Minutes of Meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Held in Room 16, City Hall, Friday, April 24, 1914.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—John Purroy Mitchel, Mayor; Alexander Brough, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; George McAneny, President, Board of Aldermen; Marcus M. Marks, President, Borough of Manhattan; Lewis H. Pounds, President, Borough of Brooklyn; Douglas Mathewson, President, Borough of The Bronx; James A. Dayton, Acting President, Borough of Queens, and Charles J. McCormack, President, Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. John Purroy Mitchel, presided.

The minutes of the meeting held April 3, 1914, were approved as printed in the CITY RECORD April 21, 1914.

PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT MATTERS.

Changing the Grade of East 162d Street, from Grant Avenue to Sheridan Avenue, and of Sherman Avenue, from East 161st Street to East 163d Street, Borough of The Bronx (Cal. No. 1).

(At the meeting of the Board on March 27, 1914, this matter was laid over for four weeks.)

On motion of the President of the Borough of The Bronx the matter was laid over for two weeks (May 8, 1914).

Acquiring Title to the Unnamed Street Extending from Sedgwick Avenue to the Intersection of Fordham Road with Hampden Place, Borough of The Bronx (Cal. No. 2).

(At the close of a public hearing on February 20, 1914, this matter was laid over for four weeks. On March 20 the matter was laid over for five weeks.)

The Secretary presented a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated April 23, 1914, calling attention to the fact that the Local Board resolution initiating proceedings in this matter was rescinded on April 21, 1914, and requesting its return.

The matter was withdrawn by President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Discontinuance of the Proceeding to Acquire Title to the Land Needed for the Widening of Crescent Street, from South Jane to 13th Street, and for Nott Avenue, from Hunter Avenue to Jackson Avenue, Borough of Queens (Cal. No. 3).

(A petition for the discontinuance of this proceeding was referred on January 30, 1914, to the Committee on Assessments, and the report of the committee was submitted to the Board on April 17, 1914, at which time the matter was laid over for one week.)

This proceeding was authorized on February 11, 1910, with the provision that the entire expense should be assessed upon an area of benefit determined at that time, which area appears to the Committee to be an especially generous one. When discontinuance was first proposed the Board stated that the City should be reimbursed for expenses already incurred, amounting to about \$5,400, and be guaranteed against other expenses through claims made in accordance with the provisions of section 1000 of the Charter. Such a guarantee could not be given by the petitioner.

The committee believes that the improvement is a proper one, that it should not be discontinued, and that no injustice is involved in assessing the entire cost upon the proposed area of benefit, and recommends that the petition be denied.

Messrs. J. Larkin, William R. Keese, Edward R. Finch, H. S. Hull and Henry Bonnick appeared in opposition to the denial of the petition. Mr. Edward W. Murphy and Mr. H. S. Kearney appeared in favor of the petition being denied.

A representative of Clinton & Gilbert, of the City Real Estate Company, also appeared in opposition to the denial of the petition.

Mr. John Larkin presented a protest signed by a number of property owners against the action of the Board in advancing the proceeding unless 75 per cent. of the assessment be borne by the City.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, hereby denies the petition of property owners for the discontinuance of the proceeding authorized by the Board on February 11, 1910, for acquiring title to the lands required for the widening of Crescent street from South Jane street to 13th street and for Nott avenue from Hunter avenue to Jackson avenue, Borough of Queens, and be it further,

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and hereby is requested to advance the proceeding for acquiring title to said lands as speedily as possible.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx, the Acting President of the Borough of Queens, and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

The speakers then declared that they would present to the Board an application for relief from the assessment in the proceeding.

Removal of Encroachments on 30th Street, from Broadway to 7th Avenue, Borough of Manhattan (Cal. No. 4).

The Secretary presented a communication from the President of the Borough of Manhattan transmitting resolution providing for the removal of encroachments on 30th street, from Broadway to 7th avenue, Borough of Manhattan.

On motion the matter was referred to the Chief Engineer for report.

Removal of Encroachments on 31st Street, from Broadway to 7th Avenue, Borough of Manhattan (Cal. No. 5).

The Secretary presented a communication from the President of the Borough of Manhattan transmitting resolution providing for the removal of encroachments on 31st street, from Broadway to 7th avenue, Borough of Manhattan.

On motion the matter was referred to the Chief Engineer for report.

FINANCIAL MATTERS.

Public Service Commission for the First District—Amendment of Proposed Contract With the Ramapo Iron Works for the Supply of Track Materials for the Construction of Rapid Transit Railroads (Cal. No. 1).

The Secretary presented a communication from the Public Service Commission, dated April 14, 1914, submitting an amendment to the proposed contract between The City of New York and the Ramapo Iron Works for the supply of track materials for the construction of rapid transit railroads, to wit: Tie plates, type "D," so as to provide for the supply of 200 tie plates at \$1.24 each in excess of the quantity provided for in the proposed contract presented to the Board at its meeting held April 17, 1914, and referred to the Comptroller.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

Public Service Commission for the First District—Consent to the Award of the Proposed Contract to Booth & Flinn, Ltd., for the Construction of Section No. 1, Route 33, of the Broadway-Fourth Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad and the Issue of Corporate Stock Therefor (Cal. No. 2).

The Secretary presented a communication from the Public Service Commission, dated April 17, 1914, transmitting for the consent of the Board proposed contract between The City of New York and Booth & Flinn, Limited, for the construction of section No. 1, route 33 of the Broadway-Fourth Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad (extending from Trinity place and Morris street under Broadway, Battery place, etc., to South street) and requesting the Board to authorize the issue of \$2,059,132 corporate stock to meet the requirements of said contract.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

Register, Bronx County; Register, New York County; Estimate of Cost of Work to Be Done Under Chapter 837 of the Laws of 1913 (Cal. No. 3).

The Secretary presented a communication from the Register of Bronx County, dated April 16, 1914, submitting an estimate of the cost of the work to be done by the Register of New York County under chapter 837 of the Laws of 1913, and memorandum explanatory of itemized statement of expenses, which act provides for the transfer to the office of the Register of Bronx County of those maps, instruments, indexes, etc., and for the certification of certain other instruments, maps, etc., affecting property lying within the present Bronx County and which are on record in New York County.

(A communication from the Register of New York County relative to the above matter was presented to the Board on April 17, 1914, and referred to the Comptroller.) Which was referred to the Comptroller.

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals—Issue of Corporate Stock (Cal. No. 4).

The Secretary presented a communication from the Secretary, Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, dated April 17, 1914, requesting the issue of \$85,000 corporate stock for the completion of the new Harlem Hospital.

Which was referred to the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget.

Fire Department—Issue of Corporate Stock (Cal. No. 5).

The Secretary presented a communication from the Fire Commissioner, dated April 20, 1914, requesting the issue of \$25,000 corporate stock to provide means for the removal and alteration of Hook and Ladder Company No. 8, located at the corner of Varick and North Moore streets, Borough of Manhattan.

Which was referred to the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget.

Change of Grade Damage Commission—Issue of Corporate Stock (Cal. No. 6).

The Secretary presented a communication from members of the Change of Grade Damage Commission dated April 21, 1914, requesting the issue of \$9,300 corporate stock for the payment of the expenses of said Commission from January 1 to June 30, 1914.

Which was referred to the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget.

Department of Education—Report of Investigation Relative to Possibility and Cost of Delivery of Ice by Existing Equipment, Etc. (Cal. No. 7).

The Secretary presented a communication from the President of the Board of Education, dated April 17, 1914, submitting copy of report of the Fuel Engineer of the Bureau of Supplies, relative to the cost of delivery of ice from freight cars at Jersey City or upon the Erie siding in the Borough of Manhattan, as compared with the cost of delivery by existing equipment.

