount paid for the use of the same.

Fourth. The number of contracts that has been granted, the parties receiving such contracts, and the purpose for which such contract was issued, the amount of money paid, and the amounts due on the same; the amount of money received from all sources and receipt given; and an account of all articles sold, and all such enumerated; the amount of money received from all rentals, and parties to whom rented; also, if any person employed by the said Department has been interested in any contract or lease for which the City had to pay the cost.

Fifth. If any money appropriated by the Legislature has at any time been converted to any other purpose than that which the law intended it for, namely, construction purposes.

Sixth. The number of policemen and gatekeepers employed by the Department, their names and residences, when appointed, the salaries paid, and cost for equipping.

That, upon examination, your Committee find that there is no street-lamps whatever lighted on all that part of the Eighth avenue mentioned in the resolution; and, as it is a great thoroughfare, used almost exclusively by persons residing along the west side, and at the upper end of this Island, to reach their places of business in the morning, down town, and their residences, in the evening, up town, in a great many instances after dark, it is of the first importance, and essential to the safety of life and property, that the avenue should be lighted; it forms the western boundary of the Central Park, and, although sparsely populated, is rapidly improving, having been quite recently graded; embankments occur at many places, rendering the use of the street extremely dangerous, particularly in the night-time. Your Committee, therefore, are in favor of causing the avenue to be lighted, and in a manner to correspond with the other avenues, drives, and boulevards surrounding and adjoining the Central Park, and respectfully offer for your adoption the accompanying resolution.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected and boulevard-lamps lighted in Eighth avenue, both sides, from Fifty-ninth to One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

For summoning petit jurors for the various Civil and Criminal Courts of Record of the City and County.

from the City Prison to the House of Refuge, Randall's Island.

For conveying prisoners and convicts from the City Prison to the Courts of Oyer and Terminer, and General Sessions, and back to the City Prison.

For making reports to the Secretary of State of convictions in Courts of Oyer and Terminer, General Sessions, and Special Sessions, for all which said special services no specific compensation is fixed by statute; and whereas, it appears to the satisfaction of this Committee, that the rates of compensation for such specific services, which have heretofore been allowed and audited by the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York (as appears by the copies of the bills of late Sheriffs Kelly, O'Brien, and Brennan, whose terms of office cover a period of nine years, and which are heretofore annexed, and verified by affidavit), are fair, reasonable, just, and proper; be it therefore

Resolved, That the compensation for the official services rendered to the County of New York by the Sheriff of the City and County of New York, for which no specific compensation is fixed, be and the same is hereby fixed, allowed, ratified, and confirmed, at the following rates of compensation for such specific services, as follows:

For summoning petit jurors for the various Civil and Criminal Courts of Record of the City and County, the sum of thirty-five cents for each juror summoned.

For making reports to the Secretary of State of convictions in the Courts of Oyer and Terminer, General Sessions, and Special Sessions, the sum of fifty cents for each conviction reported.

For conveying convicts and prisoners from the City Prison to the Penitentiary, Blackwell's Island, House of Refuge, Randall's Island, and from the City Prison to the Courts of Oyer and Terminer, and the Court of General Sessions, and back to City Prison, the sum of one dollar and seventy-five cents for each convict so conveyed.
