

# DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, November 16, 1893, at 11 o'clock A. M. Present—President Cram.

The minutes of the meeting held on the 9th instant, were read and approved.

Gilbert M. Speir, Jr., attorney for Casimer de R. Moore, agent and representative of William T.

Moore and the heirs of Mary C. Ogden, appeared and offered to sell all the riparian and wharfage rights in or annexed to or appurtenant to the premises between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets, North river, on the Thirteenth avenue, for the sum of \$500 per lineal foot measured on the bulk-bead line.

On motion, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, Gilbert M. Spier, Jr., attorney for Casimir de R. Moore, who is the agent and representative of William T. Moore and the heirs of Mary C. Ogden, has this day offered to sell to the Corporation of the City of New York all riparian and wharfage rights and interests in or annexed to or appurtenant to the premises between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets, North river, on the Thirteenth avenue, for the sum of five hundred dollars per lineal foot, measured on the hull-head line: therefore he it.

Resolved, That the offer to sell the said property for the sum of five hundred dollars per lineal foot, measured on the bulkhead line, be and the same is hereby accepted, provided, however, that a good and sufficient title in all respects to the said property, together with all rights, terms, easements and privileges appertaining thereto or connected therewith can be acquired by, conveyed to and vested in the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, free from all incumbrances, subject, however, to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and that an agreement to the foregoing effect, and in pursuance of section 715 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, be entered into by this Department, to purchase the said property at the said price, from the owners thereof. said price, from the owners thereof.

A representative of the Washington Heights Taxpayers' Association appeared and requested the construction of a new street along Sherman's Creek, and also the erection of a pier thereat.

2d. Agreeing to reimburse the City for the building of a bulkhead wall across their ferry property foot of Liberty street, provided the same be made part of the aforesaid agreement.

A TTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, requirthe same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and dhe expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited: and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property (who shall also be the owners of the propeade improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall theneforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in espect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in ront of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereatter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commonstoner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