(The above communication and report is in response to resolution adopted by the Board on March 6, 1914, directing all City Departments to investigate the possibility and cost of delivery of ice by their own existing equipment or by contract from freight cars, etc.)

Department of Education—Appropriation for Erection of School Buildings (Cal. No. 8).

The Secretary presented copies (10) of resolution adopted by Typographical Union No. 6 of New York City, dated April 15, 1914, and others, requesting the Board to appropriate sufficient funds for the erection of School Buildings in the various boroughs.

Which were ordered filed.

Department of Finance—Issue of Assessment Bonds for Redemption of Assessment Bonds Maturing May 1, 1914 (Cal. No. 9).

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Comptroller: City of New York, Department of Finance, April 17th, 1914.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On May 1st, 1914, assessment bonds of The City of New York, amounting to five million dollars (\$5,000,000), become due.

These bonds are payable from the Street Improvement Fund, but as there is only a small amount of money in said fund, it will be necessary to refund said bonds by the issue of other assessment bonds as provided by sections 181 and 184.

I therefore present herewith a resolution to authorize the issue of such bonds. Respectfully,

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of sections 181 and 184 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue assessment bonds of The City of New York to the amount of five million dollars (\$5,000,000), redeemable in not more than ten years from date of issue, the proceeds of which bonds shall be applied to the redemption of five million dollars (\$5,000,000) of assessment bonds which mature on May 1st, 1914.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

New York Sewer Plan Commission—Appropriation for Expenses of (Cal. No. 10).

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Committee on the City Plan, relative to an appropriation to meet the expenses of the New York Sewer Plan Commission.

(On November 26, 1913, the request of the Commission for an appropriation for its expenses was referred to the Corporate Stock Budget Committee.)

(On February 20, 1914, this matter was, upon recommendation of the Corporate Stock Budget Committee, referred to the Committee on City Plan.)

(On March 6 and again on March 13, 1914; the above report was laid over for one week.)

(On March 20, 1914, this matter was laid over.)

(At the meeting of April 3, 1914, on motion of the Comptroller, Tuesday, April 14, 1914, at 3 o'clock p. m., at the Mayor's office, was fixed as the time and place for a conference with the Metropolitan Sewerage Commission; and the New York Sewer Plan Commission, consisting of the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Consulting Engineers of the several Boroughs, were invited to attend.)

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York, April 21, 1914.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—Under date of March 3, 1914, the standing Committee on City Plan, made a report, recommending the authorization of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$12,000, to meet the expenses of the New York Sewer Plan Commission for the remainder of the year 1914. While this report was on the calendar of March 6, action was deferred pending a conference between the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Metropolitan Sewerage Commission and the New York Sewer Plan Commission.

The Sewer Plan Commission has been authorized to draw upon the Contingent Fund of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its current expenses until April 30, after which date it will be unable to pay the men employed by it until further provision is made.

We would, therefore, recommend that the Sewer Plan Commission be authorized to draw upon the Contingent Fund of the Board after April 30, 1914, for its current expenses to an amount not exceeding \$2,500, or so much thereof as may be needed, until permanent provision shall have been made for the Commission's expenses. Martin, in the sum of \$705 for stenographic services rendered to the District Attorney of New York County. Which was laid over for two weeks (May 8, 1914).

James H. Connell—Claim of (Cal. No. 12).

The Secretary presented the following report of the Comptroller, certifying, pursuant to section 246 of the Charter, claim of James H. Connell in the sum of \$126 for automobile hire by the President of the Borough of Queens.

The automobiles were furnished in good faith by claimant and were used by employees of the President of the Borough of Queens on the dates set forth in the claim for eight hours or more on each day; that no action has been instituted for the recovery of the amount claimed; that the automobiles appear to have been ordered by employees of the Borough President's office, but no written orders were issued for them and no certificate showing their necessity was on file with the head of the department, and therefore this claim is illegal and invalid as against The City of New York, but notwithstanding in my judgment, it is equitable and proper to pay the same in the sum of \$126, which appears to be the actual cost to claimant for the automobiles furnished, inasmuch as the City has received a benefit and derived an advantage, which in money value is equal to said sum, and \$126 is the amount which should be paid in full satisfaction of said claim from the fund entitled "Revenue Bond Fund for Claims Miscellaneous, Code, R. C. L.—11."

Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Rules of Procedure for the Conduct of the Business of the Board (Cal. No. 13).

The President of the Board of Aldermen, on behalf of the Committee on Organization of the Board, submitted the following:

RULES OF PROCEDURE FOR THE CONDUCT OF THE BUSINESS OF THE BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

I. MEETINGS

1. The regular meetings of the Board shall be held on Friday of each week, at 10.30 o'clock A. M., in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, unless otherwise ordered by the Board. The first meeting in each year shall be called by the Mayor (section 226 of the Charter).

2. Special meetings may be called by the Mayor, or by members of the Board casting seven votes.

3. Adjournment of meetings may be taken to a day other than that of a regular meeting day.

4. Notice of all special meetings shall be sent to each member by the Secretary.

5. The Mayor or Acting Mayor shall preside at all meetings (section 226 of the Charter).

6. A quorum shall consist of members in attendance casting nine votes, of whom at least two shall be members casting three votes each (section 226 of the Charter).

7. Every act of the Board shall be by resolution adopted by a majority of the whole number of votes authorized to be cast, but no resolution or amendment of any resolution shall be passed at the same meeting at which it is originally presented unless at least twelve votes shall be cast for its adoption (section 226 of the Charter), except as otherwise specifically provided in the Charter, viz.:

- The vesting of title in street and park opening proceedings pursuant to section 990 of the Charter requires a three-fourths vote.
- The vesting of title in condemnation proceedings under Chapter XXI of the Charter (section 1439) requires a three-fourths vote.
- The grant of franchises or right to use any street, avenue, etc., under section 74 of the Charter, requires a three-fourths vote, and thirty days at least shall intervene between the introduction and final passage of any resolution authorizing such grant.
- The authorization of the issuance of special revenue bonds under subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter requires the concurrent vote of all the members.
- The issue of corporate stock or other obligations for any purpose not specifically set forth in section 47 of the Greater New York Charter must be authorized by the unanimous vote of the Board.

- The approval of payment of equitable claims against the City upon the certificate of the Comptroller, as provided by section 246 of the Charter, requires the concurrent vote of all the members of the Board.

—or as otherwise provided in these rules.

8. Members or those acting in their places as authorized by law, shall attend all the meetings of the Board and shall remain during the session, unless excused by the Chair.

II. ORDER OF BUSINESS AT BOARD MEETINGS

9. The order of business before the Board shall be as follows:

- Roll call.
- Approval of minutes of previous meetings.
- Public hearings (including hearings adjourned).
 - On changes in the city map.
 - On areas of assessment for benefit in condemnation proceedings.
 - On franchises.
 - On dock, water front and terminal proceedings.
 - Miscellaneous hearings.
- Fixing roadway and sidewalk widths.
- Approval of maps and plans:
 - Rule, damage and profile maps.
 - Sewerage and drainage plans.
 - Miscellaneous maps and plans.
- Reports:
 - From standing committees.
 - From select and special committees.
 - From the Department of Finance.
 - From bureaus of the Board.
 - From city, borough and county officials.
- Local improvements:
 - Preliminary authorization.
 - Final authorization.
- Communications, petitions, etc.:
 - From citizens and public bodies.
 - From city, borough and county officials.
- Fixing dates for future hearings:
 - On changes in the city map.
 - On areas of assessment for benefit in condemnation proceedings.
 - On franchises.
 - On dock, water front and terminal proceedings.
 - Miscellaneous hearings.
- Matters laid over on which public hearings are not required or have been closed.

10. Matters not on the calendar shall be considered by unanimous consent only.

11. The Chair shall direct a roll call upon every proposition to be acted upon, and all votes shall be taken by the ayes and nays.

12. The vote upon every proposition voted upon shall be recorded in the minutes.

13. A member may be excused from voting upon any proposition upon his statement of the reasons therefor and by a majority of the votes of the other members of the Board present.

14. At public hearings those opposed to a proposition shall be heard first and then those in favor thereof, unless otherwise ordered by the Board.

15. Every communication, petition and resolution addressed and presented to the Board shall, when reached on the calendar, unless acted on, laid over, referred back or withdrawn, be referred by the Chair to an appropriate standing committee or to a special committee, if so directed by the Board, or to an appropriate bureau of the Board, for consideration and report.

16. No subject that has been referred to a committee shall be acted upon by the Board until such committee has either reported thereon or been discharged from further consideration thereof.

17. A matter pending in committee may be withdrawn therefrom by members casting at least nine votes, or such committee may in like manner be discharged from further consideration thereof.

18. All reports upon references shall constitute a part of the record of the proceedings of the Board.

19. Reports on subjects involving the appropriation or expenditure of funds, when first presented, shall lie over until the following regular meeting, unless otherwise ordered by unanimous consent. Consideration of such reports, if ordered at the meeting of their presentation, shall be deferred until action has been taken upon all other reports on the calendar.

III. COMMITTEES OF THE BOARD

20. The standing committees of the Board shall be as follows:

- Committee on the Organization of the Board.
- Committee on Franchises.
- Committee on Transit.
- Committee on Port and Terminal Facilities.
- Committee on the City Plan.
- Committee on Assessments.
- Committee on Corporate Stock Budget.
- Committee on Tax Budget.
- Committee on Salaries and Grades.
- Committee on Standardization of Supplies.
- Committee on Markets.
- Committee on Education.
- Committee on Social Welfare.
- Committee on Street Cleaning.
- Committee on Revision of City Charter.

21. All special and select committees shall be appointed by the Chair, unless otherwise ordered by members casting at least nine votes.

22. The committees of the Board shall have stated meetings. Special meetings may be called by the chairman of the committee or upon written request of a majority of the committee.

23. All committee reports presented to the Board shall be signed by a majority of the committee. A minority report may, however, be presented and shall be a part of the record.

24. Committee reports shall be in writing, with a statement of facts and conclusions. Where such reports embody recommendations for action by the Board they shall be accompanied by resolutions designed to give such recommendations effect. Such reports shall state the date upon which the subject matter was referred to the committee.

IV. CALENDARS AND MINUTES OF PROCEEDINGS

25. The Secretary shall prepare a calendar of the business to be presented and considered at each meeting of the Board. The matters thereon shall be arranged in the order described by the "Order of Business" provided for in these rules (Rule 9) and shall be properly classified. He shall also keep a record of undetermined matters which have been laid over or are pending in the several standing and special committees of the Board or referred to bureaus of the Board, heads of departments, etc., and not yet reported on, and all communications, etc., relating thereto.

26. The Secretary shall close the calendar on Tuesdays before meeting days at 4 o'clock P. M.

27. The Secretary shall cause the proceedings of each meeting of the Board to be printed in the "City Record" and shall thereafter cause the same to be printed and bound in volumes of convenient size, with an index thereto. Copies thereof shall be furnished to the members of the Board.

V. BUREAUS OF THE BOARD

28. The Bureaus of the Board shall be as follows:

Bureau of Public Improvements, under the Chief Engineer.
Bureau of Contract Supervision, under the Director in Charge.
Bureau of Franchises, under the Engineer in Charge.
Bureau of Standards, under the Director in Charge.
Bureau of Records and Minutes, under the supervision of the Secretary.

29. The several bureaus shall render all technical and clerical advice and assistance directed or called for by the Board or its several committees.

30. Copies of all reports presented to the Board shall be delivered to each member at least two days before the meeting at which the subject matter is to be considered by the Board. On default of such delivery action shall be deferred on the request of any member of the Board.

VI. GENERAL RULES

31. All communications, petitions and reports intended for the Board's consideration and action shall be addressed to the Board and delivered at or mailed to the Secretary's office.

32. All communications and reports directed to the Board by its committees, heads of departments and bureaus shall be in duplicate.

33. Copies of all communications, petitions and reports addressed to the Board for its consideration and action shall be sent to the members at least two days before the meeting at which the original thereof is to be presented.

34. Petitions for franchise rights and privileges and applications for revocable permits for the occupancy of streets or the subsurface thereof, shall be made to the Board in duplicate and verified, and shall set forth in full the facts in regard to and the reasons for the application.

35. All propositions relating to the acquisition of property for the use of city departments and the improvement of property heretofore acquired for that purpose, or the granting of a franchise for a surface railroad, or the approval of any water front terminal project, shall be examined and reported upon by the Chief Engineer prior to action thereon by the Board, as to the relation of the proposition to the city map or plan and any modification needed in order to make it harmonize with the existing or proposed city plan.

36. The Secretary shall transmit to the Mayor for approval certified copies of all resolutions of the Board requiring his separate approval, and, when such resolutions have been so approved, he shall so report to the Board at the next meeting.

37. The Secretary shall transmit to the departments or officials of the city, borough or county government affected thereby, certified copies of all resolutions adopted by the Board.

38. Communications received by the Secretary relating to changes in the city map; the institution of street and park opening proceedings; rule, damage and profile maps; sewerage and drainage plans, and local improvements, shall be transmitted by him to the Chief Engineer for examination and report.

39. The Secretary shall transmit to the Comptroller, for his examination and report, all requests for transfers of appropriations.

40. Requests for the modification of salary and wage schedules, not involving changes in compensation or changes in grades or titles of positions, shall be transmitted by the Secretary to the Comptroller. The Comptroller may approve such modifications and so advise the department heads or officials affected thereby. He shall report to the Board at the first meeting of each month the modification of schedules approved by him under this rule for appropriate action by the Board. If the Comptroller disapproves an application, he shall report that fact to the Board for its action.

41. Requests for modifications of salary or wage schedules involving changes in compensation for individuals, or changes in grades or titles of positions, or the establishment of positions or grades, or increases in force, shall be transmitted by the Secretary to the Committee on Salaries and Grades for report by the Bureau of Standards and recommendations thereon by the Committee on Salaries and Grades.

42. Requests for the approval of contracts, plans, specifications and estimates of cost for public work payable from issues of corporate stock, the street improvement fund, or where required by resolution of the Board, shall be transmitted by the Secretary to the Bureau of Contract Supervision for examination and report. But this provision shall not apply to repaving work or work payable from the Street Improvement Fund done pursuant to standard specifications previously approved by the Board.

43. The suspension of these rules may be ordered by members casting at least twelve votes.

After discussion, the President of the Board of Aldermen moved that the rules submitted by him be adopted.

The President of the Board of Aldermen offered the following resolution:
Resolved, That the operation of rule 42 of the Rules of Procedure for the Conduct

of the Business of the Board, in its application to contracts, plans, specifications and estimates of cost for repaving streets and avenues and assessment work, be suspended until January 1, 1915.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx, the Acting President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

Department of Finance—Destruction of Certain Papers, Books and Documents (Cal. No. 14).

The Secretary presented:

Report of the Comptroller, dated April 2, 1914, accompanied by a certificate of the Corporation Counsel, requesting authority to destroy certain books, papers and documents of the Department of Finance, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 697, Laws of 1913.

(On April 3, 1914, the above report was laid over for two weeks.)

Also report of the Comptroller, dated April 7, 1914, submitting certificate of the Corporation Counsel, pursuant to the provisions of section 1545A of the Charter, relative to the destruction of records, etc., of the compilation of arrears of taxes and assessments, stored in the sub-basement of the City Paymaster's office, also submitting communication from the Collector of Assessments and Arrears, explaining the nature of these records.

(On April 17, 1914, the above reports were laid over for one week.)

Which were laid over for one week (May 1, 1914).

Tenement House Department—Destruction of Certain Records and Papers (Cal. No. 15).

The Secretary presented a report of the Comptroller, dated April 11, 1914, recommending that the Tenement House Commissioner be directed to destroy certain records and papers now on file in said Department, as enumerated in the resolution submitted for adoption.

(On March 20, 1914, a communication from the Tenement House Commissioner and certification of the Corporation Counsel relative to the destruction of these records was referred to the Comptroller.

(On April 17, 1914, the above report was laid over for one week.)

Which was withdrawn by the Comptroller.

Department of Taxes and Assessments—Modification of Schedule (Cal. No. 16).

The Secretary presented a report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades, dated April 13, 1914, referring to the request of the Board of Taxes and Assessments for the readjustment of salary schedule No. 151 for said Department for the year 1914 to provide for an increase in the salary of a Clerk from \$750 to \$900 per annum, by reducing a vacant position of Clerk at \$750 to \$540 per annum, also to the report of the Bureau of Standards on said request, wherein it is stated that if the request of the Tax Department could properly be considered by itself and on its own merits, it could be granted, but that an increase for one Clerk should be considered only as a part of a general readjustment of the salaries of all Clerks in the Department doing the same kind of work.

The Committee believes that the present request should be returned to the Tax Department pending such an adjustment of the salary schedule as will bring the compensation of the large group of Clerks doing the same kind of work within the minimum and maximum rates from \$1,050 to \$1,500, and if the Board approves this course it is the intention of the Committee, pending the adoption of the Budget for 1915, to treat similar applications from all Departments in their relation to adjustments which will bring the compensation for different kinds of work within well-defined maximum and minimum compensation limits.

(On April 17, 1914, the above report was laid over for one week.)

Which was laid over for one week (May 1, 1914).

District Attorney, Richmond County—Issue of Special Revenue Bonds (Cal. No. 17).

(On February 20, 1914, the request of the District Attorney in this matter was referred to the Comptroller.

On March 20, 1914, the Comptroller's report recommending denial of the request was laid over one week, and on March 27, 1914, the matter was again laid over.

At the meeting of April 17, 1914, the Comptroller submitted a substitute report recommending favorable action on the request of the District Attorney, Richmond County, which was laid over one week.)

The Secretary presented a communication from the District Attorney of Richmond County, dated February 9, 1914, requesting the issue of \$2,500 special revenue bonds for the expenses of conducting an investigation into the smoke nuisance along the Kill von Kull, and the following report of the Comptroller recommending approval thereof:

Department of Finance, City of New York, Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, April 15, 1914.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—In a communication dated February 9, 1914, the District Attorney of Richmond County requested that \$2,500 special revenue bonds be issued, pursuant to the provisions of section 1542 of the Greater New York Charter, to meet the expenses of conducting an investigation into the smoke nuisance along the Kill von Kull. In connection therewith it is reported as follows:

The District Attorney states that the public interest demands an investigation of a grievous complaint known as the "smoke nuisance." These smoke fumes are stated to emanate from the factories situate on the New Jersey shore of the Kill von Kull, and are considered injurious both to the health and property of citizens residing in Richmond County. For these reasons funds to enable prosecution by criminal action have been requested to be provided out of special revenue bonds.

In a letter dated March 25, 1914, Corporation Counsel was requested to furnish this office with an opinion as to whether special revenue bonds could be issued under section 1542 of the Charter for purposes of conducting such investigation as requested by the District Attorney.

Under date of April 2, 1914, the Corporation Counsel rendered an opinion which states in part as follows:

"There is nothing in the provisions of section 1542 of the Charter which imperatively restrains the making of the appropriation until the criminal action therein mentioned has actually been begun. It may be well that the public interests demand the additional expenditure contemplated by that provision prior to as well as after a criminal action for an ascertained violation of law has been begun, where the purpose of the expenditure is necessary to the proper conduct of the action when it shall have been instituted. I beg to advise you, therefore, that in my opinion revenue bonds may be issued under section 1542 of the Charter, pursuant to the request of the District Attorney of Richmond County."

In view of the opinion obtained from Corporation Counsel, which opinion is in support of the request made by the District Attorney of Richmond County, the adoption of the attached resolution is hereby recommended accordingly.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx, the Acting President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

Department of Bridges—Appropriation from Revenues for 1914, and Modification of Schedules (Cal. No. 18).

(On April 17, 1914, the communication from the Commissioner of Bridges in this matter was referred to the Comptroller.)

The Secretary presented a communication from the Commissioner of Bridges, dated April 11, 1914, requesting an appropriation of \$102,811.31 from the revenues received from the Brooklyn Bridge during 1914 to provide for the operation and maintenance of said bridge during the second four months of the year 1914, and the following report of the Comptroller recommending approval thereof and modification of schedules:

Department of Finance, City of New York, Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, April 18, 1914.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—In a communication dated April 11, 1914, a request was made by the Commissioner of Bridges "that \$102,811.31 be appropriated and set aside from the revenues of the Brooklyn Bridge, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 2, section 242, of the Greater New York Charter to provide for the operation and maintenance of said bridge during the second four months of the year 1914" (i. e., from May 1 to August 31, inclusive).

In connection therewith it is reported as follows:

Subdivision 2, section 242, of the Greater New York Charter provides that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall have power to appropriate, from time to time, for the maintenance of the said bridge, the moneys received from the revenues thereof.

When the Budget for the year 1914 was adopted, your Board approved the salary and wage schedules for the operation and maintenance of the Brooklyn Bridge, amounting to \$308,433.95. This sum was to be provided from the revenues of the said bridge which the then Commissioner of Bridges estimated at the above amount, viz.: \$308,433.95. Since then, however, it has been demonstrated that the revenues will not total the figure estimated, and as it will be some time before a fair estimate as to the probable revenues for 1914 can be obtained, the Commissioner of Bridges requests an appropriation to cover one-third of the schedules approved by your Board.

The chief source of revenue of this bridge is derived from the tolls received for the operation of the elevated lines over same, but owing to the increased use of the Williamsburg Bridge at this time in conjunction with the Centre street loop lines, this revenue has considerably decreased. What the ultimate deficit will be can be more accurately gauged when the "loop lines" are in operation over both the Williamsburg and Brooklyn Bridges.

The adoption of the attached resolutions approving the request of the Commissioner of Bridges to the extent of \$102,811.31 to cover the four months period from May 1 to August 31, 1914, inclusive, is hereby recommended.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx, the Acting President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

(On March 20, 1914, requests of the County Clerk of Richmond County in this matter were referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented communications from the County Clerk, Richmond County, dated March 13th and 19th, 1914, relative to the establishment of the grade of position of Bookbinder in his office, and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommending approval thereof:

City of New York, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Bureau of Standards, April 17, 1914.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On March 19, 1914, the County Clerk of Richmond County requested establishment, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 513 of the Laws of 1909, of the additional grade of position of Bookbinder at \$1,200 per annum, for one incumbent. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon as follows:

"Chapter 513 of the Laws of 1909 provides, in part, as follows:

"Sec. 1. On and after the first day of January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, the Clerk of the County of Richmond shall receive a salary as his compensation to be fixed by the board of estimate and apportionment of the city of New York * * *

"Sec. 2. On and after the first day of January in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, the salaries to be paid to the assistants, clerks, employees or subordinates employed in said clerk's office shall be fixed by the board of estimate and apportionment of the city of New York * * *

"The County Clerk states that he applied to the Board of City Record to have a Bookbinder assigned to do the necessary bookbinding in his office and was advised that there was sufficient work to be done to warrant the employment of a permanent bookbinder. There are about 175 libers in the office which need rebinding, and about 150 which require renumbering and relettering. In order that the books in the office be put in proper condition and kept so, it will be necessary to employ regularly a Bookbinder to rebind the books now in a bad condition and repair all others as soon as they show signs of deterioration. The funds to meet the expense of the new position are to be provided by dropping the vacant position of Court Clerk at \$1,800 per annum, in the same office."

In view of the above facts we recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request. Respectfully,

Armory Board—Establishment of Grade of Position of Clerk (Cal. No. 33).

The Secretary presented a communication from the Secretary of the Armory Board, dated December 1, 1913, requesting the establishment of the grade of position of Clerk in the said Board, and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommending that said request be denied:

City of New York, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Municipal Building, Bureau of Standards, April 17, 1914.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On December 1, 1913, the Secretary of the Armory Board requested establishment, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, of the grade of position of Clerk at \$1,650 per annum. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon as follows:

"The 1913 Budget provided for the salary of Mr. William J. Phair as Clerk in the Armory Board at \$1,800 per annum pending a promotion examination. Mr. Phair failed to pass the examination. The Secretary stated that he desired to fix the salary of Mr. Phair at \$1,650 per annum, the limit of the third grade Clerkship, pending a re-examination, and a request was made to establish this grade. After it was filed Mr. Phair died.

"On March 21, 1914, the Secretary stated that he still desired the establishment of the \$1,650 grade.

"The 1914 Budget provides for the position of Clerk at \$1,800 per annum. The position is now vacant. It is proposed to fill it by increasing to \$1,650 the salary of a Bookkeeper, who now receives \$1,500 per annum. It is also proposed to request the Municipal Civil Service Commission to change the Bookkeeper's title to Clerk.

"A tentative appraisal of the value of the work performed by Mr. Phair does not justify the request for an increase in compensation."

In view of the foregoing, we recommend that the request be denied. Respectfully,

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx, the Acting President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

The Secretary was directed to transmit a copy of the report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades to the Secretary of the Armory Board.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Retirement of George Adams, Inspector of Meters and Water Consumption (Cal. No. 34).

The Secretary presented a report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades, dated April 13, 1914, returning for filing communication from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated December 4, 1913, requesting the retirement of George Adams, an Inspector of Meters and Water Consumption, in said Department, as Mr. Adams died on April 11, 1914.

(On December 11, 1913, the above request was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

Which was ordered filed

Department of Health—Approval of Contract for the Preparation of Plans, Etc. (Cal. No. 35).

The Secretary presented a report of the Bureau of Contract Supervision, dated April 18, 1914, referring to the request of the Board of Health for approval of a supplemental contract for the services of Charles A. Smith, Civil Engineer, in preparing complete plans and specifications and supervising the work required to complete the improvement of the water supply at the Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Otisville, New York, and recommending that the Board of Health be notified that no further action is required in this matter, as the Engineer's final contract, approved by the Board of Estimate on March 25, 1913, calls for a total payment of 5 per cent. of the actual cost of construction work.

Which was ordered filed, and the Secretary directed to notify the Department of Health.

Bronx Parkway Commission—List of Owners of Property and Amounts to Be Paid for Lands in the Bronx Parkway Reservation (Cal. No. 36).

The Secretary presented reports (4) of the Comptroller, dated April 15, 1914, referring to communication from the Bronx Parkway Commission, submitting list of owners of property and amounts to be paid for lands in the Bronx Parkway Reservation, and recommending that the Secretary of the Board be requested to notify said Commission that the prices mentioned have been found to be fair and reasonable.

(On October 23, and November 20, 1913, and on January 9, and February 20, 1914, the above communications were referred to the Comptroller.)

Which were ordered filed, and the Secretary directed to notify the Bronx Parkway Commission.

Register, New York County—Establishment of Various Grades of Positions (Cal. No. 37).

The Secretary presented a communication from the Register of Bronx County, dated April 21, 1914, referring to a communication from the Register of New York County, presented to the Board at its meeting held April 17, 1914 (referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades), requesting the establishment of various grades of positions, pursuant to chapter 837 of the Laws of 1913, and requesting that action be deferred on this request of the Register of New York County until the questions

pertaining to the compensation to be paid for carrying out the provisions of this law have been passed upon.
Which was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.

Department of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn—Approval of Proposed Contract in the Matter of Relocating Railroad Tracks on 15th Street and on 9th Avenue Plaza, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 38).

The Secretary presented a communication from the Commisisoner of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn, dated April 29, 1914, transmitting for approval proposed contract between The City of New York, The Nassau Electric Railroad Company and the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company in regard to the liability of the expense of relocating the railroad tracks on 15th street and 9th avenue Plaza of Prospect Park, Brooklyn.

The above agreement has been approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel. (On July 17, 1911, the Board authorized the issue of \$20,000 corporate stock for the improvement of the Plaza at the 15th street entrance to Prospect Park, which work has been deferred owing to the dispute as to how the cost of the relocation of tracks should be borne.)

Which was referred to the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget

Department of Health—Appropriation for Draining Marsh Lands in the Borough of The Bronx, Etc. (Cal. No. 39).

The Secretary presented a communication from the Board of Health, dated April 21, 1914, requesting an appropriation of \$3,600, pursuant to chapter 535 of the Laws of 1893, for the expense of draining certain marsh lands in the Borough of The Bronx, including the purchase of necessary supplies, sewer drain pipe, vitrified pipe, cement, etc.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

City Chamberlain—Destruction of Certain Papers and Records (Cal. No. 40).

The Secretary presented a communication from the City Chamberlain, dated April 21, 1914, requesting authority, pursuant to Section 1545a of the Charter, to destroy certain papers and records formerly filed in the office of the County Treasurer of Queens County, etc., and enclosing certificate of the Corporation Counsel to the effect that these papers and records may be destroyed.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

Court House Board—Approval of Preliminary Plans for New Court House in New York County (Cal. No. 41).

The Secretary presented a communication from the Chairman and Secretary of the Court House Board, transmitting for approval preliminary plan of the architect for the new court house building for New York County.

Which was referred to the Committee on City Plan.

Upon motion of the President of the Board of Aldermen the matter of incidental changes in the layout of the section contiguous to the court house site was also referred to the Committee on City Plan for examination and report.

Mr. Frank W. Smith and Rev. Father Evers appeared and asked that the site selected should not include the property on which St. Andrews Church is located.

City Magistrates' Courts—Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx—Appropriation for Reinstatement of Probation Officers (Cal. No. 42).

The Secretary presented a communication from the Woman's Republican Club of New York City, dated April 20, 1914, requesting that an appropriation be made for the reinstatement of five female Probation Officers in the City Magistrates' Courts of Manhattan and The Bronx.

Which was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.

Department of Health—Appropriation and Modification of Schedules (Cal. No. 43).

The Secretary presented the following report of the Comptroller, recommending the transfer of \$7,000 within the appropriation for the Department of Health for 1914, and modifications of schedules, to provide for the expense of vaccinating pupils in Parochial Schools:

Department of Finance, City of New York, Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, April 21, 1914.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York:

Gentlemen—The Board of Health has requested a transfer of \$7,000 within appropriations for the year 1914, in order to provide for the expense of vaccinating the children attending the parochial schools of the city.

The following statement has been made by the President of the Board of Health regarding the necessity for this expenditure at this time:

"This city is in grave danger of an epidemic of smallpox by reason of the entry into the city of numerous persons residing in the northwestern part of New York State, in Maryland, Pennsylvania, Ohio and certain Southern States where said disease is now epidemic, and, in order to avoid as nearly as possible the occurrence of such an epidemic I would recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment furnish funds with which to employ additional Medical Inspectors for the purpose of vaccinating those it has been impossible in the past to reach through the efforts of Medical Inspectors at the disposal of the Department of Health.

"I refer to children attending the schools under the jurisdiction of the Catholic School Board. These schools are not amenable to the State Law, and for that reason general vaccination of the children therein has not been attempted by the Department. The officers of the Catholic School Board, however, are disposed to co-operate with the Department of Health in facilitating the vaccination of the children in the parochial schools, and the serious danger to the city may thereby be prevented."

The necessary transfer of funds is hereby recommended to be made from the appropriation of the Department of Health entitled "No. 1877, Carfare, Promoting Public Health, Food Inspection," in order that the work may be undertaken immediately, with the understanding that the fund from which the money is now taken will be subsequently reimbursed by transfer from some available balance in an appropriate 1914 Budget account.

The adoption of the attached resolution, granting the request, is accordingly recommended. Respectfully,

City of New York—Liability Under the Provisions of the Workmen's Compensation Law (Cal. No. 44).

The Secretary presented the following report of the Comptroller:

Department of Finance, City of New York, Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, April 22, 1914.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York:

Gentlemen—Your attention is respectfully directed to chapter 41 of the Laws of 1914, as amended by chapter 316 of the Laws of 1914 (known as the Workmen's Compensation Law), providing compensation for injuries sustained or death incurred by employees engaged in hazardous employment, a schedule of which is incorporated in the law.

Section 3 of article 1, as amended, contains the following definitions:

Sub-division 3. "'Employer,' except when otherwise expressly stated, means a person, partnership, association, corporation, and the legal representatives of a deceased employer, or the receiver or trustee of a person, partnership, association or corporation, employing workmen in hazardous employments, including the state and a municipal corporation or other political subdivision thereof."

Sub-division 4. "'Employee' means a person who is engaged in a hazardous employment in the service of an employer carrying on or conducting the same upon the premises or at the plant, or in the course of his employment away from the plant of his employer; and shall not include farm laborers or domestic servants."

Sub-division 5. "'Employment' includes employment only in a trade, business or occupation carried on by the employer for pecuniary gain."

The City has a large number of employees whose employment is scheduled in the law as hazardous. Subdivision 3, as enacted by chapter 41 of the Laws of 1914, excluded municipalities from the provisions of the chapter, and chapter 316 amended this definition to specifically include them.

The definition of "employment," however, would seem to be in conflict with that of "employer," the City not conducting its business for pecuniary gain, and thus occasion some doubt as to the exact liability of the City under this act.

Section 50 of article 3 reads as follows:

"Security for payment of compensation. An employer shall secure compensation to his employees in one of the following ways:

"1. By insuring and keeping insured the payment of such compensation in the state fund, or

"2. By insuring and keeping insured the payment of such compensation with any stock corporation or mutual association authorized to transact the business of workmen's compensation insurance in this state. If insurance be so effected in such a corporation or mutual association, the employer shall forthwith file with the commission, in form prescribed by it, a notice specifying the name of such insurance corporation or mutual association together with a copy of the contract or policy of insurance.

"3. By furnishing satisfactory proof to the commission of his financial ability to pay such compensation for himself, in which case the commission may, in its discretion, require the deposit with the commission of securities of the kind prescribed in section thirteen of the insurance law, in an amount to be determined by the commission, to secure his liability to pay the compensation provided in this chapter.

"If an employer fail to comply with this section, he shall be liable to a penalty for every day during which such failure continues of one dollar for every employee, to be recovered in an action brought by the commission.

"The commission may, in its discretion, for good cause shown, remit any such penalty, provided the employer in default secure compensation as provided in this section."

It is hereby recommended that the matter be referred to the Committee on Social Welfare, and that the Committee be directed to confer with the Corporation Counsel as to the extent to which the City is liable under the provisions of the law, and to investigate the matter for the purpose of submitting to this Board a plan or plans for providing security for the compensation of injured employees, and for complying with all other provisions of the law.

Transmitted herewith for your consideration is a resolution in accordance with the recommendation herein previously made. Respectfully submitted,

Whereas, There has been passed by the Legislature, and signed by the Governor, a law known as the Workmen's Compensation Law (chapter 41 of the Laws of 1914, as amended by chapter 316 of the Laws of 1914), providing compensation for injuries sustained or death incurred by employees engaged in hazardous employment and apparently placing the same liability for such compensation on municipal corporations as on employers engaged in private enterprises, and

Whereas, The law also provides four optional plans for securing compensation to employees, therefore be it

Resolved, That the Committee on Social Welfare be and it hereby is directed to confer with the Corporation Counsel in order to determine the extent to which the law affects the city as an employer, and if it is determined that the city is subject to the provisions of the law, the Committee is directed to investigate the matter, and submit for the consideration of this Board, a plan for providing security for the compensation of injured employees and for otherwise complying with the law.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx, the Acting President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On February 13, 1914, the President of the Borough of Manhattan requested a modification of three salary schedules in his office for 1914. One schedule has been reported on. The Bureau of Standards reports on No. 352 as follows:

"In Personal Service, Salaries, Regular Employees, Administration, No. 352, Audit and Accounts, it is proposed to change the line 'Clerk, 1 at \$750,' to read 'Clerk, 1 at \$900,' the \$150 necessary to meet the increase being obtained from Balance Unassigned. The purpose is to increase the salary of Mr. John M. Lewis, Clerk, from \$750 to \$900.

"Mr. Lewis entered the service in 1907 as an Office Boy, at \$300 per annum, and has worked his way up to second grade Clerk, at \$750.

"Mr. Lewis prepares pay rolls, computes amounts expended against each line and transfers them to the vouchers. Practically all the pay rolls of the department are totaled by him each month; he draws checks for about two hundred employees, and keeps a card index of all contracts against which charges can be made on tax levy tolls, showing the date of the preliminary and final contracts and the date of registration.

"Perhaps the most exacting work is the computation of amounts to be charged against tax levy and corporate stock accounts, respectively. Time sheets showing the hours which each employee spends on a particular job are turned over to Mr. Lewis, and from those he computes the proportions of the total that should be met by corporate stock or by tax levy funds.

"In addition to the foregoing, Mr. Lewis performs such other duties as may be assigned to him by the Chief Clerk. A tentative appraisal of the value of work of this nature indicates that compensation averaging from \$1,200 to \$1,650 would be reasonable. The request is to make the salary \$900."

In view of the above facts we think the case is so meritorious as to bring it within the policy of your Board to grant individual increases only on evidence of extraordinary and exceptional facts. We therefore recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request and modifying the necessary schedule line.

President, Borough of Manhattan—Modification of Schedule (Cal. No. 50).

The Secretary presented a communication from the President of the Borough of Manhattan, dated March 20, 1914, requesting modification of schedules for 1914, and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades, recommending approval thereof:

City of New York, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Bureau of Standards, April 22, 1914.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On March 20, 1914, the President of the Borough of Manhattan requested modification of personal service schedules Nos. 357 and 359TC. The Bureau of Standards reports as follows on No. 359TC:

"In Personal Service, Salaries, Regular Employees, Care of Sewers, 359TC, Engineering and Inspection, Tax Levy and Corporate Stock Force, it is proposed to eliminate two vacant positions, Principal Assistant Engineer at \$3,500 and Inspector of Connections at \$1,200, and to add one Assistant Engineer at \$4,000. The difference of \$700 is carried as balance unassigned.

"The duties of the position of Assistant Engineer will embrace supervisory and administrative powers. In the absence of the Consulting Engineer in charge, he will act as Chief of the Bureau of Sewers, which has jurisdiction of about 500 miles of sewers in the Borough of Manhattan and a total force in active times of about 150.

"It will be the duty of the Assistant Engineer, under the direction of his Chief, to supervise the preparation of plans for all sewer work. General plans are suggested by the Bureau of Sewers and the details are worked out by the Bureau of Design and Survey, but the final design is subject to approval of the Bureau of Sewers.

"Repair and reconstruction work, which is going forward at all times, will be under the immediate supervision of the Assistant Engineer. He will exercise a general supervision over all field work, which varies in volume, but at the present time contemplated sewer improvements to the amount of about \$1,000,000 are in process of authorization.

"Another important feature of the work is the solution of problems created by the construction of new subways. These lines necessitate extensive changes in the sewer system and create complications which require skill and experience to overcome. The Consulting Engineer in charge of the Bureau of Sewers is also a member of the New York Sewer Plan Commission and the work of the Commission occupies so much of his time that current problems do not receive attention as promptly as he desires. It is to relieve this situation that the Assistant Engineer is requested.

"It is proposed to transfer Mr. John Weinberger from the Bureau of Highways, Borough of Queens, where he is now receiving \$4,000 per annum. Mr. Weinberger was employed in the Bureau of Sewers, Borough of The Bronx, for a number of years; was later in the Department of Bridges, and was then transferred to the office of the President of the Borough of Queens.

"The position of Principal Assistant Engineer, which it is proposed to eliminate, was held until last autumn by Mr. Martin Browne, who received \$4,000 per annum. Mr. Browne retired on an annuity and the position was carried in the 1914 budget at \$3,500. The grade of Assistant Engineer at \$4,000 has been established.

"A tentative appraisal of the value of work of this class shows a maximum compensation value of \$4,000 per annum."

In view of the foregoing facts, we recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request. Respectfully,

The Secretary presented a communication, dated April 9, 1914, from the Department of Education, requesting approval of contract, specifications, etc., for certain work on Public Schools 16 and 73, Manhattan, and the following report of the Bureau of Contract Supervision, recommending approval thereof:

City of New York, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Bureau of Contract Supervision, April 20, 1914.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On April 9, 1914, the Board of Education requested approval of the form of contract, specifications, plans and estimates of cost for the following:

Public School 16, Manhattan, workshop in west yard, estimated cost \$4,100;

Public School 73, Manhattan, school yard and garden, estimated cost \$2,800.

Of the cost of the work at Public School 16, \$275 representing the estimated cost of replacing the existing folding doors at the end of the gymnasium with brick wall, is to be charged to the annual budget account; the balance, \$3,825, is the estimated cost of the new work and is to be charged to the corporate stock fund entitled "C. D. E.—11, School Building Fund, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx."

At Public School 73, it is proposed to form a new school yard and garden on the vacant property to the west of the school building. This work requires alterations of existing conditions, the cost of which is estimated at \$800, and this amount is to be charged to the annual budget account. The balance, \$2,000, is the estimated cost of the new work and is to be charged to the corporate stock fund entitled "C. D. E.—11, School Building Fund, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx."

On April 15, 1914, a cash balance of \$28,238.39 remained in this fund.

The form of contract, specifications and plans are satisfactory. The estimates of cost are reasonable.

The divisions of charges between budget account and corporate stock funds are proper and the amounts reasonable.

I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request and specifying the division of charges as stated. Respectfully,

President, Borough of Manhattan—Modification of Schedule (Cal. No. 52).

The Secretary presented a communication from the President of the Borough of Manhattan, dated February 13, 1914, requesting modification of schedules for 1914 and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades, recommending approval thereof:

City of New York, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Bureau of Standards, April 15, 1914.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On February 13, 1914, the President of the Borough of Manhattan requested modification of three salary schedules for the year 1914. The Bureau of Standards reports as follows on the proposed modification of Code No. 361:

"In Personal Service, Salaries, Regular Employees, Care of Public Buildings and Offices, No. 361, Executive, the line 'Confidential Inspector, 1 at \$2,100' is changed to read 'Confidential Inspector, 1 at \$3,000.' It is proposed by this change to increase the salary of Mr. Harold C. Todd, Confidential Inspector, from \$2,100 to \$3,000.

"The description of his work given by Mr. Todd and approved by the responsible representative of the Borough President, is as follows:

"Have charge of a confidential file relating to the personnel of the Bureau; keep a record of the names, addresses, wages or salaries, titles, work, efficiency, discipline, home conditions, and all personal factors with relation to nature of work, assignment to duty, transfers, leaves of absence, approvals of appointment, efficiency records, hours of service and general operation of the work force; take charge of all time sheets, overtime, emergency transfers to cover sudden absences on account of illness, carfare, expenses, bath patronage reports and make recommendations thereon to the Superintendent; have general supervision of the cleaning of all the baths, courthouses, markets, comfort stations and other buildings under the jurisdiction of the Superintendent, and make regular reports and recommendations to the Superintendent with reference to them; make regular tours of inspection; report with recommendations, upon all cases of dereliction of duty of employees; examine and approve requests for cleaning and janitorial supplies; examine and follow up contracts with relation to cleaning, such as window cleaning contract and report to the Superintendent upon irregularities which may be made during the regular course; work upon special assignments; follow up complaints against employees or operation; investigate and do confidential work, such as may be assigned to me by the Superintendent."

"In the absence of the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices Mr. Todd is acting executive head of the department. Recommendations have been made by the Bureau of Municipal Research to establish the position of Superintendent of Public Baths in the Borough of Manhattan. In these recommendations the duties were defined and the salary suggested to be fixed at \$2,700. The duties described as appropriate to such a position are now being performed by Mr. Todd in conjunction with his other duties.

"It is quite clear from the recitation of Mr. Todd's duties that he exercises administrative functions and is in reality an active assistant superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices. The amount requested as a reward for his service seems to be reasonable but the duties are clearly beyond the scope of the title of Confidential Inspector, and it is the purpose of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to associate certain definite duties with established titles.

"It is stated, however, by the Borough President that the present request is intended to provide a temporary means of compensation for the services of Mr. Todd in existing lines and that application will be made immediately for the creation of an appropriate title and grade for the continuation of Mr. Todd's services."

In view of the foregoing facts we believe that the situation justifies an exceptional course and we hereby recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request. We further recommend that the Borough President request the establishment of a title of position describing all the work being done by Mr. Todd.

Department of Bridges—Approval of Contract, Specifications, Etc. (Cal. No. 53).

(On March 13, 1914, the communication from the Commissioner of Bridges in this matter was referred to the Comptroller.)

The Secretary presented a report of the Bureau of Contract Supervision, dated April 22, 1914, recommending that plans and specifications for furnishing and installing directory boards in the Municipal Building be returned to the Bridge Commissioner with the request that the size and location of the boards be changed to make them accessible to all visitors to the building and at the same time to reduce the cost from \$5,000 to approximately \$2,000, thereby effecting a saving of \$3,000 and giving better service to the public. It is recommended that instead of bronze framed directories for the floors above the first floor, cheaper metal frames with mahogany finish be substituted in order to reduce the cost and be more in harmony with the trim already in the corridors. The plans as submitted place the directories for the first floor lobby in the two hot air vestibules on the Centre street side of the building, and in order for the visitors entering from the six other entrances it would be necessary for them to traverse the lobby, go out into the Centre street vestibule, consult the directory and then cross the lobby again to reach the elevators, thereby causing congestion and discomfort.

The Secretary was directed to return the plans and specifications to the Department of Bridges, together with a copy of report of the Bureau of Contract Supervision.

Fire Department—Approval of Contract, Specifications, Etc. (Cal. No. 54).

The Secretary presented a communication from the Fire Commissioner, dated February 11, 1914, requesting approval of contract, specifications, etc., for seven motor driven combination mechanical and hose wagons, and the following report of the Bureau of Contract Supervision, recommending approval thereof:

City of New York, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Bureau of Contract Supervision, April 20, 1914.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

On February 11, 1914, the Fire Commissioner requested approval of the form of contract, revised specifications and the estimate of cost in the sum of \$28,315 for seven motor driven combination chemical and hose wagons for the Fire Department:

It is proposed to divide the cost and charge against corporate stock funds as follows:

For two wagons, \$8,000, against "C. F. D.—13, Purchase of New Apparatus, Manhattan."

For one wagon, \$1,364.48, against "C. F. B.—10A, Purchase of New Apparatus, Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond;" \$1,280, against "C. F. D.—15, Purchase of New Apparatus, Borough of The Bronx;" \$1,400.52, against C. F. D.—12, Purchase of New Apparatus, Borough of Brooklyn."

For two wagons, \$8,090, against "C. F. D.—11, Purchase of New Apparatus, Towns of Flushing and College Point."

For two wagons, \$384.21, against "C. F. D.—14, Purchase of New Apparatus, Borough of Queens," 1907; \$2,523, against "C. F. D.—14, Purchase of New Apparatus, Borough of Queens," 1911. \$432.48, against "C. F. D.—12, Purchase of New Apparatus, Borough of Brooklyn," 1907; \$4,750.51, against "C. F. D.—12, Purchase of New Apparatus, Borough of Brooklyn," 1911.

The appropriation of \$100,000 for C. F. D.—10A was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 3, 1910, and by the Board of Aldermen on June 23, 1910. On April 22, 1914, the unencumbered balance of \$1,364.48 remained in the fund.

The appropriation of \$19,000 for C. F. D.—11 was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 19, 1908, and by the Board of Aldermen on June 30, 1908. On April 22, 1914, an unencumbered balance of \$9,325.05 remained in the fund.

The appropriation of \$228,840 for C. F. D.—12 was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 17, 1911, and by the Board of Aldermen on July 31, 1911. On April 22, 1914, an unencumbered balance of \$9,402.48 remained in the fund.

The appropriation of \$132,140 for C. F. D.—13 was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 17, 1911, and by the Board of Aldermen on July 31, 1911. On April 22, 1914, an unencumbered balance of \$8,414.93 remained in the fund.

The appropriation of \$159,440 for C. F. D.—14 was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 17, 1911, and by the Board of Aldermen on July 31, 1911. On April 22, 1914, an unencumbered balance of \$2,907.21 remained in the fund.

The appropriation of \$130,260 for C. F. D.—15 was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 17, 1911, and by the Board of Aldermen on July 31, 1911. On April 22, 1914, an unencumbered balance of \$1,571.75 remained in the fund.

Since the transmission of these specifications for approval the Fire Department has adopted standard sizes of axle spindles, wheel bearings, hubs, brake drums and sprocket wheels for combination chemical and hose wagons in order to allow interchangeability of wheels and the drawings showing these standards have been included in the specifications. A change has also been made in the funds to which the expenditure is to be charged.

The specifications practically describe the stock car of the International Motor Company. The Fire Department has 40 wagons manufactured by this company, and in order to have standard sizes, and to allow interchangeability of wheels and other parts, it is desired to get the new wagons according to the standard now in use. At a previous bid on similar specifications there were four bidders. The specifications upon which I am reporting have been submitted to another competitor of the International Motor Company, and the representative of that competing company stated that his company could and probably would bid on the specifications.

The form of contract, specifications and plans are satisfactory.

The estimate of cost is the same as the City has previously paid for this style of hose wagon. Owing however to the omission of the automatic starter on these machines and the lower market price of rubber at this time the estimate of cost should be reduced to \$27,615.

I recommend that the request be approved at the reduced estimate of cost by the adoption of the attached resolution.

Resolved, That, in the event that the aggregate sum of the lowest bids received for the three items is equal to or less than the aggregate sum of the three items herein approved (although the amount of the lowest bid for one or more items may exceed the amount approved for said item or items) then the award for the three items, provided all three are awarded, may be made without further approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and be it further

Gentlemen—On April 14, 1914, I made application to the Civil Service Commission for the extension of the time of the employment of Miss Bessie C. Stern, expert Examiner and Tabulator at \$6 per diem for sixty-five days for a sum not exceeding \$390. Miss Stern was in the employ of the Committee on School Inquiry from July, 1911, to December 31, 1913, and has been receiving compensation at the rate of \$6 per day. I have assigned her temporarily to the office of the Committee on Education, and recommend to the Committee that she be permanently employed at a salary of \$1,800 per annum.

I recommend that the expenditure of \$390 from the contingent fund of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the purpose of paying Miss Stern at a per diem rate pending her appointment be authorized by the adoption of the attached resolution. Respectfully,

William H. Quinn—Claim of (Cal. No. 59).

The Secretary presented the following report of the Comptroller, certifying the claim of William H. Quinn, for the sum of \$1,740, for the transportation of prisoners from the Court to the Queens County Jail, Borough of Queens.

City of New York, Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office, April 21, 1914.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—Under and pursuant to the provisions of section 246 of the Greater New York Charter, I hereby certify that an application has been presented by William H. Quinn for the payment of \$1,908, alleged to be due him for the transportation of prisoners from court to the Queens County Jail, in Queens Borough, in the months of October, November and December, 1912, and February, March, April, May, June, August, September and fifteen days in October, 1913, at \$6 per day, the expenses for furnishing the vans and horses; that this application was amended by adding thereto a demand for the payment of \$180 for such hire and transportation for the month of September, 1912, and \$186 for the month of July, 1913; that the same was furnished in good faith and actually used by the office of the Sheriff of Queens County in the transportation of criminal prisoners; that no action has been instituted upon the claim upon which the application is made; that the duty of transferring criminal prisoners to and from the courts and jails in Queens County is under the provisions of chapter 456 of the Laws of 1912, within the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Correction; that the Sheriff of Queens County may incur expenses only in those cases where he is required to provide transportation for civil prisoners or in the performance of his criminal duties in those cases where he is required to provide transportation for criminal prisoners who are transferred beyond the limits of the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Correction of The City of New York, and therefore, the Corporation Counsel advises that this claim is illegal and invalid, but notwithstanding in my judgment, it is equitable and proper for the City to pay this claim in the sum of \$1,740, which seems to be the actual amount expended by claimant for the transportation of the prisoners, inasmuch as the City has received a benefit and derived an advantage, which is equal to said sum of \$1,740, and that said \$1,740 is the amount which should be paid in full satisfaction of the applicant's claims for the services rendered from the funds as follows: \$610 from the fund entitled, "Sheriff of Queens County," Code 2422—1912, and \$1,130 from the fund entitled, "Sheriff of Queens County, Hire of Horses, Vehicles and Drivers," Code 3902—1913.

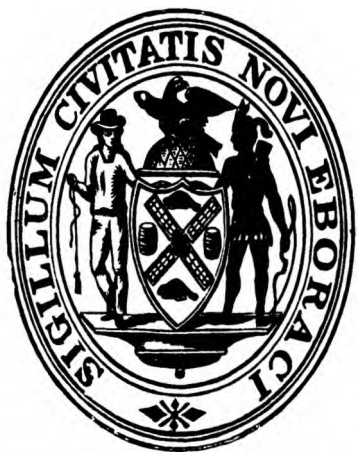

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
